

If the foundations are destroyed, what can the righteous do? (PSALM 11:3, ESV)

In our time of cultural upheaval, it is essential to rediscover the Psalms. Many of the Psalms address concerns that apply to our time. Psalm 11 is certainly one of these. Western culture has almost completely collapsed in the past five hundred years. The foundations that once upheld society have eroded to the point of destruction. As Christians, we need to know how to respond to cultural upheaval. We need to know what to do. We need to hear the message of Psalm 11.

What are the foundations the Psalmist mentions? The translators of the Septuagint chose to render this phrase "the things [God] established." The New Living Translation renders it "the foundations of law and order." It seems good to combine these two things. We know that governments are established by God (Romans 13:1) and we regard a good government as a foundation of law and order. But there are other foundations as well. The family was established by God, and is certainly foundational in all human life. The church was established by God as "pillar and ground of the truth" (1 Timothy 3:15, NKJV). In modern times, church and family are under attack. The trust that society once had in our government officials or our police force has almost completely deteriorated. In such a situation, it is easy to become discouraged, and to take an attitude that we, as Christians, are just waiting, trying to hold on until Jesus comes back and sets us free.

It is unclear who makes the statement in verse 3. Most translations consider it a quote from someone who is discouraging the Psalmist, whether it be a wicked man or a righteous man who has given in to despondency. A few translations end the quote after verse 1, making the statement a question asked by the Psalmist himself. Of these options, it seems to make the most

sense to view these words as the words of a righteous man grown despondent, a man such as Elijah in 1 Kings 19. The person who makes this statement is not necessarily wicked; in fact, in verse 2 it seems that the speaker is decrying the evils the wicked are doing. But he is discouraged. He has forgotten Who really rules the world. In Elijah's day, the evil queen Jezebel had bent her bow, to shoot at the upright prophet of God, and Elijah reasoned that since he was the only follower of God remaining, it were best he flee, so that God would have someone to worship him. His despondency was based upon two factors: first, he considered himself alone, when in reality he was surrounded both by people (7000 who had not bowed the knee to Baal) and by the armies of God that are seen by Elisha in 2 Kings 6. God rules over the kingdoms of men (Isaiah 37:20), and He will not allow His followers to be completely wiped out. He has always reserved for Himself a people, and He will always reserve for Himself a people. How often are similar things heard today? How often do Christians, speaking together before or after worship, discuss how evil the surrounding world is, and how often is the desire for this pilgrimage to end expressed, but from a desire to flee from evil, not from a desire to flee to God? How often are Christians content to be little pockets of goodness and light in a world of evil and darkness? This is what the discouraged man encourages in Psalm 11: withdraw from the world, flee to the mountains, so that somehow the worship of God can survive.

But the remainder of the Psalm reveals this attitude for what it really is: a lack of faith that God is the ruler over all the earth. Elijah fled because he did not trust God to protect him from one queen, although he did trust God to give him the victory over the false prophets. "The Lord is in His holy temple... His eyes see, His eyelids test, the children of man" (Psalm 11:4, ESV). God watches and tests all the people of the earth, to see who will do righteousness, and who will do evil. For evildoers, "fire and sulfur and a scorching wind shall be the portion of their cup" (11:5, ESV). But God "loves righteous deeds; the upright shall behold His face" (11:7, ESV). What does this mean? This is telling the righteous what to do when the foundations are destroyed: continue doing righteousness and trusting in God. We are not alone, unless we have isolated ourselves! God is always with us, and the entire community of all the saints from the foundation of the world down to this day are a "cloud of witnesses" (Hebrews 12:1) to provide us with encouragement. We are also surrounded by our brothers and sisters now in the flesh, far more than the 7000 of Elijah's day. We are simply to continue doing righteousness.

One final note of encouragement: the foundations were destroyed in the days of Elijah. The foundations were destroyed in the days of the wicked kings. The temple of God fell into disrepair, and the book of the law of God was lost (2 Kings 22). Those times were surely worse than are these. Yet the foundations were rebuilt. Divorce was common in the Roman Empire at the time of Christ. With the spread of Christianity the family became a strong institution. Christians grew from 120 people in Jerusalem, until in less than 300 years the Roman power itself lay at the feet of Christ. How did this happen? By Christians not fleeing to the mountains, but simply doing righteousness and trusting in God. May we do the same, and may the foundations be rebuilt, that once again our society may be pleasing to God.

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How the Truth Saves Us

t the trial of Jesus, Pilate asked the question; "what is truth?" The problem was that he didn't stick around for the answer. In a day when the concept of truth is scoffed at... it's a marvellous thing for us to open our bibles and to have Jesus reassure us of three things.

- 1. The first is... that there is such a thing as truth.
- 2. It is capable of being known by each and every one of us.
- 3. And the truth is not always bad news. The truth about Jesus is good news... and it has the power to set us free from sin

That is what Jesus said in John 8:30. "As He spoke these things, many came to believe in Him". So Jesus was saying to those Jews who had believed Him, "If you continue in My word, then you are truly disciples of Mine; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free" (Jo. 8:31-32).

Now Jesus did not explain on that occasion just how it was that truth would set people free. But He did say that without the truth, they could not be set free. As long as God has spoken to men and women. Satan has had something to say. Satan is an enemy of the truth. He does not want the truth to get out... certainly not the kind that saves. The Bible calls him a liar, a deceiver, an accuser and an adversarv. Jesus said that when Satan tells a lie, that's the only time that he's not a hypocrite. When he lies, he is true to his own nature. Now he is able to tell the truth... and he does tell the truth... as long as the the truth that he tells—amounts to a lie. But when Satan lies... that's the real Satan

His most effective weapon is the <u>partial truth</u>... the kind that amounts to a lie. He is the ultimate spin-doctor, he can make those who obey God, appear to be tyrants. And he is very good at making sinners out to be freedom fighters... men and women who are standing up for their inalienable rights.

When Jesus told the parable of the soils, he <u>explained</u> that the <u>seed</u> was the word of God and that the birds who took the seed away... represented Satan. Here's how serious that is: "Now the parable is this: the seed is the word of God. Those beside the road are those who have heard; then the devil comes and <u>takes away</u> the word from their heart, <u>so that</u> they will not believe and be saved" (Luke 8:11-12).

The point is—that people are lost because of sin. The only remedy to the problem of sin is the gospel. If Satan can keep anyone from hearing it, believing it or obeying it, he can keep them from being saved. The fight against Satan has always been a fight for the truth.

Now Jesus was sought out mostly by sinners who knew that they were sinners. But sinners who thought they were saved did not come to Jesus for salvation. During his final week, Jesus met a man whom He commended. He said to him: "You are not far from the kingdom of God." (Mk.12:34). This was an honest man who took the scriptures seriously. He was on the right track, but Jesus put him on notice that more was needed. He was still outside of the Kingdom of God. It follows then that *close to*, is

A Good Report

7hen someone from the community visits your congregation, what is their reaction? Sometimes, they might tell vou. They may leave a note on a visitor's card. Or, they might make a comment, possibly to the person they came with. Or, they could just "vote with their feet", never to return. It is important that

we know the impression we are making on our visitors. We need to see the church through their eyes.

Very occasionally, a visitor may pass on their response to their visit publicly. On March 6, Ted Campbell visited the Preston Road congregation in Dallas, Texas. The next day, he wrote about his visit in his internet blog, "heartcoreMethodist." Though his great-grandparents were members of the Church of Christ, two of their sons, his grandfather and his brother, married Methodist sisters and followed their wives into Methodism. Campbell notes that his family saw the Churches of Christ as eccentric. In high school, he responded to an ad for free Greek lessons and had an encounter with a group he calls "hard-shell' Churches of Christ folk." He sums up his perception before his March visit, "I did not have a very positive impression of the Churches of Christ." However, attending worship with the Preston Road congregation changed his views. We should note here that Campbell brings an interesting dimension to his evaluation. Not only is he Methodist, he is Associate Professor of Church History at Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University.

After his visit, he concluded, the Churches of Christ "may be right on some of those most interesting points that have distinguished them." He gives five reasons. The words in bold are his emphases. "First, they have profound insight into Christian music and its place in worship." Though he isn't sure about the argument against instruments from the silence of scriptures, he is "tired" of the effects of instruments (and musicians) which have gone from just accompanying to "improvisation whenever they feel like it." He wonders, "if we have gone too far with our instrumental fetish..." He observes, "There's something utterly wonderful about the sound of human voices blending together in harmony." Second, they've sure got "the right name." He suggests that some of the denominational names "are not really ace names for Christian groups." And some sound "a little pretentious" or "a little snitty."

He adds that Churches of Christ "just name their congregations for the places where they meet." Third, the Churches of Christ "celebrate the Lord's supper every Sunday." He notes that the communion service was simple and reminded him, especially the prayers, of the second-century *Didache*. Fourth, "there really is only one Church of Christ." He points out that this was "one of the cardinal claims of the ecumenical movement of the twentieth century, and the Churches of Christ were way out in front in making us aware of that claim." Fifth, "and perhaps most importantly, the simplicity of the Churches of Christ allows them to focus on what is most important, namely, the Gospel of Jesus Christ." He mentions that no creeds were used, but that before the offering, one of the members "exhorted us to consider the sacrifice of Christ as we give ourselves." Campbell observes, "... this man knew the faith and he presented the Gospel in a simple and straightforward manner." He concludes his observations from his visit, "they just get the job done... There is a primitive simplicity to their communities that really stands out among other church bodies trying to be the church of Christ. We'd do well to learn from them and thank God for their witness."

We might think about the other points we might wish Campbell had also mentioned, including the importance of immersion, that all Christians are ministers, the close fellowship within the congregation and the organization of the church. However, when we remember his previous views, his comments show that his visit had a remarkable effect on him. Perhaps

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The Growing Church (2)

s we continue to think of the need for the Church of the Lord to grow, we need to remind ourselves of God's purpose for the Church in the world. Paul seemed to have the understanding of this when he wrote, "To me, though I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given, to preach to the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of Christ, and to bring to light for everyone what is the plan of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things, so that through the church the manifold wisdom of God might now be made known..." (Ephesians 3:8-10 ESV).

The many sided wisdom of God for the salvation of mankind, is to be made known through the Church Christ established on the day of Pentecost. If this commission becomes lost because of the denominational influence of the "Christian world" then what is

grown may not be the true Church for which Christ died.

We should spend some time thinking about the God given structure of the Church. To me one of the sad commentaries on the Church in Canada is the fact that so many congregations have existed for many years and have never been led by a scriptural eldership. Surely, congregations can exist and accomplish some wonderful things in the Lord's work without an eldership, but a qualified and committed eldership will give an important foundation to the work of a local congregation.

Fundamental in the mind of Paul was that elders should be put in place to lead the Lord's Church. He wrote to Titus, "This is why I left you in Crete, so that you might put what remained into order, and appoint elders in every town as I directed you..." (Titus 1:5 ESV). In this direction and the instruction given to Timothy regarding leadership, we should be impressed with the need of developing an eldership in every congregation.


Blessed is the congregation that has an eldership that understand the work of a shepherd in the local flock. Psalm 23 gives clear details of what is expected of a shepherd. One of these is the protecting of the flock. Other aspects of the shepherds (elders) feed into this protecting, but surely it begins with the elders having the courage to stand up and fight every enemy who

would destroy the Church. Surely this begins by their knowing the word of God and being sure the food that is distributed to the flock is nourishing and free of harmful elements.

James Orr, in "The Christian View of God and the World" said "If there is a religion in the world which exalts the office of teaching, it is safe to say that it is the religion of Jesus Christ". In describing the qualities of the elders to Titus, Paul said "He must hold firm to the trustworthy word as taught, so that he may be able to give instruction in sound doctrine and also to rebuke those who contradict it" (Titus 1:9 ESV). Sadly, it is the failure of some church leaders to know, love and teach the truth of God that is contributing to the failure of some congregations to faithfully fulfil the commission of Christ.

This leadership of the elders will be both from the public platform and in private discussion and teaching. What might be called the pastor-teacher ministry is one of the principle means by which the elders' leadership and vision is communicated to the congregation.

The words of Paul in Acts 20 and those of Peter in 1 Peter 5, verify that continued on page 15

I Marvel

The story of Paul is truly an inspiring one. We know that the first mention of Saul in the Bible is noting that he was zealously seeking to kill Christians—those who were being converted to the teachings of Christ. He apparently hated Christians because they were posing what he considered to be a threat to his beliefs and the teachings of the Jews.

Paul was known for his harshness and cruelty in killing Christians. It is likely that those who were now Christians were frightened by him, and the word had spread far and wide that this man was seeking to destroy anyone who believed in Christ. We don't know how many people he was personally responsible for slaying—we know that he was present at the stoning of Stephen. He obviously believed that he was doing what was right.

The amazing thing about Paul was that, when he was taught the truth about Christ—confronted on the road to Damascus—his enthusiasm was immediately transferred to the cause of Christ. He was converted and began right away teaching and preaching about Christ.

While Paul worked so diligently to destroy Christians, convinced that it was for the good, he was able to put all of those beliefs and practices aside and begin putting all of his energies to work for Christ. Paul spoke out plainly and loudly about what he believed and didn't really worry about what others thought of him. When the Christians heard that he had been converted, you can be sure that they questioned the truth and sincerity of that move. After all, how could one who so deliberately and maliciously killed believers suddenly be doing the exact opposite, trying to win souls to Christ? We can understand how they could doubt him.

When we look at all that Paul went through once he became a follower of Christ, we should marvel at his character and behavior. Among the trials suffered by Paul were imprisonment on several occasions, shipwreck and persecution. And yet, he continued with his preaching.

If anyone had a reason to step back and take a breather from the cause, it was Paul. But he saw the urgency of continuing to spread the Word no matter what befell him. He used the circumstances in which he found himself to preach. While in prison, he was heard singing and was able to teach the jailer and his household. When shipwrecked, he taught the people who rescued and fed them.

Paul's example of diligence is one that we should all try to emulate. We will probably never face the same persecution and mistreatment that Paul experienced. And we need to step up in boldness to share the good news. But somehow, we manage to come up with excuses that keep us from doing that. We are afraid to talk to our fellow workers about Christ because we don't want to hurt their feelings or be made fun of. We don't want to have ruined relationships or be rejected. We fail to speak to our family members who aren't saved because we don't want to be rejected or make them think that we think we're better than they are. We don't speak with our friends about Christ because we don't want to lose their friendships.

Where is our zeal for spreading the truth to those we love? Paul had a passion for teaching about Christ. We, for the most part, are lacking greatly in this area.

It's interesting that we can be passionate about a sports team, spend mega bucks attending games and keeping up with the scores. We know the names and biographical information of all the members of the team. We don't mind letting our friends know who our favorite team is, even it it's not their team.

We have a political party that we defend and support, no matter what our friends and family think. We don't hesitate to let our stance be known in that arena.

Why, then, are we too hesitant to show passion for Christ? We don't have to stand on the street corners with a Bible in our hands, sermonizing about God. But we can be vocal about our spiritual beliefs. We can speak up if someone tells an off-colour joke in our hearing or uses the Lord's name in vain in

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our presence. We can decline an invitation to go to an R-rated movie with someone. We can decide that our children cannot participate in sports or extracurricular activities at worship and Bible study times. We can take a stand for our beliefs. We can live lives that show that we are different from the world and have something to look forward to.

Matthew 6:33 tells us to seek God's kingdom first. Can we in all honesty say that we are doing this?

How many decisions do we make without even thinking about what God would want us to do or how it will affect the lives of those around us? If we want to spread the word of God, we must begin by living a life that clearly shows where we stand. It might not always be easy. We can gain courage to be bold from the example of Paul's life. Read all you can about him—and get started!

we can consider why. It seems obvious that he did not attend a worship assembly that was flat and lifeless and where the singing was tedious. He notes that they "sure sing well." He observes that there "was not a lot of heavy emotion." It appears that the teaching he heard was solid and Biblical. It appears that the service was intelligent, that it engaged his mind and challenged his understanding in a way that opened his heart to begin re-assessing his previous impressions. Overall, it seems that the simplicity took his mind back to his understanding of early Christianity.

There is a danger that we might celebrate Campbell's comments as a vindication of "our rightness." It is only human to be pleased and find satisfaction in a report like this. Our main concern is not to prove that we are right and others are wrong. We should not "preach ourselves." Our goal is to follow Christ and stand on His Word. As well, we should encourage others to do the same. Our conviction is that the power to teach and convict people is in God's Word. This is where we learn about Jesus Christ and His church.

What Campbell reminds us is that there is a picture of the church presented in Scripture that should be present today. In this picture, there is one unified body, not many fragmented ones. There are people known for their relationship with their Saviour, Christians. These people assemble weekly to remember His death and resurrection through the Lord's Supper and to teach and encourage each other in singing and instruction. And that these people are committed, not to the human creeds and statements of faith of the denominational word, but to the simple and clear teaching of the truths of the Bible.

Campbell's comments should serve to rekindle our pursuit of New Testament Christianity.



Japanese Information and Relief Information

s of Sunday, April 10, Bramalea church of Christ had received \$14.588 from across Canada from Victoria, British Columbia, to Mill Village, Nova Scotia, as individuals and congregations contributed. We praise God for the generosity of Canadian Christians. Donations to Park Avenue Church of Christ in Memphis, Tennessee, totalled \$109,000 at last report. Funds from both these congregations are being sent to the Mito Church of Christ where Joel Osborne is a missionary. To donate to the Canadian funds, please make cheques out to Bramalea church of Christ with a notation for: "Japan Relief."

None of our brothers and sisters in Japan are known dead at this time though one report said two brethren are still missing. However, Yuko Kawamura, who visited Canada in 2009-2010, had to identify the body

of her best friend. Ava. and Ava's two small children. Joel, missionary to Mito, along with one of the area preachers, Shiro Obata, and intern Sasha Ingle, were in Sendai on April 12 to contact friends, Christians and relief organizations in an effort to find a good way to serve and help the situation there. Sasha had prepared food for them so they would not burden the Sendai brethren. They also took batteries, garbage bags, water. fruit juices and socks to distribute in Sendai. Joel says they were in the car on the highway when the latest earthquake hit. The highway was shut down so the normal 3-hour trip became closer to six hours. He asks for prayers that he, brother Obata and Sasha, will be discerning in their assessment. He also asks for prayers for the Mito team forming and planning to go to Sendai from April 29 to May 7.

In his April 7 prayer report Joel states: "Please continue to pray. Also, please consider giving generously to help us with the recovery. This will take a long time to rebuild. Many think Japan is a wealthy nation so there is no need—but there IS need. Please give so that Christians here may help their communities and those who have experienced great loss. My understanding is that the news has primarily focused upon the nuclear situation and people's/nation's emotional reactions rather than on the stories of people who are living in shelters, who have lost family, home and livelihood. In fact, in some news, you cannot find anything about Japan already.

Please do not forget. Please remember, please give and please pray. Thank you to so many who have helped already! For updates on the Japanese situation—and for the

ongoing relief efforts of many in the US and Canada, check Facebook: Jonathan Walter Straker, or "Working and Praying for Japan Earthquake Victims." Ben and Erica Berry, former missionaries to Japan. are scheduled to move to Mito, Japan, in May 2011, to begin fulltime work as vocational missionaries teaching English for the American English Teachers organization. not the same thing as... a part of.

Let me suggest then, that Satan loves it when as many people as possible...are 'not far'. He wants them close. He wants them so close to the kingdom that they believe that they're in it. He wants them secure in that closeness and immune to the gospel.

The night that Jesus was betrayed, He prayed for his disciples (John 17). That prayer was all about truth. Jesus asked His Father for two things: things that His disciples would need once He was no longer with them. During His ministry—Jesus protected them from Satan. He did that in large part by teaching them the words of the Father (Jo. 17:14). They had believed what He said, and because they'd believed it, the world, Satan's world hated them. Now that He was leaving and going back to heaven, Jesus asked for protection.

Here is what He prayed: "I do not ask you to take them out of the world, but to keep them from the evil one. They are not of the world, even as I am not of the world. Sanctify them in the truth; Your word is truth. "As You sent Me into the world, I also have sent them into the world. For their sakes I sanctify Myself, that they themselves also may be sanctified in truth".

Jesus asked for divine protection in the area of truth. He did that because truth is the first thing that Satan takes away. So Jesus asked for the safety and protection of God's sanctifying truth.

Now lest we miss the point, the truth that sets us apart is the truth that makes us one. Sanctifying truth is unifying truth. The way that it works is like this. When God's truth sanctifies two people, it joins each of them to Jesus. And when two people are both joined to Jesus, they are joined to each other. So, the unity of God's people is not something that we create. It is the

work of God and it is accomplished through the truth. Each Christian is united *in* Christ only with those who have been united *with* Christ.

Sanctification happens when we believe and obey the word of God. As the apostle Paul would put it years later, our job is to maintain the unity created by the Holy Spirit. But that unity is the product of the truth, which is given by the Spirit of truth. It is brought about by the word of God. You and I can destroy unity, but we cannot create it. We cannot create unity in Christ any more than we can create our own word of truth to sanctify ourselves. Once united with Jesus, He keeps us safe by giving us His word of truth. That's where the scriptures come in. Whenever false doctrine endangered the church, the Holv Spirit fought back. He inspired men to write and protected the church with the truth.

Jesus made two 'truth' promises to His apostles. Both of them were going to be kept by the Spirit of Truth. The first promise looked to the past. Jesus promised to give the apostles... total recall. God's Spirit would cause them to remember all that Jesus had taught them. The second promise looked to the future. At that time, the disciples were not ready for the whole truth. They were not even ready for the crucifixion. So Jesus promised them that after He left, the Holy Spirit would come upon them and that they would be clothed with power from on high. The Spirit of God would lead them into all the truth. He would guide them and teach them all of those things that they were not yet ready to hear. And that is what happened... starting on Pentecost.

Jesus said: "But when He, the Spirit of truth, comes, He will guide you into all the truth; for He will not speak on His own initiative, but whatever He hears, He will speak; and He will disclose to you what is to come. "He will glorify Me, for He will take of Mine and will disclose it to you" (Jo. 16:13-14).

The words of Jesus are not just found in the *red letter* sections of the gospels. The New Testament is from start to finish, the words of Jesus. The New Testament does not merely contain the word of God, *it is* the word of God. It was and it still is divine protection in the area of truth... for Satan is a liar and the "father of lies".

Now the bible does not recognize many different orders of truth. There is only the regular garden-variety that you and I use every day. The scriptures are not only inspired but are also factual historical documents. They give us an accurate record of real events. The reason why the gospel of Jesus Christ is the truth that sets us free. is because all of the events recorded in the New Testament actually took place. There is such a thing as truth that is always true. God's word is always true and without it we cannot be saved.

MISCELLANEOUS BRIEFS:

The World Bible Translation Centre participated in a Forum of Bible Agencies-International in Edinburgh, Scotland, where, in a spirit of unity and purpose in early April, agencies met to discuss the global impact of the Word of God. Christians are asked to petition God to open a door of financial provision for U.S. state legislatures as they wrestle with how to balance budgets without terminating life-changing programs. Of most concern are proposals to terminate chaplains in correctional institutions who distribute Bibles. In a number of prisons there are ongoing services each week, some of which have been arranged by their chaplains in cooperation with churches of Christ.

With both Canada and the U.S. having obtained freedom through a struggle with their mother country, there is sympathy and concern for the Arab-speaking nations as their countries struggle to obtain liberty from oppression. Christians are praying that they are able to choose leaders who have a relationship with our God and who will allow people to worship with freedom. An "Easy-To-Read" version of Arabic Bibles are already being distributed, with more ready to ship from the World Bible Translation Center. God is being praised with thanksgiving for completion of the "Rwandan Literacy Reader and Workbook" for students who are using them to learn to read English as they gain a knowledge of the Scriptures.

A ministry partner of the World Bible Translation Centre is setting up a studio in the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex to record videos and audios for Iranians who are searching for Christianity. The translation team in Haiti continues to struggle with disease, political unrest and poor economic conditions as they work to finish Easy-to-Read scriptures for distribution to

the masses who so desperately need assurance and hope for the future.

Nuclear plant workers in Japan have exposed their bodies to high levels of radiation to help stop additional catastrophes and loss of life. As opportunities arise, volunteers who have travelled to the island to do what they can are also presenting the Good News to those who are hurting from the loss of family and friends, homes and livelihood. (Excerpts from Weekly Prayer List put out by World Translation Centre)

CAMBODIA: Six days into the New Year saw John Bailey, Terry Doughty, Danny Carrigan and Hutton Brown arrive in Phnom Penh to participate in a large medical mission where hundreds of people were introduced to Jesus Christ for the first time. Many had never even heard the name before, but Bible classes were conducted as they waited their turns for treatment. As a result of the teaching and follow-up with those who indicated an interest in further study, there were 93 baptisms, with each new Christian directed to one of the 20 house churches that have been planted over the last three years. A Cambodian, Sokhom Hum, is instrumental in arranging this effort. A total of 72 workers from Cambodia, New Zealand, the Philippines, Vietnam and the US saw 14,714 patients. More than 2,000 pairs of prescription glasses were fitted, hundreds of teeth extracted, thousands of prescriptions written and filled, along with the performing of numerous minor surgical procedures. The organization, "Body and Soul", formed by John Bailey several years ago, was the primary source of funds for all of the medications and supplies needed for this effort.

INDONESIA: When Dr. John Bailey and Danny Carrigan left for the Philippines and Indonesia on March 1, they didn't know that they would be delayed on their trip home by one of the worst disasters ever to hit our world. After stops in Cebu, Philippines, to assess the "Good News Clinic", a well-run medical care centre which treats an average of 200 patients a day, and the Arapal Camp where Salvador Cariaga has overseen the transformation of rocky hillsides into beautiful banana

plantations and vegetable gardens, (along with his promotion of goat raising for many families formerly living in abject poverty), he then went to Jakarta for the opening of a new orphanage named as a tribute to Dr. Bailey's grandson, Connor Brown, who died at the age of 12. After worshipping with a small congregation on Sunday, the men flew to Medan, Indonesia, where they were met by Andrew Banjarnahor, to be driven another five hours to Btak Land. They spent the night on the shores of Lake Toba, and were up early for Dr. Bailey to speak at a 7:00 a.m. chapel service at the Lutheran Hospital. A cataract surgery camp started at 10 a.m. and 93 eye surgeries were done before the end of the day. After post operation care was given the following day, equipment and supplies were moved to Sidikalong, where 123 surgeries were completed, exceeding by 16 the hopedfor combined 200. Their flight back to the U.S. was to connect at the Narita International Airport, north of Tokyo. As the plane approached for landing, the pilot was advised that the airport had been closed because of an earthguake. They were diverted to Nagova. and from there to Seoul, South Korea, reaching home some 36 hours later than their planned arrival.

TANZANIA: In a letter of appreciation for materials shipped from Mission Printing, Inc. in Arlington, TX., a man in Mbeya wrote that all parcels received in his country had to be inspected by the Revenue Authority. He said that they found "good news" in the boxes to him that they opened, and asked if he would give them some of the contents. One of the inspectors explained, "You know, sir, we are so tighten up (hardened)." The man distributed two boxes among them of the tracts and booklets he thought might be the most helpful. The news reached the postal officer, and when he went back to redeem more, she asked, "Why didn't you give me some of the materials that you gave the Revenue Postal people?" He apologized and promised to bring her some the following day, which he did. Can you imagine such a happening today in most countries of the world?



Report on Mission Effort in Saguenay, QC

(The following report is from Mark Tonkery, Evangelist, Laings, OH, Church of Christ http://laingschurchofchrist.org. I have known Mark for many years and appreciate his sending this report on work done by 20 US brethren and himself in Saguenay. mec)

Wanted to give a report on the work we did in Quebec, Canada, March 12-24, 2011. Our mission trip was to Saguenay, Quebec, a lake region in Quebec with many cities. It is located 6 hours north of the U.S. border. There is only one congregation of the church of Christ for 272,000 people in the area. The two closest congregations are located in Quebec City (2.5 hours away) and in Baie-Commeau (4 hours away) which is another new congregation in which Jean Grenier has been involved.

I went with a group of 10 faithful Christians from Iowa and Ohio; another group of about 10 people came in after us. Both groups were led by Michael Richardson, a missionary from Iowa, USA. (His web page is: http://grandviewchurchofchrist.org/missions/richardson/).

We worked with Jean Grenier, the preacher in Saguenay. Along with Garrett McGilvray, who is trying to raise support to work with this congregation as a full time missionary. He



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is now in Mabelvale, Arkansas, while trying to raise funds.

The congregation was planted in 1996 and was meeting in rented office spaces and a hotel until recently when they found a permanent building. The congregation, of about 15-20 members, now meet in a barn that is being converted into a church building. This renovation has created much interest and support in the community.

Our job for the first week was to help the congregation move closer to allowing the Canadian officials to open the building for the public. We were able to frame and finish outside walls of the upstairs classrooms, build another washroom, (the building now has two functioning washrooms), repair the baptistry and other smaller maintenance items.

Due to my preaching responsibilities in Ohio I had to return before the second week began. The plan for the second week was to be more of a spiritual nature according to Garrett. Thirty people attended service on March 20 and there was a dinner after services. Sermons presented in English and French were:

- 1. Fellowship in the Word of God Jean Grenier
- 2. Fellowship in Christ Garrett McGilvray
- 3. Fellowship in the Local Congregation David Long
- 4. Fellowship in the Brotherhood Wayne Brewer

Also during this week there were Bible studies with individuals as well as distribution of Gospel Tracts. (Garret plans to post more about this week on his web page).

The church building is expected to be completed in about a year to a year and a half. Some of the uses for the building after it is finished will be for worship and Bible Study as well as a mission training school, yearly Bible camp and Bible classes to train the ladies for Bible school teachers.

I also had the privilege of speaking three times in our daily devotions and to visit with Jean and Garrett. They made me aware of another need the congregation has and that is for French songbooks. The French songbooks cost about \$30.00 each. The congregation in Saguenay, Quebec, is unable to purchase these songbooks, so I made a commitment to try to raise \$900.00 to purchase 30 songbooks. elders are to shepherd the congregation. In this work the eldership must clarify direction, set goals, evaluate results, plan, make hard decisions, correct failures, affect change and motivate the congregation. Shepherding the flock of God is constant work. Predators do not take vacations or leave the flock of God alone.

God speaks through Zechariah (11:15) about the "foolish shepherd". In speaking about this verse, the Bible Exposition Commentary says, "The word "foolish" doesn't mean "stupid" but "morally deficient, corrupt" because he doesn't receive God's truth. He's also called "a worthless (idle) shepherd," because he doesn't care for the sheep. Unlike the Good Shepherd, he doesn't seek the lost, care for the young, feed the flock, or heal the injured. All he does is slaughter the flock to feed himself!" Spiritual laziness can be a huge problem in the church community and among a leadership who see themselves as "office holders" rather than "committed shepherds" with responsibility for the care, feeding, protection and godly direction of the church.

Why do we have so many congregations without elderships? In "Biblical Eldership – An Urgent Call To Restore Biblical Church Leadership", Alexander Strauch writes, "When the church eldership is viewed as a status or board position in the church there will be plenty of volunteers... but when it is viewed as a demanding, pastoral work, few will rush to volunteer". One can be sure that biblical leadership cannot exist in an atmosphere of nominal Christianity.

We need men who truly love the Lord, His people and His Church and are willing to grow in their Christian life to be able to serve as elders. We need men like those described by Philip Keller in *A Shepherd Looks at Psalm 23*. "All the care, all the work, all the alert watchfulness, all the skill, all the concern, all the self-sacrifice are born of His love—the love of One who loves His sheep, loves His work, loves His role as a Shepherd".

Can the Church grow without an eldership? Yes, it can, however, the plan of Christ for His Church is that it be led by a caring and qualified eldership. In working to see the church grow let us work to grow such elderships.
