They are part of the song used as the theme for Star Trek: Enterprise that ran for several seasons a few years back. Personally, I liked the series, if only because it filled in some of the "historical" blanks prior to the original Star Trek. It is interesting though, that despite the focus of the series on science (fiction), humanity's meaning, reflected in the theme song, is derived more from wishful thinking. And that pretty much parallels where we are as a culture. Today, we regard science as the only thing we can really know, but the need of our inner being for meaning can only be provided by an irrational "faith."

We live in an age in which the ultimate questions of reality and purpose are considered unanswerable. Instead, each culture and each person must simply come up with some pragmatic approach to life that makes it (at least temporarily) worth living. We continue to pursue

the stars but no longer know why. We still search for cures for disease and the eradication of poverty, but in the face of inevitable death for all, are uncertain about humanity's eternal worth.

In such a world, faith is simply an individual's personal way of seeing reality. There is no compelling reason



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to make anyone think it is a "true" view—just a view. And it is a view that competes with many other equally personal views. What we believe is simply what it takes to keep us going. Just like the song, I've got faith of the heart—but we don't pretend to really know that it isn't pure fantasy.

This is a universe away from the idea of faith presented in the Bible.

Faith in Scripture is the certain conviction that something is true based on solid evidence. In fact, it more equates to the scientist's convictions about the physical universe than the common conception of faith. The only difference between biblical faith and scientific faith is the object of our belief. For scientists, it is physical reality, for the follower of Christ, it is the testimony of God in Scripture.

Biblical faith is based on solid evidence. When one of Jesus' followers, Thomas, refused to believe that Jesus had risen from the dead, we are told that Jesus appeared to him and provided the evidence. Here's the account in John 20:24-28.

Now Thomas, called the Twin, one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. The other disciples therefore said to Him, "We have seen the Lord." So he said to them, "Unless I see in his hands the prints of the nails, and put my finger into the print of the nails, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."

And after eight days, the disciples were again inside, and Thomas was with them. Jesus came, the doors being shut, and stood in the midst,

His Royal Highness

Where a new critter on the farm. A young donkey. He came with the name 'Prince' but I have a tendency to shorten or corrupt pet names. Our first donkey was Zariya, but I often called him Zeddie. My dog was Buddy but he was just Bud. That being the case I thought I'd like to change Prince's name a little. I decided on Prince Hal from Shakespeare's Henry IV. Prince Hal was a character depicted as funloving and undisciplined. I thought that might fit a young donkey and I could just call him Hal.

It did not work. Rather than shortening the name, I now call him Your Royal Highness. It came about when I offered him a piece of carrot but he refused it. I tried a piece of apple. He refused it. Every animal on the farm likes sweet feed so I brought a scoop of sweet feed. He looked at it, smelled it and then backed away. I placed a pail in his pen, poured the feed into it and left it. He ate it. He refused everything from my hand or from the 'serving tray'. It had to go into his pail, be it sweet feed, carrot or apple.

I got to thinking how His Royal Highness was like so many people. God offers a simple, straightforward way of salvation yet so many people refuse to accept it. They want it on their own terms, served up the way that appeals to them. Paul, writing to Timothy, made a similar reference. He said, "For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions. and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths" (2 Tim 4:3-4 ESV).

False doctrines could not flourish if there were not people ready to listen. There are people who do not want to listen to God's offer of salvation because it's not what they want to hear and it asks them to do things they do not want to do. These people turn to others who tell them what they find more palatable. They look for things that make sense to them seem true and make them comfortable. They want it their way. Often it is much more difficult or complicated than what God is offering.

I think of Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Syria, who was also a leper. On the advice of a servant girl from Israel who worked for Naaman's wife, he travelled to see Elisha. Elisha sent his servant to tell Naaman to wash seven times in the Jordan and he would be well. 2 Kings 5:11-12 tells us, "Naaman went away angry and said, 'I thought that he would surely come out to me and stand and call on the name of the LORD his God, wave his hand over the spot and cure me of my leprosy. Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than any of the waters of Israel? Couldn't I wash in them and be cleansed?"" (NIV). He wanted it his way.

Thankfully, wiser heads prevailed. "Naaman's servants went to him and said, 'My father, if the prophet had told you to do some great thing, would you not have done it? How much more, then, when he tells you, 'Wash and be cleansed'!" Naaman would have done some complicated, more difficult task to be cleansed. To him that made sense, seemed right and suited his expectations. God's way was too simple. Too easy. He was uncomfortable with it but, fortunately for him, he listened to his servants.

God's way of salvation is simple and straightforward. "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God-not by works, so that no one can boast" (Eph 2:8-9). "Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:38). God is holding out this great offer of salvation to each one. We just need to take it from His hand. Yet so many refuse. They balk at the idea that it is that simple: that submitting to Christ and being immersed in baptism is sufficient in spite of what Scripture tells us. "You are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus, for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with

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Members of One Another

n Sunday morning, May 25, 2014, as the Central Church of Christ in Gorlovka, Ukraine met for worship, armed Russian militants interrupted, demanding that the members of the church remove all of the congregation's possessions and abandon the building. Anything

not taken would be destroyed. (The building also served as the Ukraine extension of the Bear Valley Bible Institute of Denver.) According to the Christian Chronicle, the congregation was given two hours to move out (but took three). Three more hours later, almost everything, except for some appliances, had been loaded onto two trucks. InfoResist, a Ukrainian group that publishes information on web and social media sites, states that the gunmen wore balaclavas and took possession of the church building possibly to serve as their headquarters.

An event like this seems so far away both geographically and culturally. In Canada, we don't experience much in the way of persecution, possibly a little ridicule, but certainly nothing at the point of a gun. As a result, when we read of an event like this, there seems to be nothing that we identify with. We do not know the people affected nor do we have an experience in our own lives to stir our hearts.

Similarly, when we read of the abduction of schoolaged girls in Nigeria by the Boko Haram terrorist group, we may have felt some sympathy for the girls and families involved. But this event may not have really connected with us. Does anything change for us when we learned that, as reported by the Christian Chronicle, 11 of those missing girls are linked to area Churches of Christ? More recently, as people attended the Western Nigeria Christian College lectureship in Jos, bomb blasts were heard. While no one at the school was hurt, 118 people in the city were killed by the blasts (Christian Chronicle).

We live at a time when we can almost instantly learn of tragedies anywhere in the world. Weather, earthquake, war, terrorism, you-name-it. It quickly appears on our news and social media. (Some of us knew of the event in Gorlovka a few hours after it happened.) Thanks to Facebook and the Christian Chronicle, we are able to follow these events and the subsequent efforts to provide assistance. For example, we have seen the reports of the work done in the Philippines following Typhoon Haiyan last November. But, how many of us were aware how this affected Christians and Churches of Christ there?

Unless there is a real, personal connection, it is too easy for those living in North America to be relatively unconnected to what is happening "overseas"—a term we use that seems to distance us from what is happening "over there." The people are strangers to us, and because of differences in culture and language, may seem strange to us. Thus, these events seem impersonal.

In the New Testament, the Apostle Paul speaks of a critical need facing Christians in Jerusalem. We can reasonably assume that most, if not all, of the Christians in Jerusalem were from Jewish backgrounds. We get glimpses that the Jew-Gentile issues in culture carried over into the Church. Yet, we also see that churches in the Gentile world were eager for the opportunity to provide assistance for the Jewish Christians. Despite distances, both physical and cultural, there was a very real connection.

Paul states that the Church is the body of Christ. Each Christian is a member of that body. Therefore, as members of the same body, we are members of one another—interconnected and interdependent. What happens to one part of the body happens to the others. If you hit your thumb with a hammer, your whole body shares the pain. In fact, a really serious injury can cause your whole body to go into shock. What happened to Christians in Jerusalem affected Christians in Macedonia and Achaia. Joseph Swain expressed this in the words of the song "How Sweet, How Heavenly" —

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Even Barnabas Was Led Astray

The power of example is surely well known to us and is illustrated in life every day. Considering the big challenges that were before the Jews in moving from Judaism to Christianity, we might expect some failures in setting the proper Christian example to happen. A very disturbing report is given by Paul in Galatians 2:11, 12 (ESV), "But when Cephas came to Antioch, I opposed him to his face, because he stood condemned. For before certain men came from James. he was eating with the Gentiles; but when they came he drew back and separated himself, fearing the circumcision party."

Paul has spoken of the joyful way

he and Barnabas had been welcomed to Jerusalem and the recognition of his call to preach to the Gentiles. "...when they saw that I had been entrusted with the gospel to the uncircumcised, just as Peter had been entrusted with the gospel to the circumcised (for he who worked through Peter for his apostolic ministry to the circumcised worked also through me for mine to the Gentiles), and when James and Cephas and John, who seemed to be pillars, perceived the grace that was given to me, they gave the right hand of fellowship to Barnabas and me, that we should go to the Gentiles and they to the circumcised" (Galatians 2:7-9 ESV). Wonderful here to see the unity and harmony of those working for the cause of Christ, both those working with Jews and their acceptance of Paul who was evangelist to the Gentiles.

However, old habits and practices are hard to change. As Paul continues to write this letter, he speaks of a time that he was in Antioch, a Gentile city that would have been familiar to the Galatian people and where the believers were first called Christians, when Peter came to town. Some believe this was after the events of Acts 15 in which the "Gentile question" had supposedly been put to rest. To a great degree, Peter (Cephas) played a large part in resolving this issue, after all he had been taught the truth of value in the eyes of the Lord, back in Acts 10. Some base their belief that this event





took place after the Acts 15 meeting on the belief that it appears that Paul and Barnabas went to Antioch following that meeting in Jerusalem. They spent a few days there before the beginning of the second journey that sees Paul and Barnabas part and go their separate ways.

While the timing may not be completely correct, it is important to note what Paul shares with his readers next: "But when Cephas came to Antioch, I opposed him to his face, because he stood condemned. For before certain men came from James, he was eating with the Gentiles; but when they came he drew back and separated himself, fearing the circumcision party" (Galatians 2:11-12 ESV).

Wow! Did not see that one coming! However, some would suggest this should not be a surprise since we have seen Peter as a person who sometimes acts without really thinking it through first. Like stepping out of the boat when he saw Jesus walking on the water. (Perhaps the others in the boat wanted to join him but thought.

> "I'll just wait to see how this works out".) Also we have seen him as one who has made very strong statements of his commitment to the Lord...however, when push came to shove, he failed. "I am ready to die with you ... " Like all of us, he had his good days and his not so good days.

> There is a sad and very meaningful truth in this text from Galatians 2 that stands out to me as the saddest of all. I believe Peter loved the Lord and wanted to honour Him always. He lived the Christian life and likely died a martyr's death. (According to tradition, Peter was crucified in Rome. Tradition says that he was crucified upside down at his own request, as he saw himself unworthy to be crucified in the same way as Jesus Christ). While we are not given information on the reaction of Peter to Paul's

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and said, "Peace to you" Then he said to Thomas, "Reach your finger here, and look at my hands; and reach your hand here, and put it into my side. Do not be unbelieving, but believe."

And Thomas answered and said, "My Lord and my God!"

There's certainly not much wishful thinking going on with Thomas. He wants the scientist's hard evidence before he believes. And that highlights something important about the biblical understanding of faith. It is not something that is opposed to knowledge, but rather it is something that is built upon knowledge. Faith does not exists when evidence is lacking, so that we might say, "Well, I have no real evidence, but I believe with all my heart." Rather, faith says, "I believe because I have evidence." In fact, Paul on one occasion said simply that "I know whom I have believed." (2 Timothy 1:12)

Faith is the strong conviction, based on the evidence provided, that God can be trusted. In Romans 4:19-21, the writer is discussing the nature and place of faith in God. He gives Abraham as an example, in his response to God's promise that he would have a son. Here's what he writes. "And not being weak in faith, he did not consider his own body, already dead (since he was about a hundred years old), and the deadness of Sarah's womb. He did not waver at the promise of God through unbelief, but was strengthened in faith, giving glory to God, and being fully convinced that what he had promised, he was also able to perform."

Such faith came through the years of living with God and experiencing His trustworthiness. But faith is not only based on evidence and therefore a firm conviction in the veracity of God's word, it is in addition, an act of the will whereby we respond positively to whatever God's word requires of us. Without this response, there is no biblical faith.

In the book of Hebrews, chapter 11 is often referred to as the "roll call of faith." In the examples of faith listed by the writer, their faith is seen in their positive response to God's word to them. By faith:

Abel offered a better sacrifice Noah prepared an ark Abraham obeyed when he was called to go

Abraham offered up Isaac Moses choose to suffer affliction

Although God Himself is invisible and God's promises are not yet a

reality, yet confidence in God, based on His faithfulness, makes God real and His promises certain (Heb.1:1).

It seems a long way from the sentiments in Enterprise's theme song. It is certainly a long way from our present culture's view of faith and what we can really know. The biblical view is that we really can know truth, not only about the physical world, but about the questions that really matter—about God, about the meaning of life, about our purpose, about eternity. And none of it is just my faith, not just wishful thinking, but real certainty based on real knowledge-the word of a God who has proved Himself over and over, and supremely in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. As Peter once told Christians, "...through him, you believe in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him glory, so that your faith and hope are in God" (1 Pet.1:21).

So, you want something to believe in—in fact, you need something to believe in. God is worth believing! And in Jesus Christ, He has made believing possible. You can know that what you believe is real and that God will keep His word.

rebuke, likely this truth made his sin harder to bear. That truth? The power of example. "And the rest of the Jews acted hypocritically along with him, so that even Barnabas was led astray by their hypocrisy" (Galatians 2:13 ESV).

Barnabas, the son of encouragement, was also led astray. This has always seemed so sad to me. Barnabas showed his commitment to the work of God when we were introduced to him back in Acts chapter 4. "Thus Joseph, who was also called by the apostles Barnabas (which means son of encouragement), a Levite, a native of Cyprus, sold a field that belonged to him and brought the money and laid it at the apostles' feet" (Acts 4:36-37 ESV). This was not a requirement that he sell this property and give the money to the work of the Church, but surely it is an example of why he deserved to be known as "son of encouragement".

He shows this character again when he and Paul decide to go on the second missionary journey but then end up going out with other co-workers. Clearly, the fact that Barnabas took John Mark with him, the person who had dropped out on the first trip, helped lead him into greater service in years to come.

Just as a lack of trust may be the situation with my donkey, so a lack of trust in God may be the reason so many back away from the offer He extends to us. The only way Prince will learn to trust me is to get to know me. As he comes to understand I provide for him, care about him and treat him well, trust in me will build. Likewise, mankind needs to get to know God in order to trust Him. Of course that happens through reading and studying His Word. It may also come through conversations with those who already trust Him. It may come through some life experiences.

What a great example Noah is when it comes to trust in God! He believed in God and he believed God. Hebrews 11:7 tells us, "By faith Noah, when warned about things not yet seen,

May we never forget the power of example...OUR EXAMPLE. There are those who know and love us, who look to us for direction by example. You may not even know who they are, but they know you and look to you for direction through your example.

See the truth of the following illustration. "A little clock in a jeweler's window in a certain western town stopped one day for half an hour, at fifteen minutes of nine. School children, noticing the time, stopped to play; people hurrying to the train, looking at the clock, began to walk leisurely; professional men, after a look at the clock, stopped to chat a minute with one another; working men and women noted the time and lingered a little longer in the sunshine, and all were half an hour late because one small clock stopped.

Never had these people known how much they had depended upon that clock till it had led them astray. Many are thus unconsciously depending upon the influence of Christians; you may think you have no influence, but you cannot go wrong in one little act without leading others astray.—(The Seattle Churchman in One Thousand Evangelistic Illustrations). in holy fear built an ark to save his family." No questions. No doubts. He heard and responded even though he did not completely understand. He believed God's warnings about something that had never happened before and obeyed God completely. That is trust. Pray that the barrier holding back the ones you love will be broken down and trust established. "This is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance (and for this we labour and strive), that we have put our hope (we trust—KJV) in the living God, who is the Saviour of all men, and especially of those who believe" (1 Tim 4:10).

Summertime, And the livin' is sleazy...

y apologies to Mr. Heyward for corrupting his lovely poem¹, but each year as the temperature goes up, the decency level goes down, particularly in regard to clothing. Although immodesty is not confined to one season of the year, summer heat, it seems, is used as an acceptable excuse for unacceptable attire. Unacceptable, at any rate, for the child of God.

The Bible does not say very much about what we should wear. Even in the passages that do admonish us about the way we dress, we are urged to focus on who we are rather than our clothing as it is merely a reflection of what's inside. "Don't be concerned about the outward beauty of fancy hairstyles, expensive jewelry, or beautiful clothes. You should clothe yourselves instead with the beauty that comes from within, the unfading beauty of a gentle and quiet spirit, which is so precious to God" (1 Peter 3:3, 4 NLT). Apparently Paul was concerned about the culture of Ephesus influencing the way women there dressed. "And I want women to be modest in their appearance. They should wear decent and appropriate clothing and not draw attention to themselves by the way they fix their hair or by wearing gold or pearls or expensive

clothes. For women who claim to be devoted to God should make themselves attractive by the good things they do" (1 Timothy 2:9, 10 NLT). He wanted Christians to be guided by decency and good sense rather than society. Things really haven't changed. In our society it seems that celebrities have an on-going, unofficial competition to see who can wear the most shocking and revealing clothing in public. As Christians, we should not allow our manner of dress to be determined by the influence of celebrities or fashion trends instigated by ungodly people.

That these verses were directed specifically toward women doesn't mean that men need not be concerned about how they dress. You likely have heard, and may have quoted the adage "Don't judge a book by its cover," but the fact is, we do judge by external appearances. The majority of first impressions are based on how we look. One needs time to observe or interact with a person in order to go deeper than outward appearances. Whether we like it or not, people will form opinions about us by looking at

the way we dress because it is a reflection of our self-image and our values. "... believers were to "dress" their behaviour in a manner that complemented rather than clashed with their character." (Life Application Concise New Testament Commentary on 1 Tim. 2:9, 10).

As we get dressed each day, we should ask ourselves, "What does this outfit say about my relationship with Christ?" Does it reflect the Lord's glory? (2 Corinthians 3:18). "So whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God" (1 Corinthians 10:31



NLT). "Whatever you do" includes how you dress. (See also: Colossians 3:17). Romans 13:14 tells us to "clothe yourselves with the Lord Jesus Christ". While we cannot literally cover our physical bodies with Christ, the clothes we put on reveals whether or not our hearts are clothed in Christ. Our choice of clothing indicates the influences in our lives. Do we embrace fashion trends followed by

immoral celebrities or those copied from inmates in prisons—as with pant tops well below ones underwear? Or do we consciously choose clothing that affirm our devotion to God?

So, must a believer dress completely out of step with style the way some religious groups do in order to prove he or she is a Christian? Certainly not. Scripture says our clothing should be decent and modest. My dictionary defines modest as: manifesting humility, propriety and restraint.² Your clothes do not have to be peculiar to be modest and decent. As with all other areas of our lives, Christians need to use godly discernment when choosing what to wear. In a wonderful little book titled Secret Keeper: The Delicate Power of Modesty, Dannah Gresh gives seven tests one may use to judge the modesty of their clothing. She also gives suggestions on how to modify ones wardrobe so it is both decent and in style. There is not enough space here to describe Mrs.

Gresh's dress tests, but I will share the following three suggestions.

1. A Lot of Pull: Having a lot of pull may be beneficial in some areas of life, but not when it comes to clothes. If you frequently need to tug on your clothing to keep pants up, skirts down or private areas covered, you probably need to toss out that garment.

2. Hidden Valley: Cleavage should be covered regardless of whether is it upper front or lower back. (The latter applies to both men and women.)

3. A **Perfect Fit:** It's nice to have clothes that fit properly, but if they fit like a second skin, you might as well not be wearing them as they aren't hiding any secrets.

Does modesty necessitate sweltering in the summer heat? We do not have to be uncomfortable to be godly. Consider the 3 C's when choosing summer attire.

Cut: Loose fitting clothes allow for air circulation. They are cooler than tight clothing.

Colour: Dark colours absorb heat, light colours reflect it away from you.

Content: Light-weight, natural fibres—such as cotton or linen—are cooler than synthetic fabrics.

If you want to dress for success, and more importantly, to please God, follow Paul's advice to the Colossians. "Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity" (Colossians 3:12–14 NIV 1984).

bourhood, it was decided to close the Bible Institute for a few weeks. They wrote:

"Although their entrance had been quiet at first, it seemed that overnight the 'powerful' soldiers (thugs), the ones with guns and masks, were starting to intimidate, rob and kill anyone they chose to. Shootings started at the roadblocks and going through them became very scary. Masked men were robbing grocery stores, banks, car dealerships and trucks carrying gas and food. One currency exchange we use was robbed and the lady working there was strangled to death and making it even worse this lady was pregnant. This was the exchange right near to Latin and prayed for God to go before us on this trip and when we boarded the train they did not even ask for documents. Upon arrival in Dnipropetrovs'k two of our graduates, Sasha and Lena, who were married while in school and are now working with the church in this area, met us and took us to an apartment they had rented for us. We were just quite relieved to be in a calmer environment. The next day was Victory Day and there were huge celebrations here for Ukraine. We so enjoyed seeing the singing and dancing of their culture and it was so nice to be out of the stress of Donetsk for a few days, though the conversation was

about little else. Jay Don was kept busy holding classes each night for the several days we were there but we felt we had to meet with our staff and students to decide what should be done. Some of our students could not come or go to preaching appointments because they had to go through the checkpoints. So the answer was the same: we must leave Ukraine... When we left a second time, the students again accompanied us, and refused to leave until they saw us safely aboard the plane bound for Portland, OR. where our son met us. After a few days with his family in Vancouver, WA, we returned to Canada to await developments, hoping to be able to return to Donetsk by the end of July to finish up classes and have our usual graduation exercise in August." (Ed Note: Excerpts from report sent by Jay Don and Mary Lee Rogers from Canada. They left 20 years of mission work in Greater Vancouver, Canada, to accept the position of Administrator of the Ukrainian Bible Institute in Donetsk. They have been there for 13 and 1/2 years.)

GETTING NEWS AROUND THE WORLD:

Most of the world has heard about Russia's recent threats to revert to 20th Century techniques to take over countries that they feel belong to them, as well as the kidnapping of some 300 young school girls in Africa and other stories making headlines. And for 40 years, the name of "World Bible School" has reverberated, although old-timers pointed out that the method started by Jimmie Lovell in Torrance, CA, was active long before that. The message is the Bible, with the emphasis on the story of the coming of the Saviour, by men living 2,000 years ago. The method used by the apostles in the first century spread the news by correspondence, and that is still one of the best methods today. The messengers are ordinary Christians (priests, according to the definition in the Bible), who are blessed with many more means than writing by hand, with it seems, something new being invented every day. The use of the "World Bible School" was first used in 1973. It is recognized in many places, but it was recently decided that to attract new generations, especially in North America, a change to keep up with a changing world might bring the message to people who didn't notice before. "When each can feel his brother's sigh, And with him bear a part; When sorrow flows from eye to eye, And joy from heart to heart."

Typically, we think of this connection within the context of our local congregation—the spiritual family with which we worship, fellowship and work. We know them, love them and sometimes disagree with them. Yet, as shown in the relief of Christians in Jerusalem, the concept of fellowship transcends local geography. Christians separated by geography and culture shared a common faith and were members of the same body. In the same way Christians in Canada are part of the same spiritual family as Christians in Ukraine, Nigeria and the Philippines.

When we hear of events, especially tragedies, that have happened to Christians in other parts of the world, we need to remember that we are all members of the body of Christ. We may not know one another, we may have different cultures and languages. But, we are members of one another.

This suggests that we need to continually find information about what is happening to our brothers and sisters in other places. Sources like the Christian Chronicle can be helpful. We need to be praying, as congregations and

ho was the prophet Micaiah and why did God consider him to be such a faithful prophet?

We do not know much about Micaiah's personal life and he did not write a book of the Old Testament as did Isaiah, Ezekiel and other prophets. He lived in the Northern tribes of Israel during the days of the divided Kingdom. Ahab and Jezebel ruled the northern tribes and Ahab did not like Micaiah because he would not tell Ahab what he wanted to hear (1 Kings 22:8).

At this time Jehoshaphat was king of Judah and he tried to do things that were right in the sight of God. Ahab approached Jehoshaphat about joining him in a war against Syria. The two kings agreed to join in this war. Jehoshaphat, being a religious man said, "Please inquire for the word of the Lord today" (1 Kings 22:5 NKJV). Ahab agreed and gathered 400 prophets who were his friends and always told him what he wanted to hear. When he asked for their advice they said, "Go up, for the Lord will deliver it into the hand of the king" (1 Kings 22:6 NKJV). This did not satisfy Jehoshaphat and he asked if there were other prophets they could ask. "So the king of Israel said to Jehoshaphat, There is still one man, Micaiah the son of Imlah; by whom we may inquire of the Lord; but I hate him. because he does not prophesy good concerning me, but evil" (1 Kings 22:8 NKJV).

Ahab had his 400 "yes" men tell him what he wanted to hear. It seems that Jehoshaphat thought it strange that 400 men would agree on such a serious thing as going to war. The 400 had spoken as one man. Many preachers have become "yes" men, in the pulpit, saying only what the people want to hear.

A messenger was sent to call Micaiah and he had a message for him. "Then the messenger who had gone to call Micaiah spoke to him saying, 'Now listen, the words of the prophets with one accord encourage the king. Please, let your word be like the word of one of them, and speak encouragement'" (1 Kings 22:13 NKJV). In other words, PLAY ALONG! Listen to his answer. "And Micaiah said, 'As the Lord lives, whatever the Lord say to me, that I will speak'" (1 Kings 22:14). Micaiah was saying, "I am God's man, not Ahab's man." He would only speak the truth that God gave him, even facing 400 to 1 odds.

What the Lord told Micaiah to tell Ahab was for him to go to war if he wanted to, but as a result of the war Israel would be leaderless (1 Kings 22:15-28). They went to war and Ahab was killed and Israel had no leader. As a result of telling the truth, Micaiah was put in prison and fed bread and water of affliction (vs. 26-27).

In considering the point of this story from the history of Israel, a good question is "Why was Micaiah great in God's eyes?" The important answer and lesson to be learned is, he told the truth when it was not convenient to tell the truth. So must we! Today people want their ears tickled, but to please God we must stand for His truth!

Gill, Lynne (Wood) March 14, 1947 – May 18, 2014

Norma Lynne Wood spent most of her childhood in Englehart, Ontario. Her father's work as an inspector for the Ministry of Transportation led the family to move to Cochrane, Ontario, where Lynne lived for a couple of years before moving to Toronto. Lynne's brother, Lee Wood, invited by a friend, came to the Strathmore Boulevard Church of Christ on a Sunday evening in May of 1969. The next Sunday Lee came again, this time with his sister, Lynne. That's when she and Stephen Gill met and began a friendship that developed into marriage on December 6, 1969, in Cochrane.

Lynne was baptized by Marvin Johnson in 1970 and soon formed close friendships with many and became an active member of the Strathmore congregation. They had two boys, Matthew (May 23, 1972) and Tyler (February 9, 1974).

Stephen describes Lynne's personality as unpretentious, personable and wise. She had a good deal of common sense and had thoughtful perspectives on issues that needed to be dealt with. She was a good mentor to younger women in the congregation—as several have expressed.

Lynne maintained close ties with many of her childhood friends as well as her relatives. A country girl at heart, she enjoyed drives in the countryside of northern Ontario. She also enjoyed gardening and genealogy. In 1994 Lynne was diagnosed with a type of cancer (carcinoid) that affected her health and progressively limited what she could do. Lynne eventually died from complications caused by her illness.

Lynne is a good example to prove the truth of a poem that was read at her memorial service, written by Robert L. Lynn, entitled, "Cancer Is So Limited". He wrote this to comfort and encourage a dear friend who was sentenced to death by cancer. The believer's confidence is see in this item.

"Cancer is Limited"

It cannot cripple love, It cannot corrode faith, It cannot eat away peace, It cannot destroy confidence, It cannot kill a friendship, It cannot shut out memories, It cannot silence courage, It cannot silence courage, It cannot invade the soul, It cannot reduce eternal life, It cannot quench the spirit, It cannot lessen the power of the resurrection.

Dorothy was predeceased by her parents and her son, Thomas Walter. She is survived by Dan, her husband of almost 67 years; two daughters, Lynda (Warren) King of Weslaco, Texas, and Karen (Dennis) Quilliams of Red Deer, AB; two sons Allan (Bonnie) of Bengough and Kent (Paula) of Dauphin, MB.

The Wieb family expanded throughout the years giving Dorothy ten grandchildren, 21 great grandchildren and two great great grandchildren. A memorial service was conducted at the Church of Christ building in Weyburn on June 9. Interment followed at Green Acres Cemetery in Weyburn.
