

Sustaining Moments

iving the Christian life is often filled with challenges and struggles as we deal with the temptations that are continually presented to us by the god of this world. He is devious in his ways and is good at making what he offers look really good and useful. He is able to lull us into letting down our guard or convincing us he is really trustworthy and does not intend us harm but wants to help us get everything we wish.

The first example of this trait of Satan is seen in Genesis 3:1-6, "Now the serpent was more crafty than any other beast of the field that

the LORD God had made. He said to the woman. "Did God actually say, 'You shall not eat of any tree in the garden'?" (Sarcasm) And the woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden, but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the midst of the garden, neither shall you touch it, lest you die." But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not surely die. *(lie)* For God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." (lie) So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise. (lust of the flesh, lust of the eye, pride – a three-part *temptation*) she took of its

fruit and ate, and she also gave some to her husband who was with her, and he ate".

Do you suppose Satan has changed? Do you think you are immune to his lies? He knows how to reach you when you are your most vulnerable. That is why we need to have those times that I am calling "Sustaining Moments". Times that will help us be prepared for those sneak attacks. What can provide us with these needed sustaining moments?

One is a daily time of devotion. It is so easy for us to lose sight of the importance of starting the day

by preparing for the things that the forces of evil will throw our way. This may require that we begin our day a bit earlier so we can talk with God in prayer about the ups and down that may come our way in the hours before us. Thanksgiving for the night of rest and strength for the day ahead are good subjects of that prayer. Asking for the strengthening of the Holy Spirit when facing whatever temptations come are recommended as well. Consider our Saviour as the best example. Several times Jesus went away from the crowds to spend time in prayer. It would have been wonderful if the gospel writers had been able to record for us His prayers. Can you relate to the words of Paul in 2 Corinthians 4:7-9 (ESV) "But we have this treasure in jars of clay, to show that the surpassing power belongs to God and not to us. We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed..."


And from time to time reading of Hebrews 11 can remind and strengthen us because we know the God that sustained all those faithful disciples of God will sustain us as well. Remember, "Now to him who is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think, according to the power at work within us..." – Ephesians 3:20 (ESV).

Also, being able to have visiting preachers and members stay with us when in our community has made it possible to get to know some wonderfully committed Christian brothers and sisters whose influence continues to encourage and strengthen us daily.

These are some of my "Sustaining Moments" and I recommend them to you. I know these things can strengthen and empower you for the fight and will help you win!

Memory, Identity and Unity

pril 9, 2017 marked the one hundredth anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge. Special observances were held at the site of the original battle in France as well as at Vimy Ridge memorials across Canada. The World War I battle marked a significant milestone in the war, as four divi-

sions of Canadian troops from across Canada, assisted by a division from Great Britain and British artillery, overcame the German positions.


The significance of the battle was greater than the Canadian victory. For the first time, the four divisions battled as a unified force. The Vimy Foundation, on its website, says, "the impressive victory over German forces is often cited as the beginning of Canada's evolution from dominion to independent nation." They note that the Vimy Foundation is working "so that all Canadians understand the importance of Vimy to the nation's identity." A CBC News website report about Vimy noted, "At the fiftieth anniversary (of the battle), former prime minister Lester Pearson used it as a call for national unity." The report quotes historian Tim Cook who stated that 'the country was never the same afterwards." He observed that each generation has varied its assessment of the meaning of the battle. We should note that like Remembrance Day, there is a strong desire to pass on its memory to younger generations. "Lest we forget."

Remembering the past can be a very important part of the present and future. What happened in the past helped determine identity. In the Old Testament, remembering was important. A pile of stones placed by the Jordan was to remind future generations that the waters of the Jordan were cut off before the ark of the covenant of the Lord. Mounts Ebal and Gerazim reminded Israel of the curses and blessings of the Covenant. The Passover was a lasting reminder that God delivered His people from Egyptian slavery. The events so commemorated were important to Israel's identity as God's covenant people and were intended to help bring the nation together.


The Lord's Supper has the same purpose. When Jesus met with the apostles in the upper room on the evening before his death, he gave a new meaning for the bread and cup: "This is my body...this is my blood...Do this in remembrance of me." We often refer to this as a memorial feast. As Paul wrote, by partaking of the Lord's Supper, we proclaim the Lord's death. It is an affirmation of our faith and a sharing, not only in the elements but also the remembering - that through the cross – the event this memorializes – we are the people of God, purchased by the blood of Christ. In partaking, we share/participate/have fellowship with Christ and His body. Like the memorials of the Old Testament, the Lord's Supper not only reminds us of the sacrifice of Christ, it underscores our identity as part of the body of Christ. Thus, while we partake individually, we also do it corporately, as part of the body. The church at Corinth was badly divided: Jew/Gentile, rich/poor, gifted/ungifted, you name it. The division was such that Paul said that it was not the Lord's Supper that they ate. They likely had the right elements, but their divisive attitudes, their animosity toward one another, contradicted their claim to be followers of Christ and members of His body (and therefore one another). Excluding parts of the body in their hearts excluded them from Christ. Thus they were not discerning or recognizing the body.

At the Lord's Supper, we often hear it suggested that this is the high point of our worship assembly. We may not want to make one part of the assembly more important than any of the others, however, in this observance we gather to remember the death of our Lord. As thousands of Canadians gathered around the world to remember the sacrifices of nearly 3,600 Canadian men who died at Vimy Ridge, we gather to remember that Jesus gave his life as the ultimate and final sacrifice for our sins. He gives us our salvation, our identity as the adopted children of God and brings us together, as one, as His people. This is an important time to remember and reconnect with our purpose and identity.

May we approach this time, each week, with the seriousness and reflection it deserves. We are remembering one who died – a cruel, horrific death. We are also celebrating the forgiveness and life he gives. We are looking forward to our eternity with Him and all who are part of His body. We "proclaim the Lord's death until He comes."

Caricature or Character?

7ou are apt to find them wherever there will be a large number of people passing by - fairs, festivals, amusement parks, tourists areas. I am referring to those artists who earn money by sketching caricatures of anyone willing to give them a few dollars and a few minutes of their time. Caricatures exaggerate one or more physical features and thus present a distorted, yet recognizable picture of the subject. They are intended to be humorous rather than accurate. Such pictures of ourselves or famous people may be amusing but caricatures of God are not funny. Exaggerating one of God's attributes presents a distorted view which can prevent one from having the relationship with God that He desires us to have or it may even turn one away from Him all together.

There are some who see God portrayed as an angry, demanding judge – watching and waiting – ready to punish us should we mess up. Such a

picture will inspire fear and dread but certainly will not encourage love and devotion. "There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear. For fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not been perfected in love" - 1 John 4:18 (ESV).

In the opposite extreme is the picture of God as a loving, doting, grandfatherly figure who grants wishes and overlooks sin and error. This is not only a dis-

torted view of God but also of love as it ignores the fact that parental love includes discipline. "And have you forgotten the encouraging words God spoke to you as his children? He said, 'My child, don't make light of the Lord's discipline, and don't give up when he corrects you. For the Lord disciplines those he loves, and he punishes each one he accepts as his child" - Hebrews 12:5,6 (NLT). Nor does this view lead to the godly lives which God expects of His children since He is seen as one who will accept them no matter how they live. But Peter tells us, "Since everything will be destroyed in this way, what kind of people ought you to be? You ought to live holy and godly lives as you look forward to the day of God and speed its coming" - 2 Peter 3:11, 12a (NIV 1984). When faced with trials or disappointed by prayers seemingly unanswered, one may become discouraged and reject God. Unfortunately, this is currently a very popular caricature of God.

Both of these are exaggerations. God is a righteous judge. "He will judge everyone according to what they have done. He will give eternal life to those who keep on doing good, seeking after the glory and honor and immortality that God offers. But he will pour out his anger and wrath on those who live for themselves, who refuse to obey the truth and instead live lives of wickedness. There will be trouble and calamity for everyone who keeps on doing what is evil-for the Jew first and also for the Gentile. But there will be glory and honor and peace from God for all who do good-for the Jew first and also for the Gentile. For God does not show favoritism" - Romans 2:6-11 (NLT).

And He is a loving Father. "For God loved the world so much that he gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life. God sent his Son into the world not to judge the world, but to save the world through him. There is no judgment against anyone who believes in him. But anyone who does not believe in him has already been judged for not believing in God's one and only Son" – John 3:16-18 (NLT).

These two attributes balance and blend with all His other characteristics. If we are to grow in our faith and our relationship with our Heavenly Father we must have a clear, accurate picture of Him. He has given us such a picture in His Word. It is the only place we will find a true portrait of God. We see a caricature when our mental image of God is distorted by misinformation that we hear and by a lack of Biblical knowledge. Turn to the pages of Scripture and see how God describes Himself.

Following the incident of the golden calf and the breaking of the stone tablets (Exodus 32), Moses asked to see God's glory. "Then Moses said, 'Now show me your glory.' And the LORD said, 'I will cause all my goodness to pass in front of you, and I will proclaim my name, the LORD, in your presence'." – Exodus 33:18, 19a (NIV 1984) When God showed His glory to Moses He also revealed many of His characteristics.

"Then the LORD came down in the cloud and stood there with him and proclaimed his name, the LORD. And he passed in front of Moses, proclaiming, 'The LORD, the LORD, the compassionate and gracious God, slow to anger, abounding in love and faithfulness, maintaining love to thousands, and forgiving wickedness, rebellion and sin. Yet he does not leave the guilty unpunished; he punishes the children and their children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation'." -Exodus 34:5-7 (NIV 1984).

There are seven attributes of God noted in these three verses and all are equally important: compassion, grace, patience (slow to anger), love, faithfulness (His words are trustworthy. His promises secure), merciful (forgiving), just (punishing the guilty). In giving His laws to the Israelites, God often reminded them of His holiness and therefore their need to also be holy. "The Lord also said to Moses, 'Give the following instructions to the entire community of Israel. You must be holy because I, the Lord your God, am holy'." - Leviticus 19:2 (NLT). Another characteristic noted when handing down the Law is found in Exodus 34:14. "You must worship no other gods, for the Lord, whose very name is Jealous, is a God who is jealous about his relationship with you" (NLT). He will settle for no less than wholehearted devotion from His children. This is not an exhaustive list. There are others.

Just as our character is revealed through our actions, so it is with God. We see God's actions throughout the pages of the Bible, not

just in the Old Testament. Like it or not, we have physical features like our parents and other ancestors. In the same way, we find God's characteristics displayed in His Son, Jesus Christ. Therefore,

we can learn much about God by studying the life of Jesus. "Philip said to him, 'Lord, show us the Father, and it is enough for us.' Jesus said to him, 'Have I been with you so long, and you still do not know me, **Philip? Whoever has seen** me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'?" - John 14:8, 9 (ESV). We need to study the entirety of Scripture in order to see a complete and clear picture of God.

Caricatures are recognizable but inaccurate. We realize that and that fact is what makes them fun. They may be a humorous way to depict people, but it is dangerous to portray God in caricature form because it will prevent us from drawing close to the One, True God.





The case of Peter and John on trial for speaking about Jesus comes to mind. Their courage astounded his accusers and caused them to note "that these men had been with Jesus" (Acts 4:13). They showed such courage before an accusing court with the power of life and death. Have we been with Jesus? Do we have the desire and courage to show, admit, declare our relationship with Jesus before our associates who have no real power over us other than that of belittlement and bullying? These disciples declared, "For we cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard" (v.20).

Note the contrasts here. Some who, even though in no real danger, make efforts to keep their faith hidden and others who CANNOT HELP making it known under the very real threat of suffering and death.

A realization of the magnitude of our blessings in Christ would seem to compel us to show and declare them. Even ordinary, everyday good news is normally shared so as to share in the rejoicing. What greater good news than the Gospel of Salvation?

In his letter to the Ephesians, Paul addresses the subject of Christian growth and writes of the mature Christians "who will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching... Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will in all things, grow up into him who is the Head. That is Christ." (Eph.4:14, 15). Do we have a compulsion to "speak the truth in love"? It is good news! Paul wrote, "We also believe and therefore speak." (2 Cor.4:13).

Besides the possible persecution/intimidation/embarrassment referred to above, there is the discouragement of finding our efforts to appear futile, ineffective and fruitless. When Jeremiah faced such a situation and decided to keep silent, he found that he could not do so, for "the word was like fire in his bones and he could not hold it in." (Jer.20:9).

According to John 8:32, the truth makes men free. Let us live it and speak it as faithful disciples of Christ. Sometimes we hesitate or keep silent feeling that the message is not likely to be welcomed and might very well offend. Hopefully, the gualification given in this text, that we speak the truth in LOVE will help to solve this. When genuine love, concern is obvious the message/conversation is much more likely to be considered rather than resisted/rejected. Paul stated that knowing "what it is to fear the Lord' resulted in his efforts "to persuade men" (2 Cor.5:11). Let us "Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that vou have. But do this with gentleness and respect," (1 Pet.3:15).

(Ed. Note: If you are living in an area where the church has seemed to be declining, drab, slowing down, here are a collection of amazing facts to give you a lift and prove to you that as a whole, Christ's body is alive and well!)

DID YOU KNOW that in 2016 churches of Christ in 20 states gave and used \$13,233,902.68 to come to the rescue of people devastated by storms, floods, tornadoes, fires, hurricanes, earthquakes and other disasters? With a permanent staff of only 14, they were able to do this by using the responses of congregations in the area of the disaster, who were quick to accept their supplies of food, water, clothing, clean-up items, whatever was needed, and dispensing it.

DID YOU KNOW that the Healing Hands International organization made up of members from all over the world also received a donation of nearly a million dollars worth of vitamins last year? With the help of volunteers and partners, it was distributed to 15 different mission points in Columbia, Honduras, the Philippines, Mexico, Uganda, Ukraine and Venezuela. Much of the time this was done along with basic health teaching during medical missions.

DID YOU KNOW that the same organization shipped 23 containers of relief supplies, missionary belongings, well drilling equipment, and M.A.G.I. boxes (for children) to 17 different countries? They included China, the Dominican Republic, Haiti, Honduras, Guatemala, Italy, Ivory Coast, Kenya, Liberia, Nicaragua, Panama, South Africa, South Sudan, Swaziland, Tanzania, Zambia and Zimbabwe. **DID YOU KNOW** that they sponsor parties to share a "Women of Hope" program to tell others the possibilities. One example: 100 "Dorcas: Sewing For Jesus" groups representing 11 States made over 20,000 items that were used in medical clinics, disaster relief shipments and M.A.G.I boxes.

DID YOU KNOW that HHI has drilled 876 wells since it was first organized and provided 1,638 water filters where successful wells could not be drilled? Eighty-four were drilled last year and 75 restored. The earthquake altered the flow of so much of Haiti's underground water that it destroyed many of the wells. HHI also responded to victims of Hurricane Matthew in September which included funds, food, water and relief supplies.

DID YOU KNOW that a sustainable agriculture program is being hosted in 11 countries and five U. S. states? In 2016, 4,091 people were trained in the methods which empower them to feed themselves, their families, and teach others. Last year it was largely directed to the famine in southern parts of Africa, especially Zimbabwe, where 767 individuals were trained. Emergency food rations were given to 140 households, 50 individuals and 120 children enrolled at Childhood Development Schools.

DID YOU KNOW that Dennis Matthews, President of Shepherd's Hill International which works in the Philippines, actually saw and experienced a farm of pigs that were odorless?? This happened after organic farming was introduced on one of the poorest islands in that country where Shepherd's Hill is building healthy communities through the "Give A Goat" program, (as well as pigs and chickens). On a visit, he was very skeptical when he was promised a tour of a pig farm which didn't smell like-well, pigs! He anticipated he would soon smell them as he climbed the hill, but to his amazement, even nose-to-snout, there simply was no odor! As the

cost of feeding pigs can be as high as 75% of their value, this farmer uses plants, fruits, lactic acid from goat's milk and other nutrients to boost the immune system while reducing animal sickness. The owner, who learned about organic farming at seminars, is now teaching in them.

DID YOU KNOW that the Biblical Institute of Central America was established in 1998 with the mission of training evangelists across Central America? In 1998, the first campus was established in Honduras and then in 2004, a second campus in Guatemala. The goal of the Institute is to be rigorous and passionate about training evangelists who are well-prepared and strong in sharing the gospel. The mission is straight from the Bible... "go and make disciples of all nations" (Matt 28:18). For the glory of God, BICA is recognized in Central America as possibly the most influential in saving souls and training evangelists in church the churches of Christ. These people are studying with and training the members of the church to know how to effectively evangelize to the lost. T Through only the work of the students of our institutes, each year more than 1,500 people are baptized. What is unique about BICA? 1. We train missionaries that in the two years of preparation will develop an extraordinary capacity and passion to convert the lost. Each student in his/her two years of training has the experience of presenting more than 700 Bible studies. 2. We send to the mission field, sustainable evangelists that will preach at least 40 years without relying on foreign support. We are not against support but we realize it could be unrealistic to find support for almost 800 graduates from our institutions. QUESTIONS PEOPLE ASK

The Meaning of "for" in Acts 2:38

Bill Craddock

Some teach that the word "for" in Acts 2:38 means "because of", therefore Peter told the people to be baptized because their sins had already been forgiven. Is this true?

There are those who believe and teach that man is saved by "faith only" but still believe that one must be baptized. They view baptism as a work and believe that any work would be trying to be earning salvation. Thus, in order to correlate faith and baptism they teach that the baptism is "an outward sigh of an inward grace." In other words one is to be baptized to show that they have already been saved by faith.

In Acts 2:38 Peter told the people to "...repent and be baptized "for" the remission of sins." The Greek word translated "for" is "*Eis*". We

must understand that to know the real meaning of words in scripture we must understand the meaning in the original language. The New Testament was not written in English but Greek and Aramaic. *Eis* is a Greek word, so what does it mean in Greek? Eis is found 1493 times in the New Testament. 571 times it is translated "into"; 282 times "to"; 208 times "unto", etc. Never in the 1493 is it translated "because of". Eis is always looking to the future, never to the past. It always looks forward to something that will happen, never to something that has already taken place.

To see that teaching *Eis* means "because of", all one has to do is turn to Matthew 26:28 where our Lord instituted the Lord's Supper. In that verse Jesus said, "For this is my blood of the New Testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." Matthew 26:28 has the identical words – both structure and tense as Acts 2:38. If we translate *Eis* "because of" it would force the passage to read: *"For this is my blood of the New Testament, which is shed for many* "because of" the remission of sins." When we use this line of thinking for Matthew 26:28, it makes the Bible say that Christ's blood was shed because sins were already forgiven! We know that the blood of Christ was not shed because men's sins were already forgiven, but so that the sins of men could be forgiven. If *Eis* in Matthew 26:28 means "because of" it would make the death of Christ totally unnecessary. He would have died because man's sins had already been forgiven. We know that is not true.

This only helps to prove that those who teach that *Eis* in Acts 2:38 means "because of" are teaching false doctrine. In the Greek, *Eis* is always looking forward. Peter was telling the multitude then, that now that they realized they were sinners in the sight of God, if they would repent of their sins and be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ their sins would be (future) forgiven. Forgiveness was to come following these necessary acts of obedience.

ur Twitter and Facebook habits make praying harder than ever. Let's take a moment to appreciate the magic of a conscious life, the capacity to focus on one thing, like this article and this unfolding sentence, following it along until it ends with a little dot. No doubt, as a reader, you're fighting the chronic digital urge to skim.

We give our attention because we have attention to give. With our attention we can concentrate on one thing and turn away from another thing. The power to fixate is part of God's miracle in creation. Without attention, faith would be impossible. God not only created us to live and breathe and walk, like His other creatures; He wants us also to believe in Him and to trust His word, to listen. The full scope of

our affectional life becomes precious when we see it as our capacity to pay attention or as the scriptures put it, "take heed."

Mind-setting is the basis of our devotion to Christ, and it gives growth to every love and longing in our heart. What our eyes linger on, our hearts will learn to love. What our hearts love, our eyes will linger on. When by grace Christ becomes the highest prize in our life, then He becomes the supreme focus of our attention. Paul challenges us to "Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things." (Colossians 3:2 NIV).

But in the digital age, our attention faces many endeavors. Each day we give our eyes to movies and new music and books and online articles and viral GIFs and

hot Facebook trends. We have only so many waking hours, only so many caffeinated hours, only so many ways to listen, watch, and read even a small fraction of the content that endlessly pours in from our feeds and our friends.

The span of our attention is of great concern to God. Long before the media age brought with it profound changes in how we reproduced and multiplied pages in the printing press, and long before breaking news (and fake news) buzzed and beeped on our smartphones, God was always concerned with our focus. Gospel faithfulness is about attention. In eighty places in the Bible, God's people are called to take heed, which is the imperative way of saying "pay attention." Just a few occurrences are:

• We must never let the "stuff" of this world cause us to neglect the riches of the gospel — (Matthew 13:22–23).

• We must be sober-minded — (Titus 2:2; 1 Peter 1:13; 4:7; 5:8).

Lighthouse

lighthouse is very significant. It shouts out two things. It says, first of all, there is a hazard. Lighthouses are erected where there are hazards for ships. Where there is no danger there is no need of a light house. Light houses are built to tell captains that there are rocks in this area that will destroy their ships.


