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How much will it Cost?

It's a fact of life that we can't do much without money. What we do with our money, however, will depend on what we value the most. What is it that pulls most at our hearts and minds, and demands our attention? Where do our passions and ambitions lie? What would we spend that million on (if we only had it)? Jesus once said, in effect, that if you follow the money, you will find the heart. We inevitably give ourselves, and what we own, to what we value the most.

So that raises the real question what is the burning issue for us? To generalize for a moment, we can safely say that the issues for us seem to be those that affect our physical and emotional well-being. Just take a look at the newspaper editorials and letter columns. Or run your eye over the current issues, both international

and local, and you will see what is engaging our hearts and minds. Check out the bestselling books.

It's a fair bet that the guestion of a rich young man who once came to see Jesus would not feature high in our list. "What good thing shall I do that I may inherit eternal life?" he asked in the passage in Matthew 19:16-26. There are several problems with this for us today. First, the goal would probably be considered irrelevant to most. This life is what matters, not some relationship with an unlikely god that will reach into an implausible eternity. But there is something even more jarring about his question—the idea that we must do something in respect of such a quest.

It is common to hear that eternal life (or more commonly "being saved") has nothing really to do with us and what we do. If we at first accept the reality of God and believe that life with Him is worth pursuing, we are most likely to accept the idea that its achievement will be all God's doing and none of our own. God will save me and it has nothing to do with how I live my present life.

So, what is the burning issue for you? What occupies your waking thoughts?

It is extremely hard to square that idea with Jesus' response to this young man's question. In fact, Jesus told him to do something very specific—to give away everything he had—in order to be accepted by Jesus and find the life he sought. The

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searcher was unable to pay such a price and went away dejected. Jesus commented on the young man's failure—getting into God's kingdom is almost impossible.

Of course, it is true, we cannot earn eternal life. There is nothing we can do or pay to achieve forgiveness with God and gain access to His kingdom. In that respect, we are bankrupt. Only Jesus had the available resources to pay the debt we owe to make that possible. That's where the impossible becomes possible. But that's not the same thing as saying that we have nothing to pay to accept God's gift. The issue here is not what we can give to earn life with God; it's what we are willing to give up to make acceptance of His free gift possible. Unless we are willing to pay the price, the possible becomes impossible.

So what has money got to do with

inheriting eternal life, to use the young man's expression? Well, nothing-and everything! There are some things that stop us from trusting God and accepting what He wants to give us. Primarily, the obstacle is the willingness to give up everything that would compete with God's place as Lord in our lives. For the young man, it was money. And if we take money to stand for our focus on our own agenda in this life, instead of on God, then that is our problem too.

So, what is the burning issue for you? What occupies your waking thoughts? Where is your heart and mind? What do you value most? And what are you prepared to pay—or in this case, give up—to get it?

"Come, I will show you the Bride, the wife of the Lamb."

Revelation begins with the churches and concludes with the Church. This is a reflection upon Revelation 21-22.

One of the seven angels said to John, "Come, I will show you the bride, the wife of the Lamb." And he carried John "in the Spirit to a mountain great and high and showed [him] the Holy City, Jerusalem..." (Rev. 21:9b, 10a).

The question is—does this vision refer to church in its heavenly state after the end of the world and the final judgment, or does it refer to the church in its present spiritual state, wonderfully blessed by its Saviour and King, the Lord Christ? In truth, it refers to both, for it is the one kingdom "coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride beautifully dressed for her husband" (21:2).

There is just one kingdom. It is the kingdom that "is near" of John and Jesus' announcements (Matt. 3:2; 4:17). It is the coming kingdom for which Christians are to pray (Matt. 6:10), and it is that which they are to seek first (6:33). It is the subject of Jesus' many parables, "...the king-dom of heaven is like..." (e.g. Matt. 13:24). It is the good news which is to be preached "as a testimony to all nations" (Matt. 24:14). It is that kingdom that Paul (Col. 1:12-14), Peter (1 Pet. 2:9), and John (Rev. 1:6) speak of as a present reality for Christians. It is the same kingdom that Christ will deliver to God the Father "after destroying every rule and every authority and power...and... death" (1 Cor. 15:24, 26). It is that kingdom

that is of heaven, that extends into this world, and at the end will be found wholly in God's eternal realm (2 Pet. 1:11).

The common view is that the kingdom of Revelation 21-22 is the kingdom in its eternal state. Yet there are indications found in the text that suggest that the description is of the kingdom in its present state, the kingdom of heaven on earth. The common view sees Revelation as having a linear time-line. Hence, what follows the last judgment (20:11-15) must necessarily be a vision of heaven. However, the wording in the final two chapters of Revelation, it is proposed, point to the kingdom's present blessing as the consequence of Christ's victory depicted in the Scroll.

Christ, the only one "in heaven or on earth or under the earth worthy," has opened the Scroll (5:3-5). The Scroll's content (12:1-20:15) is the story of salvation centered in the death, burial and resurrection of Christ by which he achieves victory over evil, both in heaven and on earth. The purpose in retelling this triumphant work of Christ is to bring encouragement to the "seven churches" of Asia (1:11; 22:16). The concluding vision of the Church in its present spiritual magnificence is presented as a final inspiration for the troubled churches of Asia.

"Then he [the One seated upon the throne] said to me [John], 'It is done. I am the Alpha and the Omega, the Beginning and the End'" (21:5b, 6a). Here, God, speaking directly for the first time in Revelation, indicates that the general vision of Revelation has concluded. Now follows the final vision, a vision that is set in the present time of John's audience. Consider the following evidences of the text.

God's Dwelling Place: "Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more" (21:1). This is figurative language. It speaks of the coming of the New Age (see Isa. 65:17) that through the work of Christ has come. "I saw the Holy City, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven..." (21:2). *continued on page 14*

A Voice for Unity

It seems like it should be very difficult for anyone who professes to be a Christian to read Christ's prayer for the unity of believers (John 17) and not feel extremely pained by the widespread division in the religious world. There are literally thousands of denominations and sects. How can

these divisions be reconciled with the Bible? Why aren't more people genuinely distressed by this?

Historically, we know that the roots of the Restoration Movement are deeply embedded in the hearts of people who were troubled by religious division and its contradiction with the clear New Testament concept of the church as the one body of Christ. The Restoration Movement was a vibrant, exciting time when people abandoned the organizations, doctrines and practices which rationalized, maintained and perpetuated denominational distinctions and divisions. The call for a return to the practice of simple, New Testament Christianity came from people who were once part of that denominational world. They had renounced their past to be, simply, Christians. They studied the Bible to identify those things that were part of the original way. They preached, taught and debated to advance their message. Yet, despite their efforts, the religious world, generally, remained unchanged.

From time to time, individuals and groups have appeared with a restoration-type message. Sadly most of these have not attracted much attention. Recently, an article appeared in the February issue of Christianity Today which is of interest. Written by Sarah Hinlicky Wilson, it is entitled *"Lament for a Divided Church."* Wilson is assistant professor at the Institutes for Ecumenical Research in France and is editor of Lutheran Forum.

Wilson is troubled by division, speaking of the general "callous disregard" for the prayer for unity in John 17. She observes that traditionally, responses to division have tended to fall into two different positions. On one hand, there has been what might be called isolationism, which dismisses "everyone outside of a particular circle" as not being part of the one church. On the other, there is the "problematic notion of the 'invisible church'". She seems to suggest here that by this view, the "invisible church" is made up of individuals, not the "historical communities" (i.e. organizations, denominations, etc.) She notes a contradiction here as one view "maximizes the importance of church structures and the other minimizes it." But, she notes, both views ignore the reality of church history.

In Wilson's view, the ecumenical movement has been an attempt to reconcile the organizational and historic differences and promote unity. The problem has been that each religious body has brought its own history, agenda and concepts, as well, they "mimic the kind of unity they see around them." (For example, she observes how Evangelicals and Pentecostals mimic the "capitalist market providing a product for every taste" while mainline Protestants follow more of a franchise model.")

The most interesting points come in the section entitled "Back to the Beginning." Initially, Wilson notes that division goes back to New Testament times. There were differences between Peter and Paul, Paul and Barnabas and also within some of the churches. That said, the Gospel was the unifying force in the early church. "Church turns divisive and ideological when it is severed from the gospel that brought it into being." Given that, she concludes "a mere invisible unity wouldn't do justice to the Cross." In the New Testament, there was one church. She notes, we can "live in contradiction with that one church, or we can reconcile and make visible our unity in Christ."

While seeming to come so close to stating the restoration of New Testament Christianity as the means to unity, Wilson puts it more in terms of toleration, of "Love the heretics, hate the heresy." To us, this would seem an incomplete unity—some things necessary for

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Have You Forgotten Your Wedding Attire?

The title of this article is based on the situation Jeremiah found himself in as he proclaimed the will of God to the people of his day. In thinking about the people and their relationship with God, he encourages them to remember a very important day in their life. One that should be treasured for years to come and the joy of the marriage relationship becomes more and more wonderful as the years pass. He

writes, "Why do you contend with me? You have all transgressed against me, declares the LORD. In vain have I struck your children; they took no correction; your own sword devoured your prophets like

a ravening lion. And you, O generation, behold the word of the LORD. Have I been a wilderness to Israel, or a land of thick darkness? Why then do my people say, 'We are free, we will come no more to you'? Can a virgin forget her ornaments, or a bride her attire? Yet my people have forgotten me days without number" (Jeremiah 2:29-32 ESV).

Life, and marriage, are filled with many challenges, and this is a good thing in many ways, depending on how we cope with them. Seen properly, these challenges will help to keep us "on our toes" as we live day to day, careful to examine each word, thought and action to see that they are in accordance with the way we know the Lord wants us to speak, think and act. However, they can also be bad when we forget to hold true to what is right.

It has been difficult for the people of God to maintain their distinctiveness from the unbelievers throughout the centuries. In the Old Testament the Israelites were to stay free of the worship of the people around them. Clearly, the history of those times shows that they did not recognize the cost.

Clearly the intention of God is that Christians today also understand that they are different from unbelievers. In the words of Peter, "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own

> possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy" (1 Peter 2:9-10 ESV).

> When people forget they tend to forsake. "...for my people have committed two evils: they have forsaken me, the fountain of living waters, and hewed out cisterns for themselves, broken cisterns that can hold no water" (Jeremiah 2:13 ESV). When the people forgot who they were, the people of God, they forsook Him and tried to meet their spiritual needs through their own wasted efforts, 'hewing out broken cisterns'.

> In an attempt to win the people back to God, Jeremiah reminded them of who they were. So, in the text sighted above, he speaks of the very sacred relationship of husband and wife and asks, "can a virgin

forget her ornaments, or a bride her attire?" With changes in the view of marriage in our world today, of the importance of marriage and family, this example may not be as striking as it should be. The fact that many do not give much, if any, consideration to the word of God, the day of marriage may not be as significant a day in life for many. Of course, however, for the believer, this must not be true. It is sad that so many, even among those who claim to believe, choose to live as husband and wife long before their wedding day. That is perhaps a thought for another article.

The point that Jeremiah wants to impress on his hearers is that they are married to God! However, they have been unfaithful in this marriage. "Surely, as a treacherous wife

leaves her husband, so have you been treacherous to me, O house of Israel, declares the LORD'" (Jeremiah 3:20 ESV). God sees Israel as an incorrigible child. He had tried to correct them, but they

still continued in their unfaithful ways (Jeremiah 2:29-35). Instead of confessing and repenting, they complained and brought charges against Him! None of His discipline seemed to do any good. "O LORD, do not your eyes look for truth? You have struck them down, but they felt no anguish; you have consumed them, but they refused to take correction. They have made their faces harder than rock; they have refused to repent" (Jeremiah 5:3 ESV). This idea of their rejection of God and their relationship with Him is expressed several times in Jeremiah (Jeremiah 7:28; 17:23: 32:33: 35:13).

While one of the important themes that was repeated in the book of Deuteronomy was that the people should remember the Lord and what He had done for them, they often took their blessings for granted. Since they did not feel thankful to God for those daily blessings they *continued on page 16*



Bunny Trails

don't know what Nelson & Rollins had in mind when they composed this song sixty-four years ago, but in my experience, bunny trails would not expedite the delivery of goody baskets. Wild rabbits tend not to take a direct route to their destination but instead make twists and loops that crisscross one another like a tangled piece of string. It is not that their sense of direction is faulty, they have good reason for such muddled travel.

As a young teen, from the vantage point of our hilltop home, I was able to witness the making of a bunny trail. Well, I actually saw only a small portion of it, but had a pretty good idea about the path the bunny had taken. A cottontail rabbit came out of the overgrown field near the bottom of the hill. He seemed uncertain as to which way to go, hopping a short distance first in one direction and

A few minutes later with his nose near the ground, Grandpa's dog entered the field the rabbit had just left. I watched in amusement as the dog followed the bunny's trail of intertwined circles, going off in one direction only to end up back where he had already been. Eventually he gave up the hunt and went home. Peter Cottontail's tangled trail had served its purpose. It had prevented the dog from gaining a rabbit dinner.

Satan lays bunny trails for us. Not to protect himself as the rabbit does, but to prevent us from reaching our goal of a close relationship with God. If he cannot tempt us to turn our backs and walk away from God through sin, he will try to keep us so busy that we neglect our relationship with God. The weaker the bond, the easier it breaks. As is true of our human relationships, TLC is vital for making our relationship with our Heavenly Father stronger and deeper. TLC = Time together + Love (whichbrings a desire for an ever growing closeness) + and Communication (open, honest, personal, one-on-one conversation).

Good things, necessary things things like jobs and family, even church activities—can keep us going in circles consuming our time and energy so that there is little left to spend with God. Jesus knew how easily the urgent can displace the important. That is why He urged us to be less concerned with physical externals and more focussed on the spiritual. "So do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well" (Matthew 6:31-33).

Jesus truly understands the pressures of a hectic schedule and the drain that others often place on our time and energy. At times He became so wrapped up in attending to the physical and spiritual needs of those who swarmed around Him that His own family thought He had lost His senses. "Then Jesus entered a house, and again a crowd gathered, so that He and His disciples were not even able to eat. When His family heard about this, they went to take charge of Him, for they said, "He is out of his mind" (Mark 3:20, 21). He couldn't even manage a little R&R with His weary disciples without being interrupted. "Then, because so many people were coming and going that they did not even have a chance to eat, he said to them. "Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest." So they went away by themselves in a boat to a solitary place. But many who saw them leaving recognized them and ran on foot from all the towns and got there ahead of them. When Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd. So he began teaching them many things" (Mark 6:31-34).

Despite the demands on Him, Jesus did not neglect His relationship with the Father. Nor did He leave their time together to chance lulls in His workload. Whether by sending people away (Matthew 14:22, 23) or choosing prayer over sleep (Mark 1:35; Luke 6:12), Jesus made sure He had time to spend with God the Father.

Unless you are a celebrity, you probably don't have to dismiss a crowd in order to find private time with God. Or do you? Many of us carry a crowd along with us in a pocket or purse or perhaps clipped into our ear. We call it a cell phone. Through it we allow a crowd of people-close family, friends, coworkers, total strangers-to disrupt our activities, our social interactions, our thoughts. These amazing little devices are useful tools and can be a wonderful blessing, but they can also be a dangerous distraction. If you have ever had an important conversation interrupted by the other person answering a phone call or text message, you know what a negative impact the intrusion had on your exchange. God never puts us on hold in order to talk with someone else. Do we extend the same courtesy to Him?

Another lesson we can learn from Jesus' example is that service to God is not a substitute for communion with God. Jesus spent a lot of time healing and teaching. He was doing what He had been sent to do. (John 6:38). But Jesus knew that to do the job well He needed to maintain an active personal connection with the Father. That is why He often went off by Himself to pray. The same is true for us. You cannot produce fruit if you are not connected to the Root. (John 15:4, 5).

Christian service, which is both necessary and valuable, on its own will not draw you closer to God. I demonstrate my love for my husband by acts of service but

it is our intimate time together which binds us closer and makes our love grow stronger. You need to spend time with God—in the Word—getting to know Him better. You cannot be Christlike if you do not know what Christ is like. It was a lesson Martha had to learn:

"As Jesus and his disciples were on their way, he came to a village where a woman named Martha opened her home to him. She had a sister called Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet listening to what he said. But Martha was distracted by all the preparations that had to be made. She came to him and asked, "Lord, don't you care that my sister has left me to do the work by myself? Tell her to help me! 'Martha, Martha,' the Lord answered, 'you are worried and upset about many things, but only one thing is needed. Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her'" (Luke 10:38-42). Martha was serving Jesus. Literally. She had invited Him into her home. She was extending hospitality which is a commanded Christian attribute (Romans 12:13; 1 Peter 4:9) but she was missing out on an opportunity to draw closer to Jesus personally and to learn from Him.

Martha was demonstrating her love rather than developing a stronger love. In occupying her time doing what was good she had missed "the better". Are you so busy serving that you are missing out on personal time with the Saviour? Don't allow Satan's bunny trails of busy-ness to keep you from spending precious moments deepening your knowledge and love for the Lord.

unity would be left unfinished. How could differences be reconciled? How could all be of the same faith and the same mind? Agreeing to disagree might work in a business or social contract, but how could that be described as true oneness? Further, many of us see ecumenism as attempting to use human compromise to create unity, yielding Biblical truth for human preferences. We can only pray that Wilson and those whose minds and hearts are stirred by her call for unity ultimately recognize the greater need for a unity based on the New Testament.

Wilson's article should encourage us to renew our commitment to the restoration of simple New Testament Christianity. Religious division is unscriptural. Further the article should encourage us to realize that there are those in the denominational world who are grieved by division and looking for a way to help create unity. Perhaps, most importantly, we should be reminded that, according to Jesus, it is through the unity of believers that the world will come to know Him. In an age when knowing truth seems unimportant, the demonstration of truth in the lives and unity of Christians offers a strong call to Christ.





Human Sexuality

We have all heard of parents teaching their kids about the birds and the bees. I wonder how many parents are actually the ones primarily involved in their child's learning about the differences between genders and what those differences mean for human relationships. We live in a time when most children view pornographic material for the first

time between the ages of eight and ten. Educational institutions begin teaching kids about sexuality in grade one, although only on an anatomical level. There are ongoing efforts to expand sexual education to include

discussions of pleasure and same sex relationships. As you consider these truths consider also that most churches talk very little if at all about sexuality. This is despite the fact that the Bible talks a great deal about it. I would challenge you to read your New Testament and note that 21 out of 27 books talk about sexuality and sexual sin. When you consider how pervasive sex is in culture and in scripture it begs the question how are Christians doing with teaching God's plan for sex?

In this article I would like to consider some of the important truths that scripture reveals about proper healthy sexuality. I am writing as a parent who plans to teach his son God's plan for sex rather than have him adopt one received from culture or from a bureaucrats.

First, sexual desire, despite being important, does not make up the whole of our identity, it does not control us or entrap us. There seems to be an assumption today that as humans we are defined by sexuality, that is, we are denying something fundamental about ourselves if we are not expressing ourselves sexually. There are a number of problems with this but the largest is it's practically untenable and unfair. There are people who are physically unable to act out sexually so does this mean they are less human? Further there

> are people with perverted sexual desires that everyone agrees should not be acted out. Are these people less human less fulfilled or unable to have a meaningful existence? The answer is no. In fact Paul said of himself that he had no need for a sexual relationship (1 Cor 7:7). A person can and should be a whole healthy person without any sexual activity. The idea that to be whole requires a mate is a bad one. It doesn't make for healthy individuals or healthy relationships. I can't tell you how many marriage problems result from two emotionally or mentally unhealthy people thinking that coming together will make things better.

> The first thing, then, that we need to know about sexuality is that we need to develop as strong healthy Godly individuals before worrying about the sexual part of ourselves. Further there may be life situations where a person can never engage

in sexual activity: a person who never marries, a person married who cheats on his or her spouse, a person who has some physical inability, all these individuals can have long healthy meaningful lives without sex. I want my son to know that he is male but also that he is not to be mastered by anything (1 Cor 6:12).

Second, God created us male and female so humanity is a race made up of two distinct genders. God intended it to be that way (Gen 1:27). It is unhealthy and delusional to try and act as if men and women are the same. I recently read an article which discussed how doctors must be aware of how medication is prescribed to men verses women. The author pointed out

that because of chemical and physical differences men and women respond differently to medication. As I am writing this, athletes are competing in the 2014 winter Olympics. Because of the physical differ-

ences, men and women don't compete against one another. Even as Paul instructs Timothy about how to interact with members of the church he differentiates between men and women (1 Tim 5:1-2). There are differences between men and women. Practically, this means that we will treat people and situations differently depending on whether we are dealing with men or women. Certain things that would be fine for two men or two women may be wrong for an unmarried man and woman to do together. We need to understand that some interests, strengths, weaknesses, abilities, hobbies, preferences and opinions may be different between men and women. Further we need to realize that it's okay if they are. We gain much by embracing and enjoying the differences between genders. I want my son to know there's a difference, so appreciate and be sensitive to it.

Finally, sexuality is something to be enjoyed and embraced within marriage. God created our bodies to have the capacity for sexual activity. There is no need for an anatomy lesson, even rudimentary knowledge of the body reveals that men and women go together. God didn't just give us the capacity for sexual activity but He designated marriage as the only place where our sexual desires and abilities are to be enacted (Gen 2:24; 1 Cor 7:1-5).

This leads directly to another important aspect of this discussion which is that humans will have a natural desire to engage in sexual activity, as well as a natural attraction to members of the opposite sex. These two points: our natural attraction/desire. and that desire being fulfilled in marriage leads to some further practical applications. First, there are levels of intimacy that need to be kept for married couples not because they are wrong in themselves but because they give too great an opportunity to fall into sin. It may be a quiet talk with a co-worker, it may be an activity that involves close physical contact or it may be texting or social media interaction or some other interaction. These activities are all fine in most cases but it's possible to cross a line. If you would not tell your significant other about the interaction or activity then you're in trouble. If you are an unmarried couple and you find yourself purposely finding time and ways to be private, instead of with others, you are also in trouble. We need to be aware of how we meet our needs for intimacy. It's possible to seek intimacy outside of marriage that's acceptable and appropriate. However, we can become emotionally or physically intimate with someone without engaging in sexual intercourse and it still be inappropriate.

(I know I said finally but) One last note about dating and human interaction. In a healthy couple the desire for physical intimacy grows with relational intimacy. For unmarried couples this means that as a relationship progresses more care will need to be taken to avoid sin. On the other hand for married couples, this means that a healthy physical relationship is dependent on a healthy mental and emotional relationship.

In conclusion I want to remind all those who will read this that we need to make a purposeful effort to invite God and His will into every aspect of our lives. In a culture as steeped in sexuality as ours we must make extra effort to embrace, teach and embody God's teaching about sexuality. It will keep us from harming ourselves and those around us as well as help us to have happier, healthier sexual expression. This is what I plan to teach my son about sexuality. For everyone reading this take a moment to ask who or what is informing you and your family's understanding of sexuality.

If you are like most people, you blame those in authority for leading us into wars, but who are they? They are men and women just like us. Therefore, if we were in their positions, we might be blamed for doing the same thing. Or, are you living in peace? When was the last time you argued or fought with some one? Do you remember? Do you remember why? Only through Christ can man rid himself of the things that lead him to destruction. Only through Christ can man bring to his life the humility, generosity, kindness and love that will bring peace to his life and to the world. A life of peace and tranquility IS possible if people acknowledge God's sovereignty first, be led by His wisdom and His interest that all men be saved." (1 Tim 2:1-4).

PAPUA NEW GUINEA: "The month of February turned out to be a busy month, but also a difficult month for everyone. We welcomed back the Melanesian Bible College (M.B.C.) students at orientation on Monday, February 3, and classes resumed on Tuesday. On Thursday, one of the students died suddenly. Gima Peni came to start her third year of study, but due to a large boil under one arm, had missed the first few days of school. Several hours after having the boil lanced at a private clinic in town. she experienced chest pains and shortness of breath, and died during the night. Gima was from Sipaia (ship fire), on the outskirts of Lae, where there is a new congregation meeting. Because of her hunger for her family and community to hear and obey the Gospel. Gima's funeral took place there on the 11th... her husband had been baptized in November, and her father, a long-time Christian, had repented recently after a lengthy absence from the church. Four days after Gima's death, we learned of Tom Bunt's passing in Brisbane. Tom, and his wife Rens, served for several years in the late 1970's and early 1980's in the Waria

Valley and then Wau. Tom returned fourteen times after moving back to Australia, and several of those trips involved organizing and leading teams of young people. I feel very privileged to have been able to work closely with him in preparation for and during those trips, and will greatly miss being able to visit with him on my way to and from Canada. Tom tackled his fight with lung cancer in the same manner that he took on any situation—with faith and tenacity. He was sent home from the hospital in early January and the family was told that he had only a few days left, a week at the most. Five weeks later he died peacefully, surrounded by family. Your prayers are requested for his wife, who is 100 years old and living in a nursing facility in Brisbane. On February 15, we experienced yet another loss. Sister Nebobo Kasao, a long time Christian who taught at M.B.C. for several years, passed away after a three-month illness, so her passing once again impacted the school greatly. Her funeral was held February 17. She leaves her husband, Tuhi, children and grandchildren. Despite the losses, school completed the first 'block' (5 week term). I continue in the role of library worker and have nearly finished the repairs and card cataloguing for the first section. Dogo and I share the work of supervising the library sessions for the students three afternoons each week. In addition, I am teaching the literacy class for M.B.C. this year, and have two students who are working diligently, one boy of about 10 years and a grandmother, in her late forties or early fifties, who intends to take part in the M.B.C. classes next year. Her husband, a teacher for 29 years, is a first year M.B.C. student this year!" - (Excerpts from Ruth Zimmerman's February report)

If this were a description of heaven after judgment, the movement would be depicted as "going up into heaven," rather than the reverse. "Now the dwelling of God is with men, and he will live with them...(v. 3). This is opposite to our going to heaven to be with God. Hear the apostle Paul in 2 Corinthians 6:16-18, "...as God has said: I will live with them and walk among them..."

Water of Life: The One on the throne continues, "To him who is thirsty I will give to drink without cost from the spring of the water of life" (21:6). This addresses those who are contemporaries of John: "Let the one who desires take the water of life without price" (22:17b). Here we are reminded of Jesus' words on "the last and greatest day of the Feast, Jesus stood and said in a loud voice, 'If a man is thirsty, let him come to me and drink'" (John 7:37). And we remember the gracious words of Jesus to the Samaritan woman, "If you knew the gift of God and who it

is that asks you for a drink, vou would have asked him and he would have given you living water" (John 4:10; see also Acts 3:19-20). More is said about the water of life in the final vision. "Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, as clear as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb, down the middle of the great street of the city" (22:1-2a). Both in the Gospel and in the Revelation, water is a symbol of spiritual refreshment, of the Spirit's blessing, a present gift of Christ.

The Overcomers: Consider the next statement, "He who overcomes will inherit all this, and I will be his God and he will be my son" (21:7). The "overcomers" (NIV; "conquerors," ESV) in each of the seven churches (Rev. 2, 3) are those who remain faithful in spite of the efforts of Satan to dislodge them. These are promised a number of high spiritual blessings by Christ: the right to eat of the tree of life, immunity to the second death, hidden manna, a new name, rule over the nations, name in the Book of Life, a pillar in the temple of God and the right to sit with Christ on his throne. These blessings are not presented as after-life specifics but are blessings for the faithful. (The word "inherit" in 21:7 seems to imply receiving a gift after a death. However, usually "inheritance" requires the death of the testator, not of the inheritor, cf. Gal. 4:30. The word for "inherit" in the original (klēronomeō) in this case more generally means, "acquire, obtain, come into possession of." BDAG, 547.) Christ gives his blessings to the overcomers in the seven churches, the faithful who are citizens of the kingdom.

The Wicked: Then the wicked are listed: "The cowardly, the unbelieving, the vile, the murderers, the sexually immoral, those who practice magical arts, the idolators and all liars—their

place will be in the fiery lake of burning sulfur. This is the second death," (21:8). They are still present. Their punishment is yet in the future in this statement. These are excluded from the holy city. They are "the dogs outside" (22:15). But "blessed are those who wash their robes, that they may have the right to the tree of life and may go through the gates into the city" (22:14-15). "Nothing impure will ever enter it, nor will be brought into it" (21:27a). The privilege of entry by the cleansed faithful exists at the time of the writing, while the unrighteous are denied entrance—it is the Holy City!

The Bride: Then one of the seven angels of the seven bowls invites John, "Come, I will show you the bride, the wife of the Lamb" (vs. 9). What follows is a vision of the "bride" in a figurative description that denotes the church in its spiritual purity (21:11-21). The marriage feast of the Lamb and his Bride is pictured in Revelation 19:6-9. The Bride "has made herself ready; it was granted to

> her to clothe herself with fine linen, bright and pure-for the fine linen is the righteous deeds of the saints." Clearly, the "bride of the Lamb" is the Church. This is Paul's familiar description of the church: "Husbands love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her to make her holy, cleansing her by the washing with water through the word, and to present her to himself as a radiant church, without stain or wrinkle or any other blemish, but holy and blameless" (Eph. 5:25-27).

> **Coming Down:** Then immediately, the "bride" is identified as "the Holy City, Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven" (v.10). Pictured is the Christian Age, the period of the kingdom of heaven come to earth. This is the description of Hebrews 12: "But you have come to Mount Zion, to the heavenly

Jerusalem, the city of the living God" (Heb. 12:22; read the next three verses). The "coming down" description signifies the dynamic spread of the kingdom of heaven around the world and its enlargement within the hearts of the faithful. Yet, it is the "heavenly city" that belongs to heaven that never loses its celestial identity. As the Hebrew writer encouraged, "Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us be thankful, and so worship God acceptably with reverence and awe, for our God is a consuming fire" (12:28-29).

The Temple: John says, "I did not see a temple in the city, because the Lord God Almighty and the Lamb are its temple. The city does not need the sun or the moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gives it light" (21:22-23). Note that Jesus said, "I am the light of the world" (John 8:12a). He also said, "You [his church] are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden" (Matt. 5:14). The city is pictured as a grand temple in its totality. Compare Paul's vision, " ... built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus himself being the cornerstone, in whom the whole structure, being joined together, grows into a holy temple in the Lord" (Eph. 2:20-22; see 2 Cor. 6:16).

The Nations: John in his vision observes, "The nations will walk by its light [i.e. the light of the Holy City], and the kings of the earth will bring their splendor into it...The glory and honor of the nations will be brought into it...And the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations" (21:24, 26; 22:2b). Nations are of the earth, not of the "heavenly places" (cf. Eph. 1:3) This describes the present time and the influence of the kingdom of God upon the nations of the world. Remember that Jesus said, "Go... and make disciples of all the nations" (Matt. 28:19).

Open Gates: Surrounding the Holy City is a "great, high wall with twelve gates and with twelve angels at the gates" (21:12a). "On no day will its gates ever be shut, for there will be no night there" (21:25). Open gates have no function in heaven! Earthly cities shut their gates at night as protection against marauders. The Holy City is impregnable to all evil. "Nothing unclean will ever enter it, nor anyone who does what is detestable or false, but only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life" (21:27). The three gates, each on all four sides, are always open, suggesting that men and women are streaming from the four points of the compass to enter into its security. This pictures the gospel age.

The Invitation: Fittingly, Revelation closes with the evangelistic invitation, "Come!" The invitation is given by the Spirit and the Bride (i.e. the Church/ the Kingdom). This is the gospel invitation. It is given to those who are "thirsty," i.e. for life with God. "The Spirit and the Bride say, 'Come!' And let him who hears [each believer] say, 'Come!' Whoever is thirsty, let him come; and whoever wishes, let him take the free gift of the water of life" (22:17). Come where? Come to the Holy City! In our time! The Bride of this vision is the evangelistic church.

The magnificent imagery of the Holy City, in its great size and splendid wealth, matches the dazzling appearance of the throne room of God in chapter four, signifying its heavenly glory. Clearly the act of God in bringing the heavenly city to earth is the expression of highest grace.

The church has two realities. The one is earthly, and we experience it with our five senses. We see the church in its earthly setting, a godly people but often invaded by Satan. This is the picture that Christ gives in his Parable of the Weeds (Matt. 13:24-29, 36-43). This is the picture we are given of the seven churches of Asia, churches sometimes compromised by Satan.

The other reality is spiritual, and we can know it only through God's revelation and the eye of faith. We can see the church in its spiritual and perfect reality only when God pictures for us what it is like. This is what he has done in the closing chapters of Revelation.

Christ blesses his people with the splendid vision of the true City of God, the New Jerusalem, the Bride of Christ, the Called-out People, the Kingdom of God coming to earth! Christ delivered this vision first to the brethren in Asia and from that time to those from around the world who answer the Bride's invitation, "Come!" What a treasure!

were receiving, they felt no hesitation at giving their allegiance to the idols or stone of gold. Sadly this led to many failures on their part as they took advantage of the poor—people of their own nation—as is noted by Amos. "Thus says the LORD: "For three transgressions of Israel, and for four, I will not revoke the punishment, because they sell the righteous for silver, and the needy for a pair of sandals—those who trample the head of the poor into the dust of the earth and turn aside the way of the afflicted; a man and his father go in to the same girl, so that my holy name is profaned; they lay themselves down beside every altar on garments taken in pledge, and in the house of their God they drink the wine of those who have been fined" (Amos 2:6-8 ESV). Could it be that since they were enjoying such good times, politically and economically, they really did not need God or to worry about following His direction?

Well we have been talking about history. The important question

for us is, "Have We Forgotten Our Attire?" This is a question that should be considered while making a personal review but also in a congregational review. Since the Church is the bride of Christ, made up of each individual member, such a review is appropriate. Our personal growth and relationship with God through Jesus Christ is a matter of personal devotion and development, where the congregation we worship with is going will either strengthen or hinder our growth.

The people of Israel forgot the significance of their wedding attire and dishonoured God in the process. So what about us? We may remember the day of our baptism, we may even celebrate the day. But is our celebration only for the day or is it every day as we live rejoicing at being the bride of Christ? Do we still feel that thrill of sin forgiven as we did when we made that confession of faith in Jesus as the Christ, giving our commitment to Him? Like Israel, do we rationalize our sin when we should be repenting and recommitting our self to walk daily with Him? It is easy to get "caught up" in "movements" that come and go. They may seem to have merit but under examination, they are not the real thing. In writing to Timothy, Paul encouraged him to remember the things he had been taught. Then he says, "Practice these things, immerse yourself in them, so that all may see your progress. Keep a close watch on vourself and on the teaching. Persist in this, for by so doing you will save both yourself and your hearers" (1 Timothy 4:15-16 ESV).

It is interesting that as Jeremiah consider the problems being experienced by the people of Israel, he had much the same advice. "Thus says the LORD: 'Stand by the roads, and look, and ask for the ancient paths, where the good way is; and walk in it, and find rest for your souls'" (Jeremiah 6:16 ESV).
