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The God Who Sings (INTRODUCTION TO PSALMS)

"The LORD your God is with you ... he will rejoice over you with singing" (Zeph 3:17).

Poetry is meant to convey an impact far beyond the words alone to inspire imagination, touch feelings and raise memories back to life. The mental pictures created with the words of a poem can produce a greater emotional impact than simple prose. Poetry expresses the heart of the poet, the depth of feeling not normally revealed. Poets, painting a word picture of reality, invite participation. Their goal is not simply to give more information, but a means to emotionally experience the event. For example, the statement "he will rejoice over you with singing" is emotionally stronger than, God is interested in you. The statement "... the morning stars sang together" (Job 38:7) speaks at a deeper level than the simple observation that the stars "twinkle." Therefore, it is not wise to read or interpret one of the Psalms (poetry) in the same way we interpret Paul's letters.

There are two general ways of praising another: directly, by focusing on that individual, or indirectly by speaking positively or complimenting something or someone closely associated with that person. For example, one might directly praise a friend for his fine artistic taste or indirectly by complimenting his selection of the beautiful painting on the wall of his room. One might remark about a person's intelligence, or praise the book she has written. This is also true of praise of God. The Israelites praised God directly for who He was. They also praised Him by singing of that which was identified with Him-Creation, an

act of God; Zion, the city of God; the Temple, the house of God; the Law, the Word of God.

The English poet, Elizabeth Barrett Browning wrote, "Earth's crammed with heaven, and every common bush aflame with God; but only those who see take off their shoes, the rest sit round it and pluck blackberries." (Of course, those who are less poetic in nature and more literal minded, might pluck the ber-

ries and be thankful, praising God for His producing and providing the berries to eat and enjoy.) For most people poetic expression produces images and suggestions in the subconscious mind. The sound of words in music engages the feelings beyond the words alone. The famous ballerina. Anna Pavlova was asked. "Anna, when you danced, what were you saying." Pavlova replied, "If I could tell you, I wouldn't need to dance." If people could always simply say what is in their hearts, they wouldn't need the imagery, the poetry and sound of the songs.

Poetry played an important role in the lives of nomadic peoples who were usually illiterate. Communication was through the spoken word because few "books" were available. Also, people found it was easier to learn and remember information presented in poetical style.

English poetry has been largely based on rhyme and metre. Fortunately, Hebrew poetry is different from English and Arabic poetry. Hebrew poetry is not based on rhyming verses. Some might not consider it as pleasing without the beauty of rhyme, but it has one great advantage over English and Arabic poetry. Hebrew poetry does not suffer poetic loss in translation because the double, and sometimes triple, way of saying the same truth can be faithfully translated into any language. (Muslims must memorize the Qur'an in Arabic. Any "translation" into another language is called a "commentary" and is not recognized as authoritative.)

The Hebrew poets used parallelism in their poetry to present their thoughts. Parallelism is two or three lines that have a relationship to each other; equal to each other in structure and sense. The poet is sometimes comparing, contrasting or simply saying the same thing twice using different words. The second line can also add detail which reinforces or carries the thought forward. This can be seen in reading Psalm 105:5-11. Read the first lines of each verse. The passage makes sense and the meaning is clear without the second line. Then read the verses again and see that indented second lines carry the thought forward, enriching the words, giving beauty and power to the first line.

Hebrew Poetic Forms

It will be good to briefly consider the following examples of Hebrew poetic forms:

1. The simplest form is seen in Job 4:17.

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(a) Can a mortal be more righteous than God?

(b) Can a man be more pure than his Maker?

2. A double couplet is seen in Psalm 127:1.

(a) Unless the LORD builds the house,

(b) its builders labor in vain.

(a) Unless the LORD watches over the city,

(b) the watchmen stand guard in vain.

3. A double triplet is seen in Matt 7:7-8.

(a) Ask and it will be given to you;

(b) seek and you will find;

(c) knock and the door will be opened to you.

(a) For everyone who asks receives;

(b) he who seeks finds;

(c) and to him who knocks, the door will be opened.

4. An inverted or reversed parallelism is seen in Matt 6:24.

(a) No one can serve two masters.

(b) Either he will hate the one (c) and love the other.

(c) and love the other,

(c) or he will be devoted to the one(b) and despise the other.

(a) You cannot serve both God and Money.

5. An antithetic couplet where the opposite is said in the second line is seen in Psalm 1:6.

(a) For the LORD watches over the way of the righteous,

(b) but the way of the wicked will perish.

Some Types of Songs/Psalms

There is a great fullness of spiritual comfort and joy in the hearts of those who sing or read the psalms as an act of praise to the Messiah. The songs can delight the heart, rekindle the will with the fire of love and ignite a passion for righteousness and justice. The songs can drive out and destroy discontent, producing peace in both body and soul. The songs can be like a light brightening the life, health for a sick heart and honey to a bitter soul. The songs of the Bible cover a wide range of topics and emotions. Besides expressing the inexpressible, the songs often bring to light significant feelings which people did not even know were there. They help people get in touch with life's buried issues and assist in expressing them.

1. SONGS OF PRAISE were the psalms people sang when they felt comfortable in their relationship with God. The greatness and goodness of God is praised. The hearts of the psalmists were in tune with God. Their songs are the most thoughtful reflections on God to be found anywhere. It is noteworthy that of the 150 Psalms, 120 address God directly, 14 others call upon all creation to praise the Lord (Some examples: Ex 15; Psa 29, 47, 96, 98, 146-150).

2. SONGS OF LAMENT were prayers to God when the people were

hurting. The poet felt upset with himself, betraved by others or even abandoned bv God. Most of the laments begin negative with thoughts and move toward hope, ending with praise or trust (2 Sam 1; Psa 3, 13, 22, 44, 60, 64, 77, 80, 88).

3. SONGS OF THANKSGIVING were similar to the songs of praise in celebrating God, but a thanksgiving celebrated God for hearing an earlier lament and answering prayer. The structure of the songs is: first the poet had a problem, he appealed to the Lord who responded (Jdg 4; Psa 18, 30, 32, 112).

4. SONGS OF CONFIDENCE were expressions of trust in God using a vivid central metaphor (Psa 23 - shepherd/sheep, Psa 131 - mother/ child).

5. SONGS OF ROYALTY. God was presented both as the divine king and human king (Psa 2, 18, 20, 21, 45, 72, 89, 101, 110, 132).

6. SONGS OF REMEMBRANCE were calls to remember God's gracious acts in history (Psa 66, 78, 105, 106).

7. SONGS OF WISDOM would include Psalm 1, 37, 39, 45, 49, 73, 78, 119, 127, 128, 133 as well as the books of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs and Job.

8. SONGS OF PILGRIMAGE, included the Songs of Ascent, were

Songs of the Soul

hat is poetry? For many of us, the word brings back memories of English classes where we learned about rhyme and meter, symbolism and alliteration—where we may have read and heard some of the great classics of literary history and possibly we even memorized

some—but, ultimately, all may seemed fairly obscure and distant from the reality we live in.

These attitudes may have extended into our adult lives. Though we may enjoy poetry on one hand, we sometimes struggle with understanding its imagery

and meaning. We sense that there is often something deeper and more personal in poetry than in the prose that fills our lives. But, prose is easier to read and understand. It seems clear and logical, rational and objective.

Poetry is the music of literature. It is subjective. It describes the world through images and feelings. Poetry touches a part of us that prose cannot. Scientists tell us that music connects with a different part of our brains. The same would seem to be true for poetry, where words and ideas become much fuller and richer. Whether we really appreciate or like poetry, it is an important and meaningful form of expression.

Psalms, the longest book in the Bible, is a book of poetry—a collection of 150 poems (songs or psalms). It has some of the most beautiful and stirring words in the Bible. It takes the reader into wonder in the presence of God. It stirs hearts in worship. It expresses the depth of human brokenness and despair.

It is obvious that the Psalms were intended to be used in worship, so the book could be considered the hymnal of Israel. Similarly, the early church found the Psalms a source as they sang "psalms, hymns and spiritual songs." Many of the songs we sing today come from the Psalms. It is amazing that a book (collection of songs) has survived for thousands of years and is as relevant, personal and inspiring. People today sing from the Psalms, read them, study them, meditate on them, even pray from them. Why?

The answer lies in the way the Psalms connect with us. Sometimes they express fear from uncertain or difficult times. Some of the Psalms speak of times when the writer used to have a more vibrant spiritual life. One of the most beautiful Psalms speaks of having a personal relationship with God as a sheep with a shepherd. Through the Psalms we are called to lift up our eyes to God and to see His transcendence, majesty, power. We are left in

wonder and awe. The Psalms connect with the innermost parts of us. In a very personal way, the Bible sometimes speaks of this as our soul.


Without attempting to explore all the concepts of the word soul, we simply note that sometimes, in the Bible, the word is used to refer to the source of our deepest spiritual feelings. Job speaks of the "bitterness of his soul" and of his "soul being grieved for the poor." Hannah, when confronted by Eli, said she was "pouring out her soul to the Lord." In the Psalms, the expression "my soul" is used 46 times. Sometimes it speaks of deep anguish and grief, of being downcast. The most beautiful passages speak of a deep desire for God, like the deer thirsting and panting for water. And, the Psalms speak of worshipping God,

lifting up my soul. David says that God "restores my soul."

Given the significance of the Psalms, not only as a book of the Bible, but as a reflection of our experience with God and life, we

wonder how much attention is given to them today. There are always a few who say, sadly, that it's Old Testament and not important today. Some may occasionally turn there, perhaps as their Bible accidentally falls open in the middle. However, the Psalms are an important part of our spiritual heritage and our lives today. They offer a wealth of comfort, instruction and inspiration.

With this in mind, this issue of the Gospel Herald takes a look at the Psalms. Richard Kruse, in "The God Who Sings," introduces us to the book of Psalms, discussing the importance of song and the kinds of songs in the book. *continued on page 16*

This verse explains exactly why this person meditates on the Word of God all day. It is so that he can correctly handle the Word of God, and uses it to do the Lord's work, and so that he doesn't need to be ashamed in the life that he leads or in anything that he does.

We then come to the next part of the passage where it gives us an analogy of a tree and how this tree is like the blessed person. It says that this person is "like a tree planted by streams of

water which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not whither."

Jesus talks about the water which we need to live!

Here is something I know about you (the reader); I know that you wouldn't want to be a tree planted in the desert. Why? Because there is no source of life in the desert! One of the few key factors for any living organism is that everything needs water to live. So of course you're going to want to be the tree planted by the water. Water is a source of life!

Jesus talks about the water which we need to live!

"Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life" John 4:13-14.

Again this scripture is referring to how we need the Word of God to live and how we need to meditate on it all the time because the source of our life comes from His inspired Word.

But wait! There's another part to the analogy of the tree, it says that this tree "yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither." What does that mean? If God compares us to a tree that produces fruit in season,

> then what is the fruit that we are supposed to be producing?

In Paul's letter to the Galatians, he talks about this fruit and exactly what it is.

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control" Galatians 5:22-23.

These are the fruits that the tree bears, the tree whose leaf does not whither and everything that it does prospers, as said in the last part of the analogy. All these things said about the tree is God describing the person He will bless. Therefore we are supposed to be living our lives like this tree: soaking up the living water



at our roots and producing the good fruits of the Spirit.

But then it goes on to say that the wicked are not like the blessed person! It says that the wicked are like chaff which is blown away by the winds! But what is chaff exactly? Chaff is actually the husks of grains and grasses that are separated during threshing.

What is it that people are going to want, the grains or the chaff? Obviously anyone would want the grains. Chaff has no purpose to fulfill and so the only thing it can be good for is to be taken away by the wind.

This parallels what God will do with us on the Day of Judgment! He will keep His children and His followers and He will throw away the wicked people and evil doers into destruction.

This also illustrates the next part of Psalm 1 for us! It says, "Therefore the wicked will not stand in the judgement, nor sinners in the assembly of the righteous." This too is talking about the Day of Judgement, and how the wicked will not stand with the righteous before God! Instead they will be separated from us, as it says in Matthew 25:32-33:

"All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate the people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. He will put the sheep on his right and the goats on his left."

In conclusion, we need to be:

• Living our lives like the person whom God will bless.

• Not going along with the world, but rather letting our light shine into the dark places of the world.

• Living our lives like the tree soaking up the Word of God at our roots and producing the good fruit by the way we conduct our lives.

• Meditating on the Word of God, chewing on it and figuring out how to apply it to our lives

My challenge for you is to choose to live your life in a way that will glorify God.

Sin and Sickness – PSALM 38

[Please read the psalm before reading the article.]

This psalm is not much studied. It is not included in the Revised Common Lectionary. Churches following that lectionary are not troubled with the task of wrestling with its difficulties. I suspect that it is also skipped by most Bible class curricula. There seems to be a fear that the psalm might be understood as teaching that every illness is caused, in an immediate and direct sense, by sin. Indeed, such an understanding of the psalm might be possible for those who do not know the Bible very well.

Whatever danger there may be in studying the psalm, there is a greater danger in failing to study such a passage. The possibility of a connection between sin and sickness has been excluded from most people's thinking. This is a possibility we must not exclude. This psalm teaches a point of view regarding illness that is needed today. We must not ignore its teaching. There is often more to illness than germs.

A Spiritual Side to Illnesses

There is a spiritual side to illness. We ignore this to our peril. The spiritual side to illness is mentioned in this psalm repeatedly (3, 4, 5, 18).

The fact that there is a spiritual side to illness does not indicate that all illness is directly related to sin. That is not the case. That is something our Lord specifically tells us is not true (Jn 9:3). But sin is the cause behind the cause of illness. The Bible plainly teaches that human sin is what has caused the perfect

system of nature that God created to go wrong (Gen 3 & Rom 8:18-23). Thus all illness is, in this indirect sense, the result of human sin.

There is an ambiguity here that we need to ponder. The Bible notes times when illnesses fall on people innocently (such as Job or the man born blind). But the Bible also notes times when a specific illness is brought on by a particular sin. King Uzziah (2 Chr 26:16-21) is one example.

So it is appropriate in times of illness, or in any time of trouble in our lives, to ask if there might be a message from God in this illness or trouble. There does not have to be a medical cause and effect relationship for it to be so. Certainly if we have worried ourselves to ulcers, or fornicated our way to AIDS, or used alcohol to the point of damaging *continued on page 8*

our liver, we should admit the connection. But there was no medical connection between King Uzziah's sin and the resulting illness. Still, it was a message from God.

There does not have to be a cause and effect relationship for an illness to bring us a message. Paul's "thorn in the flesh" was not the result of a sin committed, but rather a humbling experience to keep him from a potential sin (2 Cor 12:7). Any illness or inconvenience we experience may have its purpose. We ought therefore to seek to understand the purpose. It may be that we will not be granted insight into the purpose, but the effort to see may be of value.

Illness may be a message from the Lord in a number of ways. It may be a call to repentance. It may be a visible punishment from which others will benefit. It may be a reminder (to all of us) that there is a price to be paid for wrongdoing, or even for excesses in activities that are not wrong of themselves. Long-term serious illness brings us to lose hope in human remedies and to cast ourselves unreservedly on the Lord. It may be an effort to make us or keep us humble. It may be an opportunity to demonstrate patient suffering.

Let us be alert to the spiritual side of illness.

Social Side to Illness

That there is a social side to illness is stated in verses 11-12, "My friends and companions stand aloof from my plague, and my nearest kin stand far off. Those who seek my life lay their snares; those who seek my hurt speak of ruin and meditate treachery all day long."

We have, at the current moment in history, reduced the tendency to blame people for their own illnesses. But that does not mean that we are always good to the ill. Our society is entertainment crazy, and much of the entertainment includes unfair caricature of the elderly and chronically ill.

Even if we are not guilty of being unkind toward the ill, we may, without meaning to, neglect the ill. Our living patterns contribute to this—we do not live near our elderly loved ones. We are not often with them in their difficulties. How are they to know that we love them when we so rarely offer words of encouragement? The local congregation is no longer the gathering of God's people within walking distance, and this leads to further neglect. It is just so far to the home of ill members that we rarely, if ever, check on them as once would have been common.

We may not deride them, we may

not rejoice in their illness, but in neglecting them we do them wrong. Someone has said that the opposite of love is not hate, but indifference. When we treat the ill with indifference we may be wounding them deeply.

Conclusion

This psalm is normally included as one of the "penitential psalms", although it does not confess specific sins. The admission of sin is implicit in the whole attitude taken toward the difficulties being experienced. Rather than excusing himself, this writer repeatedly admits that he is a sinner and that God is just in allowing him to suffer. In a sense this psalm might be seen as the opposite of the attitude described in Proverbs ("When a man's folly brings his way to ruin, his heart rages against the LORD" 19:3 ESV). Rather than bringing trouble on himself and then blaming God, this writer acknowledges his own guilt, although we are given no indication of how the troubles and the sins are connected.

This psalm reminds us of some things we tend to overlook. We see illness almost exclusively as a medical matter. Indeed, most illnesses have a medical cause; but every illness has theological and social dimensions.

Whatever the immediate cause of

a given illness—every illness should do these things for us. Every illness should remind us of the effect of sin in spoiling God's perfect creation. Every illness should be a time of self-examination. Every illness should motivate us to humbly call on God in prayer. And every illness should call forth a loving response from family, friends and fellow Christians. Toledo. Ohio

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Closer to God-PSALM 84

Some of us have been around the church just about all of our lives ... as were our parents and their parents too. For some of us, it all can become more generational than regenerational. For many of us it is easy to take it all for granted. Our church family, the Sunday worship, prayer, believing in Biblical morality and our relationship with God are so woven into our lives that

God will always give us enough strength for each new day in order that we can continue to walk in His will.

we cannot imagine living without them. Sometimes what becomes habit, repetitive and routine and can also become trite, monotonous and mundane.

Psalm 84 was written by the "Sons of Korah" or perhaps by King David

to the Sons of Korah. These were the workers, alongside the priests, in the temple of God. The heritage of their forefathers was one of rebellion and grave sin (literally) against the Lord (Numbers 16), but because of God's abundant grace they now have a wonderful opportunity to worship in sincerity and truth. Let us not ever let our past falling and failing control our present nor determine our destiny. These men were very familiar with the order, purpose and meaning of the sacrifices, offerings and worship. But for them it was anything but mindless rote or heartless duty.

In verse 1, we see that the place where God resides is too beautiful to describe; too awesome to contemplate; too lovely to imagine. We sometimes sing the song that considers the great love and grace of God, that begins with the words, "How do you explain; how do you describe, a love that goes from east to west and runs as deep as it is wide?" The answer is in the chorus, "When words are not enough to tell You of our love, listen to our hearts." Paul wrote about God's incredible, unlimited power that continues to work in us. "Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more

> than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all

generations, for ever and ever!" (Ephesians 3:20-21).

As those who participate in the new life found in Christ, we should have a greater desire, eager anticipation and joyful spirit when we are privileged to gather to meet with the Lord and His

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people for worship. We ought to have a yearning soul, a hungry spirit and a heart that cries out to be close to our heavenly Father. Like the psalmist we faint and weary from the challenges and difficulties of life, but we know, like the Psalmist, that we will be refreshed and restored when he met with our Lord (v. 2). This was a complete surrender to the presence of God. This intense passion to be near to God is also portrayed in Psalm 63:1. "O God, you are my God, earnestly I seek you; my soul thirsts for you, my body longs for you, in a dry and weary land where there is no water."

All that God has created honors and worships Him and each part acts according to their purpose and nature. We also have been created to worship the Lord and fulfill His purpose and live according to His image (vs. 3-4). We sing another song, "All things praise Thee, Lord most high, Heav'n and earth and sea and sky, All were

> for Thy glory made, That Thy greatness thus displayed Should all worship bring to Thee; All things praise Thee—Lord, may we!"

> When on the roadway of life is busy and frustrating many people trust in themselves or take direction from other travelers. As we journey we set our hearts on the pilgrimage, the path and most importantly our destination (v. 5). As we advance along the journey we go from strength to strength until we finally reach our home. It is tempting to be off track, to follow the majority, to simply just stop in our tracks because we are exhausted and weary. God will always give us enough strength for each new day in order that we can continue to walk in His will.

dreds of miles to worship at the temple. There is the image of the journey through the "Valley of Baca." This was a single narrow passageway through the hills with many dangers and difficulties along the way. Today Jesus provides the only way to the throne

of our heavenly father. This area "The Valley of Baca" is translated, "Valley of Tears." The travel can be treacherous, but the final resting place will be worth it all. Let

us not give up or turn back through the struggle, but keep our vision on the beauty and wonder of being with God in His house. We must continually look to Jesus as our example of one who persevered and remained faithful. "Consider him who endured such opposition from sinners, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart" (Hebrews 12:3). Sometimes there will be fellow disciples along the route to encourage and bless us. Other times our strength comes directly from the Lord, as water comes from the rock or food rains down from heaven.

Whether we review our entire life, specific events or even our best day, what is our primary desire? Can we say with the Psalmist, "Better is one day in your courts than a thousand elsewhere; I would rather be a door-

God will always give us enough strength for each new day in order that we can continue to walk in His will.

> keeper in the house of my God than dwell in the tents of the wicked" (v. 10). What an incredible passion to be near to the heart and will of God. Meeting together with the faithful saints to praise God in song, prayer, praise and meditation on the Word is awesome.

> There is no sense of regret, disappointment or complaint. Often we judge our worship by the song selection, the content of message and the length of our meeting. When our focus

is on worshipping the Lord from the depth of our heart and soul, we will be encouraged, strengthened and refreshed.

There is a great comfort in walking close to the Lord. God is described as a sun which showers us with light, warmth and life (v. 11). He

is a shield that constantly protects us from the obvious and hidden attacks from the devil who wants to take us captive, bring suffering, pain and death. Not only does God

keep those who walk blameless from evil, but he also blesses us with favor, honor and blessing (vs. 11 and 12).

Let us find hope and strength in what Jesus said to the church in Philadelphia, "I am coming soon. Hold on to what you have, so that no one will take your crown. Him who overcomes I will make a pillar in the temple of my God. Never again will he leave it" (Revelation 3:11-12). There is no other place I would rather be.

Praises and More:

TORAH, HISTORY AND PROPHECY IN PSALMS

Paul Birston

The Old Testament can be intimidating in length, breadth and depth. I remember praying as a new believer that God would help me understand it, a prayer He's always willing to answer. He helps us see the splendour of its grand design.

Jesus is our great teacher. He knew the Old Testament inside out. He gave us a helpful overview of its contents, form and purpose: "These are My words which I spoke to you while I was still with you, that all things which are written about Me in the Law of Moses and the Prophets and the Psalms must be fulfilled" (Luke 24:44). Jesus used the Hebrew Bible order, the "Tanakh," two letters each of the Hebrew Torah ("teaching," also known as the "Five Books of Moses"), Navi'im ("Prophets") and Katuvim ("Writings"). We are most familiar with the western order: Law, History, Poetry and Prophets.

The Hebrew title for Psalms is Tehillim, "praises." While most are laments, Psalms ends with a crescendo of praises to God. Psalms are poems set to music. While some people may think of poetry as a lightweight genre, God uses poetry when He wants to pack much meaning into few words.

A further amazing property of these poems is much of their content matches all the other categories of the Old Testament: Torah, History, Prophecy, and Wisdom. The five books within Psalms go beyond paralleling the five books of Moses, they are a microcosm of the whole Hebrew Bible!

Torah in Psalms

(Examples: 1, 19, 119)

Torah ("teaching," "instruction") includes God's commands, laws, covenants and object lessons through the colourful narratives of Genesis to Deuteronomy. Psalms begins with a Torah psalm. Psalm 1 sets the tone for the whole Book contrasting the walk of the wicked and the blessed person:

But his delight is in the law of the Lord, And in His law he meditates day and night. (1:1-2)

Torah illuminates the way the blessed person walks and grows with God and is victorious on the day of judgment.

In Psalm 19, God speaks through His creation (1-6) and His Torah (7-14) showing what Torah is and does spiritually, intellectually and emotionally:

The law of the LORD is perfect, restoring the soul;

The testimony of the LORD is sure, making wise the simple.

The precepts of the LORD are right, rejoicing the heart;

The commandment of the LORD is pure, enlightening the eyes.

The fear of the LORD is clean, enduring forever;

The judgments of the LORD are true; they are righteous altogether (19:7-9).

The Bible's longest chapter is an acrostic Torah psalm (119). All 176 verses, except 122 and 132, praise the power, beauty and benefits of knowing and keeping God's word, laws, decrees, statutes and ordinances. The opening verses echo the blessings of Psalms 1 and 19:

How blessed are those whose way is blameless,

Who walk in the law of the LORD. How blessed are those who observe His testimonies,

Who seek Him with all their heart.

Torah psalms keep us on the paths of righteousness after going astray (119:67). God's word restores our souls, makes us wise, rejoices our hearts, enlightens our eyes and our paths, blesses us and makes our work with God fruitful.

History in Psalms

(Examples: 78, 105, 106, 135, 136)

Historical psalms help us see the grand sweep of God's work. Like Acts 7 and 13, Psalms condense the history of God's faithfulness and mighty deeds:

That they should put their confidence in God

And not forget the works of God, But keep His commandments. (78:7)

Knowing God's awesome work in history is motivation to keep His commands now. God's Exodus deliverance is a metaphor for our deliverance in Jesus.

Psalm 105 reminds us of God's covenant, signs, concern and deliverance from bondage. God's past deeds have ongoing positive impacts in our lives now:

Songs in the New Testament Writings

The writers of the New Testament books quoted the book of Psalms more than any other book in the Hebrew Bible. According to one author, there are 360 Old Testament quotations in the New Testament writings with 112 of them from the Psalms. Therefore, almost onethird of the quotations are from the Psalms. The songs of Isaiah are in second place.

Matthew used 17 quotations, Mark used 9 quotations and John used 15 quotations from the book of Psalms to show that Jesus is the Messiah. Throughout Luke's history of the life of Jesus are many thoughts echoed from the Psalms. The letter to the Hebrews quotes ten psalms, as well as examining word-by-word Psalm 110:4 in relationship to Jesus.

Mary sang praises to God after the announcement that she would give birth to the Messiah and Zechariah sang praises to God at the birth of his son John (the Baptist). Jesus, who originally was greater than angels, became lower than angels, to lift his people to the place of honour which God had planned (Psa 8:4-8; Heb 2:5-9). The song of angels greeted his birth. Jesus sang the songs of Israel throughout his life. His teaching reflected the songs, his death and resurrection were prophesied in the songs. After his resurrection Jesus spoke to two disciples on the road to Emmaus explaining how he had fulfilled the message of the Old Testament Scriptures, including the Psalms.

The Apostles John and Paul wrote many new songs praising Jesus the Messiah (Phil 2:6-11; 1 Tim 3:16; Rev 4:8, 11; 5:9-13; 7:10-17; 11:15-18; 12:10-12; 15:3-4; 16:5-7; 19:2-8).

AFRICA: For six years, George and Ria Funk did World Bible School followup work in big cities. Then, after planting churches in Nambia, Nelspruit and the Freestate, realized it was too much for two people to reach many parts of Africa and a team was needed, as well as a way to baptize where there was not water available. This was in the year 2000. By April of this year, there will be seven churches of Christ on wheels called "Gospel Chariots", touring 12 central and southern African countries. They are complete with PA system, baptistery, tents and sleeping quarters for evangelists-three large, and four mini versions. Liberia was the 12th country to receive one, and two others are being built for Zimbabwe and Malawi, while one is being bought for Togo. Since first introduced, thousands have been taught and baptized, millions of WBS lessons distributed, and many churches planted. Ron Pottberg, who was on hand to drive the new truck on its maiden trip across Liberia, said that everywhere they rolled through towns and villages, people stopped to stare at the information on the side, and with some writing it down. Stopping for three days in Gbarttala, "The Passion of Christ" was shown to crowds of 500 to 800 people each night. They did similar showings in four other towns before driving back to Monrovia, baptizing 73 and leaving others learning about the Bible through WBS lessons. He couldn't help but think how like Philip ran alongside

the African's chariot—today Africans are chasing motorized chariots and that it is all about understanding the scriptures.

Make known His deeds among the peoples.

Sing to Him, sing praises to Him; Speak of all His wonders. Glory in His holy name; Let the heart of those who seek the LORD be glad. (105:1-3)

Psalm 106 recounts God's responses to the disobedience and repentance of His people. They sinned (6), forgot His works (13), did not wait for His counsel (13), envied Moses (16), made a golden calf in Horeb (19), joined themselves to Baal-peor, provoked Him to wrath at the waters of Meribah (32), rebelled against His Spirit (33), did not destroy pagan peoples but "mingled with the nations and learned their practices" (35-36). God corrected them and had compassion:

Nevertheless He looked upon their distress,

When He heard their cry; And He remembered His covenant for their sake,

And relented according to the greatness of His lovingkindness.

He also made them objects of compassion. (106:44-46a)

Psalm 135 praises the Lord for His works in the heavens and on earth providing productive farming conditions and giving victory over Egypt and the kings of the city states and regions in and around Israel.

Psalm 136 commands thanksgiving to God for His work in creation and the Exodus:

To Him alone who does great wonders,

For His lovingkindness is everlasting. (136:7)

The reason for God's great works is repeated in every verse: "For His lovingkindness is everlasting." His lovingkindness (hesed) lasts forever, an Old Testament equivalent of New Testament agape love: God is love.

Prophecies of Jesus in Psalms (Examples: 2, 22, 69, 110, 118) Prophets spoke for God to Israel and its leaders about their immediate circumstances. They reminded them of God's deeds in the past, called them to repentance and told of future events. Psalms 2, 22, 69, and the two most quoted Psalms in the New Testament, 110 and 118, prophecy profoundly of Jesus' coming and His opponents, rejection, death, resurrection, victorious reign and eternal priesthood.

Following Torah Psalm 1, Psalm 2 reveals the identity of Jesus as God's Son, His close relationship with His Father, their co-Lordship and His worthiness, all brought forward in Acts and Hebrews:

"I will surely tell of the decree of the LORD:

He said to Me, 'You are My Son, Today I have begotten You.'"

Do homage to the Son, that He not become angry, and you perish in the way,

For His wrath may soon be kindled. How blessed are all who take refuge in Him! (2:7, 12; Acts 13:33; Hebrews 1:5; 5:5)

Jesus cries from the cross, "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me," (Psalm 22:1; Matthew 27:46; Mark 15:34). Psalm 22 describes the horrors of Jesus' crucifixion, His opponents, God's answer to His cry (24), the relief of victory, His praise in the midst of the great assembly (25), and the declaration of His righteousness to future generations (22:22-23, 30-31).

Psalm 69 prophecies Jesus' cleansing of the temple and the reproaches of His opponents. John records this early in his Gospel setting the tone for Jesus' relationship with religious leaders and his burning desire to honour God:

"Zeal for Your house has consumed me

And the reproaches of those who reproached You have fallen on me" (69:9; John 2:17).

Psalm 110 promises the Father will

vanquish Jesus' enemies and establish Him as an eternal priest for us: The LORD says to my Lord: "Sit at My right hand, Until I make Your enemies a footstool for your feet."

Psalm 110:1 is one of the most quoted Old Testament verses in the New Testament (Matthew 22:44; 26:44; Mark 12:36, 14:62; Luke 10:42-43; 22:69; Acts 2:34-35; 1 Corinthians 15:25; Hebrews 1:13). Jesus' ministry is eternal:

The LORD has sworn and will not change His mind,

"You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek." (110:4; Hebrews 5:6; 7:17, 21)

Jesus is the chief corner stone in God's spiritual temple, reject by His chosen people but marvellous and blessed to those who love Him:

The stone which the builders rejected

Has become the chief corner stone. This is the Lord's doing; It is marvellous in our eyes. This is the day which the Lord has made;

Let us rejoice and be glad in it.

O Lord, do save, we beseech You; O Lord, we beseech You, do send

prosperity!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord;

We have blessed you from the house of the Lord. (118:22-26)

Paul Birston explores the diversity of the Psalms as he shows how they include the Law and history of Israel, as well as prophecy. The other three articles look at individual Psalms. In "Blessed vs. Wicked" Tyler Boland looks at the first Psalm. Thayer Salisbury explores Psalm 38, "Sin and Sickness," which he notes is not much studied. Psalms provides minimal contextual background information allowing the most universal application in bringing us close to God. Psalms continually point to Him and His work for us and in us. "Heart" occurs about 127 times in Psalms, far more than any Bible book. The Psalmists pour out their hearts to God giving voice to our deepest concerns. God hears and has compassion setting His people back on the paths of righteousness and peace with Him.

Torah psalms emphasize the power of God's Word in our walk with Him in His holiness. Historical psalms remind us of our place as people of the King, people of God who loves us, convicts us, restores us and leads us to His eternal assembly so we may praise Him forever. Prophetic psalms enlarge our vision and love of Jesus who fulfills all things spoken of Him in the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms!
