

Suffering is Universal

'n the last week alone, I read of parents who lost their children to fires, to sickness, to children wandering away from their homes and into the brutal cold only to be found dead. You can almost imagine the pain and agony that such tragedies cause like the unbearable guilt and pain felt by the parents because they believe they failed to protect their children. Imagine how the children themselves, suffered through their tragedies. What was going through their minds? One can only feel helpless in such situations.

Suffering is universal and we will all experience it at some point in our lives. For the Christian, while the physical pain and anguish are still felt, there should be a difference in one's understanding and reaction to suffering. Why? Because suffering as a Christian should serve to define and refine who and whose we are. So why does suffering occur and

what should our response be when faced with it? Below are some reasons why Christians suffer and the effect it should produce.

Suffering as a Christian should build the character of patience (James 5:10). Romans 5:3-4 tells us we need to 'glory in our sufferings' because suffering produces perseverance which builds one's character. Suffering should also produce the fruit of joy. James 1:2-4 tells us that we need to count it as joy when undergoing varying trials. I will admit that such is not the first thing that comes to my mind when my faith is being tested. I question why me? Do I not love the Lord and serve Him as best as I can, then why should I be tested and tried? Why can't I have a break? Do these thoughts sound familiar to you too? Perhaps for some, it does. But James tells us we

need to be joyful nevertheless. When our faith is tested, and we are joyful, it will produce perseverance so that in the end, we will be mature, complete and lacking nothing.

Suffering should increase righteousness and teach us. How many of us liked being disciplined as a child, or even as an adult? Discipline, according to Merriam-Webster [online] is defined as "training that corrects, molds, or perfects the mental faculties or moral character." Hebrews 12:11 describes discipline as something that when being administered is unpleasant and painful. However, it is done to "produce a harvest of righteousness and peace." Proverbs 3:10-12 tells us the Lord disciplines those he loves and we should not despise being disciplined when we err from truth. The Psalmist in Psalm 119: 67, 71–72, when he strayed from the Lord was thankful for his affliction because it taught him to obey the Lord's decrees.

Suffering as a Christian should serve to purify our lives. When Job was afflicted with all manner of hardships he knew that he was being tested so that he would be refined (Job 23:10). So it is with us when we suffer in this world. Our suffering is only for a short time. Our faith will be tested so that it can be refined (1 Peter 1:5-7: Proverbs 17:3). When something is refined, it is made better. For the Christian, in essence, the refining process is supposed to make one more Christlike (Hebrews 12:9: 1 Peter 4:12-13: 2 Corinthians 4:7-10).

Suffering should not drive us away from God; rather it should draw us closer toward God. Romans 8:35 asks the question, "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger of sword?" The answer is nothing because, during times of suffering, we can be victorious in Christ Jesus (vs. 37). My en-

> couragement to you is that at the very beginning when times of trouble come your way, entrust it to God. He asks you to cast your cares, your anxieties and burdens on Him and he promises to sustain you and at the same time, we should engage in steadfast prayer when we suffer (Psalm 50:15; Psalm 55:22; 1 Peter 5:7). Do not be afraid to request the prayers of the church and fellow citizens of heaven. We are to carry each other's burdens (Galatians 6:2).

> In closing, it is important that we realize we need not suffer needlessly if we understand the glory that awaits us if we persevere (1 Peter 2:20; 3:17; 4:15-17). Always keep in mind that your present suffering is nothing compared to the joy that awaits you when Christ returns (Romans 1:18).

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They Saw His Glory

nd the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gives it light, and its lamp is the Lamb" – Revelation 21:23 (ESV).

The prophet Isaiah relates in inspired prose: "...he had no form or majesty that we should look at him, and no beauty that we should desire him..." – Isaiah 53:2. This is to say, Jesus in His human form, looked very much like an unimpressive Hebrew man. He wasn't like Saul of the Old Testament, striking in stature and good looks. He was just a regular guy from Nazareth...nothing special.

Except that there was something that drew people to Him: His manner of speaking, wisdom and compassionate love for others...large crowds would follow Him. Of course, there were also miraculous signs as well, plus the occasional free meal.

Whatever it was, and it differed for different people, there was a certain "fragrance" to Jesus that drew the weary and the hurting to Him.

Yet isn't it strange that the very people who spent the most time with Him and observed all the amazing miracles and heard His powerful teaching would desert Him in His time of greatest need? Or is it? Perhaps it is instructive to our walk of faith that Peter, John, Andrew and all the other "top" men of Jesus would not once but numerous times

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act in faithless ways. I would contend that I personally find great comfort in the fact that God saw to it that the record of the apostles' confusing and imperfect walk with the Messiah was so...imperfect and confusing!

Even those who walked shoulder to shoulder with our Lord still struggled mightily in their walk. Yet I wonder if part of the problem we still face—we all at times become a little too comfortable and familiar with our concept of God.

In Luke 9:28–36, a few of the disciples will be given a very momentary glimpse of the true nature of Jesus. One that certainly would reorder their future understanding of who Jesus is. Perhaps we all need to prayerfully consider whether our vision of God has become too small or perhaps below the dignity entirely of our marvelous Trinitarian God.

About two decades ago when Anita and I still lived in Nashville, I was having a phone conversation with a lawyer friend of mine. I was in his Sunday morning class and we were discussing a biblical issue that had been somewhat contentious that Sunday. At some point in this discussion he said something to the effect of "I guess we can ask God that when we get to heaven." He was silent for a moment and then he asked me, "Do you think we view God too small?"

This was one of those interesting phone calls that had a lot of those silent pauses. It was my turn to be silent. I though of how those who encountered just the voice of God would react. They usually fell to the ground with their face in the dirt. The children of Israel asked that they no longer hear God's voice, just that Moses alone would face God. Then I thought how we so often see our-

selves as walking up to God to ask some inane question. How small and arrogant was my thought process! How little I treasured the image of God in my heart!

I told my friend "I don't think we have the beginning of a clue as to how incredible and holy being in the literal presence of God will be." But you know, that is the story of virtually every hero of the Bible as well. We, as finite creatures, struggle our entire lives to grow in our relationship and knowledge of God. God even encouraged His people to come to know Him more closely, to the point of boasting: "...let him who boasts, boast in this, that he understands and knows me, that I am the Lord who practices steadfast love, justice and righteousness on the earth..." - Jeremiah 9:24.

"Holding onto the Lord..."

he news in early September was sad. Another young black man had been shot to death by a U.S. police officer. This seems to be an unfortunate and oftrepeated theme in the news. According to reports, the victim was killed in his own apartment as the officer mistakenly thought

she was in her own residence. The sense of tragedy was compounded as information about the victim became available. Botham Shem Jean, 26, originally from St. Lucia, was a 2015 graduate of Harding University. He was highly loved and respected by his family and friends back home, those who knew him at Harding and the congregation in Searcy, as well as where he worked and worshipped in Dallas. It has been particularly noted that he loved to sing and was known for his ability to lead singing at church and in chapel at Harding. In the fullest and truest sense, we have lost a brother in Christ.

Sometimes, there may be a sense that a victim of such an event may have done something to cause, even inadvertently, the officer's response – being somehow threatening or menacing, arguing, making a sudden gesture or movement. However, it is difficult to see that he had any role in the tragedy since he was in his own apartment. Given that, his death must be seen as the unfortunate and tragic, undeserved end of a young and promising life.

As more information about Botham has emerged, he sounds like a remarkable young man. Beyond his gift for leading worship, was his love for God and concern for others. The Christian Chronicle (CC) reported that his aunt, Desma Charles, described him as a "very vibrant young man who was well-loved by many and had the souls of men at heart." His death is a loss to all. We know that all who knew and loved him will experience great grief and loss.

It is not uncommon for people to respond to such a tragedy with anger. The unfairness and injustice of such a loss can arouse strong emotions. However, Christians need to be careful to remember their values when faced with tragedy. The world is watching. As Botham's association with the church in St. Croix, Searcy and Dallas is mentioned in the various reports of the incident, people around the world are able to see how his brothers and sisters in Christ respond. As Christians, our hope is not changed by the circumstances of our death. Whether we die young in an accident, have our lives taken by a violent, senseless act, or die in our sleep in old age, we go to be with the Lord. As the CC reported, Botham's mother said, "I know that Botham is singing with the angels, and I want to be in that choir." Hope shows through grief.

Human beings can be so overwhelmed by their grief that they lose focus. For Christians, hope leads us through tragedy and loss. Botham's aunt said that she had spoken with him fairly recently before his death about "holding onto the Lord in challenging times." Admittedly, she was strongly affected by her sense of loss, but her faith gave her strength. We need to follow her advice and example.

In writing to the Thessalonians about our hope in the face of death, Paul encouraged them (and us) not to grieve like those who have no hope. It is interesting to note that he does not prohibit grieving. Rather, he is pointing toward hope in the face of death, not the hopeless, empty despair of those who do not know Christ. When a Christian dies, they do not lose anything. Otherwise, how could Paul have expressed his desire to go and be with the Lord. He did see opportunity and need in remaining alive to help others, but his clear preference was being with Christ.

We cannot help but see the tragedy of a life abruptly cut short, of the pain and suffering that often come with death, of the deep sense of loss experienced by family and friends left behind. However, as the world watches how Christians face death and loss, even in tragic, unjust circumstances, they need to see that our faith and hope are real, that we genuinely love each other as members of the same body. These are not just words we repeat, but are genuinely part of the way we think and live, and how we face adversity.

In Romans 8, Paul wrote, "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword? As it is written: 'For your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered.' No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us."

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Boasting In...

Paul, the apostle, lived a full life both before he became a Christian and afterward. There were many things about which he could have boasted: his ancestry, his intellect, his potential in the Jewish religion, his powerful writing etc. However, his stated desire was, "But far be it from me to boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world" – Galatians 6:14 (ESV).

Paul's life and his preaching, after the encounter with Jesus on the way to Damascus, was devoted to the preaching and teaching of Christ crucified. He wrote to the church at Corinth these words. "And I, when I came to you, brothers, did not come proclaiming to you the testimony of God with lofty speech or wisdom. For I decided to know nothing among vou except Jesus Christ and him crucified. And I was with you in weakness and in fear and much trembling, and my speech and my message were not in plausible words of wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power" - 1 Corinthians 2:1-5 (ESV).

One of the greatest hymns ever written, in my opinion, is "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross". Let us survey the cross and learn some important and helpful lessons in the process.

First, consider those who were there to survey the cross with their own physical eyes. In the multitude there were four Roman soldiers. They saw his garments as being of some value. "When the soldiers had crucified Jesus, they took his garments and divided them into four parts, one part for each soldier; also his tunic. But the tunic was seamless, woven in one piece from top to bottom, so they said to one another, "'Let us not tear it, but cast lots for it to see whose it shall be.' This was to fulfill the Scripture which says, 'They divided my garments among them, and for my clothing they cast lots.' So the soldiers did these things..." - John 19:23, 24 (ESV). Here they stood at the foot of the cross on which the Saviour of the world hung and the only thing they saw of value was some used clothing!! Such short-sighted people still exist today.

Also by the cross were what might be called the "curiousity seekers". I expect in Jesus' day, just like today, there were many "gawkers" who liked to stand around and watch when something out of the ordinary was happening. Luke writes, "And the people stood by, watching, but the rulers scoffed at him, saying, 'He saved others; let him save himself, if he is the Christ of God, his Chosen One!" -Luke 23:35 (ESV). One can imagine people laughing at the remarks the rulers were making and joining in the ridicule of Jesus. Many likely went home that night and forgot all about the events of the day - untouched and unchanged.

"But far be it from me to boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world" – Galatians 6:14 (ESV). Not everyone saw Jesus on the cross with the same understanding. Con-

sider those who were in the same situation, dying on a cross. "One of the criminals who were hanged railed at him, saying, "Are you not the Christ? Save yourself and us!" – Luke 23:39 (ESV). Dying along side Jesus, one of the men did not believe that Jesus was the Christ and expressed it. He joined those others who made fun and laughed at Jesus' predicament. Sad! He died in sin.

Yet the fellow on the other cross took a different view. Was he a believer in Jesus as the Christ who had broken the law and found himself dying for his sins...justly, perhaps, unlike Jesus? His testimony re the Christ is still remembered today; "But the other rebuked him, saving, "Do vou not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed justly, for we are receiving the due reward of our deeds; but this man has done nothing wrong" - Luke 23:40-41 (ESV). Since Jesus had the power for forgive, this man heard sweet words from the Lord's lips, "And he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." And he said to him, "Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise" - Luke 23:42-43 (ESV). He died to sin that day!!

Some of the Jews saw Jesus on the cross (as well as the other two who died with Jesus that day) as a problem that had to be cleared away before the Sabbath. John tells us, "Since it was the day of Preparation, and so that the bodies would not remain on the cross on the Sabbath (for that Sabbath was a high day), the Jews asked Pilate that their legs might be broken and that they might be taken away" - John 19:31 (ESV). Sadly, as they looked at the cross that day, they only saw dying men, not the Saviour of the world.

As they observed the cross some were moved to change their view of

the man who was dying/died there. Some of the soldiers were moved by the events which followed Jesus' death. "When the centurion and those who were with him, keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were filled with awe and said, "Truly this was the Son of God!" – Matthew 27:54 (ESV). It would be interesting to know if perhaps some of these men were in the audience who heard the first gospel sermon and how they might have reacted.

One other person who deserves consideration is a man named Joseph. He was a member of the Council, an upright man who had not agreed with the decision to put Jesus to death. He went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus so he could give him a proper burial. "Now there was a man named Joseph, from the Jewish town of Arimathea. He was a member of the council, a good and righteous man, who had not consented to

their decision and action; and he was looking for the kingdom of God. This man went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then he took it down and wrapped it in a linen shroud and laid him in a tomb cut in stone, where no one had ever yet been laid" – Luke 23:50-53 (ESV). At least in this action he was making his conviction plain.

The cross reminds us of the fact that we were unable to save ourselves. Sin is evident around us as we observe life and as we listen to the daily news. Sin continues to leave its mark through crime, sorrow, disease and human suffering. Paul reminds us that we have been delivered from the consequences

of sin through the death of Christ. "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come. All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God" -2 Corinthians 5:17–21 (ESV).

From the beginning man has been enticed by sin and it appears the people of today are no different. The cross helps us to understand how terrible sin really is. As noted in the passage above, special provision had to be made to take care of the sin problem. God's grace and love for mankind meant that this price had to be paid. We should fully understand that it is God's love and not our personal worth that caused this sacrifice. "...but where sin increased, grace abounded all the more, so that, as sin reigned in death, grace also might reign through righteousness leading to eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord" – Romans 5:20b – 21 (ESV).

The cross makes us aware of this inexhaustible love of God for humanity. We see the height, the depth and the width of His great love. It is a love that takes in all of mankind who are willing to submit to God's will in their life. Consider 1 John 3:1-3 (NIV), "How great is the love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God! And that is what we are! The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him.

Dear friends, now we are children of God, and what we will be has not yet been made known. But we know that when he appears, we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is. Everyone who has this hope in him purifies himself, just as he is pure".

In what can we boast? Paul reminded us that it should only be in the cross, "But far be it from me to boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ" - Galatians 6:14. Apart from the cross the church would be worthless. Apart from the cross, baptism would be worthless. Apart from the cross the Christian life would be worthless. So, let us rejoice in the cross and in all that it means to us who believe.

Piggy Banks

id you have a piggy bank as a child? Perhaps you still have one. Although not necessarily shaped like a pig, people have used some sort of coin storage for centuries. In fact, there is mention of something of this sort in 2 Kings 12:9. Piggy banks were often given to children as a way to teach them to save. Pennies, nickels and dimes placed in the bank would eventually add up to enough money to purchase that special wished for object or treat (lessons that are sadly lacking in this age of instant gratification).

The apostle Peter describes a sort of spiritual piggy bank in 2 Peter 1:5-7.

"For this very reason, make every effort to supplement your faith with virtue, and virtue with knowledge, and knowledge with self-control, and self-control with steadfastness, and steadfastness with godliness, and godliness with brotherly affection, and brotherly affection with love" (ESV).

Just as a financial goal motivated us to keep adding to our piggy bank's supply of coins, "His [God's] precious and very great promises" (verse 4) should motivate us to keep adding these attributes to our lives.

"Peter does not mean to imply that the believer is to cultivate each listed quality in turn, one after the other until all have been perfected. Instead, they are all to be cultivated simultaneously, in increasing measure. Peter has continuing spiritual growth in mind."

Still there is possibly a natural

progression in the list. First and foremost, Peter speaks of faith. Since he was writing to believers, he knew that they had faith for without it they would not be Christians. But faith needs to grow. Paul was grateful that the faith of the Thessalonians was growing (2 Thessalonians 1:3). Our faith also needs to grow. Just as James indicated that faith that isn't displayed through our works is dead (James 2:17ff), Peter also points out that faith is not passive but affects one's behaviour. This leads to the next item in his list—virtue. Various terms are used in different translations, but the Greek word basically means moral excellence.

"While the Greek philosophers discussed such excellence at length, Peter once again explained that true goodness could be found only in relationship with Christ. To their faith, believers were to add lifestyles that mirrored Christ's. Their motive for such high standards? The shining moral quality of Christ's life compels us to be our very best. That life of moral excellence should lead to knowing God better."²

Knowledge is not a bunch of accumulated facts but rather it is an understanding of God which leads to wisdom and discernment. It is necessary in order to make godly choices and decisions in our lives. It enables us to "live a life worthy of our calling" (Ephesians 4:1). It will help us to maintain self-control.

Self-control is keeping our sinful desires in check and our minds focussed on things the Spirit desires (Romans 8:5). The term self-control is somewhat misleading as we can only do this with the strength that comes from the Holy Spirit.

As our self-control grows stronger, so also does the likelihood that we will remain steadfast through whatever suffering and trials we may have to face in our lives. Again various translations will use other words such as patient endurance or perseverance but these all mean basically the same thing – not giving up when things get tough.

All of this will bring about a life of godliness. "The word describes an awareness of God in all of life—a lifestyle that exemplifies Christ and is empowered by Him. Christians must have a right relationship with God and right relationships with fellow believers." 3

A right relationship with God will naturally result in a right relationship with fellow believers. The Greek word used by Peter and translated as brotherly affection or brotherly kindness, is philadelphia which denotes strong family ties as should exist between siblings. As God's children, it is the way we are to love and care about one another.

"Such love among believers allows for weaknesses and imperfections, deals with problems, affirms others, and has a strong commitment and loyalty. Such a bond will hold the believers together no matter what persecutions and suffering they may face."

As we love one another in this way, that love is bound to spill over to others. Peter ends his list with love. Agape. It is that sacrificial love which puts others first and seeks their highest good. It is the love Jesus commanded that we should have toward those around us including our enemies (Matthew 5:44 and 19:19).

Just as one needs to keep adding coins to their piggy bank if they are to reach their desired goal, so believers must not only possess but continue to grow in all areas of Peter's list.

"For if these qualities are yours and are increasing, they keep you from being ineffective or unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. For whoever lacks these qualities is so nearsighted that he is blind, having forgotten that he was cleansed from his former sins" – 2 Peter 1:8, 9 (ESV).

Peter does not put a maximum limit for us to reach. Tese qualities are to continually increase in our lives. As they do, our relationship with God will be strengthened and we will better understand His will and how to please Him. We will be better salt and light. We will be more able to teach others as our own knowledge grows. We will be more able to keep sin from taking control of our lives and better equipped to remain faith-

ful through difficulties and persecution. We will be better able to strengthen and encourage our fellow saints and love will move us to share the Gospel with lost souls. We will become more Christ-like and glorify God through our lives. In short we will be effective and fruitful, and isn't that what every Christian should be striving for?


And we do need to strive for these Christ-like attributes. They do not come automatically with baptism nor is it enough to sit through sermons and Bible classes once or twice a week. In verse 5, Peter urges us to "make every effort" to obtain and grow these qualities. Bible classes and lessons will certainly help, but if we are to "make EVERY EFFORT", we need daily personal time deeply engrossed in God's word and in prayer. We need to work at it and work at it diligently (verse 10).

Remember how exciting it was when our stashed pennies, nickels and dimes had reached their goal? Peter reminds us of the rich reward that awaits those who steadily grow in the attributes he spoke of.

"So, dear brothers and sisters, work hard to prove that you really are among those God has called and chosen. Do these things, and you will never fall away. Then God will give you a grand entrance into the eternal Kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ" – 2 Peter 1:10, 11 (NLT).

What greater reward could anyone work toward?

FIRST SENIOR CAMP AT **SPRUSTON ROAD:** Attendance for the first "Over 50" senior camp was even better than originally thought, as about 50 oldies showed up for the varied activities that organizers had planned for the four-day camp in August. Free ferry rides to Vancouver Island and a varied program of speakers, skits, camp food and fellowship Aug. 17 through 20 brought reunions and surprises, as well as interesting thoughts from special speakers John and Carolyn McMillan from Kennedy, SK, whose suggestions on how we can maintain "Godliness in Today's World" were helpful and encouraging. Most felt a similar event would be well supported in the years to come.

JAPAN (Hokkaido): (Editorial note: This part of Japan has had one typhoon after another in recent weeks, with torrential rains so heavy they were nicknamed "waterfall rain". The following report is only a part of one letter from Steve Hasbrouck in Sapporo.). "With some areas in southern Japan getting over a meter (39 inches) of rain within just weeks, it has already caused major landslides in those areas. Then typhoon number 21 (so much for naming them--one a man, one a woman, etc.) hit with the most energy of any to hit the country in 25 vears! It landed down around Osaka (about 800 miles to the south) and then proceeded up the archipelago to slap Hokkaido a good one. Crops have been destroyed for the whole country for most of the year. We had torrential rains and winds up to 135 miles per hour. So far, so good? In some places, the rain came down so hard it actually did look more like a waterfall! Then we had a terrific

lightning and rain storm. It was nice (I love lightning, no fooling). About 3 a.m. it was rock and roll time, with the island getting hit by a 7.0 Japan scale earthquake, (at least 7 on the Richter). Now, with the land being super-saturated, the quake, which lasted almost a full minute, brought more devastating landslides, blew the boiler of the main generator which supplies electricity to most of the island and buckled roads in the city of Sapporo. Hospitals were without electricity; those without backup generators will probably add numbers to the death toll. So far, (as of this morning) seven have died and the entire island of over four million was without electricity until late last night. Even this morning, only 40% of the people have had their electricity restored. The city of Sapporo, 2 million people, lost their water. Kiyota ward looks like a bomb had gone off. I will admit I was frightened with the quake particularly because it was more vertical than horizontal in motion. When Marcia and I were at Pepperdine in 1970, the Sylmar quake took over 60 lives and had a similar motion. It is more frightening than the side to side quakes we have often experienced. Supermarkets took a large loss because refrigerated items didn't keep and had to be sold below price to get them out. There

was no gasoline for almost 24 hours because there was no electricity to run the pumps, etc. I am fine, but not looking forward to the next quake which is expected within the week, at a similar or higher magnitude. So, we will rest in God's care. "Shepherding the village": I don't like the idea of a preacher or pastor over one little church (sometimes a large church). I rather like to think that I am the shepherd for this little part of the world, this part of our village. We literally have a lower part and then the upper part, where we live, on the side of the cliff. So I made the rounds, calling at various houses and asking the folks how they were, did they have any problems, etc.(They are not Christians, but they are still God's creation and He loves them; they just don't seem to know that yet.) Now on Tuesday I had made a huge pot of chili and had prepared the fixings for a large pan of cornbread, to take to the wedding chapel to somewhat answer the teasing about my own cooking and also to celebrate the manager's upcoming marriage (she had just told me she was a career woman and would never marry as she is already over 50). I was going to pop the cornbread into the oven to bake while I got ready to go do two weddings, but the earthquake

changed all of that. Well, now I have a huge pot of chili and a pan of cornbread that I still intend to bake. I went over and got Brother Doi (his apartment with only one window gets very dark without lights) and told him to come stay the day with me. He came at ten. I went over to check on a neighbor and the daughter (in her forties) answered the door. She was all upset because she couldn't charge her iphone and was almost out of gas in her car. I told her I had three quarters of a tank and an adapter in my car and she was welcome to use it for shopping or recharging, up to at least a quarter of a tank. My two weddings being canceled, I didn't intend to go anywhere. She was greatly relieved about the cell phone, but didn't know what to do about dinner because without electricity, she couldn't cook rice, a staple in most

Japanese homes. Evidently she had never steamed rice in a pot on the stove because they have a two burner propane gas stove, no oven, (which is typical in Japan.) Our gas supply was not interrupted. So I told her that I would bring over some chili and fresh baked cornbread, but didn't know if they would like it. (Most Japanese have never eaten chili.) Then around 2 p.m., my photographer friend who I work with at the wedding chapel dropped in. He bought a house near here last year about a 10 minute walk away and said he had nothing to do and nowhere to go, so could he just stay? I invited him for dinner. At around 3:30 I took the fresh cornbread and chili next door, prepared cucumbers and tomatoes in vinegar for a salad, and we three sat down to dinner (it gets dark at 6:30 and we wanted to be able to see what we were eating).

We had coffee and then I remembered I have over 1000 candles that I brought home from doing weddings at the Park Hotel. Candles there are used for only one wedding, burn for about 20 minutes and then the used candles are often given to me, with at least sevens hours yet of use per candle. At 12 candles per wedding, it is easy to get over 1000 candles in a year, even though I do only about half of those weddings. No one else wants the candles! So I gave Brother Doi a large box of candles, gave the photographer a box and then took a box next door, so that each of us could at least have some light. No TV, no lights, only transistor radios and up until evening we had our cell phones and then they quit connecting. Bible study by candlelight, time for prayer and reflection, and early to bed, early to rise!" (One day's surprises in the life of a missionary!)





The Early Beginnings of the Kingston Church of Christ

July 2018 marked the 60th anniversary of the Kingston Church of Christ purchasing its building on College Street. The congregation gathered over the Simcoe Day weekend to celebrate the occasion. We were blessed to have former members and visitors from Toronto, Cambridge, Feversham and Ottawa with us to celebrate.

On Saturday evening, Trevor and Christine Shelly from Bayview Congregation roasted a lamb setting the tone for a great evening of fellowship at Chad and Robyn Comfort's home which included a meal and a hymn sing. Max Craddock encouraged us as he gave three lessons on Spiritual Renewal on Sunday. We were blessed to have Murray Hibbard (former member) lead our singing and Rob MacRury (former minister) lead us around the table. Further fellowship occurred as we ate together between the morning and afternoon sessions.

This occasion (and encouragement from Max Craddock) motivated me to look a little deeper into the beginnings of the Kingston church.

The September 1952 issue of the Gospel Herald includes this statement, "We are pleased to tell the readers...that there is now a congregation in Kingston, Ontario. This new congregation is meeting in the home of Brother H. Garrison...Brother D. A. Sinclair recently held a meeting there." This same month a listing was inserted into the directory at the back of the Gospel Herald. The Garrison home was just outside of the city.

In December, 1952 Bethel Bailey came to Kingston to hold meetings to assist the new congregation. He had spent the summer and fall months doing similar work with the young Ice Lake congregation. He reported in January 1953 that the meetings that were held in a rented hall were poorly attended because of the weather and the time of the year. but affirmed his plans to continue the next few more months in Kingston.

Early in 1953 Dorothy Bailey (Dennis) lived and worked with Bethel and Blanche. She recalls a friendship with a neighbour, Betty Bertrim who later became Betty

Bourdage. She and Glenn are the longest continual members of the Kingston congregation.

By 1954, plans were in the works to build a new facility as the Garrison house was too small to accommodate the numbers, but instead, by February of 1955 the church purchased a house that would accommodate the Bailey family and have space for the church to meet. By June of that year, the congregation was meeting in that house on Howard Cres. The Bourdages recall their wedding taking place there.

The congregation grew to about 20 and was bulging at the seams of the house they were using. Several options were considered, but the congregation ended up taking over a denominational Sunday School and Boy Scout Building. After the purchase was completed in July, the building was raised to build a basement under it and install a furnace. The first record of meetings taking place there is in the March 1959 Gospel Herald directory listing.

The early years found the minister working a secular job at times to feed his family and the church making sacrifices to try to reach out in Eastern Ontario and nearby New York State localities.

The congregation has continued to exist through the years going through many ups and downs. A group of 15 continues to meet. Chad Comfort and Art Ford have been sharing the preaching and teaching duties for the past year. In the early days there were many calls for Christians from other areas to join the Kingston church in its special meetings. Today Kingston has become a thriving senior-friendly city with affordable housing. For those seeking employment or looking for a retirement location, you will find yourself welcome to move here to assist the local church as it seeks to grow and impact the community.



- 3. Heaven is a prepared place for prepared people and the caring church is preparing its members for heaven (John 14:1-3; Revelation 21:1-3).

A caring church cares for its members, cares for others, cares for what is right and cares for God. As a result, a caring church will always be sharing, declaring and preparing. Do you care enough to help keep your congregation a caring church? If not, why not?



Is the silence of the scriptures a "red light" or a "green light" when deciding what can be done in worship and service to God?

congregation was interviewing a favorite candidate as a possible pulpit preacher. The man was obviously capable and popular. He looked like a certain choice. However, no one had asked him any questions about what he believed and preached on various questions currently bothering the congregation. A congregation that does not know what a preacher believes is headed for tragedy.

One brother asked the preacher about his view on the silence of the scriptures. He seemed to be confused by the question so

the man elaborated in the form of a traffic light image. "Is silence of the Scriptures a green light, meaning to go ahead, or is it a red light?" The candidate answered, "It is a caution light." Earlier, in telling about the congregation where he was then working, he had mentioned some practices that are not authorized in the scriptures. After the answer, some minds in the meeting seemed opened for the first time to question whether or not he was actually the best choice. In a short time, he voluntarily withdrew his name from further consideration.

The "authority" of the silence of the scriptures means that when God had commanded His will for man that He does not need to list all the things that he does not want done. In the New Testament we are not given a complete list of things we are not to do in worship to God. However, we are given the things the Lord wants us to do in worship to Him. It is not necessary to be told to **NOT** sprinkle babies; burn incense; hold religious processions; serve water or Gatorade at the Lord's Table, etc.
