Questions People Ask

Are we born with a conscience?

Tebster defines conscience as, "Sense of consciousness of the moral goodness or blameworthiness of one's own conduct, intentions, or character, together with a feeling of obligation to do right or be good. Hence, a faculty, power, or principle conceived to decide as to the moral quality of one's own thoughts or acts, enjoining what is good."

conscience is that part of man's intellect that guides him into right conduct and afflicts him when he ventures into wrong conduct. The word does not appear in the Old Testament, but the idea frequently appears, as when Adam and Eve hid themselves from God in the garden after they had sinned and could see that they were naked (Genesis 3:8). Joseph's brothers confess their quilt regarding their

Jesus never used the word. It was used mostly by the Apostle Paul in his speeches and writings. Paul speaks of the conscience in regard to the eating of meat that had been offered to idols. "However, there is not in everyone that knowledge; for some, with consciousness of the idol, until now eat it as a thing offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled" (1 Corinthians 8:7 NKJV). "But when you thus sin against the brethren, and wound their weak conscience, you sin against Christ" (1 Corinthians 8:12 NKJV). In both of these cases, the person's conscience was directing them in the manner in which it had been taught. These people had been pagans who offered sacrifices to idols and they felt that eating the meat that had been offered to an idol was an act of the worship of that idol. Paul said that it was not, but these weak brothers did not understand the truth on the matter, thus their conscience was afflicted.


The conscience is that part of man's intellect that guides him in his relationship with God. The intellect has to be properly educated according to the will of God for it to be a safe guide in life. An intellect that has been educated contrary to the will of God would not inflict guilt when wrong is done.

Are we born with a conscience? No, but we are born with the capability of developing one. In fact, everyone will develop a conscience. As to whether that conscience helps or hinders a person depends on the training the conscience gets. Our conscience is our mind. If we train our mind to do the things of God, our conscience will warn us if we are straying from the things of God. Paul said, "And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your MIND, that you may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God" (Romans 12:2 NKJV). If we train our mind according to the things of the world, we will have no conscience to convict us of sinning

against God.

If we were born with a godly inclined conscience, we would never need to be taught right and wrong. That is why our minds must be taught. The conscience will only tell you that something is wrong if it has been taught that it is wrong. This is why we need to be sure that we put the will of God into our minds and the minds of our children.






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Begging the Question

ave you ever heard a statement that sounds extremely **L** convincing at first but as you reflect you realize it's not as much of a sure thing as you initially thought. Often this happens when the speaker asks you to share in an assumption which he has made in drawing his conclusion. An example could be "It's not that kids in Canada are smarter than those in the US, we just have a better educational system". This statement is full of problems. How does the speaker know kids in Canada aren't smarter? How does the speaker know we have a better education system? Statements that draw a conclusion based on an unproven premise (an assumption) are called "question begging." That is, they ask the listener to share some unproven statement without question.

In a recent publication by a fairly well known author there is this line of reasoning. First God always gets what He wants, second God wants everyone to go to heaven and third everyone must be going to heaven. This line of reasoning is question begging. The author is asking his readers to accept his unproven assumption that God always gets what He wants. It is true that scripture proves that God loves all men (John3:16; 1 Timothy 2:4; 2 Peter 3:9). However, the Bible also tells us that mankind has freedom of choice (Deuteronomy 30:15-20) and that God is just (Psalm 33:5). So the second statement (God always gets what He wants) can't be proven from scripture. The author asks us to suspend our knowledge of God and ignore what He has told us. He leaves a question unanswered that needs to be proven before his conclusion is valid.

This kind of argument is incredibly common in speaking and writing. When you start to watch for it you will find everyone from newscasters, to political commentators, to preachers are guilty of drawing conclusions based on assertions they have not proven. Now I should point out that there are times when we can and should assume certain things about our audience. For example, I don't start every lesson I teach or preach by proving that God exists and that the Bible is His revelation to man. I assume my audience already believes this. However what I try not to do and should not do is make some point about the topic I am dealing with at the time without offering evidence from scripture or elsewhere that my point is correct. What if, for example, I were talking about raising kids and I simply stated "the greatest influence on any child is his or her parents". This is an important point and one that I need to talk about. However, I should offer some evidence from studies which have been done and

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

Same Song, Another Verse

ver a century ago, there was an issue that created an irreparable division within the Restoration Movement. Typically, many people look back at the separation that occurred and attribute it to one or two manifestations of the issue—like instrumental music or mission societies. However,

there was a larger issue—one that went to the very core of the authority of the Bible and how it was understood and applied in the church. The issue is how the silence of scripture should be seen. Is it permissive or prohibitive?

The question of the silence of scripture goes back, historically, long before the Restoration Movement. During the Protestant Reformation, Zwingli believed that the silence of scripture was prohibitive. Even earlier, the writer of Hebrews uses the idea of the authority of silence in 7:12-16 when he notes that Jesus was from the tribe Judah, but that the Law said nothing about priests coming from that tribe. Thus, by stating that priests came from Levi, the Law did not have to specify that priests could not come from any other tribe. The principle, simply, is when scripture specifies something, it does not have to specifically exclude everything else.

One of the most common areas of discussion of the application of this principle has been, and continues to be, on the nature of worship—specifically in whether instrumental music should be part of worship. On one hand, there are those who believe it is necessary to use instruments to attract people, especially young people, in today's culture. On the other hand are those who strongly believe instruments are an unscriptural and unwarranted addition to worship.

Regardless of which view one takes, there is a reality that history should teach us. In Christians Only, James DeForest Murch notes, "The organ controversy was not peculiar to the Disciples. All the denominations of Protestantism had been torn by it." When the Restoration Movement fractured over 100 years ago, the introduction of instrumental music in some churches was among the most divisive issues. Many churches were split. In the past few years, this is happening again. Some congregations are turning again to this human innovation. In some cases, churches have gone from vocal to instrumental worship. Some have added an additional instrumental service, while also retaining an unaccompanied one. A few have chosen a "blended" service, using both unaccompanied and accompanied songs in their worship.

It was the experience of this writer to have visited a congregation in the U.S. on the morning the elders of that congregation announced they were adding an instrumental service. The *a cappella* service would be earlier in the morning, while the instrumental one was to be at 11 a.m. The elder making the announcement explained the reason for the addition. "We have a paradigm that works." (However, he did not explain further what that meant.) He had not even finished making the announcement when a number of members quietly rose and left the assembly. The following Sunday, a new congregation had been formed. The unscriptural decision and action of the elders caused the flock unnecessary hurt and division.

With the addition of instruments in a few Canadian congregations, the Gospel Herald has found itself in a difficult position. These congregations have historically been among the mainstream, *a cappella* Churches of Christ. However, by adding instrumental music to their worship, they are choosing to realign themselves with the instrumental churches of the Restoration Movement known as the Churches of Christ/Christian Church and the Disciples of Christ.

The masthead of the Gospel Herald states, "For the promotion of New Testament Christianity." Throughout its history, this has been understood to include the belief that New Testament worship was, and still should be today, without instrumental accompaniment. Everett Ferguson, one of the foremost authorities on early church history, stated in his book **The Church of Christ**, "The testimony of early Christian literature is expressly to the absence of instruments from the church for approximately the first thousand years of Christian history." The GH serves an audience that shares these values. Thus, our directory lists congregations that are non-instrumental. Our

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Joy Made Complete in Fellowship

The beloved apostle John wrote to encourage Christians in their daily fight against the powers of Satan to disarm, discourage and defeat them in their Christian walk. John understood the value of fellowship that could be enjoyed by the Christian community. The caring fellowship of the church as recorded in Acts 2:44, 45 and Acts 4:32-35, was beautiful. Sadly, as time progressed we see fellowship under stress, such as in Acts 6. when some brethren had to be appointed to deal with the problem of the provisions made for the widows. This problem was overcome and we read often of the value of the fellowship in giving strength and purpose to the life of the Church.

The Lord, in His wisdom. provided us today with some things to help us overcome sin and live for Jesus. Of course, number one. He provides His Holy Spirit to dwell within us giving us strength and support as we battle with the influences of the ruler of this world. A second blessing is the Word of God. Herein we read of God's provisions for us through His Son and gives promise of what is in store for us, the highs and the lows, as we live in submission to His will. Thirdly, He gives us the privilege of prayer to take our concerns, desires, needs and thanksgiving to Him. No one stands between the Christian and this communication with the Father.

Lastly, and of particular importance to our theme, is the Church. Sadly many see the Church as "somewhere you go from time to time for worship, study, weddings and funerals" rather than a family of God's people who love God and each other, always ready to share the difficult times and the joys of each other's lives. Far too many of us only see our fellow Christians once or twice a week, and that in the worship or group Bible study sessions. These are fine but far from enough. We need to be sharing our lives with each other in social and recreational activities as well.

Godly living has always been in danger of the forces around it. From the Garden of Eden on, Satan has worked at getting people to dismiss God's truth in favour of believing his lie. Over

the centuries many have bought into Satan's lies and, sadly, many who have owned the Lord in primary obedience to the gospel, have been called away by the deceiver's lies.

Our age is a time when many chide those who continue to believe there is truth—be it God's or any other truth. Our society rejects "the truth" to the arbitrary giving of equal validity to any opinion or philosophical idea. Truth becomes determined by what one desires to be truth.

The really sad thing is that members, often leaders, of the Lord's Church today are being influenced by this way of thinking. This should not be a surprise since the people of God from creation till this day in 2012 have been so influenced. Maybe, however, because of the technological advances of our time we are hearing more from those who promote this kind of thinking.

Among religious people there are more voices promoting the idea that no one can know for sure what the Bible means. Those who take this position will not take a stand for the

pattern of faith and practice seen in the Bible, but would rather warn that in doing an exegeses of scripture should one offer a "humble" suggestion as to what scripture says. This sound like suggesting that we take our stand on "the politically correct" translation!

These folks must have missed John 8:31, 32 "So Jesus said to the Jews who had believed in him, 'If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." Also Jude must have been mistaken when he said, Jude 1:3, "Beloved, although I was very eager to write to you about our common salvation, I found it necessary to write appealing to you to contend for the faith that was once for all delivered to the saints."

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It seems that Jude wanted to speak to his readers in a joyful way and with thanksgiving about the common salvation being enjoyed by the Church, but felt the need to remind them (us) that there would be dangers to maintaining a proper stand on truth. The Lord's Church has always been able to overcome the attacks of those on the outside. The real danger is when "pretenders" within the body teach doctrines such as noted above. (Remember Jesus teaching in Matthew 7:15-20 and Paul's words to Ephesian elders, "Pay careful attention to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for the church of God, which he obtained with his own blood. I know that after my departure fierce wolves will come in among you, not sparing the flock; and from among your own selves will arise men speaking twisted things, to draw away the disciples after them. Therefore be alert, remembering that for three years I did not cease night or day to admonish everyone with tears. And now I commend you to God and to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up and to give you the inheritance among all those who are sanctified" (Acts 20:28-32). While Paul does not say so, understand that fellowship in the Lord's Church comes through our relationship to God "...and to the word of his grace".

Returning to the apostle John, look at the opening verses of his first letter. "That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we looked upon and have touched with our hands, concerning the word of life-the life was made manifest, and we have seen it, and testify to it and proclaim to you the eternal life, which was with the Father and was made manifest to us-that which we have seen and heard we proclaim also to you, so that you too may have fellowship with us; and indeed our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. And we are writing these things so that our joy may be complete" (1 John 1:1-4). One of the things that stands out in these verses is that John is writing to confirm to his readers the truth of the testimony given through himself and the other New Testament writers about Jesus. He emphasizes that the things he has written about (in the gospel of John) came as a direct result of his time spent in travelling with and sharing in the ministry of Jesus the Lord. He wants his readers to know this truth so they can enjoy the fellowship with John and the same fellowship John has with the Father and the Son.

In coming issues of the Herald we want to examine the Joy of Fellowship and its importance to us in the Lord's Church. We must understand what elements go into making this fellowship real. We must realize that this fellowship is conditional and what those conditions are. There are costs in such fellowship and these too must be understood if the real value of fellowship is to be understood and appreciated.

What this means is that it becomes important for Christians, and anyone who believes truth is important, to look for unanswered questions. John warns us that not every statement that comes from someone claiming to speak for God is actually true. The beloved apostle John instructs us, "Beloved, do not believe every spirit, but test the spirits to see whether they are from God, for many false prophets have gone out into the world" (1 John 4:1).

One test that is easily applied is; has the conclusion been drawn based on any unproven propositions. If so the conclusion is suspect because it is question begging. Just as we have mentioned many times in considering false arguments, we need to "Test all things and hold fast to that which is good" (1 Thessalonians 5:21).

Weathering the Storm

They might have been apostles of Jesus Christ, but they still had to deal with storms! Some of them were professional fishermen. and the Sea of Galilee was their lake for fishing, but they were still frightened this night as the storm raged and their boat was in the process of being swamped. Jesus was there, but he was asleep in the stern (Mark 4:35-41)! This was not the only time the disciples got into difficulty on the sea, as the wind came up and the boat was battered by the waves (Matthew 14:22-34). This time, Jesus was not with them, but came to them—walking on the water! The Apostle Paul also had experience with storms as he served Christ. Of special note is that time on the way to the imperial court in Rome, when a fierce northeaster drove the ship across the Mediterranean for many days and finally wrecked it on the shores of Malta (Acts 27:14-44).

As with the apostles, so with us. Life is certainly not all sunshine. Often we encounter the storm: family difficulties - business reverses - unjust criticism - sickness - death - loneliness - temptations - broken friendships unemployment - problems at school. This is life, and the follower of Jesus is involved in it: sunshine - shadow: winter - summer; storm - calm. Even Jesus knew these things and He has not promised to withhold them from His people. He has not told us that we will not have to face storms as His followers. Real Christianity is not in living a storm free life, but in learning to persevere and to overcome.

What should we do in the storm? How should we behave in the storm? What will help us to "ride it out"? First, let us keep our faith. Let us determine never to become fearful and hysterical. Jesus: "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?" (Mark

4:40). Does not God still reign? Is not Christ still with us?

Paul, in the midst of the storm at sea spoke of "the God to whom I belong and whom I worship" and urged those present to "keep up your courage, men, for I have faith in God that it will be exactly as I have been told" (Acts 27:25).

In the midst of the storm, remember: "I will never leave you or forsake you" (Hebrews 13:5, 6); "If God is for us, who is against us?" (Romans 8:31, 32); "So do not worry..." (Matthew 6:33, 34).

In the midst of the storm, be hopeful. Doesn't calm follow the storm? Doesn't the rainbow appear following the rain? We can always live in hope if our life is anchored in the right place. Our hope needs to be embedded deep in the love and the integrity of God. "...that hope we hold. It is like an anchor for our lives, an anchor safe and sure. It enters in through the veil, where Jesus has entered on our behalf as forerunner, having become a high priest forever in the succession of Melchizedek" (Hebrews 6:19,20 NEB). "You will find trouble in the world - but, never lose heart, I have conquered the world!" (John 16:33 Phillips).

A storm is no time to cast away the anchor—but so many do! How sad when the storm is allowed to stop one from assembling regularly with the saints, to stop seeking ways to serve, to stop reading God's Word and to stop praying. That is asking for real disaster!

Have you had a great challenge lately? Have you had to face the wind and the waves? Have you acted so as to strengthen your anchor in the love of God, or to weaken it? In the storm, let us keep our faith and maintain our hope!

The results need not all be bad. The results of the storm need not all be bad, if we will keep our faith and maintain our hope (although it must be admitted that in the storm it does often appear as if no good could possibly result!).

The storm can reveal character. We do not know our real strengths and weaknesses until we are put to the test. Back in 1962, when we were building the church building in Halifax, all seemed to be going well. Then one day a strong wind came up!

The men who were putting down shingles on the roof quickly came down. Engineers were called and the design altered. Storm braces were added to the trusses. The wind had revealed a flaw in the design and corrective measures were needed. Anyone can be a "fair-weather Christian"—it is when all does not go well with us that we learn our real make up!

How strong is our faith? Do we really love God? Trials "test" our faith (James 1:3). It is the person who "passes the test" who receives the crown of life from God (James 1:12). Just as gold proves itself genuine when it passes through the assayer's fire, so our faith shows itself genuine when it survives the fires of disappointment, loss, sorrow, setback (1 Peter 1:6-8).

We know that Job was utterly loyal and faithful to God, that he served God out of true motive, and that he was no hireling who just served God when all went well. We know those thing about Job because he faced and passed the test! So the storm can reveal character.

The storm can strengthen character. Was Job weaker or stronger after having faced and overcome sorrow and loss? Job himself said he was stronger; that he had a better understanding of himself and of God (Job 42:1-6).

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The strong tree is the one that, during its growth, had some exposure to winds and storms. The tree, always protected, is the one that will fall first in a storm. The overprotected person, not meeting trials, will be immature, and so unsteady in reaction to life. There is a warning to parents here!

"...the testing of your faith produces endurance." And endurance or perseverance is necessary to the development of maturity, to a well-rounded, complete character (James 1:2,3).

To fail to strive, to reach out, to be tested, to face the storm, is to fail to develop as God meant for us to develop!

The storm reveals our need for the Master! It is when the storm starts to swamp the boat that we cry out "Lord, save us! We are perishing!" (Matthew 8:25). In the storm we recognize our humanity, our weakness, our ignorance, our smallness, our utter need for God! It is in the midst of the storm that we learn to rely "not on ourselves but on God who raises the dead" (2 Corinthians 1:8,9).

Howard Rutledge, U.S. Air Force pilot, imprisoned in North Viet Nam, wrote of how the pressure of the storm made him turn to God: "During those longer periods of enforced reflection it became so much easier to separate the important from the trivial. the worthwhile from the waste. For example, in the past, I usually worked or played hard on Sundays and had no time for church... I was too busy, too preoccupied, to spend one or two short hours a week thinking about the really important things. Now the sights and sounds of death were all around me. My hunger for spiritual food soon outdid my hunger for a steak. Now I wanted to know about that part of me that will never die. Now I wanted to talk about God and Christ and the church... I had completely neglected the spiritual dimension of my life. It took prison to show me how empty life is without God" (In the Presence of Mine Enemies, 34).

The storm may serve to remind us of the need for one another. Suddenly

we realize the need for human companionship, for support, for help, for encouragement. Petty differences seem to disappear in the storm!

At a critical moment in that great storm saga in Acts, the sailors decided to abandon the ship and the other people on board. Paul emphasized that the sailors would need to stay on board and not abandon ship, lest all be lost (Acts 27:30,31). The storm is a time for pulling together, not for trying to go it alone!

The storm reveals the power and compassion of the Saviour. "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" (Mark 4:38). Yes, He cares! It was not the storm that woke Him from a deep sleep, but rather the need of His disciples!


When we put our trust in Him, lay our needs before Him, put our hopes upon Him, we find that He does care and does help us in our need! He is able to "sympathize with our weaknesses" (Hebrews 4:15). He went through some tough times Himself when He was on earth! If we will let Him, the Saviour will give us the strength to deal with life and to handle both the good and the bad times (Philippians 4:12,13).

This life has its share of storms. Sometimes it seems one storm follows closely upon another! Our Lord assures us that, for His people, someday the storms will end. Someday He will speak again—"Peace! Be still!"—and all storms will end for all time for those in Him! What will be left will be a great and peaceful calm (Revelation 21:3,4).

What about you? "Will your anchor hold in the storms of life, When the clouds unfold their wings of strife? When the strong tides lift, and the cables strain, Will your anchor drift, or firm remain?" If your life is grounded firm and deep in the love and integrity of the Lord, fastened to the Rock which cannot move, then your soul will be kept steadfast and secure though the billows roll!

CENTRAL AMERICA: "Daniel H. Burnham was an American architect and urban planner responsible for the creating the master plan for the city of Chicago, IL, and designing Union Station in Washington, DC, among other great projects. He is remembered for saying: 'Make no little plans; they have no magic to stir men's blood and probably themselves will not be realized. Make big plans; aim high in hope and work, remembering that a noble, logical diagram once recorded will not die.' God has given us a big plan for the evangelizing of the world. "Go into all the world and preach the gospel" is the command (Mark 16:16). But it is much more than a command. It is a commission that requires real forethought and planning in order to accomplish everything that can and ought to be accomplished. In 1998, George Hall approached a group of preachers in the Central American country of Honduras with a plan for the evangelism of Central America. It was not only ambitious, but much bigger than anything ever proposed before but he was persuaded this was the way to go. And he persuaded those indigenous preachers that they could - with God's help - accomplish the task. So they set about putting in order an organization for creating the Biblical Institute of Central America—a school designed to prepare knowledgeable and effective evangelists for Central America. To date, the Biblical Institute of Central America has graduated nearly 300 men, been responsible for tens of thousands of baptisms and

restorations, conducted more than 100,000 Bible studies (by the students in the last 4 years alone), and the establishment of many new, faithful congregations of God's Church. Beginning with a few young men in Honduras, the BICA has begun to play a really significant role in building up the church and developing evangelistic preachers in this continent. It is a testimony to the power of God. Plans that seem too great to even dream are

possible, as Jesus promised in Matthew 19:26. George Hall began this project with no thought of failure, using the biblical model that is both simple and effective. "And the things that you have heard from me among many witnesses, commit these to faithful men who will be able to teach others also" (2 Timothy 2:2). Everyone associated with BICA, from supporters to directors to students, have been willing to work hard. The plan was ambitious, but grounded in faith and built with hard work. The steps have not been easy, requiring constant dedication, consistent effort and daily perseverance. BICA has been able to share this vision with congregations willing to embrace it and partner in it, enabling the vision to continue to grow."—From a report written by Richard Kirkand

RESEARCHERS EXAMINE TEXTBOOK TREATMENT OF ISLAM:

A recently released analysis of history textbooks used in school districts nationwide in the U.S. reveals a strong pro-Islam bias that researchers say will profoundly affect the way future generations approach foreign policy, if left uncorrected. Is it Education or Indoctrination? The treatment of Islam in Grades 6 through 12, according to the non-profit organization ACT, was read by 70,000 school board members across the country in late March. The heavily documented 229-page study, over the course of two years, found the textbooks gloss over some aspects of the Islamic faith, while completely rewriting others. "What we found is a pattern of historical revisionism and bias that clearly creates a narrative for the average middle or high school student to have a view of the Muslim world that is very rosy," according to Executive Director Guy Rodgers. "The errors are numerous, and the implications are disconcerting. We're now in the second generation of young people that have been exposed to this rewrite of history, and it will affect how they deal with public policy and threats from the Muslim world. That's a big deal, because those threats are not going to go away—they're going to increase with time, and there needs to be an accurate understanding of Islam, how it was founded, jihad and what it means for us today."

Most of the 38 textbooks analyzed were published between 2000 and 2010, but Rodgers said some factual errors were traced as far back as 1990. For example, though the books accurately describe the rise of European imperialism and its African slave trade, they "are silent" on the fact that the Islamic slave trade in Africa began 800 years before Europe's. Nor do they discuss the violent invasions and forcible takeovers of other nations which resulted in the 6,000-mile long Islamic Empire known as "imperialism". "One textbook treats this by saying, verbatim, 'Islam became popular in India," Rodgers said. "You ask the Hindus who know their history, and they'll tell you 80 million Hindus were killed and 2,000 temples were destroyed by Islamic jihadists. That's hardly 'becoming popular.'" According to the study, some of the books also falsely claim that Islam extends equality to Jews and women under Sharia law. The implications of mis-education are already evident on college campuses, he noted. "We're seeing a rise of anti-Semitism, a rise of opposition to Israel and sympathy with the plight of the Palestinians. We're seeing a rise of militant Muslim groups on campuses. We run into young people who tell us that they were taught Christianity and Judaism are bad, the Crusades were terrible, that women are treated equally under Islam. Public school students are not the only ones necessarily affected," he continued, "A lot of Christian schools use the same textbooks as public schools. The typical board member, teacher, etc., do not know these things any more than the average person does. It is urgent to wake enough of them up to put pressure

> on the textbook publishers to make corrections." – Reported by Karla Dial

INDIA: One of every six people in the world today lives in this country, the world's largest democracy. It also has more churches of Christ, more gospel preachers and more members of the church than any other nation on earth. The results of the work of the India Missions team, headquartered in Alabama, are so phenomenal



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that they are frequently doubted by people who worship in congregations which, according to recent studies, barely average 2-4 or 5 baptisms in banner years. What is the difference? For one, it is in the characteristics of the people in India as contrasted to Canadians and Americans. With the caste system in place for thousands of years, those in the lower castes were consistently ignored, downtrodden and used by the upper classes. A religion that recognizes all people as equal and stoops to help the poor, the poverty-stricken, the sick and maimed, naturally would appeal to these people who have always striven for a better life by belief in that system. As Ron Clayton frequently notes, India is the most receptive mission field in the world today. After worshipping and appealing for centuries to gods who gave no answers, a religion that offers unconditional pardon, a life of confidence and peace of mind, the assurance of help from a merciful God, along with the promise of a glorious life beyond this one, why wouldn't people be interested in this amazing offer? Accepting

the gospel involves the willingness to spread the Good News to others, thus giving at once the impetus to give their families and friends the same opportunity they have experienced. Even though this sometimes ends in physical disaster for the new Christian, many are willing to risk it in their happiness in having found something new to live for and depend on. Thoughtful Christians are beginning to ask why we build buildings and spend money on attempts to interest people in our own countries when there seems to be so little to show for it?

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Western Collegiate and Humber College in Toronto. His goal was to become a counsellor for abused youth, but he was not able to complete his education.

For 27 years, Joe worked for the Parks Department. This was a seasonal job which allowed him to spend most of his winters in Toronto, where he had access to good doctors. For about two years, he worked in construction in Toronto. Then, in 2000 when the Ontario Government decided what his friends had been telling him for years – that he was unemployable – he gave in and went on a disability pension. But he never gave up. He volunteered at a wildlife sanctuary, and continued to work in construction on his "good days" even though he might have to lie down on the sidewalk now and then.

In 2000, having begun a Bible Study under Richard Kruse, with the International Bible Correspondence School, he realized he needed to be baptized. The deed was done at the Strathmore building. He worshipped with us for a while, until ill health prevented him. But he never lost his love for the Lord (his favourite hymn was "He's My Friend") and exploring his Aboriginal roots gave him a deeper love and respect for our Creator and all His handiwork.

On November 24, Joe's support group, Among Friends, hosted a memorial service at LAMP Community Centre, a touching tribute to a man they loved and admired. The members of Among Friends said that preparing the displays, the hand-outs and the food helped them to heal in their grieving. The service touched on the four aspects of Joe's life: Christian, Aboriginal, mental health patient, alcoholic / addict. Almost everyone who took part knew him and loved him. The only one who didn't know him was an elderly gentleman who came by special request to give us "The Touch of the Master's Hand".

Richard Kruse led us in a beautiful prayer. Gerry Ellis read 1 Corinthians 13. Wil Maddeaux led two hymns: Joe's favourite, and "Angry Words". He gave a short talk on love and the responsibilities connected with it, especially obedience, and neatly segued to a Gospel sermon. During the rest of the service, each speaker talked of Joe's spirituality and his willingness to reach out to anyone who needed help. (I doubt if many understood how he struggled to overcome his paranoia and fear of people.) We all agreed he was a blessing to those who knew him. The meeting ended with "The Disciples' Prayer".

Joe is survived by his birth family, his foster family, and two daughters. He is very deeply missed by those who knew him well, including Wil, Blanche, and other friends of Bill and Lois W.

You've left a big hole in our lives, bud, but that's okay. Seeyinabit.

BOOKREVIEVS

The Truth About Giving, God's Dare to Give Scripturally, Kyle Butt & John Farber, Gospel Advocate, Nashville, TN, 93 pages, paperback, \$8.99 (US):

In this book Butt and Farber set out to challenge the reader to trust God more than anything else, including one's money.

In the preface they write, "You see, many people view giving in a negative way. They approach the subject wondering what they are going to have to 'give up' but the biblical view of giving is very different from that. The Bible is replete with verses and illustrations that underscore God's primary message about giving: 'It is more blessed to give than to receive' (Acts 20:35)."

Perhaps it is a topic that gets right to the heart of some important principles of Christian living, like stewardship, commitment and sacrifice, so is not preached on enough. The writers tell of the work of brother V.P. Black (1918–2007) and his preaching on giving. During his lifetime brother Black would become well known because of his lessons on stewardship and giving. They tell of his beginnings in the subject.

"As a young preacher, he was working for a small congregation every other Sunday. An older preacher and friend of Black asked him if he had thought about preaching a sermon on money and stewardship. Brother Black didn't know the Bible said much about that subject and wondered if there would be enough in the Bible to constitute an entire lesson. After some studying, he realized that the Bible has much to say on the topic, and he worked his sermon up accordingly.

After the sermon, one of the leading men in the congregation stood up and basically said: 'Brother Black has been preaching for us every other Sunday for sometime. We will have a new preacher to fill his slot from now on.

This man fired Black on the spot

and explained to him that money and giving were not subjects preachers had any business preaching about." Can't help but wonder how many might feel that way today!

This book is a thoughtful and challenging study of giving and would be worthy of a wide reading. The chapter titles are a reveling guild to what the book has to offer.

This is an excellent book to stir and challenge your thoughts about this important biblical subject. Each chapter ends with some questions for discussion making it an excellent study book for a class setting. Also, a prayerful reading of the book will give every person who desires to please God some real food for thought.

The Lost Outlines of J.W. McGarvey, edited by Brandon Renfroe, Gospel Advocate, Nashville, TN, 96 pages, paperback, \$14.99 (US)

This interesting volume begins with a quote from brother J.W. McGarvey, regarding books of sermons. He wrote, "I have no partiality for volumes of sermons; for I have derived from them comparatively little benefit." While that was his view, many over the years have benefited from the printed sermons, both manuscript and outline versions that have been handed down through the years.

McGarvey speaks of his one-time experience of trying to preach someone else's sermon saying, "It was the first and only time that I have ever deliberately preached another man's sermon." He goes on to compare the experience to "Saul's armor on the shoulders of David." With this in view he cautioned young preachers in reference to his own published collection, "study them without imitating them."

Contained in this book are thirty-seven sermon outlines, twenty-eight textual and nine topical, which have been seldom seen during the last 100 years. These outlines give an interesting view of the thinking of this great man of God. The outlines require the person who would learn from them... and perhaps use them as a source in preparing lessons... to study the biblical texts and seek to make application of these to our life today. They provide a useful foundation to build on and stimulate useful thought.

In view of the concerns about the future of the Church and the importance of the Restoration Movement today, the Appendix of this book is worth the price. In this section we learn some of the life history of brother McGarvey and the Church and their struggles during the early 1900s which ended in division among the brothers, mainly over the introduction of the instrument into the worship. Sadly for McGarvey and the church, these struggles did not end happily.

The first three chapters of the appendix outline the development of these "issues" which would divide the Lord's Church and bring on the Restoration Movement. McGarvey fired the opening printed shot in the war over instrumental music which was answered by A.S. Hayden, an Ohio preacher and composer. Their discussion was carried in the Millennial Harbinger from November 1864 to April 1865. These discussions had an impact on the issue in those days and continues even till today. The section on "The McGarvey-Hayden Exchange" gives insight into the importance of their writings on the subject.

The next section gives the history of the growth of the Main Street congregation in Lexington, Kentucky. This congregation spawned the Broadway

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congregation which began in 1871. McGarvey served this congregation for many years as both a minister and as an elder. He resigned as an elder in 1902.

This congregation became a focal point in the debate over the use of instrumental music in the Lord's Church. This chapter, well worth reading, is a sad one as it outlines the debate and the results of the decisions made in favour of the instrument.

The debate and final decision of the Broadway congregation to introduce the instrument broke the heart of

brother McGarvey. At this time McGarvey was the President of a Bible College in Lexington and so his opinion on this issue was of interest. Finally, in an article in the Lexington Herald on November 16, 1902, he gave his reasons for opposing the organ. In this article he lists three principal reasons for his stand. These reasons were powerful in 1902 and remain good reasons for not using the instrument today.

The book ends with a discussion of "Why Restoration Still Matters." The first paragraph of this chapter reminds us that the first voices heard in the Restoration believed that the New Testament provides the pattern for "all things that pertain unto life and godliness" (2 Peter 1:3), and their purpose was to return to the practice of primitive Christianity. Then Brandon Renfroe reminds us that "We stand today as heirs of this rich legacy."

This book will be appreciated by all those who desire to "walk with the Lord and His people in faith and practice."
