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The Elijah Complex

lijah was a great oral (nonwriting) prophet of God who ⊿ lived around 860 B.C. His ministry was carried out during a time of great apostasy from the Lord and His law. 1 Kings 18 tells of the contest (debate) Elijah entered with the prophets of Baal who were leading the people of Israel into idolatry. Elijah challenged the Baal prophets to a showdown on Mount Carmel in which either Baal or the Lord would be shown to be the true God. Long story short, Baal was shown to be nothing, the Lord was shown to be everything, the people fell on their faces and repeatedly declared, "The LORD, He is God! The LORD, He is God!," and the 450 proph-

ets of Baal were summarily exe-

cuted by Elijah (1 Kings 18:39-40).

The New Testament writer James tells us, "Elijah was a man of like passions with us" [ASV], or "with a nature like ours" [NKJV] (James 5:17). In other words, Elijah was human and subject to all the foibles of humanity, including the tendency to become discouraged. Following the glorious defeat of the prophets of Baal, Elijah became despondent and thought he was the only one who was faithful to the Lord. He said, "I have been very zealous for the LORD God of hosts; because the children of Israel have forsaken Your covenant, torn down Your altars, and killed Your prophets with the sword. I alone am left; and they seek to take my life" (1 Kings 19:14). But God had a word for the discouraged prophet. The Lord said to him, "Yet I have reserved seven thousand in Israel, all whose knees have not bowed to Baal, and every mouth that has not kissed him" (verse 18).

Elijah's mind-set has been referred to as "the Elijah complex." It refers to those who think that they are the only ones who are faithfully serving the LORD. The fact is

that today (as in Elijah's day) there are many good and faithful servants of the Lord. Not everyone has abandoned the Lord's army for the army of Satan. Not all who wear the name of Christ have become unfaithful. Not all churches of Christ have "thrown in the towel" when it comes to pleading for a restoration and practice of apostolic Christianity in the present age. Not all preachers, elders, and congregations have become liberal. As in Elijah's day, there still are many "whose knees"

have not bowed to Baal"! There are multiplied thousands who are committed to being the church of the New Testament and fully dedicated to the Lord in both their personal and congregational lives!

At the same time we must realize that the faithful people of God have always been in the minority. Only eight souls were saved from the massive, world-wide flood-Noah, his wife, their three sons, and their wives (Genesis 7:13; I Peter 3:20). Just ten righteous souls would have spared the wicked cities of Sodom and Gomorrah (Genesis 18:32-33; Genesis 19). Of the thousands who left Egyptian bondage under the leadership of Moses, only two above the age of 20-Joshua and Calebwere eventually permitted to enter the promised land of Canaan (Numbers 32:11-13).

Jesus warned that "wide is the gate and broad is the way that leads to destruction, and there are many who go in through it. Because narrow is the gate and difficult is the way that leads to life, and there are few who find it" (Matthew 7:13-14). Christ went on to say, "Not everyone who says to Me, 'Lord, Lord,' will

enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of My Father who is in heaven" (Matthew 7:21). The sad reality is that most people will not have the interest or be willing to take the time to learn the true way of the Lord as set forth in the New Testament. False teachers and false teaching will confuse many and cause them to be lost (Matthew 7:15; Matthew 15:8-9; 1 Thessalonians 5:21; 2 Thessalonians 2:9-12; 1 Timothy 4:1-5; 2 Timothy 4:2-4; Jude 3-4; et al).

jah complex to point out the preceding matters, and I have to wonder why some elders, preachers, Bible professors, and congregations seemingly never get around to addressing the above matters, the related texts, and how they apply to the contemporary religious scene. Do they not believe that all Scripture is inspired of God and is profitable? With the old apostle, "I marvel" (Galatians 1:6).

One is not guilty of the Eli-

The great preacher and Bible scholar, Moses E. Lard, over a century and a half ago, with clear insight as to what was happening among the people of God at that time, said: "He is a poor observer of men and things who does not see slowly growing up among us a class of men who can no longer be satisfied with the ancient gospel and the ancient order of things. These men must have changes; and silently they are preparing the mind of the brotherhood to receive changes. Be not deceived, brethren, the Devil (sic) is not sleeping. If you refuse to see the dangers till ruin is upon you, then it will be too late. The wise seaman catches the first whiff of the distant storm, and adjusts his ship at once. Let us profit by his example.

"Let us agree to commune with the sprinkled sects around us, and soon we shall come to recognize them as Christians. Let us agree to recognize them as Christians, and immersion with its deep significance is buried in the grave of our folly... Then the door of heresy and schism will stand wide open, and the work of ruin will begin. Let us agree to admit organs, and soon the pious, the meek, the peace-loving, will abandon us, and our churches will become gay worldly things, literal Noah's arks, full of clean and

unclean beasts. To all this let us yet add, by way of dessert, and as a sort of spice to the dish, a few volumes of inner light speculations, and a cargo or two of reverend dandies dubbed pastors, and we may congratulate ourselves on having completed the trip in a wonderfully short time. We can now take rooms in Rome, and chuckle over the fact that we are as orthodox as the rankest heretic in the land.

Though we thus speak, and though we see the future not in the most enchanting light, we yet have hope. Many noble men are left. Many true hearts are still ready to be offered up on the altar of one Book, a pure faith and faultless practice. In God and these we put our trust" (Lard's Quarterly, April 1865).

"I Will Never Leave You Nor Forsake You"

MEANING OF GOD'S PROMISE FOR YOUR LIFE

Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or terrified because of them, for the Lord your God goes with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you" (Deuteronomy 31:6 NIV).

God commands our confident trust in Him. In a world that encourages us to believe in ourselves and to achieve all we deserve, it's important to understand who and Whose we are. Society sets a bar to earn and accumulate. Accomplishments and accessories are praised above humility and God-ordained purpose.

Often, people have a hard time taking God at His word. If God says it, that settles it, and there's absolutely no reason to doubt it. In place of worldly standards, the Old Testament admonishment of Deuteronomy 31:6 can serve as a benchmark in our everyday lives.

Hebrews 13:5 echoes the same sentiment, putting an extra emphasis on what not to have confidence in: "Keep your lives free from the love of money and be content with what you have, because God has said, 'Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you…'" (NIV).

Deuteronomy 31:6 was written to encourage the people of Israel, including Joshua, Solomon and Hezekiah's military officers. Their Old Testament reality presented their lives with unconquerable challenges, and God wanted them to know explicitly that they could trust Him to lead them to victory.

It was a call to obedience amidst great adversity. Two verses later God repeated, "The Lord himself goes before you and will be with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged" (Deuteronomy 31:8 NIV). When we promise "always" or "never" we are incapable of upholding it. Therefore, the infamous saying, "never say never!" However, when God promises "always" or "never" He can be fully trusted to honor His word. "God is not a man, that he should lie, nor a son of man, that he should change his mind. Does he speak and then not act? Does he promise and not fulfil?" (Numbers 23:19 NIV).

Imagine having to follow Moses. Joshua's call was to lead the Israelites into the promised land Moses had been guiding them towards for forty years. No pressure. Joshua had witnessed the flaws of his mentor. Surely, he harbored doubts of his own. But God assured him in Joshua 1:5 "No one will be able to stand against you as long as you live. For I will be with you as I was with Moses. I will not fail you or abandon you" (NIV).

The legacy of our Heavenly Father's character resonates in Solomon's reaffirmation as the temple in Jerusalem finally came to fruition: "May the LORD our God be with us

as he was with our ancestors; may he never leave us or abandon us" (1 Kings 8:57 NIV). LORD, capitalized, is significant. It means Yahweh, the highest and most emphatic expression of our loving and compassionate Father.

Genesis 28:15 reads, "Behold, I am with you and will keep you wherever you go, and will bring you back to this land. For I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised you." The NIV Cultural Backgrounds Study Bible notes of Jacob's dream, "We should not imagine that the angels Jacob saw were marching in procession down and up the stairway as often pictured in art. Rather he saw messengers (angels) going off on missions and retiring from delivering their messages."

Hebrews 13:5 applies the same concept conditionally, both spiritual and physically. The transition from traditional Jewish faith to following Christ led New Testament writers to remind believers that efforts to earn their salvation were not Biblical. Ridding their lives of rules in exchange for a new way of life demanded they put their trust and obedient faith in Christ alone. If you have obeyed the gospel of Jesus scripturally, you have God with you at all times through the promised Holy Spirit. Is God with you? If not, why not?

We Remember

eptember 11 marked the 18th anniversary of the "9/11" terrorist attacks. It was a staggering assault which shocked the world. It still seems unthinkable that four commercial aircraft were

used as weapons to cause such a massive amount of death and destruction. For those of us who were alive at the time, it still seems recent and real. But those people who are now turning 18 have no memory of it, except as something in the past. They were just born.

Events like 9/11 are part of our "cultural memory." They are embedded in our long-term memory even though we may not have personally experienced them. You can probably think of many examples, such as the assassinations of Lincoln and JFK, the attack on Pearl Harbor, D-Day, the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the moon landing—to name a few. We may not remember the actual date, but we cannot forget the event, and may even participate in observances that help perpetuate those memories.

Sometimes, memories are encouraged by sayings like "Remember the ..." or "Lest we forget." The events were so significant and worldchanging they need to be remembered. The sayings evoke memories which stir feelings. Sometimes, the sayings become battle cries. Whatever, they serve as catalysts for the future.

For Christians, our faith is based on powerful memories. Much of scripture represents the memories of those who participated or observed—which also helps to validate our convictions that these were real events. (Like John recalling what he had seen, heard and touched.) More than that, our worship centres on memory. We remember what God has done,

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who He is, His power and love, our hope—so many memories.

Jesus created memories for the Apostles as He lived with them and taught them, and as they were present for the events of His life. They were His witnesses, telling others about Him, helping them to develop memories of Him. Imagine the memory they had of the Last Supper. As they passed the memory on by sharing the memorial meal with others, Christ was made more real and personal. Can we imagine sitting with one of the Apostles as they spoke of sharing that last meal with Christ—perhaps of the words, sights, sounds and smells—even of their puzzlement at how a familiar Jewish custom was framed in new words and images to become a new memory to be observed and passed on? "Do this in remembrance of me."

Over time, memories can fade and lose their significance through carelessness and routine. People often speak jokingly about those who forget anniversaries and birthdays. As generations come and go, 9/11 may fade into history. However, we should never allow the story of Jesus and the cross, remembered in the Lord's Supper, to ever become common and casual.

Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand firm" - Ephesians 6:10-13 (ESV).

To win the Christian crown one must keep on keeping on. "But we are not of those who shrink back and are destroyed, but of those who have faith and preserve their souls" – Hebrews 10:39 (ESV).

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"Trust in the LORD, and do good; dwell in the land and befriend faithfulness. Delight yourself in the LORD, and he will give you the desires of your heart. Commit your way to the LORD; trust in him, and he will act" - Psalm 37:3-5 (ESV).

The Christian is one who has come to believe—and as he experiences more—believes even more in the truth of the statement we just noted from Psalm 37. The Christian has come to the point where he builds his hopes on things that are changeless and eternal. He believes that God is indeed his Heavenly Father and on His being and character one builds for the future.

God can and will use those men and women who trust in Him and believe in His promises. (Many others could be noted from the Bible who showed the value of trusting in God and doing His will. Perhaps you can relate to Joseph as well as any and his life is a great lesson for us all).

Trust God because He is the fount of every blessing. (James 1:17; Matthew 7:11)—because of His infinite power which He will use for us. "For this reason I bow my knees before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named. that according to the riches of his glory he may grant you to be strengthened with power through his Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith—that you, being rooted and grounded in love, may have strength to comprehend with all the saints what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, that you may be filled with all the fullness of

Bananas

he popular children's program, Sesame Street, often used catchy little songs to teach a lesson. I am proof that this is a successful method as I have remembered one of those songs for possibly thirty years. That song is about bananas and the chorus goes like this: "Just count one banana, two banana; one for me and one for you banana.

Count three or four or even more banana, 'cause banana can't grow alone."

If you have ever seen bananas growing (or a picture of them), you know that the song is correct. God placed bananas in bunches. They do not grow alone. God also placed Christians in bunches because we can't grow alone either.

"And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. ... And all who believed were together and had all things in common. And they were selling their possessions and belongings and distributing the proceeds to all, as any had need. And day by day, attending the temple together and breaking bread in their homes, they received their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having favor with all the people. And the Lord added to their number day by day those who were being saved" – Acts 2:42; 44-47 (ESV).

Those first Christians spent time together. They shared with one another. They helped one another. They needed one another. We still need one another.

In 1 Corinthians 12, a passage which paints some rather comical pictures, Paul tried to impress on the Corinthian Christians that all members are needed and important to the whole. There, as in some other letters, he compared the church to the human body. Just as all parts of the body are necessary for the body to function properly, so also are all members needed for the church to function and grow.

"But in fact God has arranged the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. If they were all one part, where would the body be? As it is, there are many parts, but one body.

The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I don't need you!' And the head cannot say to the feet, 'I don't need you!' On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and the parts that we think are less

honorable we treat with special honor. And the parts that are unpresentable are treated with special modesty, while our presentable parts need no special treatment. But God has combined the members of the body and has given greater honor to the parts that lacked it, so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other. If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it.

Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it" – verses 18-27 (NIV 1984).

"Not only should each individual part realize its own importance, but all the other parts should realize their interdependence as well. One part of the body can never say it doesn't need another part. Those in the church who have the more spectacular gifts should not look down on or dismiss those with other gifts because, in reality, all are needed."

Just as God designed each part of the body so that it would benefit the whole being, He also gave each of us gifts which enable us to enrich and strengthen the body of Christ.

"Now these are the gifts Christ gave to the church: the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, and the pastors and teachers. Their responsibility is to equip God's people to do his work and build up the church, the body of Christ" –

Ephesians 4:11, 12 (NLT).

But it isn't just the leaders mentioned in these verses who are to build up the church as we can see from verse 16.

"He makes the whole body fit together perfectly. As each part does its own special work, it helps the other parts grow, so that the whole body is healthy and growing and full of love."

The rest of the chapter describes ways we should be treating one another so that the body will be healthy and full of love. If we understand that all are needed and each one is important, there should be no comparing of talents, no jealousy, and no elevating of one above another. All should be working together for the common good.

Peter said, "God has given each of you a gift from his great variety of spiritual gifts. Use them well to serve one another. Do you have the gift of speaking? Then speak as though God himself were speaking through you. Do you have the gift of helping others? Do it with all the strength and energy that God supplies. Then everything you do will bring glory to God through Jesus Christ. All glory and power to him forever and ever! **Amen**" – 1 Peter 4:10, 11 (NLT).

We need to be doing all we can to help and encourage one another—and that takes more than just spending an hour together on Sunday morning. Remember the passage from Acts 2? Those early Christians worshipped together. They shared meals in one another's homes. They studied together. They prayed together. And they did this, not just once a week but "day by day". The following verses also point out our need for frequent fellowship and exhortation.

"But exhort one another every day, as long as it is called 'today,' that none of you may be hardened by the deceitfulness of sin" – Hebrews 3:13 (ESV).

"And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near" – Hebrews 10:24, 25 (ESV).

"So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you are already doing" – 1 Thessalonians 5:11 (NLT).

There are many believers who are very good at helping

others when there is a special need, such as a sickness or death, but we should always be concerned about the spiritual health of our brothers and sisters.

"Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others" – Philippians 2:4 (ESV).

Read through Paul's letters and see how often he mentioned praying for his brethren. We should be doing likewise. Prayer is just one of many ways in which we can encourage each other and build each other up. They all require time and energy, but mostly, they require love and devotion.

"Well, I think banana is like you and me—needing each one in our church family.

Let us take a lesson from banana tree, "cause banana can't grow alone."

MISSIONNEWS

Dear brothers and sisters...

Please excuse, this is a "group email' but it is the easiest way for me to share this with you and others who have a heart for the lost.

In August I had the opportunity to travel to Austria and to volunteer as a short-term missionary with Gerhard, the long-term missionary who lives in Vienna. He is a third generation Christian and originally from Vienna, Austria. He studied at Sunset in Lubbock, Texas and is very sound doctrinally. His American wife teaches at an international school in Vienna and they live on her salary, which allows Gerhard to dedicate 100% of his time to the mission effort. He takes no salary, but puts 100% of donations and support into the mission work.

What did I do during the two weeks?

I taught Bible class or preached a sermon for the English speaking Nigerian congregation in Vienna, the Farsi speaking congregation in Vienna, the Farsi speaking congregation in Salzburg and the Farsi speaking congregation in Klagenfurt. On two consecutive Thursdays I led a Bible study in a coffee shop in Traiskirchen. This town is 30 minutes outside of Vienna and it has the largest refugee facility in the country. A few hundred refugees live in an old Army Cadet College. Both members of the church and new guests (who are mostly newly arrived refugees) attend this study each week. Because the Austrian government moves refugees around the country to facilities that have vacant rooms in them, many of the newly baptized and those who are studying but not baptized vet, have been moved away from Traiskirchen and Vienna into isolated small towns. I travelled out to three such towns on four different occasions to have small group Bible studies and fellowship in an effort to encourage these new Christians and

non-Christians. At every gathering each person had their own Bible, either a physical copy or an electronic one on their phone, and they turned to every verse in the lesson, read it for themselves, and followed along. Gerhard has worked hard at this with them. He does not use PowerPoint. does not put the verses up on a screen during worship. He wants everyone turning to every verse, reading and thinking for themselves. I was very impressed by this and the depth of their thinking and questions. For example, one member asked, "Why did God send an angel to rescue Peter from prison but he left John the Baptist to die in prison?" Or, "Jesus said not to cast our pearls before swine, but he also said to pray for our enemies. How do I do both?"

What are the main needs?

Money for train and bus tickets so that people can attend worship. Some Christians are travelling up to three hours, one way, to come to a congregation in Traiskirchen, Vienna, Salzburg or Klagenfurt. When they do make it, Gerhard reimburses them for the cost of their train and bus travel. As newly arrived refugees, they are not allowed to work. They must live in government refugee facilities where they get their lodging and food provided for them, as well as 50 Euro a month for all their other needs and expenses, so they cannot afford transportation to and from church. This can cost as much as \$3200 (USD) in one week for all those who come to all of the congregations. Beginning in the near future, Gerhard is helping the Christians who live in isolated refugee facilities to organize their own worship every second week, so that they only have to travel twice a month to worship with one of the established congregations rather than every week. There are some obstacles. In some of the facilities you are not allowed to hold a worship service, so they will have to go outside of the refugee facility to a public park (or somewhere inside in the winter) to have a worship service. Also, many of the members are new Christians, so Gerhard has to help them to know how to conduct worship. He is preparing study material that he can share with them every second week via cell phone so they will have a lesson to study or listen to as many are not ready to teach yet. This will help to cut down the transportation costs per person, but as more are baptized, the costs will continue to rise.

Gerhard and I came up with an idea to help. We hope to find congregations or groups of five Christians who would like to sponsor the transportation cost for one Christian in Austria. If each Christian could give \$25 per month, the group of 5 could provide \$125 to cover all the transportation costs to and from church for one Christian. (Train and bus tickets are not cheap in Austria.)

Gerhard would pick the members to support. He would only pick those who are already demonstrating commitment and active participation in the church. Then, the group of 5 Christians would transfer \$125 each month, using PayPal, directly to the PayPal account of the Christian in Austria. This will eliminate administration, delays, etc. The Group of 5 and the Christian in Austria could get to know each other through email, Facebook, WhatsApp, etc. Gerhard would monitor each Christian in Austria who is part

of the program, and would change people out if they stop attending, etc.

If you think your congregation (or 5 people in your church) might like to sponsor one refugee Christian in Austria, please contact me and we can work out the details. I've included a photo of Ali, a refugee from Iran who is attending the church of Christ in Salzburg, Austria. He travels 3 hours, one way, to come to church. He is separated from his wife and 1 year old son, who are refugees in Sweden. They hope to be together in one country in the future. He is an example of a Christian who would be helped through this program. I am hoping that as a brotherhood, Christians in Canada could sponsor a total of 10 to 15 Christians in Austria.



Claims of Jesus

Donald Perry (First Published in the Herald in 1985)

Tesus went about doing good and teaching those who were attracted to Him. Those who heard Him began to realize that He was different, for He taught as one having authority. When they saw the miracles which He performed they really began to wonder about Him. Who was this man who could cast out demons, heal the diseased, quiet the storm and even raise the dead?

A great number of people had come to conclude that Jesus was from God. Nicodemus, a Pharisee who came to Jesus at night, confessed, "Rabbi we know you are a teacher who has come from God for no one can perform the miraculous signs you are doing if God were not with him" (John

3:2). After being with Jesus and getting to know Him intimately, Peter boldly said, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16). In many situations. Jesus worked quietly and let the miracles He did in his Father's name speak for Him (John 10:25). But in other situations. He made some very definite claims for Himself.

"Tell us if you are the Christ, the Son of God," was the charge of the high priest at the trial of Jesus. He replied, "You have said so. But I tell you, from now on you will see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of power and coming on the clouds of heaven." (Matthew 26:64) When Pilate asked Jesus if He were a king, Jesus answered, "You are right in saying I am a king. In fact, for this reason I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth" (John 18:37). Jesus made these extraordinary claims and did not deny charges of blasphemy even in the face of death.

A separate study of each claim which Jesus made for Himself would emphasize the meaning which Jesus can have for us. Each claim that Jesus makes presents a facet through which we see the glorious personage of Jesus the Christ, the Son of the living God.

The Son

Jesus claimed to have come from the Father. He claimed that the Father sent Him. He was doing the work of the Father and saying what the Father told Him to say. He was going back to be with His Father. He and His Father were one, He said. The significance of this claim challenges us. It challenges our understanding. It challenges our faith. It challenges us to humble obedience.

The Jews understood that when He said that He was doing the works of His Father and was indeed calling God His Father, that He was making Himself equal with God (John 5). It was on this charge that they put Him to death. Jesus died on the

cross still calling God His Father. "Father, forgive them." "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit." But for us to try to fully understand how Jesus could be the Son of God is folly. The church in the centuries following Christ divided over efforts to explain the nature of Jesus as the Son of God. The real challenge to us is to take the word of Jesus in faith. If Jesus as the Son of God can be Immanuel (God with us). that is enough. A son in the family could fully represent the father. Jesus claimed then that His teaching was from the Father, that He had authority to

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forgive sins, that judgement was given to Him, that He could give life and that He was the resurrection.

Man has sought to reach out beyond the confines of this life on earth. He has sought to know what is beyond "the cold and barren peaks" of birth and death. Immanuel Kant, the watershed German philosopher, stated that the great questions for man through the ages have been of God, man and sin. Jesus came to reveal God to man. He claimed to know man (John 2:24). He came

to deal with sin and to present man righteous before God. Man seeks to know the great mysteries of life, death and eternity. God answers

man in Jesus Christ, the Son of the Father. Man needs to humbly accept the Son as his Lord and Saviour.

The Light

On a number of occasions, Jesus claimed to be the light of the world. He claimed that the world was in darkness and that men were stumbling in the darkness. Light shows flaws. Light shows us how things should be. Light provides a bigger perspective. Light helps us to get things together. Light gives direction so we know where to go and how to get there. Man is so dependent on the light from the sun for physical life on this planet that life is unimaginable without it. Even at night we make use of the stored energy which has come from the sun. In cold weather it is energy from the sun that keeps us warm as we use fuels and hydroelectric energy. The high standard of living man has come to enjoy is for the most part due to his

learning to harness the energy from the sun.

We could compare this dependence on the energy of the light from the sun to our need for spiritual light from God through his Son. Jesus claimed that He came so that man might have life and have it to the full (John 10:10). This high standard of life in the spiritual sense is possible to those who will come to the light. Jesus knew that men would not come to the light because they love darkness since their deeds are evil (John 3:19). For those

willing to trust Jesus as the Light there is life eternal, a life beyond our imagination or anticipation.

An Example

After we have been told and taught, we need someone to show us how. God knows how we ought to live; Jesus shows us how we ought to live. Being "God among men," He becomes to us an example. The "stars" of sports, movies and music are not enough for us. They have the same limitations and aberrations that we have. Jesus claimed to be the Way the truth and the life (John 14:6). After He humbly washed His disciples' feet He said, "I have set you an example that you should do as I have done" (John 13:15). When He was trying to teach His disciples to avoid personal ambition, He was able to put His example before them: "Even as the Son of Man came not to be served, but to serve, and give himself a ransom for many" (Matthew 20:28).

Jesus invites men to follow Him. What an invitation! What a challenge! This is where a real commitment is possible.

Forgiveness

Jesus told a number of people that their sins were forgiven. The Jews had a problem with this. They considered sin to be against God, and that God alone could forgive sins. Yet, Jesus claimed to forgive sins. When a man was brought to Jesus on a bed, Jesus first told him that "his sins were forgiven". When Jesus

perceived that some present questioned His authority to forgive sins, He said to the paralytic, "I tell you, get up, take your mat and go home" (Mark 2:11).

When the people could see that the man was healed physically, some could believe that they could also be healed spiritually by Jesus. Believing in Him, they could know that He had authority on earth to forgive sins. Sin is still real though many may deny God and His law. Jesus sent His apostles to preach a message of forgiveness of sins and wholeness of life to those who would repent and be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ (Acts 2:38). When He is accepted as Lord, He becomes the Saviour.

Conclusion

Space fails to write of Jesus as the great Shepherd, the water of life, the bread of life, the resurrection, the truth and the vine. He can become everything to those who will put their trust In Him. Praise God for his most excellent way: Not a philosophy of life, but a life: God who became flesh and dwelt among us!

The Wonder of Writing

Irst, the wonder of writing is the marvel of language. Scientific studies in linguistics have determined that man has a built-in aptitude for both sounds production and grammatical construction. For example, studies have shown that children of all races and language groups in learning to speak go through set stages. In the first six months, all children make the same sounds and listen to themselves while experimenting with over one hundred distinct sounds. Next comes a jargon peri-

od in which even the deaf child is active. During the second year specific words are learned under parental and other's tutoring, and

the child attempts to pair words. In the third and fourth years phrases are attempted; children are learning by rules. By the fifth year there is a start at understanding clauses. The child has a sense of categories of parts of speech and he won't mix categories. Primates who have been trained in rudimentary sign language have no such inherent grammatical sense.

Prior to the 60s, the behaviorists were saying that language learning is controlled response to stimulus, reinforcement, deprivation—the usual elements in the explanation of behaviorism. In the 60s, Noam Chomsky and others in the young science of cognitive psychology were demonstrating that linguistic ability is an inward functioning of the mind, not the predictable results of stimuli in the environment. It would appear that the human mind is programmed, hard lined in computer terms, for language creation and use. These insights were shared with me by Andrew Fleming, a

graduate student in linguistics.

In 1982, University of Hawaii linguist, Derek Bickerton, published his work *Roots of Language*. He concluded that the roughly 350 creole languages in the world share almost identical grammatical structures. Creole, or pidgin, languages which sprang up as Colonialism spread from 1500 to 1900, are make-shift tongues which tack together words from the various languages being used in order that workers with diverse

languages might communicate. "Because the structures of creoles were formed from scratch, instead of evolving from existing tongues, they show grammar and syntax developing naturally." Bickerton concludes that this may be evidence of a bioprogram that shapes man's gift for words (Newsweek, March 22, 1982)

Christians can identify such as evidence of design pointing to the creative activity of God. The linkage of language with intelligence is the important factor here. Man has the power of reasoning logic, of creative thought, of esthetic appreciation, of moral evaluation. All of these he is able to communicate through the marvel of language.

The wonder of writing, secondly, is that its development parallels God's progressive revelation of himself in the literary masterpiece of all time, the Bible. Written records go back more than 5,000 years. The earliest forms of writing were stylized pictures repre-

senting basic objects or ideas. The Egyptian hieroglyphic script was developed around 3,000 BC. In Mesopotamia, picture writing was upgraded to the cuneiform script, involved wedge-shaped which markings pressed into clay. The major step forward which provided a single symbol to represent each consonant, ie. alphabet writing, was first used in the area of and in languages closely akin to Hebrew usage somewhat before 1500, the beginning time of the

actual writing of the Old Testament Scriptures. (Cf. Deuteronomy 31:24).

In addition to carvings in stone and markings in

clay, paper (from papyrus) was developed for every day writing and vellum (ie. polished leather) for valuable records. Aramaic, closely related to Hebrew, was the official language of the Persian Empire (c; 550 BC), and was the common language in Palestine in the time of Christ. Portions of Aramaic are found in both the Old and the New Testaments. By the first century, Greek, in a 'common form', had spread throughout the civilized world. Unsurpassed in its expressiveness and exacting construction, it became the language of the New Testament writings.

Thus, through language God "spoke to the fathers through the prophets at many times and in various ways and in these last days he has spoken to us by his Son." (Hebrews 1:1) And through writing he has preserved this information for God-seekers in every generation. The story of the scribes of the Old Testament, their training, discipline and precision, and the story of the later monastic copiers

of the Scriptures, their diligence, fortitude, and devotion, capture men at their. reverent best. The development of printing, with the Bible the first work to be produced, is a story of the changing shape of modern society. Northrop Frye's work, *The Great Code: the Bible and Literature* (1982 testifies to the continuing cultural importance of the Bible as the single most important influence in Western art and literature.

The impact of writing upon our lives cannot be minimized. This is still true even though, with the advent of TV, whole segments of society are reverting to a pictographic mentality, where symbolism, emotionalism, and illiteracy abound. Ignatius Loyola's *Spiritual Exercises*, Thomas à Kempis, *The Imitation of Christ*, Karl Marx's *Das Capital*, Adolph Hitler's *Mein Kampf*, illustrate the explosive power of recorded Ideas and testify to the wonder of writing.

For a people such as the fellowship of brethren of churches of Christ in Canada, no matter how small we may be or how mute we may feel, to have the privilege of the pages of a Christian journal such as the Gospel Herald, wherein ideas can be communicated to each other 'from sea to sea' is indeed a precious benefit. How precious this benefit is to us will be determined by how carefully men and women enter the disciplines of writing and how thoroughly the readers examine the thoughts' presented. On the occasion of the 50th year of the Gospel Herald, may we show our gratitude to God for the gifts of language, spoken and written, by dedicating ourselves to a more serious use of this publication to the glory of God and the encouragement of men.

Obedience, a Key to Abundant Living

braham probably had a lot going for him for many years in his hometown. Ur of the Chaldees was a wealthy place. Abraham came from a well-established family, was married to a local girl, no doubt owned a home, and probably had a good job in this ancient seaport. "Leave it all." God told him one day. Leave all that security and become a wanderer in a country he didn't even know about yet?

Abraham could have refused, disobeyed God and continued with the good life at Ur. But Genesis tells us that this man had more respect and faith in God than that. "So, Abram went, as Jehovah had spoken unto him" (Gen. 12:4). Hebrews tells us he began a life of wandering, taking directions from God where to go. From a settled life in Ur they now lived in tents. Those of us who like to go camping know that tenting is okay for a while, but rain and many other conditions can make the experience miserable! I'm sure they adjusted to it and lived comfortably, but it was a great change from home! Abraham and Sarah stand as great examples of obedience.

"Because thou hast obeyed my voice"

Why did he obey the Lord and thus experience such a great change in life-style? Wouldn't it be easier just to forget about the Lord's instructions? Abraham didn't think so, and he made the night decision. He knew something about obedience that made his decision a lot easier. He was aware that obedience to God, while it is not always easy at first, puts one in harmony with the Lord of this Universe, and life becomes enriched because of it. He subjected himself to God in humility and immediately began to feel the rewards of obedience.

Rewards? That's right. Too many

people think of obedience as something we do "because we have to." It's boring and a terrible drag, etc. Abraham saw the REWARD! Right off the bat, God promised him personal greatness, blessings of all sorts, tremendous descendants and later he promised land in abundance! On top of all that, Hebrews reveals Abraham was aware of the heavenly realm, which had obviously been promised him too, (Hebrews 11:16).

Later on, as his faith was tested and Abraham obeyed again, the greatest promise of all was made to this great man: the Messiah would bless all the world, and He would come through Abraham's seed (Genesis. 22:18). Why so many promises and blessings to this one man? God tells us: 'because thou have obeyed my voice." His faith proved to be rock-solid by his obedience.

Obedience Enriches!

All personal benefits of obeying God come to us because of another man who accomplished the greatest act of obedience possible. His name was Jesus. He left heaven in obedience to God. Then suffering the cross at the hands of the very people He had created, His obedience to God was taken to the extreme. Jesus "learned obedience by the things which he suffered" (Heb. 5:8). Through that obedience he paid sin's price for every human. Then he proceeded to conquer our other great enemy, death. Obedience, accomplished all of this, and was rewarded as well: "who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross" (Heb. 12:2). God rewards obedience!

It's because of Christ's obedience to the 'Father that our obedience can be an enriching experience and set us on a course that leads to abundant living. For example, our obedience to the gospel brings us forgiveness and "connects" us to the source of real life: God himself. All the benefits of that "connection" flow to us from the throne of grace. Without obedience to the gospel, we're living in death.

God Blesses Those Who Obey!

Listen to God, "If ye be willing and obedient, ye shall eat the good of the land..." (Is. 1:19-20). Israel reaped material wealth because of obedience, and the poorhouse when she disobeyed. This was the message of the prophets to a disobedient people: repent and be obedient, and God will bless you again. Perhaps not with material wealth for obedience today, but blessings flow, nonetheless.

Consider: (1) God will exalt us in due time: 1 Pet. 5:54; (2) Avoids bad mistakes and sorrow in life: Prov. 5:11-14; (3) Harmony with God because we are at peace with Him: Romans 5:1; (4) Causes brethren to rejoice over you: Romans 16:19

Obedience Is Fundamental

Obedience has a lot to do with the heart. There are a lot of reasons why we sometimes fail to obey. Some people have their minds filled with the ways of the world. The television and broadcasting Industry works hard to make the world's ways look appealing. Sometimes we choose the world before we choose to obey God.

Then there is ignorance. Some people just don't know about God and His ways, about God's offer through Jesus. How can such people obey what they don't know!

But a man's heart is at the core of the obedience question. Do we really believe that God's ways are best and therefore we obey? Or, down deep, do we feel our own ways are better, therefore we obey God in a half-hearted way or not at all. The man who is obedient to God and is enriched by that obedience is a man who really believes God's wisdom is best, and is willing to obey God even when he doesn't fully understand that wisdom at times. Abraham didn't fully understand WHY God wanted him to sacrifice Isaac, but he trusted God and always obeyed! James put it this way: "God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace to the humble. Be subject therefore unto God" (James 4:6,7).
