# "I Have No One Else Like Him"

The boat on which Paul and Barnabas sailed docked on the northeast coast of the Mediterranean at an inland port called Perga (Acts 13). They then set out on foot for Galatian Antioch in the high country of Pisidia where they were inhospitably received by the Jews. Being rejected (v. 46), they continued eastward into the interior of Asia Minor, looking for synagogues where they could possibly receive a hearing. There they shared the good news of Jesus' resurrection and confirmed the message of grace with miraculous signs and wonders. Learning of a plot against them they

went to the Lycaonian cities of Lystra and Derbe (14: 6).

At Lystra they found themselves on the edge of civilization where archeologists have found statues and inscriptions to Zeus, chief of the Greek

gods, also known as "Jupiter" among the Romans, and Hermes, also known as "Mercury," the mythological messenger of the gods. A local legend held that at one time Zeus and Hermes had visited the Lycaonian cities but they were not well received. The locals were determined not to make the same mistake again. So when Paul healed a Lystrian man who had been crippled from birth, the locals began to shout "The gods have come down to us in human form!" Barnabas they called Zeus, and Paul they called Hermes because Paul was the chief speaker (v. 12). The priest of Zeus brought bulls and wreaths to the city gates where a crowd gathered to offer sacrifice to them.

Jewish rabble arrived from Antioch and Iconium and won the crowd over. They stoned Paul and dragged him outside the city, most likely to the local garbage dump, and left him for dead. Christian converts gathered around his lifeless body and Paul revived (14:20). Scripture is silent on this particular point but it is possible that one of those who stood over Paul's lifeless body was an impressionable young lad named Timothy. When Paul returned to Lystra over a year later he found Timothy already a disciple who was well-spoken of throughout the region (16:2). Later, Paul (Phil. 2:22; 1 Tim. 1:2; 2 Tim. 1:2) claimed Timothy as his son in the faith so a safe conclusion is that Timothy became a disciple on Paul's first trip to Lystra. Although Timothy's biological father was a Greek, and likely a pagan worshipper of the gods, his mother and his grandmother were Jewish and, through their influence, he had developed a sincere faith (2 Tim. 1:5) and confidence in the Hebrew Scriptures (2 Tim. 3:15).

Everything...that we learn about this young man enables us to understand why Paul, almost a dozen years later, was highly impressed by him...

> Everything else that we learn about this young man enables us to understand why Paul, almost a dozen years later, was highly impressed by him and said of him to the Philippian church, "I have no one else like him" (Phil. 2:20). The superlative of which Paul speaks of Timothy is all the more significant when we consider that among Paul's co-workers were notables such as Silas, Barnabas, Titus, Tychicus, Epaphroditus and even Luke the physician.

> Timothy's magnanimity was evident early in Paul's second missionary tour (Acts16). In order to facilitate ministry among the Jews, Paul thought it best for Timothy to be circumcised. This minor surgical procedure, generally accomplished on Jewish males eight days old, must have been a painful embarrassment to the young man. Yet, characteristic of his spirit from this point forward, he yielded to what he thought was best for Christ.

> Timothy was with Paul at Philippi when he and Silas were brutally beaten and Timothy may have attended to his spiritual father's wounds. Later, on the same tour, Silas and Timothy

were left behind to strengthen and encourage the newly formed church at Berea (17:14) while Paul went on to Athens. They reconnected with Paul at Corinth (18:5) and assisted Paul in his ministry there (Rom. 16:21). It seems reasonable that Timothy was among the disciples who were with Paul during the two years he lectured in the school of Tyrannus at Ephesus (19:9). It was during this time that all who lived in the province of Asia heard the word of the Lord (19:10), a ministry that no doubt involved Timothy.

The text is silent on whether Timothy was with Paul in any capacity

> during his two years' imprisonment (24:27) in Caesarea or whether he accompanied Paul as prisoner to Rome for his appeal to the emperor. However, Timothy is named along with Paul in salutations

to the Colossians, Philippians, and Philemon, all of which are believed to have been written from Rome during imprisonment there causing us to believe that he was with Paul and somehow assisted in his writings.

In Paul's second letter to Timothy, Paul speaks of his "first defense" (4:16) causing us to conclude that he is awaiting a second defense before the Emperor. Furthermore, the tenor of this letter implies that Paul anticipates execution (4:6-8). At this time, Timothy appears to be in Ephesus and the aged Paul wants this special bosom friend to come to him (v. 9) before winter (v. 21) and to bring his cloak and the parchments (v. 13). A remarkable and inspirational special bond between the two is apparent.

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## **Our Changing Country**

anada is changing! You knew that already. Perhaps what you may not have known is how. Immigration certainly comes to mind. What about any significant changes in age groupings?

According to Statistics Canada estimates for July 1, 2015, the population of Canada

reached a significant milestone. For the first time, the number of seniors (those 65 and older) exceeded the number of children age 14 and under. There were 5.78 million seniors (16.1% of the population) compared to 5.749 million children (16%). In ten years, StatsCan projects that the percentage of seniors will increase to 20.1% of Canada's population with the number of children only increasing to 16.3% as the last of the "baby boomers" (those born between 1946 and 1965) reach 65. This is a significant enough change that an October 5 editorial in the *Winnipeg Free Press* was titled, "Preparing for a grey tsunami." The editorial was commenting on the attention being given to seniors by party leaders leading up to the election in October.

In practical ways, this population bulge will put significant stresses on programs like health, Old Age Security and Canada Pension Plan. In future years, increasing pressure will be placed on the younger generations to keep these programs adequately funded. But our purpose here is not implications of population change for government and its programs. Rather, we need to consider the implications for our congregations.


If a church matches the overall demographic of the country, there will be as many seniors as children. Over the coming years, the number of seniors will increase in proportion to the number of children. What will this mean, in ten years, when one in five Canadians are seniors? We have tried to be aware of the various major generational demographics – the "boomers", the "Xers" (those born between 1965-1980) and the "millennials" (born after 1980). And we understand how complicated the dynamics of Canada's population really are. Many churches have been especially trying to reach out to the young. What are we doing for those who are older?

The same StatsCan report noted that overall, Canada's annual growth rate had dropped to 0.9% in 2014/2015 compared to 1.1% the year before. (This is subject to regional variations.) While Canada has the highest growth rate among the G7 countries, a growth of less than one per cent per year seems small. What is significant is that 60.8% of Canada's population growth

came from "international migration." 39.2% came from "natural" growth (calculated by subtracting the number of deaths from the number of births). Three out of five new residents to Canada came from outside the country. Just under two of five were born here. (The summary figures from StatsCan don't identify what percentage of those were born to those who have moved here from other countries.

What this information suggests is that churches should reflect the demographics of their communities both in age and origin. The exciting thing is that many congregations in Canada already do. Whether planned or unplanned, congregations are showing the rich diversity of Canada's policy of welcoming people from all around the world. There are many ways of reaching out to these newcomers and helping them get settled in their new home. Some congregations help with food, clothing, furniture and even housing. Programs like FriendSpeak offer help with conversational English and language skills, while also studying the Bible in simple English. It is surprising that newcomers who may already come from non-Christian or even non-religious backgrounds may be willing to participate in FriendSpeak to be able to practice speaking and experience a friendship with a Canadian.

The changes that Canada has been experiencing over the past several decades seem unlikely to stop. Look around your neighborhood, the mall or grocery stores where you shop, the schools where your children/ grandchildren attend. The world is coming to our door! Opportunities to share Christ and His love abound.

# **Thinking About The Church**

he most important establishment known to man today is the New Testament Church. It is a privilege to be a member of that body which Christ loved so much that He was willing to give His life to make it possible, "Husbands, love your wives, as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her, that he might sanctify her, having cleansed her by the washing of water with the word, so that he might present the church to himself in splendor, without spot or wrinkle or any such thing, that she might be holy and without blemish" (Ephesians 5:25-27 ESV). "Muse" along with me and notice some of the marks that identify this New Testament

Perhaps the first mark which will help identify the church is that it has no creed but the Bible. Men are divided over creeds which have been written by men. The New Testament holds Christ before us as the perfect example and is the only infallibly safe and perfect guide. "All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17 ESV). Human creeds, which change or disregard the New Testament teaching, end up replacing Christ and taking Him out of His

rightful place as the head and Lord in His Church. "And he (God the Father) put all things under his (Jesus Christ) feet and gave him as head over all things to the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all" (Ephesians 1:22-23 ESV). New Testament Christians have the Bible as their rule of faith and practice. God's Word is and must be held firmly as the guide for faith and the authority for serving God as His people. We must be careful to learn from the people under the Old Law that what God expects is heartfelt obedience to His will.

A second mark of identity for

Churches today have become so over organized that the true spirit of simple New Testament Christianity has been buried in the rush. Today churches have appointed men who control the operation of all the congregations in a given province or area. Then over them is the world headquarters which directs the work of all areas. This is not the New Testament pattern of church government or organization.


According to the New Testament, the work of the Church is to be overseen by the elders who are appointed in each church. (These elders are men who fit the qualifications given by Paul in I Timothy 3 and Titus 1). This form of Church Government was changed when one elder began to be given authority over the others and became known as the chief elder or bishop in each congregation. Then these "chief elders" began to meet and to decide

the business of all the congregations in a certain area or diocese.

A careful study of the New Testament churches will show that within a reasonable period of time, they all had elders. The church at Philippi, often referred to as a model church. was addressed: "Paul and Timothy, servants of Christ Jesus. To all the saints in Christ Jesus who are at Philippi, with the overseers and deacons: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ" (Philippians 1:1-2 ESV). Paul wrote to Titus, "This is why I left you in Crete, so that you might put what remained into order, and appoint elders in every town as I directed you..." (Titus 1:5 ESV). This work

# **Spider Webs**

A nyone who knows me, knows that I am not fond of housecleaning. I have better things to do with my time than trying to evict every dust bunny that takes up residence in our house. But, while I am a bit lax with some things, I am not so tolerant of spider webs. If the spiders would stay outside, they could go about their business undisturbed but inside my house they are the enemy.

There are a few things I have noted about spider webs.

1. It takes continual effort to keep spiders and their webs out of my house.

2. If you don't kill the spider, it will replace any webs that have been swept away.

3. Webs appear anywhere, not just in unused corners. (even across my bathroom door)

4. Webs repeatedly show up in places where they have been cleaned out of before.

5. Webs often go unnoticed, then show up at embarrassing times. (like when company comes)

6. The best way to find those webs before they embarrass you, is to turn on a light and look up.

Just as I must continually battle to keep spiders and their webs out of my house, Christians must be vigilant in keeping their hearts free of ungodly attitudes and behaviours – spiritual spider webs, so to speak. Scripture gives us several lists of the "webs" Satan loves to build in our lives. Two similar lists are found in Ephesians 4:25–5:4 and Colossians 3:5-10. Here are some of the items Paul mentions in those two letters.

**Bitterness**—This is defined as a spirit that refuses forgiveness or reconciliation. Bitterness is like a festering sore. It eats away at one's heart eroding joy and preventing injured relationships from healing.

**Rage**—Rage is outburts of anger or quick temper. Anger so strong that one is out of control. Rage lashes out at anyone or anything that gets in the way and the damage it leaves may be irreparable.

**Anger**—We know that anger is unavoidable, but verses 26 and 27 tell us to control and deal with our anger so that we do not sin because of it or allow it to be a doorway for Satan. The anger we are to rid ourselves of is that which is a continual attitude of hatred which is often kept bottled up inside. When such anger does escape, it often comes out as rage.

**Brawling (NIV) or clamour** (ESV) (another translation is 'harsh words')—The dictionary defines this as loud shouting; contentious; quarrelsome. The Greek word used here in Ephesians, is translated "uproar" in Acts 23:9 (NIV). It is loud self-assertion in order to make one's opinion or grievances heard.

**Slander**—This is defamation of character; destroying another person's good reputation by lying, gossiping, spreading rumours, etc. Malice often manifests itself through slander. **Every form of malice**—Malice is a deliberate attempt to harm another person by word or deed. As noted above, slander is one form of malice. Physical violence, verbal or emotional abuse are other forms.

Lying/ filthy language/ obscenity/ foolish talk/ coarse joking— These two passages also address the type of words that flow from our mouths. Jesus said, "For out of the overflow of the heart the mouth speaks." (Matthew 12:34b NIV 1984) The heart filled with Christ will not produce such language as is listed here. (Ephesians 5:3, 4)

I tend to notice spider webs when I turn on a light and look up. This also helps in spotting those spiritual webs in our hearts.

Turn on the Light. "The unfolding of your words gives light; it gives understanding to the simple" (Psalm 119:130 NIV 1984).

"When Jesus spoke again to the people, he said, 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life.'" (John 8:12 NIV 1984). See also John 12:46.

"For once you were full of darkness, but now you have light from the Lord. So live as people of light! For this light within you produces only what is good and right and true" (Ephesians 5:8, 9 NLT).

Look up. "Since, then, you have been raised with Christ, set your hearts on things above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things" (Colossians 3:1, 2 NIV 1984).

"Turn my eyes from worthless things, and give me life through your word." (Psalm 119:37 NLT)

"Look to the Lord and his strength; seek his face always" (Psalm 105:4 NIV 1984).

Some of the spiders which invade my house are so tiny that trying to get rid of them is like chasing a dust speck. But no matter what their size, spiders can enter through any small crack or crevice. That is why it takes continual vigilance to keep them and their webs out of the house. Besides those that sneak into our house, we actually bring many spiders inside ourselves as they hide in the wood we carry in for our stove.

We can do the same thing with the spiders of sin. We bring them into our homes via TV, movies, books, magazines, computer sites, friends and associates. Need to get rid of those spiders? Consider some home renovations.

#### 1. Remodel your thinking.

"Don't copy the behaviour and customs of this world, but let God transform you into a new person by changing the way you think. Then you will learn to know God's will for you, which is good and pleasing and perfect" (Romans 12:2 NLT).

"And now, dear brothers and sisters, one final thing. Fix your thoughts on what is true, and honourable, and right, and pure, and lovely, and admirable. Think about things that are excellent and worthy of praise" (Philippians 4:8 NLT).

# 2. Decorate your life with good people.

"The godly offer good counsel; they teach right from wrong. They have made God's law their own, so they will never slip from his path" (Psalm 37:30, 31 NLT).

"Do not be misled: 'Bad company corrupts good character'" (1 Corinthians 15:33 NIV 1984).

# 3. Furnish your heart with God's word.

"How sweet are your words to my taste, sweeter than honey to my mouth! I gain understanding from your precepts; therefore I hate every wrong path" (Psalm 119:103, 104 NIV 1984).

Housecleaning may not be much fun, but having a clean house to live in is worth the effort. If we are to be imitators of God, as Paul instructs in Ephesians 5:1, then we must keep our spiritual house clean. The psalmist gave us an excellent cleaning formula in Psalm 119:11–16. "I have hidden your word in my heart, that I might not sin against you. I praise you, O Lord; teach me your decrees. I have recited aloud all the regulations you have given us. I have rejoiced in your laws as much as in riches. I will study your commandments and reflect on your ways. I will delight in your decrees and not forget your word" (NLT). <sup>1</sup>The Strongest NIV Exhaustive Concordance;

was an important part of the work of Paul and Barnabas, "And when they had appointed elders for them in every church, with prayer and fasting they committed them to the Lord in whom they had believed" (Acts 14:23 ESV).

There was not in New Testament times, and should not be now, any organization in the church larger than the local congregation. Each church, with its own elders and deacons, is entirely independent of every other church.

This perhaps begs the question, "Why do so many congregations fail to put emphasis on the development of men to fill the role of elder and deacon in their congregation? Old congregations who have perhaps never had a scriptural leadership of elders and deacons. Surely high on the priority list of every believer should be to have godly men of ability to oversee, feed and care for the

great nation. It didn't make any sense to Abraham when God told him to offer this child as a sacrifice. After God had gone to so much work giving him a son by a miracle, why would He now command Abraham to kill him? But in faith Abraham obeyed God until he was stopped at the last second.

Gideon couldn't accept that God wanted him to go to battle against those who were persecuting the children of God. The odds were too great. It was unbelievable to think he could defeat a huge army with just a few men. He had to get double proof from God before he would attempt the task because humanly it didn't make sense.

Believing/obeying God isn't difficult when we can rationalize why we should do what He asks of us. It isn't hard to believe that God would want us to care for those in

flock. If the Lord thought that was important enough to make it a priority in the days of the early church, can it be any less important today?

A third point of identity for the New Testament Church is that it stands for the terms of pardon for sin that are set out in the Word of God. As we read and study from the Word of God we are made aware of the terms of salvation that were taught by the apostles as they worked under the direct influence of the Holy Spirit. These terms of pardon have not changed over the years. The plan of God is the same now and will continue to be the same until the close of our age at the return of Christ.

The terms of pardon as given in the Word of God are positive commands which were given by the authority of Christ. The person who is willing to follow the New Testament for pardon from sin is sure that he will be added to the need. Human nature supports the principle that we should take care of those less fortunate than ourselves. It is logical for us to do that.

But the whole issue of faith comes in when we cannot reason something out by human logic. Or, in reverse, if we can reason something out by human logic, we don't have to accept it by faith. Three times in the Word of God, Romans 1:17, Galatians 3:11 and Hebrews 10:38, we see the term "The righteous will live by faith." It would seem to say that there are a lot of times that a child of God just cannot logically reason out why something is happening. Or perhaps how we will respond to something that is happening. When we cannot reason it out we really have to try to cope with it by faith. And that gets really hard sometimes.

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body of Christ. (Acts 2:47) This plan for Pardon included: Faith - Hebrews 11:6; Romans 10:17; Repentance - Acts 17:30; Confession - Matthew 10:32; Romans 10: 9-10; Baptism - Romans 13:14; Galatians 3:27; Mark 16:16. To these is added the need to continue "...teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you" (Matthew 28:20 ESV). Personal Note: A cause of personal sadness for me is that so many have stopped reminding the people in sermons of the invitation of Jesus and the response needed to become a part of the Kingdom for which Jesus died.

These three 'marks' of the New Testament Church should be a concern to all religious and God fearing people. We should carefully consider our relationship with God in the light of these things and find out if our faith comes up to the standard which is laid down in the Word of God.

# How To See The Good In Others

Some just can't! They assume bad motives, intentions and behaviours in others. They like to predict failure and disaster. Some take that attitude toward people, including Christians. "They won't last!" "They can't cut it as a deacon/elder." "He won't ever be a good preacher!" "They just want the praise of men." Think about all the people you know and interact with. Some are exceptionally talented and

pleasant and some are pretty worthless and repulsive, but most are inbetween the two

extremes. But, what if I told you that you could influence what others become? Barnabas did (Acts 4:36). He was so good at encouraging people, "encouragement" wasn't his middle name but his first name. Who was the first one to see good in Saul of Tarsus (Acts 9:27)? Who saw great potential in Antioch (Acts 11:23-26)? Who still believed in John Mark (Acts 15:37), who Paul would later think valuable once more (2 Timothhy 4:11)? Barnabas was a great leader because of what he could see in others. We can make an eternal difference in people by seeing the good in them.

First, take them where they are. Jesus did. Do you remember when Jesus met Peter (Luke 5:1-11)? Peter calls himself sinful. We know he was impetuous (John 18:10) and could use unsavory words (Matthew 26:74). Peter's business partners, the Sons of Thunder (Mark 3:17) seemed to have some anger management issues. In fact, Jesus made it an emphasis to take sinful people and work with them wherever they were (the woman at the well, the sinful woman caught in adultery, Bacchus, publicans, sinners, etc.). We will never help people get to heaven if we can't take them where they are.

Then, see them for what they could be. Whether it's a non-Christian or Christian, they need us to be able to see their potential and think the best of them. I don't mean gullibility or compromise, but optimism! Why did Christ put such effort into Peter? He was a sinful man when He met him, made many mistakes while he was with Him, and denied Him in His greatest moment of need (Luke 22:60-62). He saw what Peter could

be (John 21:15-17). Look past people's quirks and flaws; imagine the possibili-

ties. There's got to be a soul-winner in every Christian, since Christ commands it of us all (Mark 16:15-16). Every one of us can be faithful, dedicated and fruitful Christians. Every lost person could have their hearts softened by the gospel-at the least the gospel has the power (Hebrews 4:12; Romans 1:16). Remember, love "hopes all things" (1 Corinthians 13:7).

what they can be.

Finally, help them be what they can be. It's far easier to be the critic

and tell people what they're doing wrong. But remember, "To belittle is to be little." Criticism alone is useless. It's a lot tougher to help people improve than to go about helping with patience. Jesus didn't end His work by telling people what sinners or failures they were. He guided them to the better way (Matthew 7:13). He told the adulteress to stop sinning (John 8:11). He told Peter to go feed His sheep (John 21). When He was through with Zaccheus, he went from thief to philanthropist. Jesus' whole purpose was to take people, afflicted with sin, and transform them. It is rewarding work to invest in people and to help them grow. The Bible tells us to help people do better and be better (Galatians 6:1). To see the best in others, be willing to help and lead them (Luke 6:39-40).

If we are negative and pessimistic, that really is just a commentary on us. Look for good in others. Accept, anticipate and assist!



As per your instructions, we plan to do the work in Cuddapah District and its surrounding areas soon. I will work with my key men and local preachers. I have connections with 35 local preachers in Cuddapah District. We will do 480 to 500 meetings and more Bible classes in seven days along with my key men & preachers." (From K. CH. PAPUA New Guinea( Lae): From Ruth Zimmerman comes exciting news about this year's National church camp-lectureship, which took place from Sept. 20-23. The first evening, there were approximately 2,400 people present, and by the last evening, 65 had been baptized. A great deal of advance

preparation had been made to care for the influx of people in addition to a giant tent erected for the lectures and classes. Among these were tents for sleeping, outdoor showers and sanitary facilities, as well as a kitchen tent for the huge boiling pots used to feed people three times a day. Meat provisions alone included 15 pigs, three cows, numerous chickens and cartons of sausage. Ruth and Dogo manned a tent to sell Bibles and songbooks, as well as a few drinks and snacks, during the rest periods to help fund at least one new room for the ant-eaten facilities at the Melanesian Bible College. They raised k530 and Ruth said she was thrilled every time she saw one of the songbooks that she had worked on for years to complete go out the door! An Australian congregation furnished the Bibles printed in the language the people use.

UKRAINE (Kiev): "We have had another outstanding month at UBI. Classes continue to go very well and the students are learning fast what it means to study every waking hour!! "I really loved teaching the ladies again. For the first few days we shared our life stories. I started and I always share the good, bad and the ugly. I tell them they are to do the same. After the last story was told, Natasha looked over at me and said this is the best, most touching and emotional stories we have ever heard. I agreed. It's such a great way to start a class of total strangers. I no longer look out and see 14 faces I know nothing about, but I can look at each one and know where she came from, the things in life, good and bad, that have happened to her, how she came to the Lord and why she is now at UBI. After sharing so much from our hearts we already feel closer to each other which is the whole point of this series--if we are to grow spiritually together we must feel we know each other. When we have the lesson on growing in love, I have each lady write

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down one positive thing about each one in the class. I then get my translator to cut and paste their comments on a separate piece of paper. The next day I give each lady the paper that has all her positive comments on it. I LOVE to watch their faces as they begin to read their comments. A somewhat solemn face just starts to light up with a big smile, growing bigger and bigger!! It happens every time to every lady, without exception. It's just such a great example of how, by showing others love, we can make their day." Jay Don's class on Church History was also good and he loves teaching this course. He said that one of the things he enjoys pointing out in the class is that, where most Christian groups love to share their time-line to show that their roots go all the way back to the first century church, he tells the students that all of these should be thrown in the trash! The thing that really matters is not men tracing their origins back to the New Testament church on a sheet of paper, but planting the seed, which is the Word of God (Luke 8:11), and which

will come up as a disciple of Christ just like it did in the 1st Century. It is not a time-line that determines truth. It is the Word of God that determines truth." (Excerpts from September Report from Mary Lee Rogers)

# Laodicean Hymnal

eaders of the Laodicean Church in Canada last week announced the publication of a new hymnal. "This is truly a hymnal for the new century," said Presiding Bishop Luke W. Armm.


"This collection of hymns really captures the essence of our tradition," Bishop Armm explained. "At the core of our belief is the motto, 'Moderation in all things,' and that applies to our faith life as well. We just don't like to get carried away." When asked if the new hymnal will help the Laodicean Church attract new members, Bishop Armm replied, "People in today's society get kind of uncomfortable with too much talk about things like commitment and dedication. They'd much rather have a religion that they can turn on or off at will. Our church seeks to meet that need. This hymnal will help with that, I think."

Editor in chief of the new hymnal, Priscilla (Presh) S. Moment, explained some of the difficulty the committee had in choosing hymns. "Many of the old favourites just won't cut it among Laodiceans," said Moment. "We had to change a lot of the wording to make them fit with our style. We tried to incorporate some new songs into the book, but we had trouble finding Laodiceans interested in writing new music."

The title of the new hymnal, Church Songs, was chosen very carefully, explained Moment. "We didn't want to turn anybody off with threatening words that no one understands any more like 'Worship' or 'Hymn.'" Here is a partial list of titles included in the new Laodicean hymnal:

## Only Luke Is With Me

"Make every effort to come to me soon; for Demas, having loved this present world, has deserted me and gone to Thessalonica; Crescens has gone to Galatia, Titus to Dalmatia. Only Luke is with me. Pick up Mark and bring him with you, for he is useful to me for service. But Tychicus I have sent to Ephesus. When you come bring the cloak which I left at Troas with Carpus, and the books, especially the parchments. Alexander the coppersmith did me much harm; the Lord will repay him according to his deeds. Be on your guard against him yourself for he vigorously opposed our teaching. At my first defense no one supported me, but all deserted me; may it not be counted against them."

#### (2 Timothy 4:9-16)

t's amazing how brave and confident one can be in difficult situations when surrounded by friends. Yet when friends desert us in our time of need then that can be quite another story. Such was Paul's case in the latter part of his life as seen in the text above when Demas, his friend and fellow worker in Christ, decided not to encourage him when he needed him the most. There is no explanation for Demas' desertion although some believe he was afraid for his life.

Paul certainly didn't want God to count it against him and any others that had deserted him (Vs 16). It is hard from the text to determine why Crescens and Titus were absent. Some believed they had gone to other places on missions for Paul. However, in the text above it states that at Paul's first defense no one supported him for all had deserted him. Overcome with loneliness Paul writes to Timothy pleading that he makes every effort to come to him as soon as he could.

Wow, you mean one person of faith can make that much difference in another Christian's life when they're struggling? Absolutely!! In the past Paul had taken the time to teach Timothy and covert him to Christianity (1 Timothy 1:2). Now Timothy was needed to encourage his teacher.

There is no limit to the number of ways we can encourage one another in Christ if we only look for them. Demas is gone, so were Crescens and Titus. Only Luke was with Paul and as a physician his presence was vitally important

And although Paul could have benefited from Tychius' presence he sent him to the church in Ephesus likely to get Timothy and encourage the brethren there. At this time Paul was a prisoner in Rome likely awaiting his death. He was in his deepest moment of need and Satan knew it. So, he tried to thoroughly dishearten him by separating him from his greatest joy and faith-building opportunities – being with his faithful brethren.

Previously, Satan tried to get Paul to succumb to discouragement when he used Alexander, a former member of the church (1 Timothy 1:19-20), to vigorously oppose his teaching (2 Timothy 4:14-15).

Anticipating the arrival of winter Paul asked for his cloak that he had left at Troas and also the books but especially the parchments. It would be hard for anyone to travel to visit him in the winter so Paul felt he could overcome

his loneliness by writing encouraging letters to his brethren. Isn't that what Paul always did? Just look at his prison epistles!

Is there a lesson here for us today? Paul found his own way to deal with his discouragement. It was to get busy encouraging others whatever way he could. How could he do this? Well, he knew he never was truly alone for his God stood by him, strengthened him and would eventually deliver him even in death.

Every Christian needs another Christian's encouragement whether you're a great leader like Paul or just an ordinary Christian. Let's never desert one another!!

have had the pleasure of taking many trips to Denver, Colorado, L and have enjoyed every one but I was recently, asked about the town of Denver, I had to admit that I had no knowledge of the city or its surroundings. How is this possible? Well, each time I was there it was to take a couple of short courses at Bear Valley. I literally got off a plane, went to my motel, was in class for 12 hours every day and within a very short time after the last class session was back on a plane headed home. When we're in a tough spot it's important not only to look ahead at how were getting out but to look back at how we got there. Sometime we are forfeiting the joy and peace that God can give. Paul calls us to think about: Whatever is true, honorable, just, pure, lovely, commendable, any excellence, anything worthy of praise, in Philippians 4:8. There are a couple of points we need to make here. First, Paul has to tell us to think about these things

because we have a tendency not to. Second, Paul tells us to think about these things because we have a choice.

Confucius said you can't stop the birds from flying over your head but you can keep them from making a nest in your hair. He meant that you may not be able to control every random thought that come into your head but you can control what you dwell on. How you see your situation is not only related to your focus but also your attitude. Paul said in Philippians 4:12, "I know how to be brought low and I know how to abound". and in I Timothy 6:6, "Godliness with contentment is great gain". Sometime we are miserable in our current situation because we are spending all our time focusing on what we wish our situation would be. Imagine going on a great vacation with your friends or family and after enjoying the beach and a great meal you sit back and say "This is a good resort but it is nothing compared to the five star one I saw online." What about getting in your late model ford and saying "this car is okay but I wish it was a Lincoln." This kind of thinking is going to make you miserable and I promise further that it leads directly to

greed and covetousness. As the old saying goes, "the grass is always greener on the other side of the fence". Let me tell you a secret, when you get to the other side of the fence you know what you find? Another fence. If you'll take a moment to open your eyes and really look around you'll find that you are surrounded by God's goodness and blessings.

Looking for true value. Imagine if you were there when Enron shares started climbing and were told by a friend, "I've got a great investment people and love stuff when what we should do is love people and use stuff. We need to understand that souls/people are valuable. If we're going to spend time and resources we should spend them on developing better relationships. Souls are valuable because they are eternal. Paul emphasizes this idea a number of times. Colossians 3 tells us that in baptism we were raised with Christ. We should put to death that which is earthly and pursue that which is heavenly or above where Christ is seated at the

> right hand of God. In II Corinthians 4:16-18 Paul calls us to look to that which is eternal rather than that which is tran-

> opportunity for a very valuable stock". You probably remember that Enron shares climbed to \$90 each in the year 2000 but were in reality totally worthless. When the truth was discovered in the shares plummeted to less than \$1 each in early 2001. We often spend a great deal of time and energy pursuing the spiritual equivalent of Enron shares. People spend years and funds and energy trying to find joy and happiness in things that will never deliver that. Mickey Mantle lived as a reprobate because he thought he needed to squeeze every bit of joy out of a life he thought would be short. At 68 he was quoted as saying "Don't look at me as an example, I would have lived my life differently."
