

What the Church Needs Now

t the time of my birth, the preacher in my home town was Grady McKnight. He was a sheet-metal welder. I have only the vaguest memories of his preaching in those early years. I think that he left when I was about four. He returned to the area later, and was a great encouragement to me during my teen years, but I do not remember much about the time he served as our regular preacher.

Later we had a couple of "full-time" preachers (people who were actually supported, if you call \$45 a week sup-

port). One of these, Ed Mathews, moved on after a few years and spent his entire life either as a preacher, a missionary, or a Bible professor in a college. The other,

Connie Burton, returned to supporting himself by ordinary labor after a brief spell as our preacher.

When I was about ten, Rodney Rockwell became our preacher. He earned his living with a company called Lubrizol. They made the additives used in many brands of motor oil. "Uncle Rod" was a shipping clerk with Lubrizol. He was still doing the preaching when I left home.

About seven miles west of my hometown there was another congregation. The preacher at Mentor, all the time I was growing up, was Elmer "Hoover" Spence. He earned a living as a machinist and later as a foreman for the Cleveland Crane Company.

Of course, sometimes our regular preacher might go out of town. If

Date of issue is the first of each month. that happened we would get someone to fill in. Sometimes it was Lloyd Shockey, of Mentor. He was a machinist by trade, but certainly capable of delivering an understandable and biblically grounded lesson. My dad also preached occasionally, if there were no one better qualified to do so. Dad started life in the coal business, mainly hauling coal, only occasionally mining it. Later he used his truck driving experience, and his experience driving an ambulance in Korea, to get a job with the Greyhound Bus Lines. He was always good with math and

eventually ended up the auditor of terminal accounts, although he was not trained in accounting. He was not trained in preaching either, but he did it as needed.

I have been blessed to be supported in full-time ministry or mission work for 25 of the last 40 years. I was blessed with the opportunity to study Bible and Missiology for eight years, earning three university degrees. I certainly gained by this; and I think that the church gains something by having well-trained preachers. But at times I wonder if we have not lost more than we have gained.

Perhaps the church has always struggled to fully practice the concept of the priesthood of all believers. Perhaps the church has always had members who sat back and waited for the official leaders to do what ordinary Christians ought to do. But it seems to me that the situation has become more serious in recent years. Many congregations struggle to find Bible class teachers, song leaders and someone to deliver a sermon.

The Big Street Church of Christ in Major City, Down South may have no such difficulty. They might have 80 applicants for their five fulltime positions. But for most of our congregations, finding those who have prepared themselves for teaching or leadership of any kind is difficult.

As a boy, I remember leadership training classes that were full. It seemed that nearly everyone attended. In recent years I have not seen such a class meet with success. In one case that I am aware of, in a congregation of about 150, only five men showed up to the first class session. Things declined from there. The

> class was called off after only a few sessions, due to lack of interest.

> I have tried to analyze this shift, this lack of interest.

It is not that such training classes are poorly taught now. The materials for such classes are better than what we had in my childhood. The teaching methods are better as well. Overall, I would have to say that far better training is available now than then, yet less training is actually taking place.

I cannot prove this, but it seems to me that there are two or three main factors keeping us from having more interest in training for Christian service.

The first is that the clergy mentality of the denominations has taken over in the church. We expect higher levels of training in our full-time workers, and that is not all bad. But it has led to an attitude of resignation on the part of many, and that is very unhealthy.

The second is that we have simply allowed Satan to fill our weeks with too many secondary activities, so that the primary work of honoring the Lord is crowded out. I never played on an organized sports team until I reached grade eight (age 14), and I never participated in more than one sport per year. Many kids now start organized

sports by the third grade (age 8), and try to juggle several sports at once. We went out to eat only if dad came in from a business trip and we had to meet him at the bus station. Many families now eat out more than they eat in. We watched (at most) one or two sporting events per week. Many now watch several sporting events per day, even several at once! None of these are, in and of themselves. sinful. But the way we have allowed such things to fill our time is sinful (Eph 5:15-16).

The third factor may be an overreaction to the first-mentioned. Some, in reaction to the clergy mentality, seem to think that they should be allowed to lead worship, and even to teach, without any training at all. I have actually heard it said that if a man feels called to lead singing, we must allow him to fulfil that calling. I have heard both sermons and songs from people who may have felt called, but who certainly were not well chosen. When the acceptance of

mediocrity replaces clergyism we are no better off. The church is not edified, and the unbeliever is not convicted, by an ill-prepared and poorly presented lesson.

Good news from afar

Having written all that, I then picked up a church bulletin from a congregation that will remain unnamed. I will just say that it is a congregation where my wife and I were members many years ago. This congregation has not only bucked what seems to me to be a trend in the church, they have reversed the process.

When we were members of the congregation in question (about 40 years ago), and for many years afterward, the preacher was always a fine speaker and one with excellent written communications skills. They had four top-notch preachers in a row. But the church as a whole was going nowhere. It had not grown in years. Other than a very modest bus ministry (bringing in 12 to 15 children), and an occasional VBS, the church had no outreach to the community.

I know little about the current preacher. I judge his ability by the church bulletin. On that basis I would guess that his speaking ability may not measure up to that of those who served there in the past. His writing ability certainly does not.

How is it then that this church, stagnant for so many years, is now far more active than in the past? How is it that they now bring in dozens of children for mid-week Bible classes? How is it that they are now known in the community as a church that is making a difference in the lives of others?

The difference is involvement by all members. The stagnation of the past may have been caused, in part, by over-reliance on the leadership.

In the past they had "star" quality preachers. In the past they had a long-term eldership. In the past they had deacons, but sometimes deacons who were not very active. In terms of involvement by ordinary members, this congregation used to have almost none. Now it appears from reading their bulletin, many different members are involved in all kinds of ways. And it is making a huge difference for that church.

I believe in the value of good preaching, good teaching, and good writing. But the involvement of the members remains the key. A church that once had a "star" of a preacher but was not growing, is now growing with a preacher who is merely adequate in his pulpit skills. Why? Because a higher percentage of the members are involved.


The church started with a carpenter. It has been continued by fishermen, tentmakers, school teachers, farmers and other workmen. If it dies in our hands it will not be because we did not

> have enough college trained and fully supported workers, but because we were unwilling to do our part. What we most need is not more Ph.Ds, but more ordinary church members with the commitment to bring their best effort to whatever aspect of the work they are assigned. We need more men training to preach, not so that they can earn a living at it, but so that they can honor their Lord whether anyone supports them or not. We do not need slackers who expect to be called on even as they refuse to learn how to do the task properly. But we need dedicated and steady workers. We need those who will do their very best, and who are striving to improve on their best. And we need them in every aspect of the work.

Danger Warnings

ugust and September of this year (2107) were disasters, literally. Two major hurricanes hit the Caribbean and southern United with devastating results, an earthquake happened along the Pacific coast of Mexico and wildfires raged in several places in the U.S. and

Canada. Thousands of people had to evacuate, damage was extensive. It will take many months, if not years to recover. Most tragic was the loss of human life. Disasters like these remind us how small and powerless human beings are up against the incredible forces of nature.

What is impressive is that in events like these, loss of life does occur, given the magnitude of these events, the losses of life were not anywhere near what they might have been. Given the wind, torrential rain and flooding of hurricane Howard, and the wind, storm surge and sheer size of Irma, the potential death rate could have been staggering. Yet, thanks to the weather forecasters, storm chasers, media and government officials, plus forced and voluntary evacuations, loss of life seems thankfully low. (At the time of this writing, clean-up from Irma has only just begun, so who knows what the casualty numbers will ultimately be). Regardless, the advance warnings played a major role in saving countless lives. Imagine what the results might have been had there been no way to forecast these disasters and warn of the impending threat, or if those responsible for monitoring and warning of severe weather were preoccupied with other things.

In the Old Testament world, cities had walls built around them, with gates that could be closed, either at night or in the face of the threat. Guards were stationed on the walls to look out for coming danger, like invading armies, and to warn the inhabitants of the danger. The responsibility was clear, as the duty of these watchmen to warn was defined by God. If danger was coming and the watchman warned the city, he had done his job. However, if he failed to warn and disaster came, God would hold him responsible for the blood (lives) of those who perish. But, if he has done his duty and warned the city, but the inhabitants ignore the warning, and perish as a result, the watchman is guiltless. Their blood is on their own heads.

It is concerning to consider that with the warnings of the threat posed by Howard and Irma that there were people who chose to ignore the warnings and tried to ride out the storms where they were. The numbers of those who died as a result of their own actions may never be known. However, our hope is this will be minimal. While not wanting to unfairly criticize the victims, in some cases, ultimately, people are responsible for their actions.

This all has to do with physical danger and safety. Most of us have learned to be careful in the face of warnings of severe weather or flooding or other things that may threaten our lives and those where we live. But what about spiritual warnings? Are we as zealous to protect ourselves, our families and friends, even our communities when there is spiritual danger? Do we see the urgency and need? Do we realize our responsibility in telling people the saving news of Jesus?

The apostle Paul is a good example for us. We cannot look at his life without seeing his passion for preaching Christ. Most of us remember his words, such as, "I have become all things to all men that by all means I may save some." We see his courage to say, when on trial, to the governor, that he wished he would become just like Paul (a Christian). He describes his commission and compulsion to preach. Perhaps most powerful are his words, "I am innocent of the blood of all men." Paul echoes the concept of the watchman! If he has done what he could to warn the lost, he has fulfilled his task. Did Paul mean he talked with every single person in the world. Obviously not. But he used the opportunities to speak to those he could.

The greatest disaster is for a person to lose their eternal soul. Jesus died so this will not happen. He commissioned his people to share the warning with the world. There are many good things that we can and should do, but nothing more important than warning of the danger. Will we?

"Listening to hear the Word of the Lord"

– JEREMIAH 7:2

The congregational theme for the year in 2014 at the Strathmore Blvd. congregation was "Listening to hear the Word of the Lord" based on Jeremiah 7:2. Many times we may be challenged that we do not really listen to what someone is saying to us because we are too busy getting ready to point out what is wrong or in what way we disagree with what they are saying. Truthfully, this appears to be the mindset of many as they hear the words of the Lord. Often through the Old Testament we see the choice of the people to reject the clear word of the Lord to fit their own wishes. Many of these wishes became traditions that rejected the law of the Lord (See Matthew 15:3-9).

Jeremiah's day was one of upheaval and change. Josiah, a king who feared the Lord and led the nation toward God, died as a result of wounds received in battle. This was a great loss for the nation. While Josiah was king he restored the temple buildings and removed the idols. However, after his death, Jehoiakim brought them back, showing his indifference to the word of the Lord and bringing idolatry into the temple of God. In truth they gave lip service to God but gave heart service to the idols.

God commanded Jeremiah to go to the temple and preach truth. Jeremiah 7: 1–15 gives the sense of the message Jeremiah was to bring to the people, "The word that came to Jeremiah from the LORD: 'Stand in the gate of the LORD's house, and proclaim there this word, and say, Hear the word of the LORD, all you men of Judah who enter these

gates to worship the LORD. Thus says the LORD of hosts, the God of Israel: Amend vour wavs and vour deeds, and I will let you dwell in this place. Do not trust in these deceptive words: 'This is the temple of the LORD, the temple of the LORD, the temple of the LORD.' "For if you truly amend your ways and your deeds, if you truly execute justice one with another, if you do not oppress the sojourner, the fatherless, or the widow, or shed innocent blood in this place, and if you do not go after other gods to your own harm, then I will let you dwell in this place, in the land that I gave of old to your fathers forever. "Behold, you trust in deceptive words to no avail. Will you steal, murder, commit adultery, swear falsely, make offerings to Baal, and go after other gods that you have not known, and then come and stand before me in this house, which is called by my name, and say, 'We are delivered!' - only to go on doing all these abominations? Has this house, which is called by my name, become a den of robbers in your eyes? Behold, I myself have seen it, declares the LORD. Go now to my place that was in Shiloh, where I made my name dwell at first, and see what I did to it because of the evil of my people Israel. And now, because you have done all these things, declares the LORD, and when I spoke to you persistently you did not listen, and when I called you, you did not answer, therefore I will do to the house that is called by my name, and in which you trust, and to the place that I gave to you and to your fathers, as I did to Shiloh. And I will cast you out of my sight, as I cast out all your kinsmen, all the offspring of Ephraim'" - Jeremiah 7:1-15 (ESV).

As you read the book of Jeremiah note that he exposed the nation's false worship, Jeremiah 7:1–8:3 and exposes their false prophets, Jeremiah 8:4–22. The people had placed their confidence in the covenant but then did not obey it. They topped this off, as noted in Jeremiah 10:1,2, by worshipping false gods instead of Jehovah God. As one can imagine, his was not a popular message and Jeremiah almost lost his life for preaching it.

In interesting note in the instructions given to Jeremiah is found in Jeremiah 7:16–17 (ESV), "As for you, do not pray for this people, or lift up a cry or prayer for them, and do not intercede with me, for I will not hear you. Do you not see what they are doing in the cities of Judah and in the streets of Jerusalem?" Consider this thought from the College Press NIV Commentary: "This short unit is formulated as a private address

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to Jeremiah, but the majority of it concerns Judah. Verse 16 is directed to Jeremiah. There is a strong odor of sarcasm in the Lord's words, as he picks up on the preceding language of rejection. Just as the people have not listened when he spoke to them, now he will not listen when Jeremiah speaks to him. Obviously, this is not a rebuff of Jeremiah, but an indirect rebuke of Judah. Because they do not listen to him, he will not listen to a righteous man praying on their behalf (note Jeremiah 15:1)."


The basic message to the temple crowd consists of two points:

First is a call to repentance: Amend your ways...v. 3). Second, do not trust these deceptive words...(v.4). Yes, it is true they have the temple, the right place but they have forgotten that blessing comes from a more important personal action, hearing the Word of the Lord. The message is not encouraging to Jeremiah

because the Lord tells him, "Thus says the LORD: "Stand by the roads, and look, and ask for the ancient paths, where the good way is; and walk in it, and find rest for your souls. But they said, 'We will not walk in it' I set watchmen over you, saying, 'Pay attention to the sound of the trumpet!' But they said, 'We will not pay attention." Jeremiah 6:16, 17 (ESV). While God is calling His people back to the law as given through Moses they are choosing to not respond. And remember, God is not calling them to certain external acts but to an attitude of heart that commits to the way of the Lord -Deuteronomy 5:27.

In conclusion, we must be careful before we judge ancient Israel too harshly. Clearly we must recognize some similarities to their attitudes that are clearly seen in religion even today and even among us. While we are not usually prone to forming some sort to idol to bow before, we must keep careful control on our attitudes. It is easy to develop an attitude of self-righteousness that gives us a false sense of our own holiness and importance.

While the "ancient paths" that Jeremiah is calling the people of his day to embrace, we need to embrace the "ancient paths of the new covenant" and walk in humble obedience to God that were patterned for us by Jesus Himself. Day by day the challenge comes to do as the beloved apostle John wrote, "...walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin" - 1 John 1:7 (ESV). The decision of the people in Jeremiah's day in reference to walking in the Lord's way was, "we will not". The really important question for us is "will we walk with Jesus or not?" I pray we all make the right decision that leads to life eternal.

Chicken or Pig?

here is an illustration that has been around in various forms for many years. In one version the story goes something like this.

One day as a chicken and pig strolled along together, they came upon a sign advertising a charity breakfast to benefit the poor. Being generous souls, the chicken suggested they contribute to the cause.

"That's a wonderful idea," responded the pig, "but what can we give?"

"Well," said the chicken, "it's a breakfast, so we could donate bacon and eggs."

"That's easy enough for you," squealed the pig. "For you that is only a contribution but for me it's a commitment!"

One of the problems in churches today is that congregations often have too many chickens and not enough pigs. Commitment is not a popular concept these days. Yet nothing worthwhile is ever accomplished without it. A lack of commitment by its members handcuffs any group and makes it ineffective. Commitment is vital for the church.

In his book, *Confronting Casual Christianity*, Charles Stanley points out the difference between decision and commitment. One can make a decision about something without making a commitment to it. As an example,

Stanley notes that many marriages fail because those involved decide to marry but do not make a commitment to the marriage and to their spouse. In the same way, one may make a decision about Jesus but fail to make a commitment to Jesus. Such individuals may fill pews and directories but they do little or nothing to advance the cause of Christ.

One dictionary definition of "commit" is "to devote (oneself) unreservedly". That is exactly what Jesus expects as a commitment from His disciples. Jesus did not mince words when He spoke of commitment. "But seek first the

"Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me. and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me" - Matthew 10:37 (ESV). "And he said to all, 'If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will save it" - Luke 9:23, 24 (ESV). "So therefore, any one of you who does not renounce all that he has cannot be my disciple" - Luke 14:33 (ESV). "Be faithful unto death, and I will give you the crown of life" - Revelation 2:10b (ESV).

What does commitment to Jesus look like? As disciples, we should be committed to becoming more and more like Christ. We need to be learning and growing in our relationship with the Lord. "Rather, speaking the

truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and held together by every joint with which it is equipped, when each part is working properly, makes the body grow so that it builds itself up in love" – Ephesians 4:15, 16 (ESV).

Both 1 Corinthians 3:2 and Hebrews 5:11-6:3 reprimand Christians for not maturing as they should. We should all have a mindset like Paul, who stated, "I want to know Christ and experience the mighty power that raised him from the dead. I want to suffer with him, sharing in his death, so that one way or another I will experience the resurrection from the dead! I don't mean to say that I have already achieved

these things or that I have already reached perfection. But I press on to possess that perfection for which Christ Jesus first possessed me" – Philippians 3:10-12 (NLT).

A commitment to Christ means a commitment to His body – the church. Our first level of commitment should be to our personal relationship with God. Closely tied to that should be our commitment to the church. It is Christ's body (Colossians 1:24). We are members of that body (Ephesians 5:29, 30; Romans 12:5; 1 Corinthians 12:27). The church is the major avenue through whom Christ accomplishes His work. When some parts of His body are not functioning, it handicaps that work.

Although it is vital (Hebrews 10:25), commitment to the church goes deeper than mere attendance. Commitment includes fellowship. "And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers" – Acts 2:42 (ESV). "But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin" – 1 John 1:7 (ESV).

Commitment also demands involvement. A person will never truly feel a

part of any group he/she is not actively involved with. This includes the church. "The severest sin of Christians is a numbing lack of concern, an anesthetized attitude of 'I don't care. I'm in the fold. Why should I concern myself? I have a fire insurance policy against hell'." James 2:14-26 shows us that an inactive faith is a dead faith. Commitment is not passive.

Commitment to the church requires loyalty. We are to build one another up, not tear each other down. "Love one another with brotherly affection. Outdo one another in showing honor" - Romans 12:10 (ESV). "This makes for harmony among the members, so that all the members care for each other. If one part suffers, all the parts suffer with it, and if one part is honored, all the parts are glad" - 1 Corinthians 25, 26 (NLT). "Always be humble and gentle. Be patient with each other, making allowance for each other's faults because of your love. Make every effort to keep yourselves united in the Spirit, binding yourselves together with peace" - Ephesians 4:2. 3 (NLT). "Your love for one another will prove to the world that you are my disciples" – John 13:35 (NLT).

Commitment to Christ also means being dedicated to serving. Jesus came to serve and expects no less of His followers (Matthew 20:26-28). We are given various gifts (talents and abilities) in order to keep the body of Christ healthy and growing and to demonstrate God's love to those around us. "Having gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them: if prophecy, in proportion to our faith; if service, in our serving; the one who teaches, in his teaching; the one who exhorts, in his exhortation; the one who contributes, in generosity; the one who leads, with zeal; the one who does acts of mercy, with cheerfulness" -Romans 12:6-8 (ESV). "So let's not get tired of doing what is good. At just the right time we will reap a harvest of blessing if we don't give up. Therefore, whenever we have the opportunity, we should do good to everyone—especially to those in the family of faith - Galatians 6:9, 10 (NLT). The parable of the talents (Matthew 25:14-30) illustrates how our Master regards those who do not use the talents He has given them.

Paul said, "I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship" – Romans 12:1 (ESV). That is commitment. Jesus said of the Laodiceans, "So, because you are lukewarm, and

neither hot nor cold, I will spit you out of my mouth" – Revelation 3:16 (ESV). Surely, we do not want Him to say that of us!

Take a look at yourself in the mirror – are you a chicken or a pig?


ONTARIO

Delta: We were blessed to have another excellent visiting speaker for our morning service on August 27 when Jay Hawkins, who preaches for a body of Christ in Oregon was here with his family to visit grandparents Jim and Carolyn Hawkins. His sermon gave some good advice on "Sorting Out A Family Squabble", and was followed by a Pot Luck fellowship in the park.

Surrey: The editor of our weekly bulletin featured a special note to students as they face sometimes hectic schedules to try to allocate a few minutes of study time in God's Word each day as they started a new school year. It is still the most influential and important subject they will ever have the privilege of reading and learning from.

INDIA: On August 10 and 11, 33 children died in two days of encephalitis outbreaks when there was a disruption in the hospital's oxygen supply. Doctors who have been treating children in this vicinity for decades say that the problem is a symptom of mismanagement, corruption and negligence. India's Prime Minister Narendra Medi expressed sympathy this week to the families of the victims in his Independence Day speech, causing many doctors to hope that the national spotlight will force officials to focus on the problem of encephalitis which has killed more than 4,000 children and sickened nearly 25,000 in Utter Pradish alone, where this hospital is located.

BODY & SOUL MINISTRIES: Our latest publication shows a map of the Southeast Asian world with the core areas of work this organization concentrates on circled: Indonesia, Vietnam and the Philippines. These are where our efforts are centered and where we are making a huge difference in the lives of thousands of people. In the Philippines the "Tree of Life" tutorial and feeding program has been in operation for almost three years on the island of Cebu. The children come from in and around the Arapal communities near Bogo City. We currently have a total of 100 children in the program: 50 elementary school-aged, and 50 high school students, the majority of which have been in the program since its inception. The Tree of Life not only helps these children academically, but also provides groceries and rice at the end of each month to help feed

their families at home. Students attend a worship service for their spiritual nourishment each week. Two wellqualified board members run the school very efficiently, for which we feel very fortunate. In Vietnam, BandS is now operating two English Centers in the Can Tho City area. Ranging in age from four years old to 18, 162 students have been attending the 586 English Center for two years. A second, Connor English Center, was established in April of this year with 25 in kindergarten, 50 in elementary, 51 in Secondary and 31 high school. It is the first English Center ever opened in Nga Sau Town, which is about 40 minutes from the other English Center in Can Tho City. Currently the center has 12 classes for its 171 students which consist of 25 in kindergarten, 60 elementary, 58 secondary and 28 high school students. Ngan Huynh, the lady in charge, along with her staff, is doing an amazing job of accomplishing much in a short period of time. This last March, BandS went into a partnership with the Caris Foundation to complete cataract removal surgery on 446 eyes in three different locations of Northern Sumatra, Indonesia. Our surgeons, Drs Pinto Pulungan and Jusni Dsaragih, who are very proficient as well as professional, managed to do this in just three long days once the ground work throughout the year had determined the best locations and screened the patients eager to regain their sight. These brought the number of eyes operated on since the work was started in 2005 to 6,367! (Ed. note: In a separate letter, Dr. Bailey disclosed the fact that it has been determined that he has developed Parkinsons Disease. As Dr. Bailey had a great many more projects lined up for himself, of course he is disappointed that he may not get to see them to fruition. He noted that his main difficulty at the present time is in maintaining his balance. I am sure he would be grateful for

your prayers as he wants to carry on with this life-changing work as long as possible. If you would like to contribute to this cause, you may find a Donate Online link under www.bands ministries.org, or by mail to BandS Ministries, P.O. Box 1926, Colleyville, TX 76034.)

NASHVILLE, TN.: "IF Healing Hands International had one wish, it would be to take each one of you to see and meet the people we are aiding, equipping and empowering. Why? Because we believe that it would help grow the seed deep within each one of us to help others in need, as well as providing avenues for them to experience the salvation, love and grace of Jesus. But being unable to bring that about very easily, we decided to pick out two young people in Zimbabwe whose story we could tell. The first is Blessing Mutereko, who lives deep in the village of Dzere. Because he was the victim of several childhood sicknesses, he was four years behind those of his age when he was finally able to start back to school. Like many other children, the older ones laughed at him at first, but then became angry when he was tempted to steal some of their food when he could no longer stand the pangs of hunger. When HHI learned of the lack of food in Blessing's home, we provided daily Manna Pack rice to several families as well as theirs, and he no longer had to steal in order to stay alive. He was recently baptized at the Chigodora church of Christ, and is so thankful for the opportunity to continue being in school without being labeled as "a bad boy". In the same village a young woman named Beauty Chavambuka lives with her young family. They survived by doing day labor in the community and surrounding farmlands, but could not make enough to be able to send her children even to primary school - so were looked down on in the village. Through the local Sakubva church and

the Mutare School of Preaching, we have been able to purchase cornmeal and beans to distribute to those in immediate need, but that did not solve their biggest problem, which was the need for water. Did you know that, in fact, famine is not so much a lack of food as it is of water? So HHI has drilled a well in Dzkere and Beauty and her children can now grow their own food. We have been told that at harvest time, women can be seen dancing in the street.

PAPUA NEW GUINEA: PAPUA NEW GUINEA (Lae): From Ruth Zimmerman: "Lae continues to be cool (high 20's Celsius), and wet. So far there has been no sign of the predicted El Nino drought. In fact, flooding in August has seen heavy damage to one of the villages outside of Lae. Please pray for the church in Gabensis, some of whose members lost their homes. This report covers half of July, as well

as August. As Art & Ruby Ford moved from Beamsville to Kingston, Ontario, and then were travelling, I opted to hold off writing. At the time of my last newsletter, I was "down" with malaria. God gave me a one month "time out" altogether. I am now fully recovered. Thank you for your prayers and emails. My "down" time led to a good start in getting caught up on library work, all of which I could do from home. I was able to record the entire book list (2.129 books!) into a ledger book. The library doesn't have its own computer, so it is important to have a hard copy that can be easily added to as we start processing new books. I am also making steady progress on the card cataloguing. As the parts for the printer are still on back order (!!), I've been glad to have work to do from the house. Hopefully the repairs will soon be done and I'll be able to get going again with printing the next lot of song books, as well as continuing with book repairs. On August 28th, we welcomed our last (?) visitors for 2017. LaMoine and LaDell Harrison arrived from Keller, Texas, in the midst of hurricane Harvey. Curtis & LaMoine Harrison, with their four children, including LaDell, first arrived in Papua New Guinea in 1972 and worked for several years in Goroka. It has been 30 years since LaMoine was last in P.N.G., and 40 years for LaDell! They were able to spend time in Port Moresby, Goroka and Lae, before travelling safely home again. We enjoyed their visit greatly." (Ed Note: Ruth Zimmerman continues to plug for the growth of the fund to build new classrooms which the Melanesian Bible College so badly needs. Burning Hearts

"...let each of you love his wife as himself..." Ephesians 5:33

There is a touching story recorded by Luke about two disciples who were on their way to Emmaus. Jesus had died, and these two followers of Him were talking about all that had happened the last few days. Jesus joined them, but He did not appear to them to be Jesus. He asks them what they were talking about, and they stopped and looked "sad." One of the disciples, named Cleopas, gave Jesus the run-down. Jesus then proceeded to explain how that, far from being a tragic ending to the Christ, was actually a complete fulfillment of what Scripture had foretold. After a long encouraging talk, Jesus finally allows himself to be seen by the men and then disappears! Note what impact this had on the downcast believers: "They said to each other, 'Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road...?" - Luke 24:32.

What Jesus produced in these men was a passion for the things of God. Knowing God, walking beside Him and working for Him produced a love and a passion for righteous-

ness in His followers! If this sounds almost romantic, in a way it actually is: Christ frequently refers to His people as His *bride*. The *church* is characterized as the *bride* of *Christ!*

Ephesians 5:25-32 is frequently used, as it should be, to help husbands understand the kind of love that they are to have for the wives that God has entrusted to their care. But look at the "punch-line." This whole passage about husbands and wives ultimately applies to Christ and His church!

So by way of application what Jesus wants from us is what is expected by God between a husband and a wife in marriage. This is a challenging notion that might make us a bit uncomfortable. Yet when we think of the great marriages we have seen in our own lives, we can see the transforming power of this.

What would happen if each of us, as *living stones* (1 Peter 2:5), related to Jesus with the intensity, selflessness, and passion that should characterize a godly marriage?

I have been amazed (as has my family) how over time the things that are important to my wife have become intensely important to me. For example, I am by nature a slob. Early in my marriage, it used to drive me nuts how my lovely bride would be so upset when the house was even just a little bit messy. Yet through applying what Scripture instructed, I began to see that in order to truly love my wife, I needed to live as though cleanliness were important to me. Now a mess in the house upsets me because I have taken on her heart as my own. That's the nature of loving someone as your own body.

You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. Deuteronomy 6:5

If I were to love God as well as He has taught me to love my wife, would my efforts to the kingdom look any different than they are today? What are just some of the priorities that God has expressed through His Word?

"But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream" (Amos 5:24).

"He has told you, 0 man, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8).

"We destroy arguments and every lofty opinion raised against the knowledge of God, and take every thought captive to obey Christ..." (2 Corinthians 10:5).

"...For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost" (Luke 19:10).

What would really happen if the church left the pews and began to fight the battles of the Lord with intensity and passion, guided by the Holy Spirit? What if the church was immersed in the Word and the heart of Jesus, and engaged the battle that rages outside our meeting place—going to the front lines rather than trying to coax the lost into our doors? What if we gave ourselves to God to be used as *He* saw fit?

Consider the following quote from Henry Varley, the quote that launched Dwight L. Moody on his own crusade: "The world has yet to see what God can do with one man wholly committed to him."

Perhaps this would be the perfect gift for the God who has everything. Imagine a whole community of believers who were totally committed to God in Dickson County (or in your county, city, village, etc.). For that matter, imagine if only 10 or 20 of us had hearts burning for God! The whole world would be changed... starting right here!

May we prayerfully wrap up this gift and give it to our great God!

BOOKREVIEWS

The Book: The Story of God and Humanity,

Michael R. Parker; Shekinah Reflections Publications; 225 pages; available at Amazon. ca, CDN \$19.02 Reviewed by Max Craddock

In the introduction Mike writes, "The Bible is a wonderful and exciting book, it is full of actions and adventure, sci-fi and fantasy, romance and even comedy. However, it is a really long book." This is surely true. And while one might think this statement is in an introduction to a "Readers Digest" version of the Bible I found it to be a good deal more than that.

The table of contents reflect that this book gives attention to Volume One – the Old Testament and Volume Two – the New Testament. Some Old Testament chapter titles are "God Creates", "God Rejects", "God Reboots" and "God Calls Back" stirring interest in how the story unfolds. Some New Testament chapter titles are "God Arrives", "God Teaches", "God Reaches Out" and "God Returns".

Comments on the back cover include: "It can be a daunting task to pick up a copy of the Bible and make sense of it. It's a very long book. It has sections that can seem downright dull and other so complex that the best scholars still puzzle over them. THE BOOK retells the powerful story of God and people in a way that both first-time readers and experienced students of the Bible can relate. In his humorous but authentic style, Parker has captured the story line of the Bible and pieced it together in a way that will connect with today's reader. Real life examples from his own experiences will make

you chuckle, but also serve to bring clarity and meaning to the story."

In the back of the book, Mike suggests this book might be used to help start conversions with people seeking the truth; material that could be used in ESL programs; grounding new Christians and giving them a sense of the big picture; for Junior High or High School Sunday School curriculum and a discussion starter in adult classes or small group ministry.

I would add one more. The chapters are broken into two parts. For example, in the chapter "God Creates" he discusses in simple words the fact that God did create the heavens and the earth. Then in the "Behind The Scenes" part of the chapter he discusses, explains and applies the importance of the information learned in the chapter. It could be a useful tool for discussion in family devotions.

I enjoyed reading the book and expect that you would as well.
