

Occasional Thoughts on Church Leadership - 2

▼ rover Cleveland Brewer was born in 1884 and died in ▲ 1956. He served several congregations both as an evangelist and as an elder. He wrote several books and many articles for Christian publications. One of his most useful books is titled The Model Church. In our effort to prepare this congregation for the appointment of leadership, we will occasionally quote portions of this book for your consideration. What follows here is a condensed selection from the first chapter of The Model Church. In this chapter Brother Brewer explains why, for both biblical and practical reasons, the church must have a clearly defined membership, and each member must have a sense of commitment to the congregation and its leaders.

What Constitutes a Congregation?

Nothing is more plainly taught than that the New Testament churches all had elders over them. The mother church at Jerusalem had in it the twelve apostles, but it also had elders (Acts 15:6, 22, 23). Paul, who had great anxiety for all the churches and who returned to them again and again to see how they fared, "appointed for them elders in every church" (Acts 14:23). The Holy Spirit, probably through Paul, had made certain men elders in the church at Ephesus (Acts 20:28). The church at Philippi is often called a "a model church," and it is certain that it had both bishops and deacons, for Paul addresses them as follows: "Paul and Timothy, servants of Jesus Christ, to all the saints in Christ Jesus that are at Philippi, with the bishops and deacons" (Phil 1:1). If there is any further need of proof, it is supplied by Paul's charge to Titus. To him he said: "For this cause left I thee in Crete, that thou shouldest set in order the things that were wanting, and appoint elders in every city, as I gave thee charge" (Titus 1:5).

Since God has ordained that certain men should be overseers, it is inevitable that there should be others over whom this oversight is exercised. And these persons must submit to this oversight and, in some way, make known their willingness to be under the rule, discipline and watch care of the elders: otherwise there could be no elders and hence no divine organization. When a Christian severs his connection with one congregation—goes from the oversight of one set of elders—he must, if he wishes to respect the Lord's order, unite himself with the congregation where he goes—publicly make known his willingness to be under that eldership.

We often witness the sad spectacle of Christians drifting around from one place of worship to another and not claiming to be members of any local organization or church. Such persons are clearly out of harmony with the will of God and are hindering His cause. How can the elder have charge of persons to watch concerning their souls without knowing who is thus committed to him? And how can he exercise the divine function of oversight, rule, control, etc., unless the persons submit themselves to him?

Under our present slipshod way of doing things, any sort of schismatic or hobbyist may tear up a church and then go to another and be received and get in his evil work there before he is known; or even one who has been withdrawn from by a congregation for unchristian conduct, incest or other immorality may go to another congregation and be received. We are a long way from the New Testament.

In a scriptural congregation, if a member leaves without formally severing his connection with the congregation, the faithful elders will soon miss him and find out where he has gone, and then communicate with the elders of his nearest congregation concerning him. Yes, and they will communicate with the brother himself, for they watch concerning his soul. Condensed from The Model Church, by G.C. Brewer (pp. 14-20)

Acts 20:28-30: "Pay careful attention to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for the church of God, which he obtained with his own blood. I know that after my departure fierce wolves will come in among you, not sparing the flock; and from among your own selves will arise men speaking twisted things, to draw away the disciples after them."

Hebrews 13:17: "Obey your leaders and submit to them, for they are keeping watch over your souls, as those who will have to give an account. Let them do this with joy and not with groaning, for that would be of no advantage to you."

Those who tend to reject every idea presented by a youth ought to remember that Jeremiah, John the Baptist, Timothy and even Jesus, were all quite young when they were called to speak the word of God to their generations.

It is interesting that it was the young man, Jeremiah, who said, "Thus says the Lord: 'Stand by the roads, and look, and ask for the ancient paths, where the good way is; and walk in it, and find rest for your souls" (Jer 6:16).

The young man, Elihu, has something to say to all of us. His words speak to those who are older, his manner of speaking says something to our youth. Elihu waited while Job and his three friends debated for days before he finally said, "I am voung in years, and you are aged; therefore I was timid and afraid to declare my opinion to you. I said, 'Let days speak, and many years teach wisdom.' But it is the spirit in man, the breath of the Almighty, that makes him understand. It is not the old who are wise, nor the aged who understand what is right. Therefore I say, 'Listen to me; let me also declare my opinion." (Job 32:6-10)

Young or old we all have ideas and are free to respectfully express them. But ideas are to be judged on their merits—primarily on their conformity to God's word. New does not always mean improved, and old does not always mean reliable.

Preaching to the Satisfied

\ anadians are among the most prosperous and contented people in the world. According to the OECD's (Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development) Better Life Index, Canada and Australia rank at the top of a 34-nation comparison of "measures of

well-being." The OECD states that both countries "perform exceptionally well...among the top countries in a large number of topics." The Index includes 11 overall topics with 25 individual indicators, including housing, education, employment, community, health, income, environment and life-satisfaction. While things in Canada are far from perfect, the country ranks better than most of the rest of the world.

Jeffrey Simpson, in a Globe and Mail column, "Are Canadians happy? We say we are" summarized Canada's rating. "Canadians work fewer hours each year than the OECD average, earn more money and spend 62 per cent of their day—15 hours—eating, sleeping and engaging in leisure activities." According to the OECD, 78% of the people in Canada said they are satisfied with their life. "This makes Canada one of the highest-ranked countries in terms of life satisfaction."

Think about that for a moment—the vast majority of Canadians (over ¾) are happy with their lives. Simpson adds that "85% believe their life will be more satisfying five years from now." Canadians are positive about today and optimistic about tomorrow. Generally, they are safe, secure, healthy, employed, connected with a community and have the time and resources to be reasonably comfortable. What more could they possibly need?

Perhaps it is no coincidence that as comfort and satisfaction have increased, faith and religion have decreased. Satisfied people are content with their lives. They do not feel the need for God. We might note here that the two highest ranking countries, Canada and Australia, are among the most difficult nations to evangelize. Like the Laodiceans, they say, "I am rich; I have acquired wealth and do not need a thing." They echo the rich man, who said to himself, "You have plenty of good things laid up for many years. Take life easy; eat, drink and be merry." It's

a "pursue pleasure, lay-up-treasure on earth and forget about God" view of life. They are distracted from the truly important and meaningful things of life for that which is only superficial and momentary.

In the past, we have viewed the story of Mary and Martha as an important lesson about priorities, contrasting Martha's preoccupation with preparations to Mary's desire to listen to Jesus. Jesus notes that Martha is worried and upset about many things, while Mary has chosen the only really necessary thing. Many sermons have been preached from this about allowing "busyness" to crowd out faith and service. However, the picture of Canadians today suggests that the preoccupation is not as much with the necessities of life (although sleeping and eating are essential) as it is with leisure. Consider the billions of dollars Canadians spend every year for recreation and entertainment.

The combination of living contentedly in a comfortable society with countless diversions to distract and amuse means most Canadians may feel they have attained "heaven on earth." What can a future paradise offer? They cannot see the importance of a future in heaven when they can have the good life now. How can we, as Christians, reach out and share Christ with those who are contented and satisfied if they don't feel any need to change or improve their lives?

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The Growing Church (4)

In thinking about leadership in the church, we need to emphasize the manner of leadership the elders—all leaders for that matter—need to give. It is not sitting in some seat of authority giving orders but rather leading by serving.

Jesus is the perfect example of this type of leadership. His example as a servant leader is seen in His teaching and ministry with the apostles, as recorded in the gospels. Mark wrote, "For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45 ESV). I always appreciate the thought of Luke in the beginning of the book of Acts, when he writes, "In the first book, O Theophilus, I have dealt with all that Jesus began to do and teach" (Acts 1:1 ESV). It was not simply a matter of telling but included the demonstration in action.

A key to this kind of leadership is humility. Pride destroys the ability of one to "live where the sheep are". Jesus is the ultimate example of humility as Paul points out in his letter to the Philippian church, "So if there is any encouragement in Christ, any comfort from love, any participation in the Spirit, any affection and sympathy, complete my joy by being of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. Do nothing from rivalry or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. Have this mind among yourselves, which is

yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but made himself nothing, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross" (Philippians 2:1-8 ESV). This is a familiar passage that speaks volumes in reference to the practical side of humility.

The account of Jesus washing the disciple's feet in John 13 is another clear humility lesson. It is key to our understanding of the work of Jesus that His coming was done voluntarily because of love, not forced by duty. Clearly the symbol of our Lord is the servant's towel not the cleric's robe. It has been well said, "Nothing distinguishes the kingdoms of man from the kingdom of God more than their diametrically opposed views of the exercise of power". Charles Colson, in Kingdoms in Conflict, wrote, "One seeks to control people, the other to serve people; one promotes self, the other prostrates self; one seeks prestige and position, the other lifts up the lowly and despised".

This understanding and view of leadership is not something that comes naturally to mankind. Even among the twelve apostles there was a competition for importance. Mark records the exchange that took place between Jesus and the apostles on this issue. "And James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came up to him and said to him, "Teacher, we

want you to do for us whatever we ask of you," And he said to them, "What do you want me to do for you?" And they said to him, "Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory." Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or to be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?" And they said to him, "We are able." And Jesus said to them, "The cup that I drink you will drink, and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized, but to sit at my right hand or at my left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared. And when the ten heard it, they began to be indignant at James and John. And Jesus called them to him and said to them. You know that those who are considered rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones exercise authority over them. But it shall not be so among you. But whoever would be great among you must be your servant, and whoever would be first among vou must be slave of all. For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:35-45 ESV). A difficult lesson sometimes is to learn the difference between worldly leadership and Christian leadership.

Perhaps the very nature of church leadership is such that men may become puffed up and self-righteous. After all, is not the work of church leadership to bring people to relationship with God? The Jewish leaders in the time of Jesus on earth are a good example of what leadership should not be. In Matthew 23, Jesus expresses condemnation on these leaders (the seven woes). He says, "They do all their deeds to be seen by others. For they make their phylacteries broad

ommitted Christians are frustrated! They believe in One who has begotten them to a new life. They believe He can change other lives and through them can revolutionize the world. Believing in Him they must speak (2 Cor. 4:13). Frustration results when the message is so frequently spurned or shunned.

Mature Christians know that all are not going to accept the gospel. It is likely, however, that more would accept Christ if His ambassadors were more effective.

A key to the success of Paul is found in 1 Cor. 9:20-23. He became as much like others as he could to win as many as possible **by all**

means. There is an apparent flexibility in Paul's methodology that 20th C (21st C) Christians would do well to imitate.

Our Reluctance

Lack of flexibility may result from the lack of ability to distinguish between method and message. We don't like a lot of the changes we see in the world today. Old values, many of which are precious and indispensable, are being overthrown. When someone in the church begins to call for flexibility (change) it frightens us.

We know that the gospel and the church are unchanging and unchangeable. Furthermore, we have settled into comfortable methods of preaching the gospel and it will not be easy for us to change. It may

be helpful to recognize how much changing Paul did.

This is the man who said a curse is waiting for the man who preaches any gospel other than the gospel (Gal. 1:8). A fair study of his preaching will show that he did not alter the essential Good News. In the *Celebrating*

essential Good News. In the same study it is evident that he seldom approached two situations in the same way.

A comparison should be made of Paul's method in preaching Christ to a business-woman at a riverside prayer meeting, with his approach to Greek philosophers in a High-Court meeting; or the way in which he communicated with Jews in the Synagogue and to Roman officials. He even joined those who had taken a Nazarite vow (in which they let their hair grow long) in one of the most controversial moves of his life, but he did it with the encouragement

of the brethren and in harmony with the principle of 1 Cor. 9 (Acts 21).

Some of the highlights of Paul's methodology in these situations will serve to emphasize the points we are making: He quoted from

Aretas (usually referred to as a "Pagan poet") to strengthen his communications link in Acts 17. This would have made very little sense in a Synagogue, and would have been, in fact, very irritating.

We cannot imagine Paul doing it anyway and justifying his action by saying, "I always preach the same gospel everywhere I go". He did not shun the religious meetings of others. In this the Restoration preachers were very much like Paul. As Bro. Reuel Lemmons said in a recent Firm Foundation editorial concerning Pat Boone. "The pioneers of the Restoration... did most of their

preaching in the other fellow's church house."

"Our Denominational Friends"

Most frustrating to us of all students are those whom we refer to as "our denominational friends." After all, we say, they do have the Bible and have read it. So, what can we learn from Paul about this problem?

It would appear that Paul tried to do two things which we do not usually do: (1) He tried to spend as much time with those of other religious groups as possible: and (2) he tried to be as much like them as his conscience would allow.

These two points are selfevident. He said, "To Jews I became a Jew" to win Jews...." His experience with the Nazarite vow is a



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vivid illustration of what he meant!

Do we not tend in *the opposite* direction—avoiding contact and purposing to be just as different from "our denominational friends" as we can be? If there is some truth in these observations perhaps the contrasting results of our Twentieth Century ministry with Paul's first century ministry will make it imperative that we return to Pauline methodology.

The Incarnational Approach

John MacKay, President Emeritus of Princeton Theological Seminary, discussed what he calls the "incarnational approach" to evangelism in Christianity Today, Jan. 2 1970 (p. 2). God was incarnate in Christ. Our Father thus took part in our lives to redeem us. Christ took the form of man to communicate the Father's love to us all. Without such a glorious fact The Mission of all missions would never have occurred.

We can do no better than to imitate this perfect example. Is this not what Paul was doing when he became all things to all men that in "one way or another" he might save some?

There is a compassionate, selfsacrificing, Christ-like love in this method of evangelism. In this approach there is much more than concern with rightness of fact and accuracy of content. To be sure, Christ said exactly what His Father would have Him say, and Paul did not tamper with the Revealed Story. But Paul, like Christ, knew that the beauty and power of the gospel could be hid by the clumsiness of the messenger. This was of particular concern to Paul who was only an earthen vessel and who therefore sought to hide himself behind the cross.

When the lost heard either Paul or Jesus they knew they were loved and therefore they listened. How did they know they were loved? They had seen the messenger go as far as possible to put himself in their place!

First, we should begin with ourselves. How much have we been caught up with same thinking and lifestyles as those around us? Are we satisfied and comfortable because of the things of the world? Is our happiness based on what we have? Are we so busy that we don't have time or interest in being actively involved with the church? Do we put more money into recreation and entertainment than we give to God's work? Are we being assimilated into our culture? Is there anything about us that sets us apart? We cannot lead people where we have not gone ourselves.

Second, we need to remember that people today are being bombarded with messages from every direction. Even commercials often preach values and ideas. People have become distrustful and sceptical. They have learned to filter and even tune out when they are being preached at (unless it's a message they want to hear). For many it's like having a mailbox filled with junk mail. There may be something really worthwhile in there, but it's easiest just to throw out the whole pile. Being content and satisfied with their lives means that many people are not looking nor are they even open to new ideas (or in the case of the Gospel, what they may perceive as only another form of an idea they may have already dismissed). At this point, we also need to remember that while there are a large number of people who are satisfied with their lives, nearly one in four Canadians are not.

Although reaching out to satisfied people may be challenging, it is not impossible. How? By helping them be unsatisfied. They need to see the Gospel demonstrated in the lives of Christians—that there is something more to live for. They need to see that it works—that life

is better when lived Christ's way. People need to see that the church is not a cold, lifeless institution, but a caring family that is engaged in serving God, helping one another and actively involved within the community. We are all familiar with the old saying, "I'd rather see a sermon than hear one." It isn't until people see something better that they will want to know what it is and how it can be part of their lives.

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Death – Sting? or Victory?

ny thinking person recognizes that death is a fact of life. The writer of Hebrews calls death an "appointment" all of us must keep. The exceptions will be those who are alive at the Lord's second advent, who will meet the Lord in the air.

Since the path to the grave is the common lot of princes and paupers, statesmen and slaves, the high and the mighty as well as the humble and lowly, it remains for each person to make his destiny beyond the grave as sure as he can. Failure to believe in a life after death is no defense against its consequences.

Death has been seen in every generation as the ultimate calamity that can befall any person, but the Bible teaches that there is something far worse than the physical death we are all headed for. It is called "second death"—the death of the soul, *'elebrating'*

for all eternity.

That this is an irreversible condition is pointed out in several places in the Bible, but nowhere more graphically than in the account in Luke

of Lazarus and the rich man. Only when he found himself in "torment" did the rich man discover that he should have taken steps in life to avoid coming to this place, across an impassable gulf from the joys and blessings of heaven. He learned this lesson well-but he learned it too late!

On the other hand, the apostle Paul had lived so that he could laugh at death and even taunt it! "0 death, where is thy sting? 0 grave, where

is thy victory?" To him, death was not defeat, and the grave was not only a means of release from the miseries and inequities of life on earth, but it was also an entrance into a wider and far more rewarding

life than he had ever known on earth.

The "thorn" in his side, for the removal of which he had prayed earnestly, would now be forever removed. The grave could not hold him, for God would reclaim him from the soil in which he was buried, just as God will call forth all who are dead, whether they have been cremated, buried at sea or disintegrated by nuclear explosion. (John 5:28, 29). It does not stretch the imagination to believe that God, who spoke the worlds into creation, can call His children forth from whatever grave they happen to fall into.

The "sting" of death is sin, which is simply another manner of saying that if a person dies in sin, he has been stung as no hornet ever could. The fires of an eternal burning hell await him after the worms have had a "go" at his mortal remains. Once convinced that death of the body is not proof against appearing before God AFTER death, no sane person would want to shuffle off this mortal coil without first making his peace with God.

Even Christians will sometimes honestly admit, even if only to themselves, that if Jesus came today, they would be woefully unprepared to face Him in the final Judgment. This, in spite of the fact that they are convinced that their demise, or the end of the world, could happen at any moment, with no

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prior warning, except what the Bible has already given.

Some good advice may be found in the saying, "so live that you would not be ashamed to sell the family parrot to the town gossip". There is no way of telling how many people pay only lip service to Christianity and respect

it as a "form" to be observed, at least outwardly, even as did the Pharisees. Jesus compared the "many" and the "few", those who would enter the broad way that leads to destruction as compared to those who would enter the narrow way that leads to eternal life. This is probably the saddest of all commentaries on human nature. See Matthew 7:13, 14.

This writer has been called upon to speak post-mortem words over lifeless forms of people who were sadly unprepared to face what they must face after death. We often need to remind ourselves that funeral messages are not for the dead, who can't hear them anyway, but for the living, who have another opportunity to ponder what their ultimate end might be and to be reconciled to God while life and time still favor them.

The words of William Cohen Bryant (no relation) are appropriate here. "So live that when thy summons comes to join the innumerable caravan which moves

to that mysterious realm where each shall take his chamber in the silent halls of death, thou go not like the quarry slave at night, scourged to his dungeon; but, sustained and soothed by an unfaltering trust, approach thy grave like one who wraps the drapery of his couch about him, and lies down to pleasant dreams." (Thanatopsis).

Paul said, "For me to live is Christ, and to die is gain." (Philippians 1:21).

Death and the Judgment await us all. Whether death is a Sting or a victory is up to each of us, for "God is not willing that any should perish, but that ALL should come to repentance." (I Peter 3:9).

Cambridge: Besides our Sunday morning worship, we have small group Bible study on Wednesday nights. For the past few months, this has been reduced from two groups to a single group, due to the departure of a couple of families last summer, who moved away for job reasons. However, we have recently begun a second small group—a 'Bible 101' study, for newer Christians who might not get much out of some of the discussions we have on Wednesday nights! We host a drop-in for adults one morning each

week, a youth activity night each Friday. A number of our ladies run a girl's night each week, which has a strong spiritual message delivered in an otherwise fun and entertaining atmosphere. Youth group happens every Saturday evening. Also, weekly studies are ongoing, both with non Christians and new Christians in one-on-one settings. The elders meet twice each month to discuss the work of the congregation here. There is a ministry meeting that meets roughly once each month, allowing those on the 'front lines' to get together and share. A congregational meeting occurs every other month, so that everybody stays informed and can be heard. A 20's gettogether has just been implemented that is hoped will meet monthly, and a ladies' meeting has begun this month. The over 40's folks get together for supper every month or so, so everyone has a place to belong! The excellent messages brought to us on Sundays come not only from Greg, but also from various men in the congregation, as Greg encourages them to use the talents that God has granted them. This also keeps us well prepared to continue uninterrupted when Greg is away. From time to time we have opportunity to join forces with the broader Christian community in the Waterloo region. One such example just recently saw us help churches in Waterloo, Kitchener, Cambridge and Guelph collect enough food to fill a transport truck. All food collected went to local food banks within the region. The congregation will be employing Greg Toohey of the Waterloo congregation as an intern this summer. We thank God for the numerous ways in which He allows us to serve Him. We are also so blessed by the ongoing, faithful support we receive from individuals and congregations who are eager to share in what God is doing here. Without the financial resources that come from beyond the confines of our small group, we would be unable to maintain some of the activities that we believe are so vital to our ministry.

Fenwick: Kids For Christ wrapped up with an awards night on June 3. Over 30 children were registered for 2010 - 2011. Ninety two people attended the Niagara combined worship held at Fenwick on June 26. Canada Day was another success at Dandelion Acres, with 170 in attendance. A hymn sing on the lawn was held on July 16.

Ottawa (West): Giuseppe (Joe) Borracci responded to the Word and was baptized on July 4, in his backyard pool by Bob Hickson. The congregation rejoices with Joe, welcoming him to the congregation.

Stoney Creek: The Stoney Creek church is one of several Ontario churches involved in the Partnership for the Missional Church, and steering and listening teams are currently being formed. The senior's group continues to provide a meal once a month at Micah House, which provides temporary housing for new refugees in Canada. In July, those fed included newcomers from El Salvador, Columbia, Haiti and Hungary. It is estimated that it will take at least four years just to clean up the debris caused by the double catastrophe of an earthquake and a tsunami.

Delta: Ladner's Lucas Waddell recently completed an outstanding sophomore season as a starting pitcher at Harding University in Searcy, Arkansas, He garnered honours both on the field and in the classroom. On the diamond, the right-hander started 12 games and went 9-3 with a 4.06 ERA and earned Second Team All-Gulf South Conference honours. He became just the third Harding pitcher to win nine or more games in a single season. He was sixth in the conference in wins and ninth in innings pitched (82). His performance gave Harding its firstever appearance at the NCAA II National Tournament, where Lucas managed a win against North Alabama in his first of two starts in the GSC Tournament, pitching a complete game in Harding's 5-2 victory. He also pitched two scoreless innings against Southern Arkansas in the championship game. Lucas was just as successful in the classroom. 


DID YOU KNOW?: 1) That there are a large number of Serbs living in Switzerland? A Christian there is making the rounds to distribute "Easy-To-Read" New Testaments in the Serbian language to as many as he is able to contact. 2) That churches in Abilene and Austin, TX, are making a trip to Peru with Olive Branch Ministries to carry out a program for an orphanage housing 900 children? The "Let's Start Talking" series is being used to teach University and high school students. 3) That Richard Taylor reports his co-worker, John Henry, who oversees the distribution of literature by one of the congregations in Bangkok, Thailand, will be traveling there in October to visit the work? This church was excited to have four baptisms in the month of May, with the current number of students taking the correspondence courses at 944.

COLLEGE OF PHARMACY: Harding University College of Pharmacy welcomed 24 students from eight different States to its third annual Pharmacy Summer Camp June 19-24 on campus in Searcy, AR. The camp provides an opportunity for high school juniors and seniors to explore the pharmacy profession through classes and hands-on learning experiences. Activities included pharmaceutical laboratory experiences, group health and wellness projects, games and recreation, professional shadowing and an introduction to curriculum and current topics in the field. Some of the camp class topics included preparing to become a pharmacy technician, diabetes prevention and treatment and CSI: forensic fingerprinting.

VBS IN INDIA: In the spring of 2010, long-time missionary to India, Karen Clayton, in Hamilton, AL, began working on the 2011 Vacation Bible School materials. With help from Tina Sanders and other volunteers from the Maysville church of Christ in Gurley, AL, 50 full

sets of studies on the Parables of Jesus were prepared, and over 200 pounds of VBS materials transported to India—no small task because of ever-changing airline restrictions. Brother Jaipaul, who directs this massive effort in India. works with well over 100 Indian brethren that are scattered over three states: Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka and Tamil Nadu. The lessons are taught in five languages: Hindi, Telugu, Kannada, Tamil and English. Their goal this year was to teach more than 33,000 children in 12 weeks. Jaipaul believed that they would go well beyond that number. During the summer holidays which start on the second week of April and end the last week of June the Vacation Bible Schools are offered, with many church members and preachers working in the program. In some places more than 50 children, in some a hundred or more, participate, though it is the hottest time of the year and space is always limited. The lessons are printed in India after they arrive. They consist of five different lessons on flip charts, Beginner workbooks for children from grades 1-4, Primary workbooks for children from grades 5-7, Junior workbooks for the children from grades 8-12, Activity sheets for that day's lesson, badges for every student and a VBS Certificate and crown given each student at the closing session. The lessons are designed for five-day schools, requiring three hours daily. Depending upon their time and budget, some congregations have a morning and afternoon session, and feed the children lunch at noon for three days instead. After the individual groups have their lessons, all the students are gathered back to one location to learn new songs and watch a Puppet show, with the Puppets asking children questions about what they have learned. Students who have memorized the memory verses quote them in front of the assembly, and, on the last day, given a gift for remembering them, with a special gift for those who also complete their workbooks. When the children have their crowns in place, they all march around the village in a parade, singing songs and quoting their memory verses. This has been a tremendous advertising tool, because the villagers come to their doors to watch, and children who miss out this time want to come to the next VBS.



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Questions People Ask

Bill Craddock

If people today are under the New Testament covenant, why do we spend so much time in studying the Old Testament? Should we spend so much time studying the Old Testament?

It is true that we today are under the New Testament covenant of grace and truth, but it is also necessary that we have knowledge of the Old Testament to really understand the New Testament. The Apostle Paul wrote "For whatsoever things were written aforetime were written for our learning, that we through patience and comfort of the scriptures might have hope" (Romans 15:4). In 1 Corinthians 10 Paul reminds the Christians of many of the mistakes and sins of the Israelites. In verse 11 Paul writes, "Now all these things happened unto them for

ensamples: and they are written for our admonition, upon whom the ends of the world are come." Question: how can I know the sins of the Israelites unless I study the Old Testament?

The truth of the matter is, we cannot understand the New Testament unless we know a great deal about the Old Testament. For example, we would not know that we are a part of the human race if it were not for the Old Testament. The Old Testament tells us that God made us (man) in His own image. "And God said, Let us make man in our image, after our likeness: and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over

the cattle, and over all the earth, and over every creeping thing that creepeth upon the earth. So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them. And God blessed them, and God said unto them, Be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth, and subdue it: and have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over every living thing that moveth upon the earth" (Genesis 1:26-28).

How do we know that we are the human race and not one of the animal kingdoms? The very fact that we control animals and we are not controlled by someone else is proof that we are humans. God put man in charge. We have free will as God gave Adam and Eve. That we can think and reason, as no other part of God's creation, proves we are human.

If it were not for the Old Testament we would not know what sin is and what it does to our relationship with God. We learn all this in the first three chapters of Genesis. The Old Testament gives us the story of God preparing the world for the arrival of His Son, Jesus Christ, to be the Saviour of the world. We would never know this story if it were not for the Old Testament. There are over 300 prophecies of Christ in the Old Testament. Jesus stated in Matthew 5:17, "Think not that I am come to destroy the law, or the prophets; I am not come to destroy, but to fulfill."

For some reason most people do not like to study history. As a

> former history teacher, one of the greatest jobs I had was convincing the students that they needed to know these historical facts. Folks, you cannot know where you are unless you know where you came from. It is impossible to understand God's scheme of redemption without knowing some of the history revealed in the **Old Testament concerning** God's dealings with man throughout the centuries.

We don't live under the old covenant. The New Testament reveals to us God's plan of salvation and how He wants us to live as His children. The Old Testament reveals how this salvation came into being.





and their fringes long, and they love the place of honour at feasts and the best seats in the synagogues and greetings in the marketplaces and being called rabbi by others. But you are not to be called rabbi, for you have one teacher, and you are all brothers" (Matthew 23:5-8 ESV). Their position of leadership had "gone to their head" and they forgot the real honour was not in the position but in service. Jesus leaves no doubt to the issue by saying, "The greatest among you shall be your servant. Whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and whoever humbles himself will be exalted" (Matthew 23:11-12 ESV). All too often she has worn the robes of the ruler, not the apron of the servant. Even in our own day it can hardly be said that the 'brand-image' of the Church is of a society united in love for Jesus, and devoted to selfless service of others".

May the elders of the Lord's Church never become proud position seekers. May their example always be that of the Chief Shepherd, Jesus Christ, as they protect, encourage, feed, mature and lead the flock by being a model of the servant nature of the Lord.

The church, growing to maturity and accomplishing the purpose for which it was established—to make known the manifold wisdom of God—must have such leaders.
