Doubting Thomas and His Faith

s I was meditating on the doubts and faith of Thomas, the thought occurred to me that most of us probably have not done justice either to Thomas or to the subject of faith as we have normally or ordinarily discussed them. With no effort to excuse his doubts, let us look more carefully at the story.

Other Apostles Doubted

First, let me suggest that we have little reason to apply the pejorative appellation, "doubting" to Thomas any more than to any other of the apostles. (You may now suspect what the "T" in my name stands for!). Mark 16:11, 13-14; Luke 24:11, 25, 41 and other references show that the other apostles had also heard that Jesus was risen and believed not.

Although it behooves us to be skeptical of many reports we hear about miraculous events and supernatural things, I am not particularly interested in upholding the skepticism of Thomas in this instance, even though it does have some redeeming features. At least he expressed the willingness to believe when he was presented with what he considered adequate evidence, and he was not intellectually dishonest enough to disregard the evidence when it was available.

Faith Comes by Both Seeing and Hearing the Word of God

My purpose now is to suggest some additional thoughts relative to the scope, nature and basis of faith. Most of us in the Lord's church have properly emphasized the biblical truth that "faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God" (Rom. 10:17). But Jesus suggests in John 20:21 that faith also comes by sight, or as a result of things we see and properly evaluate. The fact

that "we walk by faith, not by sight" (2 Cor. 5:7) does not mean they are antithetical.

This involves another truth that we seldom emphasize. There is a difference in a general faith in a person and specific faith in a proposition. If we had been in the presence of Jesus and had seen Him raise the dead, cast out demons and do all the mighty works that He did, if someone asked us "Do you believe in Jesus—that He is indeed the Christ? Do you believe He has the power to cure blind eyes?" we could answer "Yes," even though we had not actually heard Jesus say, "I can cure blind eyes." That faith in the person of Jesus would not have been produced by hearing the word of God on that particular issue, but rather by seeing the acts of Jesus in various similar circumstances. But on the other hand, if we are speaking of a particular proposition, such as, "I have faith that Christ will cure the blind eyes of John Doe," we have no right to say that unless we have heard His word with reference to that particular thing.

Paul illustrated this truth in Romans 1:20-21 when he writes that "they are without excuse" because they should have had faith in God (recognized his eternal power and Divinity) as a result of what they had seen. For "the invisible things of him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made." The atheist who does not believe in the person of God is guilty and without excuse, not because he has not read the Word and allowed it to produce faith, both in God and in propositions about God, but because he has not been honest with what he has seen. Faith in the reality of God can come

from seeing nature, as well as by hearing the word of God. But faith in a particular proposition may come only by hearing that proposition. "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" is a proposition that cannot be believed simply as a result of looking at nature, but rather it is believed by hearing it because of a prior faith in the person of Jesus who said it.

True Statements Can Come from Unreliable Sources

Notice another important thing: If one has proper faith in Jesus (or anyone else) as a person, it necessarily involves faith in any proposition he may announce or statement he may make. But the converse is not necessarily true. That is, one may believe a particular statement of a person without having faith in that person. For example, an atheist who is a known liar may say, "You can buy chickens at the grocery store for forty cents per pound." You may believe that statement for various reasons without having any faith in that person. But, if you have faith in a person as being truthful and trustworthy and he says, "You can get them today at this grocery store for thirty cents per pound," you will believe that statement, no matter how improbable it may be because you have faith in the person who made it.

Thomas acted improperly in rejecting the testimony of credible witnesses.

But it was not a result of an atheistic disposition and a deliberate refusal to examine testimony. When he saw Jesus and heard Him speak, he then had faith in the person of Jesus and, as a necessary consequence, faith in anything that Jesus might say.

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We Should Develop Faith in the Person of Jesus

Part of my effort in this article is to suggest that we need to do more than have faith in particular propositions. We need to so examine the evidence that we have faith in the person of Jesus and therefore be willing to trust in any statement or proposition He makes. In addition to that, we need to trust in Jesus to the extent that we are willing to commit all of our life to Him, far beyond any reference to a particular statement about specific events or a belief in any particular proposition.

It seems apparent that one of our failures is that we may have equated belief in a particular proposition of or about Jesus with trust in the person of the Saviour. They are different things. For example, you may believe that Jesus rose from the dead, but not be willing to trust Him with your life. You may believe His statement, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved," yet not be willing to

do that. You may be willing to admit the proposition expressed by Jesus that "All authority is given unto me in heaven and on earth," and that which Paul expressed in Colossians 3:17, "Whatsoever you do in word or deed do all in the name [or by the authority] of the Lord Jesus" without actually trusting the Lord enough to do that!

Conclusion

The following things should be understood: (1) Belief in the being of a person or a proposition about a person and faith in the person himself are two different things. You may believe that God IS, or that a doctor has a degree without being willing to let either of them operate on you! (2) Faith in a person may come in two ways: (a) by hearing (Romans 10:17, John 20:31) or (b) by seeing (John 20:29). (3) Faith in a particular statement of or about a person comes by hearing. For example, you might say, "I have great faith in you, so I believe you will take me to Nashville tomorrow." You have no right to do that, for faith in the proposition that "I will take you to Nashville tomorrow" comes by hearing. If you have faith in me either because of what you have seen or heard, and you heard me say, "I will take you to Nashville tomorrow," you would have a right to believe that proposition. Otherwise it is merely an assumption.

The religious world in general continually makes the kind of mistake suggested above. Because they have a general kind of belief in the person of Jesus, they assume this gives them the right to believe almost any kind of specific proposition they can imagine and give it credibility as though Jesus had actually said it. That is not faith. It is opinion, and many of our brethren seem to be as guilty of such as any member of a denomination.

Do Churches Create Atheists?

o churches create atheists? It may seem like a strange question, yet it is one we should ask. In a time where church membership and influence is declining across Canada, and non-belief is increasing, we must ask if there is any

correlation between the two trends.

In the past, in North America, it was assumed that everyone had some kind of religious affiliation, however nominal that might be. Today, an ever increasing segment of the population does not even admit to having any faith. As well, we have seen the rise of a new, very militant and aggressive atheism spearheaded by people like Christopher Hutchens, Richard Dawkins and others. It is interesting to note that both Hutchens and Dawkins came out of religious backgrounds. When he was young, Hutchens attended religious schools. Dawkins was raised in an Anglican family. Both, while relatively young, eschewed whatever religious ideas that they might have been taught, instead favoring ideas that were more secular and, in their view, scientific.

Many of us have had some experience with people who have moved away from belief. Often they have been disillusioned or disappointed, either by their expectations of God or the behaviour of those who professed to be believers. Some may have been very marginal in their belief to begin with, basing their involvement more on church or family culture, rather than personal conviction. Some, like the Laodiceans or even the Ephesians, may have just become lukewarm and lost their first love.

However, today, there is a new generation of young atheists who have abandoned their faith and church. They are more militant and active. On countless university and college campuses, they have come together in organizations for association, encouragement and even to work together to promote atheism. It has been suggested that these groups are the atheist equivalent to Campus Crusade for Christ. Many of these young adults came from religious backgrounds, and like Hutchens and Dawkins, have chosen not to believe in God. Why? Were they influenced by the atheist apologeticists or was there something in their backgrounds that led (or pushed) them away from faith?

The Fixed Point Foundation decided to find out how and why these young adults left. They decided to seek out students involved in these on campus atheist organizations. They asked the young people to "tell us your journey to unbelief." The goal was not to engage in debate, but rather to listen. While each person had their own story, a "composite sketch of American college-aged atheists began to emerge." In June, 2013, an article, "Listening to Young Atheists: Lessons for a Stronger Christianity" published on "The Atlantic" website, written by Larry Alex Taunton, director of Fixed Point, summarized the results. Of the atheist young people they sought for the survey, Taunton notes, "They are people who are not merely irreligious; they are actively, determinedly irreligious."

Generally, the results came down to specific points. First, most (if not all) had attended church. Their atheistic views were a "reaction to Christianity." (In this case, Christianity refers to the broad spectrum of religious groups under that umbrella.) Second, the "mission and message of their churches was vague." In particular, through the article, Taunton tells the story of one young man's experience. The key moment in his life was when the church he was attending made a major change in direction away from Biblical content to a "teach less and play more" strategy to attract more young people. Throughout the study results, many noted that the "connection between

The Fruit of Our Life

very well-known passage gives us a view of fruit produced in the life of folks who do not see value in giving honour to God and also those who do. Paul wrote, "Now the works of the flesh are evident: sexual immorality, impurity, sensuality, idolatry, sorcery, enmity, strife, jealousy, fits of anger, rivalries, dissensions, divisions, envy, drunk-

enness, orgies, and things like these. I warn you, as I warned you before, that those

who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God. But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control;

against such things there is no law" (Galatians 5:19-23 ESV).

The contrast between the "person of the flesh" and the "spiritual person" is very blunt. Naturally not every person who lives their life according to the flesh commits all the sins Paul lists. It is perhapse noteworthy that he lists the "works" of the flesh but the "fruit", not "fruits" of the Spirit. I do not know for sure why he lists them that way, however, perhaps part of the answer is that there are many sources of temptation influencing the works of the flesh while there is only one source for the fruit of the Spirit. Also, I wonder if people looking at the lists of actions included may be guilty of considering some of the works of

the flesh less serious than others and that some "parts" of the fruit of the spirit are less important that others?

Man is really a spiritual being and has a part that will live on past life on this planet, however, he allows himself to be ruled by the god of this world. "In their case the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers, to keep

them from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God" (2 Corinthians 4:4 ESV). The love of sin comes because the god of this world has blinded the eyes of men to the true consequences of their choices. It is this god, Satan, that controls the ideologies, opinions, hopes,

aims, goals and viewpoints current in the world.

Satan has created a system that appeals to the depravity of unbelievers. The evil in mankind—crime, hatred, bitterness, anger, injustice, immorality, conflict between nations and individuals etc. fulfills Satan's agenda. Thankfully mankind does not have to live under this death sentence. "And you were dead in the trespasses and sins in which you once walked, following the course of this world, following the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work in the sons of disobedience - among whom we all once lived in the passions of our flesh, carrying out the desires of the body and the mind, and were by nature children of wrath, like the rest of mankind" (Ephesians 2:1-3 ESV). Displaying the fruit of the spirit rather than the works of the flesh is an obvious sign of one being a disciple of Jesus Christ.

In describing the fruit of the spirit Paul begins with love. The type of love, Agapē, used here reflects love that is a personal choice. It is not the love that one "falls into and out of" but the love of will. God expressed this love for us: "For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. For one will scarcely die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die-but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:6-8 ESV). The disciple of Jesus Christ is challenged to love like this as well. "By this we know love, that he laid down his life for us, and we ought to lay down our lives for the brothers" (1 John 3:16 ESV).

It is fitting that the listing of what makes up the fruit of the Spirit begins with love. Thinking of our hope in God through Jesus Christ, the motivation behind it all is love. "Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Through him we have also obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand, and we rejoice in hope of the glory of God.

More than that, we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us" (Romans 5:1-5 ESV). Paul reminds us again in Colossians 3:12–14 that love

FROGS

pril showers bring May flowers—and tall, thick grass. I enjoy mowing our nearly three acres of lawn, but it can be difficult to find enough dry days to keep up with the rapidly growing grass in spring. That is not the only challenge to mowing our yard. One thing I have to watch out for is frogs. Yes, frogs. Each year I chase several around trying to avoid hitting them as I mow. Despite my vigilance, I still mutilate a few each spring.

Frogs, like a number of other animals, use camouflage to protect themselves from predators. Their colour will vary from a bright green to a greenish brown depending on their surroundings. This enables them to hide equally well in vegetation or mud. A frog will sit motionless to make their camouflage even more effective. Tall vegetation naturally provides a better hiding place than short grass. Unfortunately, following their instinct to sit unmoving in tall vegetation coupled with a lack of fear for machinery causes many frogs

I have had frogs refuse to move even though my mower wheel bumped against them. Those that do move, typically hop into taller, uncut grass which means they will again be in danger when I make the next round. Some will jump into the path of the mower. If I see one hop into the long grass, I will try to watch for it on my next pass, if I can remember where it was. I may chase one into the uncut grass for several rounds or I may find mangled frog in the previous swathe. Although those frogs were following what they sensed was the safest course, their actions proved to be fatal.

to become victims of my John Deere.

People often do a similar thing in regard to the safety of their souls. For example:

1) Accepting the World's Viewpoint

It is easier to drift along with popular opinion than to go against the grain, but widely accepted doesn't equal wise. These ideas may sound reasonable if one does not know the facts. One popular philosophy is that all religions are equally valid. Sometime ago, I read an article which quoted a leader of a large Christian denomination. The man stated that it was ludicrous for Christians to believe that they have the exclusive path to God. He claimed that when

we get to heaven we will find Buddhists, Muslims, Hindus and others there as well. Such a claim shows a lack of knowledge of the various religions and defi-

nitely ignorance of

the Bible on which his own religion is supposedly based. Major religions' concepts of God and heaven vary a great deal. Most, if not all, view their own beliefs as exclusively right, so to say that all are equally valid is actually saying that none are valid as such equality contradicts their doctrines and teaching.

"You are my witnesses," declares the LORD, "and my servant whom I have chosen, so that you may know and believe me and understand that I am he. Before me no god was formed, nor will there be one after me. I, even I, am the LORD, and apart from me there is no saviour. I have revealed and saved and proclaimed—I, and not some foreign god among you. You are my witnesses," declares the LORD, "that I am God" (Isaiah 43:10-12 NIV).

The claim of equal validity essentially calls God a liar because Jesus

said, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me" (John 14:6 NIV). Relying on popular philosophies will camouflage us to look like the rest of the world, but it cannot draw us to God or save our souls. See James 4:4.

2) False Teachers and False Doctrines

"Follow me!" That was the invitation given by Marshall Applewhite, self-appointed leader of the Heaven's Gate cult. He promised those who would become his disciples that he would teach them how they could move on to a higher level of life in a new world. Sincere but gullible men and women heeded his call. They left families, friends, homes and jobs to live and work together and to obey their leader's teachings. Those 38 disciples followed him even when he told them to commit suicide. He said they would be liberated from terrestrial bondage and enter into an exalted state of being. In March 1997 they followed their leader to death and eternal loss. 1

You may be able to successfully pass off a well-crafted counterfeit bill as the real thing but you will be laughed at if you try to spend Monopoly money at the local mall. Similarly, odd-ball cults such as those led by Applewhite and David Karish will find a few followers for a time, but it is the more subtle. close-to-the-truth false teaching that is the most dangerous. Many Christian denominations have lasted for hundreds of years with thousands of members because their doctrines contain enough Scripture to sound genuine. Most honestly believe they are teaching truth even though they will admit to augmenting the Bible with creeds developed by their denominational leadership. Scripture repeatedly warns us to beware of false teachers. (e.g. Acts 20;29-31; 1 John 4:1; 2 Peter 2:1-3; Jude 3-23) Jesus said, "Watch out for false prophets. They come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ferocious wolves" (Matthew 7:15 NIV). Just as a knowledge of the genuine is necessary to spot phoney money,

one must know the Scriptures in order to recognize false teaching. We need to be very careful of the things we read or hear—even from our brethren so that we will not be fooled by counterfeit doctrine. "Watch your life and doctrine closely. Persevere in them, because if you do, you will save both yourself and your hearers" (1 Timothy 4:16 NIV).

3) Traditions

Another thing which clouds people's vision is traditions. The apostle Paul describes himself before his conversion as being "extremely zealous for the traditions of my fathers" (Galatians 1:14 NIV). He literally had to see the light to realize that the traditions he was so dedicated to were not pleasing to God. Sadly, there are many like Paul yet today who hold to religious beliefs because of their up-bringing. It is family tradition and they never question whether or not it agrees with God's will. "See to it that no one takes you captive through hollow and deceptive philosophy, which depends on human tradition and

the basic principles of this world rather than on Christ" (Colossians 2:8 NIV).

4) Self

The problem with the frogs in my yard is that they rely on their instinct. While camouflage colouring and the ability to sit motionless may protect them from herons and hawks, those behaviours increase the danger from my mower. I would really rather not mince frogs in my yard. I wait for them to move or gently nudge them out of the way—IF I see them! Those I do not see become lawn fertilizer.

So it is with us. Possibly the greatest threat to our salvation is our reliance on ourselves. We take pride in being able to take care of ourselves, but trusting in our own abilities, opinions, feelings or good deeds gives us a false sense of security. We cannot save ourselves. We must have a Saviour. "But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions—it is by grace you have been saved. And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus, in order that in the coming ages he might show the incomparable riches of his grace, expressed in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus. For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—not by works, so that no one can boast" (Ephesians 2:4-9 NIV - See also: Romans 5:6-8).

A sailor repeatedly got lost at sea, so his friends gave him a compass and urged him to use it the next time he went out in his boat. He followed their advice and took the compass with him but, as usual, he became hopelessly confused and was unable to find his way back. Finally, he was rescued by his friends. Disgusted and impatient with him, they asked, "Why didn't you

use that compass we gave you? You could have saved us a lot of trouble!" The sailor responded, "I didn't dare to! I wanted to go north but as hard as I tried to make the needle aim in that direction, it just kept pointing southeast." He was so certain he knew which way was north that he stubbornly tried to force his own personal conviction on his compass. "There is a way that seems right to a man, but in the end it leads to death" (Proverbs 14:12 NIV).

Check out any opinion poll that has tallied such information and you will find that the number of people who believe they are going to heaven is far greater than the number who consider themselves religious or regularly attend church services. Those people base their confidence on their own goodness. However, Scripture tells us "...everyone has sinned; we all fall short of God's glorious standard" (Romans 3:23 NLT). The problem with sin is that it only takes one sin to separate us from God and no amount of good living can repair

that division. "But—When God our Saviour revealed his kindness and love, He saved us, not because of the righteous things we had done, but because of his mercy. He washed away our sins, giving us a new birth and new life through the Holy Spirit" (Titus 3:4,5 NLT). We are saved by God's mercy, not by our own merit—by Christ's death not by our doing. And for that we should praise God!

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart; do not depend on your own understanding. Seek his will in all you do, and He will show you which path to take. Don't be impressed with your own wisdom. Instead, fear the Lord and turn away from evil" (Proverbs 3:5–7 NLT). Don't let Satan mow you down—Fully Rely On God.



On the list are expensive things to do, places to see and life experiences. The list itself becomes a minor focal point as the friends begin to scratch off the items completed. How many of us have our own "bucket list" perhaps it is not written down on paper but I'm sure each of us has things in our lives we wish to accomplish or experience.

I wish to now focus you on a need that many of you may not even be aware of. Haiti was devastated by that large earthquake in 2010. Poverty was an issue before and will continue over the next generation for sure and probably over more time until Haiti can begin to stand on it's own two feet... Those of us who were in Haiti last December were amazed that a simple bucket that held some nuts and bolts would be the most sought after item, I personally was asked for a bucket on at least 5 different occasions by both children and adults.

So this created an idea... To support those in need in Haiti why not create a "bucket list" so those who might choose to support the project would know what to purchase, First start with a clean paint bucket and lid from any big box hardware store and fill it with the items from the list.

So here goes...

- Bucket and lid (buy the lid) Cost under \$10.00
- Place bucket in a place where you or other people will notice!
- Place the following into the bucket:
 - 1. Gently used clothes
- 2. Toiletries (purchase from dollar stores)
 - a. Toothbrushes
 - b. Toothpaste
 - c. Lotions
 - d. Soaps
 - e. Cotton swabs
 - f. Band-aids
 - g. Shampoo
 - h. Conditioner
 - i. Wet-naps
 - i. Hair-Brushes
 - k. Small hand held mirrors / compacts



- 4. Wash/face cloths
- 5. Work gloves
- 6. Pencils / Pens
- 7. Workbooks
- 8. Paper
- **9. Coloured paper** (heavier construction type)
 - 10. Safety scissors
 - 11. Colored pencils
 - 12. Pencil sharpeners.
- 13. Crayons (I hesitate with this one as when we ship the bigger container it gets so hot in the interior that they may melt together) perhaps if you put the crayons in a plastic bag then wrap them in a towel or bunch of clothes they may stay okay. Wrap with masking tape and write on the tape "crayons" inside so when we sort in Haiti we can put with paper, etc.

This is a great way to involve a Sunday school program and even a whole church! Leave the bucket by the back door... Challenge to fill! After the bucket is full put the lid on it and ship it to Max Craddock, 5 Lankin Blvd., Toronto, ON M4J 4W7.

Fill one, fill two, how many of us purchase things we really don't need or use. As a family do this project two times a year, once in the summer and once around Christmas. You won't get a tax receipt, you won't get a hug from the people who will receive the items but you will get the satisfaction of knowing that where this is going, the people who receive the items are in a desperate way and they will use it, or barter with it or they will even give it away to someone who they think needs it more than themselves.

mmediately Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead of him to the other side, while he dismissed the crowd. After he had dismissed them, he went up on a mountainside by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone (Matthew 14:22, 23).

Several years ago the Manager of Strawberry Point Christian Camp gave some instructions to the staff. He asked that we all go to a private spot on the property and be alone with God. I have to admit that I thought it was a waste of time. Why not just get on with orientation and plans for the incoming session. After all, we were a little late already. Another delay of 30 minutes was not my idea of an effective approach to the situation. Wrong! After about 20 minutes alone with God I understood the wisdom of the Manager's request. I felt infinitely better prepared to take on the challenges before us.

How much time do we spend alone

with God. Worship with our brothers and sisters in an assembly situation is so valuable for encouragement in living the Christian life. But what about being alone with God?

First I suggest if Jesus needed to be alone with God we would likely benefit from it also. There is another time that Jesus chose to be alone with God. "One of those days Jesus went out to a mountainside to pray, and spent the night praying to God" (Luke 6:12). It is interesting to note the next event in Jesus' life. Luke 6:13, "When morning came, he called his disciples to him and chose twelve of them, whom he also designated apostles." One of the most important activities in Jesus' life on earth was to choose the men who would carry on after He left this earth. Is it coincidence that Jesus spent time alone with God before making such important choices?

Also, before Jesus faced the most traumatic time of His life, His death on

the cross, He spent time alone with God. "Then Jesus went with his disciples to a place called Gethsemane, and he said to them, 'Sit here while I go over there and pray.' He took Peter and the two sons of Zebedee along with him, and he began to be sorrowful and troubled. Then He said to them. 'My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death. Stay here and keep watch with me.' Going a little farther, he fell with his face to the ground and prayed, 'My Father, if it is possible, may this cup be taken from Me. Yet not as I will, but as You will'" (Matthew 26:36-39). It appears Jesus took some of His Apostles part of the way with Him but then He went further where He was alone with God.

Let's give some thought to the amount of time we spend alone with God. Do we spend very much? Would we be better able to meet the challenges of life if we spent more time alone with God?





binds the godly qualities together in the Christian's life.

Remember, love, real love, is the greatest of all virtues. (1 Corinthians 13:8, 13). Faith will end, hope will end but love will be seen in its greatest degree possible in heaven. Today love has power to lift a heart that is saddened and point tear filled eves to the wonder of God's blessings. Love can give new life to the discouraged. Love can give purpose to life. The greatest example of love that gives joy and peace to life was seen on a hill just outside Jerusalem 2,000 years ago and that example continues to produce love in the Christian today. "We love because he first loved us" (1 John 4:19 ESV).

Nothing—activity, sacrifice or busyness—can take the place of love. Christians have no excuse for not loving—Romans 5:5. We have been taught of God to "love one another"—1 Thessalonians 4:9. Have been told to "pursue love"—1 Corinthians 14:1. To "put on love"—Colossians 3:14.To "increase and abound in love"—1 Thessalonians 3:12; Philippians 1:9. To be "genuine in love"—2 Corinthians 8:8. To be "unified in love"—Philippians 2:2. To be "earnest" in love—1 Peter 4:8. To "stir up one another to love"—Hebrews 10:24.

Jesus and a person's life was not clear." Third, not surprisingly, the respondents felt that "their churches offered superficial answers to life's difficult questions." Further, they felt that church services were "largely shallow, harmless, and ultimately irrelevant." Fourth, despite their negative responses to what was becoming increasingly irrelevant and watered-down, they "expressed their respect for those ministers who took the Bible seriously." Taunton notes that among the militant atheists, there is a surprising respect for believers who take the Bible seriously enough to attempt to share its message with others. One student from Dartmouth stated, "I really can't consider a Christian a good, moral person if he isn't trying to convert me." Taunton shares similar comments from Hitchens and well-known entertainer (illusionist/comedian) Penn Jillette. Taunton notes, "Comments like these should cause every Christian to examine his conscience to see if he truly believes that Jesus is, as he claimed, 'the way, the truth, and the life." Fifth, the high school years were "decisive." Sixth, while the students generally stated that their transition to unbelief was for "exclusively rational reasons" many indicated it was "deeply emotional as well." This was sometimes coupled with disappointments with people and/or their expectations of God. Finally, Taunton includes the role of the internet. When asked about what may have influenced their move to atheism, instead of citing the writings of the new generation of atheist apologists, the students mentioned online videos and forums.

Perhaps of greatest value is Taunton's summary, that these young people were "idealists who longed for authenticity, and having failed to find it in their churches, they settled for a non-belief that, while less grand in its promises, felt more genuine and attainable."

It would appear, at least in some cases, churches have created atheists. It's a sobering thought, but one we need to take seriously. Sometimes, the only time when people appear to be passionate about their faith is when arguing, often behaving in ways that are inconsistent with their profession. People, especially young people...

our young people...are looking for faith that is real. The words Taunton used were "authentic" and "genuine." That is, that a person's faith is expressed not only in that they believe the Bible, but that they live it—in character, attitude, purpose and activities. We not only quote the Golden Rule, the chapters on love and faith and the Great Commission we also live them in our daily lives. We need to show our conviction and passion that Jesus is our Lord.

friend insists that the word "justified" in the New Testament is in the passive voice, therefore, it is something that God does, not man. Therefore, a human action such as baptism could be no part of the justification process. Is this correct?

I have talked with many who contend this very thing. They contend that if a person did "one" thing in the forgiveness process that it would make the grace of God null and void. They contend that baptism is a work and that would be an attempt to earn one's salvation. Of course they are wrong in their allegations.

Those who say that "justification" is a process wholly of God and any "obedience" on the part of man is excluded, though sincere, are seriously wrong.

While the passive form "justified" emphasizes the fact that ultimately only God can acquit sinful man, the passive voice does not nullify the fact that Jehovah may set conditions in His own plan for the justification of sinful humanity.

There is no question but that we are saved totally by the grace of God, but the conditions that God has placed on receiving that grace does not make those conditions works of merit. When we obey God and receive salvation we have not "earned" anything.

It is interesting that those who condemn baptism as a work of merit will tell their converts to have faith in God and by that faith they can be saved. In John 6:28, 29 we read, "Then they said to him, what shall we do, that we may WORK the WORKS of God? Jesus answered and said to them, this is the WORK of God, that you believe in him who he sent." According to the words of Jesus himself, faith is a work that God has given the sinner to do!

Justification may be defined as the divine process by which God acquits the sinner and reckons him as righteous. There are some very erroneous ideas regarding justification in the "Christian world" today. There are those who believe that salvation must be "worked out" totally. They believe salvation must be "earned." On the other hand there are those who believe that salvation is by "faith only." Both ideas are wrong. Incidentally, if the passive form, "being justified" eliminates all human response, faith also would be excluded from the plan of salvation.

In every case of conversion in the New Testament the sinner was required to obey God's plan of salvation. All heard the gospel, believed the gospel, repented of their sins and were buried with the Lord in baptism for the remission of their sins. These actions were to meet God's requirements for salvation, not to earn anything.

There is no question but God forgives our sins. Only God can do that. But it is also true that God will not forgive our sins unless we are willing to obey His will. God does the saving, we do the obeying.


