

Feet Quick to Evil

houghts must be clothed in actions. Too often people claim that their hearts are right, but, when evil is afoot, those same people can be found taking part. The talk and the walk must agree. That is the point of the closing words of verse 18 and the point of many other passages of scripture (1 Jn 2:4-6; James 1:22).

Even the apostle of grace makes this clear. Paul tells us that we must, "walk by the Spirit" if we would avoid gratifying the desires of the flesh (Gal 5:16). If we want a right relationship with God, we must be careful how we walk as well as what we think. The two cannot really be kept separate for long.

Eagerness

We must honestly evaluate the eagerness of our walk. What are the things in which we eagerly participate? What are the things done only out of duty?

Many ask themselves, "Do I sometimes have good thoughts and noble intentions?" They are satisfied to say "yes." But the more important question is, "Was there any eagerness in the doing of good?" Most people do some good and some evil. Few are so corrupted as to never do anything good, none (save Christ) so perfect that they never do evil. But in which direction is eagerness shown?

Let us ask ourselves, "Do I sit in the front row at the concert? Do I

arrive early to get a good seat at
the game? Do I arrive the same
way for worship? Am I glad to hear
that there is a work day, or an opportunity to give away clothing, or
some other service opportunity?
Where is the eagerness?"

Planning

We need a plan to change our walk. Physically, most of us learned to walk so long ago that we have forgotten that there was a learning process to it. Spiritually, we act as if our feet should require no training, but such is not the case. We need information to **guide** our walk (Hos 4:6: Mt 15:14: Rom 10:2). We need examples to encourage our walk (Mt 4:19: Mk 3:14; 2 Thess 3:7-9). We need practice to perfect our walk (Philip 4:1-9). We need accountability to maintain our walk (Heb 13:17). The Roman practice of confession is not wrong because confession to a church leader is a bad idea, but because of the claim that the priest stands in the place of God. Purified of that error, confession to a fellow Christian is an excellent idea, and a biblical one (James 5:16).

We need to be careful what we see, what we hear, what we think, because God cares what goes on in our hearts. We also need to be careful where we go, what we do, how we live, because God cares about our walk every bit as much as he cares about our talk.

A False Witness

Once there was a preacher who preached on baptism every Sunday. After a while the congregation was sick of it. The elders spoke to the preacher, but he kept preaching on baptism. Finally, the elders decided to assign the preacher a text and tell him that he must preach from this text. The first text

they assigned was Genesis 1. The preacher began with a reading of the text.

"In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. The earth was without form and void, and darkness was over the face of the deep. And the Spirit of God was hovering over the face of the waters', which brings me to the subject of baptism."

It is comical, although often harmful, when a preacher harps on his own favorite theme. But when God keeps returning to a subject, we should return to it also. Sins of the tongue seem to dominate this passage in Proverbs. Three of the seven things listed as hated by God involve speech.

There are shades of difference between the three sins of the tongue mentioned in this list. A lying tongue could be carelessness about the truth in a general way. A false witness will actually go to court telling lies. One who sows discord may not even tell lies. He may speak the truth, but do so in a way that puts others at odds with one another.

Premeditation

To bear false witness is given separate treatment from "a lying tongue," perhaps because bearing false witness will normally involve premeditation. Sometimes we speak untruths when taken by surprise. We do not know what to say and fear to say something that will hurt others, so we shade the truth. We should not do this. It is a sin, but, when compared to bearing false witness, it may not be as serious. For the one bearing false witness will have premeditated his falsehood. He has had opportunity to remind himself of the duty of truthfulness, and been reminded

of it by being placed under oath, yet has chosen to lie. He speaks out of malice. This is especially sinful (Lk 12:47-48; Num 35:20-21).

Willingness to Harm

Bearing false witness usually implies at least willingness, if not an eagerness, to harm another. It is a form of violence against others (Ps 27:12).

The superlative example of this would be the false witnesses at the trial of Jesus (Mk 14: 56). Note that not everything they said was false. Some of their words were true, but given a false context or implication (Mk 14:58). Such is true with most false witnessing.

Even in lesser cases, a person's reputation, and perhaps his property can be taken from him unjustly, not by physical force, but by the force of false words. This has become particularly easy in our era. An innocent person can

be destroyed by legal fees, or even through a trial by mass media. Even if eventually found not guilty in court, many a person has had his life ruined by a false witness.

Deuteronomy 19:18-19 tells us how to prevent this. Those who tell lies designed to hurt others should be punished to the extent they attempted to do harm. A society, even a church, that fails to heed this instruction is headed for trouble. If those who want to harm others know that they will not themselves be punished, they have nothing to lose in making false accusations.

Arrogant Attitude

Bearing false witness also implies an arrogant attitude toward God himself. It is, in effect, lying to God himself (Acts 5:3-4). It demonstrates a terrible attitude toward the institutions he has ordained. If done in court, it demonstrates disrespect toward his servant, the government (Rom 13:4). If done to church leaders, it shows disrespect to those trying to serve God (Heb 13:17). It often involves the willingness to misuse the name of God (Ex 20:7; Mt 26:63).

It might seem unnecessary to cover this subject. One might think that few readers of the Gospel Herald would perjure themselves either in court or in the church. But it is actually a highly practical lesson. We may tell ourselves that we would never do this, but we might. We say we would not have falsely accused Jesus as those false witnesses did at his trial: but I am not so sure.

Any sinful habit, including that of inaccurate speech, can grow on us. If we begin to speak false-

ly in "minor" matters, we may go on to the point of lying about Jesus (Lk 16:10). I have not known many church members who would bear false witness in an official setting, but I have known a few. They reached that point because they had so often gotten away with dishonesty in the past. All too often the church does not deal with it as we ought.

A hastily stated inaccuracy is bad enough, but false witness, is far worse. We must not condone such conduct: and we are condoning it anytime we continue in fellowship with one who commits it.

God hates false witness. We must hate it also.

Sowing of Discord

The last of the seven things God hates, and the last of the three sins of the tongue listed here, is the sowing of discord. This sin has

> always been among Satan's fundamental tools for harming the church. I do not think that I am exaggerating when I say that wherever you find the church, you will find those who are sowing discord. Satan will see to it.

> The very nature of the church makes it attractive to dysfunctional and destructive people. Sociologists tell us that you will find a higher percentage of dysfunctional people in the church than in society as a whole. It is the one place they can find acceptance, and the one place where they might hope to even rise to leadership. That fact, and Satan's desire to harm the church. means that we must always be vigilant in dealing with this problem.



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Teach

We must teach on this subject. We may have sometimes avoided the subject, or trod lightly regarding it, for fear that someone would think that a certain individual was being targeted. But we must teach the whole council of God (Acts 20:27), all that he commanded us (Mt 28:20). We should do so routinely, not waiting for the problem to come up.

Rebuke

We must also rebuke cases as they occur, gently at first, for we should realize how easy it is to drift into such conduct (2 Tim 2:24-26), but firmly in blatant cases or if someone becomes a repeat offender.

Practice Church Discipline

And we must have the courage to practice biblical discipline. Now

when I speak of practicing biblical discipline, I am not speaking of misapplying biblical texts to give troublemakers every possible advantage. The way we handle church discipline often does just that, it aids Satan.

There is no contradiction between Matthew 18 and Titus 3. The one indicates a three-step process of discipline (Mt 18:15-17). The other commands a shorter and simpler process (Titus 3:10). There is no contradiction because they are not addressing the same subject. Matthew 18 addresses a personal offense (18:15), a matter between two people. Titus 3 addresses someone doing wrong to the family of God (3:10). For too long we have tried to deal with Titus 3 offenses as if they

were Matthew 18 offenses. That is as logical as punishing a murderer according to the jaywalking laws. Paul did not approach Peter privately concerning what Peter had done publicly (Gal 2:14). We should not deal with sowers of discord according to Matthew 18. The proper texts in such cases would be Titus 3 and Proverbs 6.

Refuse to Accept Excuses

We must not accept excuses. Sowers of discord will use scripture as an excuse. Matthew 7 and Matthew 18 will be two of their favorites. But a scripture taken out of context is no excuse for stirring up trouble. The troublemakers rebuked in Galatians, and those confronted in Colossians, evidently used scripture, but they did not use it rightly. The same will be true today.

A frequent defense of those who sow discord in recent years has been to claim emotional problems

or dementia. I sympathize with genuine cases of dementia. I have had to deal with that in my family and I sympathize. But genuine cases of dementia do not become increasingly skillful at deception and prone to concocting elaborate tales. Yes, they lose touch with reality and say ridiculous things; but no, they do not skillfully warp the truth in an effort to make others look guilty.

Sowers of discord will sometimes hide behind the concept of congregational autonomy. It is not good when congregations interfere excessively in one another's business. But sin in the body of Christ is the business of every member of his body. The body of Christ has various local manifestations, but it is one body (Eph 4:4). What hurts one part of the body is of concern to all (1 Cor 12:26). Sowers of discord must not be allowed to cause trouble in one congregation and then


> run to another to escape discipline. Yet it has happened, frequently.

> God hates the sowing of discord. Let us make sure that we do not engage in this hateful practice. Let us learn to deal with those who do engage in it in a firm and timely manner.

> So ends the list of seven things that God hates. If we are going to support he hates. We must be dili-

Finding God in Tragedy

I umboldt — Until recently, this small community in Saskatchewan was relatively unknown. A collision between a bus transporting the Humboldt Broncos hockey team and a tractor-trailer put the town as the first news item across North America.

At the time of this writing, fifteen people were killed and many others hospitalized, some still in critical condition. Many of those killed were healthy young men looking ahead to future hockey careers. Indications are that one of the survivors is paralyzed from the chest down. The often heard question, as with other tragedies, is. "Why?"

Perhaps there is no time in our lives that prompts as much contemplation and discussion about God as a time of tragedy. Infamous events, like 9-11 or the Oklahoma City bombing, which caused devastation and loss of many lives, or personal events, like the loss of a child or other family member, cause grief and pain. There seems to be an unfairness to such loss, creating doubt about the place of a sovereign God in our world. Many have asked, "Where is God?" when we hurt.

Often, in a sincere attempt to console those who are mourning, people will say, "It is God's will." They believe that God is in control, that He knows even when a sparrow falls, and He directs the events of our lives. The question becomes, does God choose or cause tragedies to happen? Or is there something else we need to understand?

Jesus spoke of two tragic events of His day—a tower in Siloam that fell, killing people, and Herod ordering the murder of people who were offering sacrifices. At the time, He was challenging another misunderstanding of tragedy—that bad things happen to bad people. We see the reasoning in the book of Job as his friends suggest that his suffering was God's punishment for his sin. Their poor comfort blamed Job as the author of his own disaster. Similarly, Jesus asked His hearers if the victims of the two tragedies were any more sinful than anyone else.

The attempt to explain pain and tragedy has led to some unfortunate reasoning. Many years ago, Harold S. Kushner, in his book, "When Bad Things Happen to Good People", suggested only two possibilities. Either God is not all powerful or He is not all loving. This seems to be a very inadequate view of God or our suffering.

Are there other options? The writer of Ecclesiastes observes, "The race is not to the swift or the battle to the strong, nor does food come to the wise or wealth to the brilliant or favor to the learned; but time and chance happen to them all." As Peter told Cornelius, God does not show partiality. Paul said that God brings rain on the just and the unjust. Noone has a "get out of tragedy free" card. We all face pain, suffering and loss. Even God did when Jesus died on the cross. Bad things happen. As some have observed when people ask where God was when they encountered tragedy, He was in the same place as when Jesus died.

Our comfort does not come from being able to avoid suffering and trials. Those are a part of life. Rather, Romans 8:28 says that "in all things, God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to His purpose." Our comfort in tragedy is knowing that God will bring good to our grief. It is so encouraging to hear Christians express this in their loss as they say they are watching to see the good that God will bring.

There are no easy answers to why we suffer loss and grief—how we face tragedy. But, there is hope in our God who is all loving and all powerful, and who has promised to be with us whatever happens. Our comfort and strength are found in Him.

"Print Thine Image Pure and Holy"

It has been suggested that imitation is one of the highest forms of flattery. I am not sure that flattery is the best word. However, I am sure you get the idea. A person may walk, talk, play, study, work, etc. like someone they consider to be a good example and perhaps who has success in their life.

In the everyday world this may be the person who looks at a successful sports figure and tries to follow that individuals example of how they play the game. Maybe today, but for sure in the early 2000s, such a star was Canadian Mike Weir, a left handed golfer. Golfers around the world, especially Canadian golfers, saw him

as an example to follow. He won the Masters, one of the major PGA tournaments, becoming one of the few left handers to do so. Many left handers looked to him for inspiration, watching him in warn up, studying his swing and trying to imitate it themselves. Who knew, they may have thought, if I can be like him I too could become good enough to play on the pro tour... and failing that, they could still become a much better golfer than before. Surely, looking to a good example can help one to be better.

I remember when I began preaching full time in 1960, I had opportunity to preach several times, as well as visit for worship services, at a congregation in Ohio before moving to Canada in 1961. At this congregation there was a young boy who seemed to like me very much

and we began to notice that he did several things that mimicked the way I walked, held my song book and my Bible when preaching etc. I have not thought of that young boy for many years and wonder if he continued to reflect me in some of his actions.

It should go without saying that if we have people who mimic us it is abundantly important that we give them a worthy example to follow. Paul reminds us of what this should include, "Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ" – 1 Corinthians 11:1 (ESV). The highest goal we can have is to conduct our lives by following the example of the Master. Part of the reason for the writing of the gospels was

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In many ways He had a much more difficult task than we do as He was marked as an enemy of the Jewish religion and as a threat to the relative peace the people enjoyed in the Roman Empire. For this reason, His every act was watched and judged publicly. Peter writes that if we can endure and live the Christian life it is commendable before God. "For this is the will of God, that by doing good you should put to silence the ignorance of foolish people. Live as people who are free, not using your freedom as a cover-up for evil, but living as servants of God. Honor everyone. Love the brotherhood. Fear God. Honor the emperor.

to allow us to see how Jesus lived

and how He coped with the temptations of daily living. Daily He faced and overcame hardships to serve

God without sin.

Servants, be subject to your masters with all respect, not only to the good and gentle but also to the unjust. For this is a gracious thing, when, mindful of God, one endures sorrows while suffering unjustly. For

what credit is it if, when you sin and are beaten for it, you endure? But if when you do good and suffer for it you endure, this is a gracious thing in the sight of God. For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you might follow in his steps. He committed no sin, neither was deceit found in his mouth. When he was reviled, he did not revile in return; when he suffered, he did not threaten, but continued entrusting himself to him who judges justly.

He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. By his wounds you have been healed. For you were straying like sheep, but have now returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of your souls" – 1 Peter 2:15-25 (ESV).

Spring Renewal

s Spring awakens the earth around us and refreshes our drab winter world with colour and warmth, many of us also get the urge to revive our surroundings by giving our homes a facelift. To do that, it is usually necessary to begin by doing a thorough cleaning. This spring, why not do some sprucing up of your spiritual house – which isn't just any house. It is the home of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 6:19).

Sometimes we don't realize how much clutter has accumulated in our

homes until we start cleaning. The same may be true of our spiritual house. We may not realize how much junk we have in our lives unless we stop and examine

ourselves. It may be that our lives are overdue for a thorough cleaning and freshening up.

Any redo starts with cleaning. However, just getting rid of the trash and dirt is not enough. Repairs may be needed. It may be necessary to replace some things and, if you have not done so for a while, you will likely need to repaint. It is the same in our spiritual lives. We need to clean but we also need to redo—to refresh, revive and restore.

"Because we have these promises, dear friends, let us cleanse ourselves from everything that can defile our body or spirit. And let us work toward complete holiness because we fear God" – 2 Corinthians 7:1 (NLT).

"Since you have heard about Jesus and have learned the truth that comes from him, throw off your old sinful nature and your former

way of life, which is corrupted by lust and deception. Instead, let the Spirit renew your thoughts and attitudes. Put on your new nature, created to be like God—truly righteous and holy" – Ephesians 4:21-24 (NLT).

Scripture gives us several lists of things that need to be cleaned out of our lives.

"Get rid of all bitterness, rage, anger, harsh words, and slander, as well as all types of evil behavior" – Ephesians 4:31 (NLT).

If we have not done any spiritual house cleaning for a while knowing where to begin could also be a problem.

"Let there be no sexual immorality, impurity, or greed among you. Such sins have no place among God's people. Obscene stories, foolish talk, and coarse jokes—these are not for you. Instead, let there be thankfulness to God" – Ephesians 5:3, 4 (NLT).

"Therefore, rid yourselves of all malice and all deceit, hypocrisy, envy, and slander of every kind" – 1 Peter 2:1 (NIV 1984).

When we look at lists like this, we sometimes forget that they were written to Christians—members of the church just like us—not to lost sinners. Bad habits do not disappear overnight and undesirable things can sneak in and build up without our realizing it. The contamination of the world can easily accumulate in our lives just as dust and dirt do in our houses. That is why they need to be cleaned regularly.

In recent months, my husband and I have spent numerous hours cleaning and fixing up our "bunkie". (An empty house left by previous residents in a rather chaotic state.) In cleaning that house, we found it rather overwhelming at first because there was so much to be done that it was difficult to know where to start.

If we have not done any spiritual house cleaning for a while, knowing where to begin could also be a problem. In our house, we started with the kitchen and bathroom so that we would have access to sinks and water for further cleaning. With our spiritual cleaning I would suggest that since it is the root of nearly everything else in our lives, a good place to start is our thoughts and attitudes.

Jesus said it is what is in our hearts that spills out in word and

action. We therefore need to make sure we focus our thoughts and attention on God and what is good.

"A good person produces good things from the treasury of a good heart, and an evil person produces evil things from

the treasury of an evil heart. What you say flows from what is in your heart" – Luke 6:45 (NLT).

"Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will" – Romans 12:2 (NIV 1984).

"Since, then, you have been raised with Christ, set your hearts on things above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things" – Colossians 3:1, 2 (NIV 1984).

"And now, dear brothers and sisters, one final thing. Fix your thoughts on what is true, and honorable, and right, and pure, and lovely, and admirable. Think about things that are excellent and worthy of praise" – Philippians 4:8 (NLT).

One of the cleaners we may need to use on our spiritual house is confession. Confession cuts through pride and helps to repair relationships – both with God and with our brothers and sisters.

"But if we confess our sins to him, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all wickedness" – 1 John 1:9 (NLT).

"Confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The earnest prayer of a righteous person has great power and produces wonderful results" – James 5:16 (NLT).

Forgiveness is another very effective cleanser. It removes anger, bitterness, hatred, malice, discord, etc. This also improves our relationships as well as our emotional and physical health.

"If you forgive those who sin against you, your heavenly Father will forgive you. But if you refuse to forgive others, your Father will not forgive your sins" – Matthew 6:14, 15 (NLT).

"Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you" – Colossians 3:13 (NIV 1984).

"Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you" – Ephesians 4:32 (NIV 1984).

With the bunkie, once the trash was out, the cleaning done, and repairs made, the next step was to brighten and revive with new floors and fresh paint. God's word not only points out the cleaning that needs to be done, it also gives us instructions on improvements that need to be made.

"Imitate God, therefore, in everything you do, because you are his dear children. Live a life filled with love, following the example of Christ. He loved us and offered himself as a sacrifice for us, a pleasing aroma to God" – Ephesians 5:1, 2 (NLT).

"Since God chose you to be the holy people he loves, you must clothe yourselves with tenderhearted mercy, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience. Make allowance for each other's faults, and forgive anyone who offends you. Remember, the Lord forgave you, so you must forgive others. Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds us all together in perfect harmony. And let the peace that comes from Christ rule in your hearts. For as members of one body you are called to live in peace. And always be thankful" – Colossians 3:12 – 15 (NLT).

"As a prisoner for the Lord, then, I [Paul] urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received. Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace" – Ephesians 4:1-3 (NIV 1984).

"Do everything without complaining or arguing, so that you may become blameless and pure, children of God without fault in a crooked and depraved generation, in which you shine like stars in the universe" – Philippians 2:14, 15 (NIV 1984).

"Love must be sincere. Hate what is evil; cling to what is good. Be devoted to one another in brotherly love. Honor one another above yourselves. Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fer-

vor, serving the Lord. Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer. Share with God's people who are in need. Practice hospitality" – Romans 12:9-13 (NIV 1984).

If only one person had been working on cleaning and redoing the bunkie, it would probably still be in the cleaning phase. Thankfully, we have had many hands working on it and so much improvement has been made. We can also be thankful that when it comes to our spiritual house, we do not have to do it on our own. The Holy Spirit wants His house to be clean and beautiful and He will gladly help to accomplish that.

"So all of us who have had that veil removed can see



and reflect the glory of the Lord. And the Lord—who is the Spirit—makes us more and more like him as we are changed into his glorious image" – 2 Corinthians 3:18 (NLT).

"But the Holy Spirit produces this kind of fruit in our lives: love. joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against these things! Those who belong to Christ Jesus have nailed the passions and desires of their sinful nature to his cross and crucified them there. Since we are living by the Spirit, let us follow the Spirit's leading in every part of our lives. Let us not become conceited, or provoke one another, or be jealous of one another" - Galatians 5:22-26 (NLT).

Not all houses need as much work as our bunkie did, but time and the environment take their toll on our houses so all need some freshening up from time to time.

Our spiritual lives are similar. They may not need a major overhaul but might benefit from some sprucing up. Satan may not be able to draw us into a life of sin, completely turning our back on God, but he has subtle ways to wear us down and dull our enthusiasm and tarnish our joy.

Some of the things he uses to do that are discouragement, grief, trials, stress, criticism, boredom, even prosperity. So how do we combat the dirt Satan tracks in and freshen up our spiritual house?

One way is prayer. "Create in me a pure heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me. Do not cast me from your presence or take your Holy Spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of your salvation and grant me a willing spirit, to sustain me" – Psalm 51:10-12 (NIV 1984).

Spend time in the Word. "The law of the LORD is perfect, reviving the soul.

The statutes of the LORD are trustworthy, making wise the simple" – Psalm 19:7 (NIV 1984).

Look outward. Help others. "The generous will prosper; those who refresh others will themselves be refreshed" – Proverbs 11:25 (NLT).

"So let's not get tired of doing what is good. At just the right time we will reap a harvest of blessing if we don't give up. Therefore, whenever we have the opportunity, we should do good to everyone—especially to those in the family of faith" – Galatians 6:9, 10 (NLT).

We need encouragement and we need to encourage others. Therefore, we need to spend time with the saints. And as these verses tell us, that does not just mean at worship service on Sunday morning.

"Let us hold tightly without wavering to the hope we affirm, for God can be trusted to keep his promise. Let us think of ways to motivate one another to acts of love and good works. And let us not neglect our meeting together, as some people do, but encourage one another, especially now that

the day of his return is drawing near" – Hebrews 10:24, 25 (NLT).

"But encourage one another daily, as long as it is called Today, so that none of you may be hardened by sin's deceitfulness" – Hebrews 3:13 (NIV 1984).

"But you, dear friends, must build each other up in your most holy faith, pray in the power of the Holy Spirit, and await the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ, who will bring you eternal life. In this way, you will keep yourselves safe in God's love" – Jude 20, 21 (NLT).

"So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you are already doing" – 1 Thessalonians 5:11 (NLT).

No matter the extent of your Spring sprucing up, be sure to –

"Put on your new nature, and be renewed as you learn to know your Creator and become like him" – Galatians 3:10 (NLT).

ZIMBABWE: "While I was in a village I was tipped off by a reliable source to get out of the country, but unfortunately by now it was late in the night and driving the roads is just too dangerous. For those of you who have visited me in Africa, you will know Triangle Country Motel in Zimbabwe, where I decided to seek refuge for the night, planning to get out of the country at first light. But whilst I was there, a heavily armed military group moved in and basically took over the motel. In the chaos, the motel staff were shocked and did not really know what to do. I managed to slip back to my room (which was in the back and out of the way). I packed my things, locked

the doors and left the back bathroom window open in case I needed a quick escape. I could hear the group talking and drinking until early hours of the morning. When all was silent I did a quick surveillance, noticing everything seemed quiet and people were sleeping. By now it was 4.30 a.m. I headed straight for the border, but was met by military at road blocks all along the way. A trip which should take about 3½ hours took 7½. It was a shake-down at every stop, but the Lord was with me and I was not injured or harmed. It seems the military are not really concerned with the Zimbabwe citizens as they have the president under house arrest and a number of his ministers. They were more concerned about why a foreigner was in the country at this strategic time. Thank you all for your prayers as I believe the power of prayer keeps God's children safe. I have been overwhelmed with messages —thank you, I am home safely and all is well. Please continue to pray for all our brethren in Zimbabwe as this unfolds, that it will all end better for them, that no one is harmed and this does not end in a civil war," wrote Warren Sholtz in his monthly report) (Editorial note: Because of the severe drought in this country, the Salmon Arm church is sending a donation to Warren in order to buy food for farmers whose crops have failed.)


PAPUA NEW GUINEA: "On February 26, the P.N.G. highland provinces suffered a 7.5 magnitude earthquake. The main areas of damage were in the Southern Highland Hela and Enga Provinces. We didn't feel the quake at all in Lae, and I actually found out about it from an Australian news broadcast! One of the hardest hit areas was Tari. where I visited with my cousin last September. I was able to get through to the manager of the lodge where we staved, and he reported damage to some of their buildings, and large cracks, but no injury or loss of life to any of the residents or staff. 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New Zealand, so this was not a new experience for him.

"Watching the devastation on the local news broadcasts has been difficult. The initial quake was followed by several more of 6.0-7.0 magnitude, along with hundreds of tremors, and the people were very frightened and upset. In the past few days fighting has also broken out in the same area with 7 deaths reported, including 2 primary school students, and many houses burned. The army has been sent in, and the aid workers are being removed for their safety. The last confirmed death toll (from the earthquakes) stood at 125, with many more missing as whole villages were buried as the mountains crumbled. Many of the areas are very remote, and the roads have been heavily damaged, so communication has been poor and overseas coverage very limited. The seismic activity in the area seems to have calmed down over recent weeks. However, there have been several large quakes in East and West New Britain in recent days. In Lae we have had a few very minor quakes, the kind that are easily missed if you are moving when they happen. Please pray for the church in the affected areas, as well as everyone suffering loss of family, property and lifestyle as a result. "March was an incredibly busy month. In addition to literacy and the library sessions, I have been teaching a class for the women from 1:00-2:00 p.m. as part of the second term curriculum. Our last class was today. In addition to the regular school schedule, we also had: our classes for the Indagen ladies, (which Miring and I started in September), the first Lae City combined ladies' class for this year, at M.B.C. on the 17th; a birthday party for Rose's younger brother, Pale ("Pa-ley") on the 25th (who turned 17 and cut his very first birthday cake!); and the One Day Youth Camp, which the 3rd year students host annually as their practical, on the 31st. This year there were two baptisms during the camp:

Bikon Waia and Joelene Diring. So we have two new young sisters in Christ." (Excerpts of Report from Ruth Zimmerman)

UKRAINE (UBI NEWS): Over 100 people in each city interested in keeping the Ukrainian Bible Institute alive and well enjoyed two fund-raising dinners and the amazing history of the school unfolded by three speakers each evening. Doug Reeves spoke on the need for such a school and how UBI was started. It was during his four years that they were able to purchase a building for the school and get the Institute legally registered with the Ukrainian government. Jay Don Rogers then summarized highlights of the next 16 years. After getting all the individual

rooms in the building (a 10-year effort) through the whole remodeling process, they were finally able to have a wonderful facility for their staff and students, but which they were able to enjoy only a short two years as then, to their horror, war came and everything that they had worked so hard and so long for in Donetsk was lost. After a few months of not knowing what to do, the decision was made by the Rogers and their staff to relocate in Kiev and begin again. He told how God has blessed this effort and now there are more students than ever, a loval staff and a "sufficient" rented building.

Jay Don then introduced Sasha Maluga, the keynote speaker, who began his personal testimony, basically giving his life story of how he became a Christian and how attending UBI had changed his life. "It was a "tear jerker", Mary Lou wrote, "We learned things we had not known, even after all these vears. We knew he had served 12 years in prison after being involved in a crime which included a murder but that was about it. That night we learned that there were four people killed and he was actually on death row when just 19 years old. Only by God's intervention was he spared from death, though sentenced to many years in prison. Later, people like Ed Sills and other Americans were eventually allowed into the prison where Sasha was taught and converted. He made a COMPLETE reversal of his life, becoming very serious about his faith and teaching many fellow prisoners. After 12 years he was eventually released for good behaviour. He began to minister for one of the local churches, where the leaders felt he should further his education in the Bible at UBI. This he did and became one of our best and most serious students. Upon Sasha's graduation, Jav Don hired him to be one of our teachers where he has worked tirelessly for 13 years in addition to always preaching full time." (Roger's report of extra trip)

Lessons from the Life of Noah

oah's salvation reflects our own salvation today in that Noah was saved by grace, by faith, by obedience and from destruction. All should understand that God worked in the days of Noah just as He does today. God's dictates are the same today though His methods are different.

We often teach the story of Noah and the Ark to our children. The story also contains great lessons for adults as well. The principles that we find in this story of salvation are the same principles God uses today.

Noah was saved by grace – Genesis 6:8. The presentation of God's grace to Noah was through a covenant. Genesis 6:18 "But I will establish my covenant with you, and you will enter the ark—you and your sons and your wife and your sons' wives with you" (NIV).

The situation in our day is all have sinned - Romans 3:23. Our sin deserves eternal punishment - Romans 6:23. But, we are saved by grace. "God demonstrates His own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8 NIV). It is through the unmerited favor of God's sending His Son Jesus that we can have salvation today. The presentation of God's grace to us today is through the New Covenant of Jesus. Jesus said, "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins" - Matthew 26:28 (NIV). (see also Hebrews 9:11-15).

Noah was saved by faith. Noah had never seen a flood. Noah had likely never seen rain. Noah had never seen every animal in the world. Noah had never seen a structure like the one God told him to build. Noah had never seen a boat float. But God spoke

directly to Noah and he trusted in the word of God. The Hebrews writer says, "By faith Noah, when warned about things not yet seen, in holy fear built an ark to save his family. By his faith he condemned the world and became heir of the righteousness that comes by faith" – Hebrews 11:7 (NIV).

We have never seen our own souls. We have never seen the stain of sin on our souls. We have never seen God wipe off that stain with the blood of Christ. We have never seen heaven or hell. We have never seen Satan. But just as Noah trusted in the word of God, so we do as well. God speaks to us today through Jesus, His Son - Hebrews 1:1-2. So we put our trust in the word of the Resurrected Savior - Romans 10:17. Today we are saved by and through faith. (see 2 Corinthians 5:7; Ephesians 2:8; John 3:16).

Noah was saved by obedience; his faith was not a deedless faith. "Noah did everything just as God commanded him" – Genesis 6:22 (NIV); see also Genesis 7:5, 7:9, 7:16). Noah did what God commanded for the purpose that God commanded it, to be saved. This is obedience.

We are saved by obedience today. John writes, "This is love for God: to obey His commands. And His commands are not burdensome, for everyone born of God overcomes the world. This is the victory that has overcome the world, even our faith" - 1 John 5:3-4 (NIV). Although Jesus was the Son of God. He learned obedience from what He suffered; He became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey Him - Hebrews 5:8-9. Just as Noah obeved for the reasons that God told him to obey, so must we.

Finally, we see that Noah was saved from destruction. Moses writes, "Every living thing that moved on the earth perished, birds, livestock, wild animals, all the creatures that swarm over the earth, and all mankind. Everything on dry land that had the breath of life in its nostrils died. Every living thing on the face of the earth was wiped out; men and animals and the creatures that move along the ground and the birds of the air were wiped from the earth. Only Noah was left, and those with him in the ark" - Genesis 7:21-23 (NIV). "In the ark only a few people, eight in all, were saved through water" - 1 Peter 3:20.

We are saved from destruction. Baptism saves us from destruction today - 1 Peter 3:21. What kind of destruction can we expect to come? Peter describes the destruction to come in 2 Peter 3:3-7. We can be saved from destruction today as well. "This will happen when the Lord Jesus is revealed from heaven in blazing fire with his powerful angels. He will punish those who do not know God and do not obev the gospel of our Lord Jesus. They will be punished with everlasting destruction and shut out from the presence of the Lord and from the majesty of his power" - 2 Thessalonians 1:7-9 (NIV). We must know God. We must obey the gospel.

Noah has many lessons to teach us, but perhaps the lessons in salvation and the relationship between the different aspects of salvation is the greatest. Let us remember: Noah was saved by grace, just as we are; Noah was saved by faith, just as we are; Noah was saved by obedience, just as we are; and Noah was saved from destruction, just as we are.

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What Is Your Life?

(A sermon by Shawn Redding, adapted for print by Don Hipwell)

s an old preacher lay dying, he sent for his banker and family lawyer to come to his home. When they arrived, the preacher held out his hands to summon them to sit at his bedside, one on each side. They were bewildered as to why they were called to be with him during the preacher's final moments. Finally, the banker asked, "Why did you ask us to come?"

The old preacher mustered up his strength and said, "All my life I have followed the example of Jesus. He died between two thieves and that's how I want to go too."

There are a lot of humorous stories concerning death but let's seriously consider our life. What is our life? Scripture says it is but a mist, a vapour, a very limited time – James 4:14.

Psalm 90:12 says, "So teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom" (ESV).

How do we number our days? No one knows how many days one has left even though there are websites that claim to tell you. You put in your birthdate and a few other personal details, hit a button and a date pops up. Of course it is just an average based on the details you provided. Really, no one knows how long we have, except God.

God knows. Psalm 139:16 tells us, "Your eyes saw my unformed substance; in your book were written, every one of them, the days that were formed for me, when as yet there were none of them" (ESV). With that in mind, we need to live knowing that our future is in God's hands and not make the mistake so many people do.

We read about a businessman in James 4, beginning at verse 13, "Come now, you who say, 'Today or tomorrow we will go into such and such a town and spend a year there and trade and make a profit'—vet you do not know what tomorrow will bring. What is your life? For you are a mist that appears for a little time and then vanishes. Instead you ought to say, 'If the Lord wills, we will live and do this or that.' As it is, you boast in your arrogance. All such boasting is evil. So whoever knows the right thing to do and fails to do it, for him it is sin" (ESV).

It begins with a picture of a successful businessman. He has a plan. Today or tomorrow he will travel. He left room for contingencies. He might leave today but if something comes up he'll leave tomorrow. He has a location in mind. He'll go to such and such a town. He has a timeline. He'll spend one year there. He has a purpose. He

wants to make a profit. It was all good planning. There was nothing wrong with that. In fact, the Bible's wisdom books talk a fair bit about business practice and making an honest living.

He forgot one thing, however. He left God out of his thinking. He believed that he was master of his own fate and approached life as if he was in control. That makes him arrogant and foolish.

Life is uncertain and brief (v. 14). Seventy, eighty or even ninety years is not a long time in the grand scheme of things. Our life is a vapour that begins to disappear the moment we are born.

I remember being a child of seven, laying on my back on the living room carpet and chatting with my sister. We were fantasizing what it would be like in the year 2000. How old would I be? Forty-two! I could not imagine that. It might as well have been one hundred. And now here it is the year 2018! Where did the time go?

There is a poem that says it well. I do not know the author but it reads:

When as a child I laughed and wept,
Time crept.

When as a youth I waxed more bold,
Time strolled.

When I became a full grown man,

Time ran.

When older still I daily grew, Time flew.

Soon I shall find, in passing on, Time gone.

If we are strong and healthy and blessed by God, we may live a reasonably long life but eventu-

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ally everyone dies. So James said, when we live our lives we ought to consider the Lord's will (v. 15). I will be honest with you. In my youth and arrogance, I have rarely uttered those words but that needs to change. Not just to say it as some magical formula but with sincerity. Why? Because those three words, the Lord's will, point us away from ourselves and to the God who made us.

Paul said in Acts 18:21, "But on taking leave of them he said, 'I will return to you if God wills,' and he set sail from Ephesus" (ESV). He is saying, "I might come back. I want to come back. I intend to come back, but I do not know what God has in store for me." We make our plans and set our schedules but we need to leave the unfolding of them in God's hands, the way Paul did. Proverbs 16:9 reminds us of that. "The heart of man plans his

way, but the Lord establishes his steps" (ESV).

I am sure no one reading this is suffering from delusions, thinking they are not going to die. We have that pretty much figured out and we know it can happen at any time. So the question is, "What are we going to do with the time we have?"

The man in James 4 was boasting about what he was going to do. He was arrogant, thinking he controlled the future. Such boasting is to usurp God's position. We need to recognize God as being God and surrender to His control. So to begin, my part is simply to live each day for God. We still need to plan, to set goals and to dream, but we need to do so considering God's will and as verse 17 tells us, it is God's will to do what is good and right.

Earlier we looked at Psalm 90:12 which suggested we should num-

ber our days to grow in wisdom. What the psalmist is really saying is that we need to think about the brevity of life to inspire us to live correctly. I like the way the Message interprets that verse. "Oh! Teach us to live well! Teach us to live wisely and well!" It is not how long we live but how we live that counts.

We should be willing to help others we meet in whatever way we can. We know what we ought to do! If God has put it in our hearts to do a kind act, to render a service to others or to restore a relationship, we need to do it. When we do, we will experience a renewed and refreshed energy in our Christian walk. It is God's will!

What is your life? Better yet, what are you doing with it?



What does the apostle
Paul mean when he writes
in 2 Timothy 3:7 "always
learning and never able to
come to the knowledge of
the truth?" Is he talking
about people who never
have the ability mentally
to know the truth?

In Paul's second letter to Timothy he warns, the young preacher of the gospel, to be careful to not get caught up in the teaching of those who are not teaching the truth. He encourages Timothy, "Be diligent to present yourself approved to God, a worker who does not need to be

ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth. But shun profane and vain babblings, for they will increase to more ungodliness" (2 Tim. 2:15-16). Just as today, there were many who went about teaching false doctrine and passing it off as the true word of God.

Paul encouraged Timothy to "flee youthful lusts; but pursue righteousness, faith, love and peace with those who call on the Lord out of a pure heart" (2 Tim. 2:22). Paul is encouraging Timothy to be faithful in his teaching of the gospel. He is telling him that there would be many times of hardship as he remained faithful to God.

At the beginning of 2 Timothy chapter 3, Paul

tells him that in the last days there would come perilous times because men would be lovers of themselves, lovers of money, boasters and many other things that would keep them from believing the truth of God's word. Paul says these teachers have a form of godliness but are denying its power. From these Timothy is to turn away. Does that sound familiar? All you need do is tune in to the preaching one hears on radio and TV today and you hear everything but the truth of God's word. They read from the Bible but do not give proper meaning to the Scriptures they use. You can take Scripture out of context and make it mean about anything you want it to mean. This makes their teaching false doctrine.

This brings us to our question about those never coming to

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the knowledge of the truth. In 2 Timothy 3:6-7 Paul writes, "For of this sort are those who creep into households and make captives of gullible women loaded down with sins, led away by various lusts, always learning and never able to come to the knowledge of the truth." Paul is not talking about people who are too young or have mental disabilities. He is talking about people who study and study but never come to understand the true meaning of the Bible. The world is full of these people. They listen to everything that comes along religiously but never come to an understanding of the truth of God's word. We have found many of these people when we offer Bible Correspondence Courses. They will take every course you have and want more. They love

to read the Bible and find the answers to the questions but never grasp the true meaning of the Scriptures. The same is true of those listening to different preachers on radio and TV. They will listen to ten different preachers give ten different meanings to the same scripture and the listener is thrilled with and agrees with each one.

I have found many of these people in my work for the Lord. You can give them the true meaning of Scripture and they will thank you for it but stay with their practices of listening to everyone. They just will not come to a true knowledge of the truth.
