


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Understanding Fellowship With God

The word 'fellowship' sometimes can be difficult to define. Dictionaries, such as the American Heritage Dictionary, use words such as companionship, friendship, and 'a close association of friends or equals' to define the word. But when we are talking about the spiritual implications of words, I like to go to the Bible for God's intended meaning. Jesus said in John 14:23, "If anyone loves me, he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our home with him" (ESV). Here Jesus presents a visual picture of fellowship, where the Father and the Son make their dwelling with the one who loves him and keeps his commandments. It is a picture of a close, genuine relationship.

Have you ever wondered why God has such an interest in having a relationship with us, his creation? What does fellowship mean to God? Can we understand its importance to Him? To answer these questions, I believe we need to look closely at his very nature.

God Is Eternal

In Moses' prayer to God in Psalm 90, the final statement in verse 2 reads, "from everlasting to everlasting you are God" (ESV). And again in Isaiah 44:6, the scripture says, "Thus says the Lord, the King of Israel and his Redeemer, the Lord of hosts: 'I am the first and I am the last; besides me there is no god'" (ESV). Understand that when the Lord God says he is the First and the Last, he is addressing his eternal nature - that he is at the beginning of all things and at the end of all things. While this is not a surprising revelation for us today, the Lord's eternal nature is something we need to be keenly aware of, particularly as we connect it other aspects of his nature, such as his plurality.

God Is Plural

We understand from the scriptures that the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit are one. In fact, Jesus comforted John the apostle with the same words his Father used in describing himself from Isaiah saving "I am the first and the last" in Revelation 1:17, and then again he said it in Revelation 22:13. Jesus claimed his Father's eternal nature - that he is without beginning or ending. In addition, Jesus told his disciples, "I and the Father are one" - John 10:30 (ESV). The Biblical text also expresses the oneness and unity of the Godhead in Matthew 28:19, where in speaking of baptism, Jesus said it is to be done "in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (ESV). All three beings of the Deity are mentioned, and the word "name" is singular (the text does not read "names"), which is significant as it illustrates that the Father, Son and Holy Spirit equally share this singular name. This shows the unity they have as God. Plurality as one. And so this should bring us to the truth of God's nature: that God has always existed in a state of community. He has always enjoyed eternal fellowship. And it has been a fellowship characterized by love.

God Is Love

One of the themes of the letter of

1 John is love – that we are to love because love is from God. 1 John 4:8 reads, "Anyone who does not love does not know God, because God is love" (ESV). From the text we see that God does not simply have the ability to love, but rather that love is an essential part of his very nature. And it should be noted that the context of the passage is one-another love – as verse 7 says, "let us love one another" (ESV). There are some in the religious world today who deny the plurality of God and believe that only the Father is eternal. But if we follow that line of thinking to its logical conclusion, it would indicate that the Father would have existed in the eternal past without even the ability to love until his creative work began, for the simple reason that he would have had no one TO love.

So God has always had one-another love between the Father, the Son and the Spirit. This is what God has always known – perfect, loving, never-ending fellowship. This is the God who created the heavens and the earth. He is the God who created man, male and female, and placed them in the



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Garden of Eden. And it is through his creation where we clearly see his holiness.

God Is Holy

As recorded in David's prayer in Psalm 5:4, he wrote "For you are not a God who delights in wickedness; evil may not dwell with you" (ESV). At the conclusion of God's creative work in Genesis 1, he saw that it was 'very good' (Genesis 1:31). It was described in this manner because evil had not vet touched it: God's creation was pure. The holiness of God was reflected in the nature of what he created, and was the basis for his fellowship with man. At the beginning, Adam and Eve enjoyed the kind of fellowship with their creator that God had always known.

Of course we know the rest of the story with sin breaking that fellowship. As Isaiah 59:2 says, "but your iniquities have made a separation between you and your God, and your sins have hidden his face from you" (ESV). God is the great law-giver, and sin is lawlessness (1 John 3:4), so sin is always against God and violates who God is (his character). But the beauty about God is that he so desires fellowship with man that he sent the eternal Logos to become flesh, dwell among man, and offer up his own life as a ransom for many.

Our eternal, plural, loving, holy God "is patient toward you, not wishing that any should perish, but that all should reach repentance" – 2 Peter 3:9 (ESV). His desire and will is just as Jesus had said: "If anyone loves me, he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our home with him" – John 14:23 (ESV). This is what fellowship with God looks like; and we should desire it just as much as God does.

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Are We A Jesus Centered People?

The entire Bible revolves around Jesus. Consider the amount of time God dedicated to Jesus in the New Testament – the gospels occupy half of it pages, the same story told four times! That Godgiven emphasis (II Timothy 3:16) should tell us something about the importance God gives to Jesus. God reinforces that emphasis by showing how Jesus' life changed others' lives in the book of Acts. The letters that Paul and others wrote also stress Jesus' importance by basing all of their teachings about the Christian life on Jesus' life and teachings. This foundation can clearly be seen by noting the innumerable references to Jesus within these letters. Paul even wrote that the Old Testament worked to emphasize Jesus by preparing people for his arrival (Galatians 3:24).

Since God's Bible gives Jesus a central and foundational place, what place should we give Jesus within our lives? The answer is obvious, but when we carefully read the things we write, when we carefully listen in our classes and in our sermons, when we listen carefully to our conversations, do we find that Jesus always has the central place? Does he occupy our thoughts and plans? Does he have importance in our conversations and relationships? Are we known first and foremost as Jesus centered people?

If I properly understand the Bible's message, Jesus should hold all of those places. And here is why Jesus has to hold that place within our lives – we will only be who God wants us to be when we "sanctify Jesus as Lord in our hearts" (I Peter 3:15; Romans 8:29).

Sanctifying Jesus as the Lord of our hearts means that we make Jesus the center of our lives. God therefore asks for a complete, all-of-self, lifechanging devotion to Jesus; "I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me" - Galatians 2:20 (ESV). The Bible unfortunately shows that, for whatever reason, most people do not realize that radical expectation within their lives; "Enter by the narrow gate. For the gate is wide and the way is easy that leads to destruction, and those who enter by it are many. For the gate is narrow and the way is hard that leads to life, and those who find it are few" - Matthew 7:13-14 (ESV).

What about us? Have we really come to understand the importance Jesus should have within our lives? If we have, our lives will show evidence of it. So, what does your life show?

Soldiers of Christ

ne of the most powerful images of discipleship is of being soldiers. Throughout the New Testament world, people were well familiar with Roman soldiers. The Roman legions had conquered the Mediterranean world. Despite the obvious paradox of associating the Prince of Peace

with the violence and power of the Empire, there was a familiarity with soldiers that offered analogies to help early Christians understand what Jesus expected of them. In a small sense, Christians are portrayed as walking together in rank. Paul related the Christian's ability to stand against Satan with the soldier's armour. And he drew from the soldier image in writing to Timothy.

First, Paul encouraged Timothy to "endure hardship like a good soldier of Christ Jesus" (2 Timothy 2:3). This brings to mind the difficult conditions that could face soldiers - inclement weather, harsh temperatures. Slogging through, even living in mud. Plus, they faced the difficulties of having enough food and water. A soldier's life could be miserable. Timothy was to similarly endure hardship – difficult living conditions, opposition and persecution. In the words of the song, "Am I a Soldier of the Cross?" - "Must I be carried through the skies on flowery beds of ease?" We know this as the cost of discipleship.

But there is more. Paul said that the purpose of a soldier is to "please his commanding officer." Following orders is a must. There is a focus he must have to accomplish this. Paul says that "no one serving as a soldier gets entangled in civilian affairs." He must be single minded. In part, Jesus referred to this by saying that we cannot serve two masters. Serving God and Satan are mutually exclusive. But Paul didn't say that a soldier does not get involved with the enemy. That's obvious. Rather, the soldier does not allow himself to become distracted by things that are not part of his military role. These are things of the civilian life. Those who have served in the military or are close to those who have served know how encompassing and focused military life is. It can literally be what we call 24/7 – twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. Even clothing is dictated by military life. There can be no competitors or rivals for fully focused loyalty and service. Insubordination and disobedience cannot be tolerated. So, Timothy is to stick with it, "in season and out of season" - when it is convenient and easy and when it is not. He cannot let anything or anyone distract him.

We have to wonder at this time in world history if some Christians have allowed themselves to become distracted from full loyalty to Jesus, paying more attention to the things of the world. Many years ago, John White expressed this in his book "Flirting with the World." Two young people are in a relationship, but one is distracted by another person. How crushing to be the one who is jilted! Christians have pledged loyalty to Christ, yet we can thoughtlessly lose our focus to become entangled in civilian things.

One cannot avoid noticing, for example, how people who profess to follow Jesus can become caught up in their political environment. The current election in the United States is an example. Several decades ago, the Moral Majority wielded a powerful influence in the U.S., both religious and political. Politics and religion/faith came together in such a way that some religious leaders became influential voices in the political realm. The current election has caused many people to realize that neither Donald Trump nor Hilary Clinton represent a Christian alternative. Serious moral questions have created the serious doubt whether either really is suitable. Many Evangelical leaders have finally announced that it is not appropriate to use the pulpit or church to promote political campaigns and candidates. Yet, there are those within the religious community who are becoming entangled in the things of this world, politically, and are actively supporting and promoting candidates whose lives, attitudes, values and reputations are far from Christ.

As Christians, we need to be responsible citizens. We are to show respect for Caesar, yet we cannot allow him (or her) to cause us to change our faith or values. We cannot become entangled in civilian affairs. We are aliens and strangers in this world, just passing through. We don't really belong here. Neither candidate is worthy of our ultimate loyalty. Only Christ is – we are His soldiers. Let us not become entangled in civilian affairs!

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Looking For The Best

It would be a much different world if everyone looked for the best in people around them rather than focusing on the weaknesses and failures. However, it has ever been so that one's humanity gets in the way resulting in seeing only the negative. Jesus faced this attitude daily in Hs work on earth and His people face the same problem today.

Consider Luke 15. Jesus was already on the "unacceptable" list of the leaders of the Jews. Here was another opportunity for them to find fault with Him. He was in the company of "known sinners and tax collectors" making Him unacceptable to many in His audience. "Now the tax collectors and sinners were all drawing near to hear him. And the Pharisees and the scribes grumbled, saying, 'This man receives sinners and eats with them" - Luke 15:1-2 (ESV). The fact that Jesus was already on their "unaccepted people list" and His willingness to talk and eat with the sinner provided another opportunity for finding fault.

In Luke 15 Jesus confronts the Pharisees and scribes with three powerful parables. Sorrow over a lost sheep, a lost coin and saddest of all, a lost boy. Thankfully the first two end happily. The third, not so much.

The real question is, "What was Jesus really talking about in these parables and who did he hope would get the point and learn a valuable lesson?" Surely his purpose was to contrast the heart of God toward the lost with the heart of the scribes and Pharisees in

their attitude toward sinners. The difference was like night and day. Because God has a forgiving, gracious and loving spirit, He always looks to see and works to bring out the best in all of His creation.

The view of the pessimist is always a downer. The elder brother in the parable of the Prodigal Son was the true pessimist. He had served his father but really seemed to almost see it as slavery. When the father welcomed the younger son home the real nature and attitude of the elder came through.

All of us may be a pessimist at some times in our life. And there may be many reasons for it, however, for some it is that they are simply a negative person. I looked up some quotes about these two types that you might find interesting, challenging and, hopefully, amusing:

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In some cases, pessimism may be a faith problem. Remember the parable Jesus told of the talents? The one talent man failed, basically, because he saw only the demanding nature of the master. He was not rejected because he failed to gain another talent. He was rejected because he failed to TRY!!

Thankfully, we have a God who rewards faithful effort and the person who looks to the positive and does not dwell on the negative.

In your daily life are you an optimist or a pessimist? This is a question that each of us needs to address for our own personal life. Do we put our confidence in what we can see easily reached before us or are we able to see that our life is not lived on our own ability alone. The prayer that Paul wrote to the Ephesians is one in which he encourages them to understand the real source of power for the Christian life. - Ephesians 3:14 - 21. Believing in the power and promises of God is key to looking for the best in our personal life.

There is no doubt that God rewards optimistic faith in those who obey Him. Abraham, for example, believed God when it did not make good "human" sense to do so. This expression of faith began with he left home and family behind to go where God would lead him. His willingness to trust God regarding sacrificing of his only son on an altar stands out as a bright shining example of optimistic faith – Genesis 22:6 – 8.

Consider also the optimistic faith of David when he faced the challenge of Goliath and the Philistine army. – 1 Samuel 17:34 – 37.

Before you say, "Yes, but..." remember Ephesians 3:14 – 21.

Of course, we can see examples of pessimism in scripture as well. We have already mentioned the fellows in Jesus parable of the talents.

An example that shows the possible terrible consequences of pessimism in found in ten of the twelve spies sent in to spy out the land God promised to Abraham in Numbers 13:31–33. This led to 40 years in the wilderness before Canaan was finally gained. All 20 years and older, except for Joshua and Caleb, never got there.

It is easy for us to shake our head at them for their failure to trust God, however, we often fail to believe God's promises like, "No temptation has overtaken you that is not common to man. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it" – 1 Corinthians 10:13 (ESV). We excuse ourself because of our humanity rather than admitting that the problem is the strength of our faith and willingness to respond according to the direction of God.

We can get encouragement and help as we reach out to our brethren. Seeing the strong faith and its result in brothers and sisters can strengthen us. The encouragement to think positively like Paul's statement, "Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things" - Philippians 4:8 (ESV). As Christians we have much to be positive about. To "count your blessings, name the one by one" will keep us busy and focused.

May our nature in Christ be like the following from an unknown author, "I am born of faith...dwell in the soul of the worker...believe in God...believe in God's people... believe in the ultimate triumph of good over evil...look into the

heavens and see God there...look upon the beauties about me and see God in them... dispel gloom...dispense sunshine...am patient, rejoicing in hope...do not murmur or complain...trusting in God...holding on to Christian optimism because I know who holds my hand, leading me toward eternal jov."



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Superstitions

Triday the 13th. Broken mirrors. ◀ Black cats. Walking under a ladder. Spilled salt. Knock on wood. You may recognize these as elements of superstitions. Some, like carved pumpkins, only show up near Halloween. My dictionary defines superstition as, "a belief founded on irrational feelings, especially of fear, and marked by a trust in or reverence for charms, omens, signs, the supernatural, etc."1 Superstitions are common. They vary greatly over the world but all peoples have them. They are the result of people trying to make sense of things they do not understand. Typically, two unrelated, coinciding events are linked as cause and effect. Many that are still

commonly acknowledged (though not necessarily still believed) are so ancient that we can only guess at their origins. Superstitions may be cultural, geographic or personal. They may be tied to a particular area of life, such as sports or theater. Superstitions may be wide spread, as the practice of omitting 13 when numbering floors of a building, or they may affect only a few individuals, such as those suffering from paraskevidekatriaphobia.²

Hopefully, we all recognize the inaccuracies of superstitions. We may laugh about them since many are downright silly. Foolish as they may be, when it comes to matters of chance or luck, superstition sells. Charms, in one form or another, have been popular for hundreds of years. I have seen ads for jewellery made with

semi-precious stones which are touted to influence various aspects of ones being. Another popular fad is good luck symbols as tattoos.

A catalogue we received last spring contained an item which was said to have come from a centuries old custom. This particular "charm" disturbed me because, not only does it employ superstition, it is also idolatrous spreading misconceptions about God and how He deals with mankind.

The catalogue identifies this item as a "Saint Joseph Home Seller Kit". Its description includes the following: "The tradition of St. Joseph having special power in real estate transactions has evolved over many years. The statue is buried upside down in the front yard with the feet pointing to heaven. After the home has sold, the statue should be removed and given a place of honour in your new home."3 A card included with the tiny resin statue is pictured in the catalogue and it states: "The burying of a statue of Saint Joseph is a tradition that finds its roots in the ancient Catholic custom of burying blessed medals in the ground, invoking God's blessing on a specific area. It is the blessing, not the medal, which brings God's power. Many cases have been documented of his (Joseph's) powerful intercession. So we encourage you to look to Saint Joseph for help in the sale of your property and home."4 The card points out that this began as a Catholic custom, but it claims that, "Today, homeowners of all denominations ask for Saint Joseph's help in selling and buying their homes."5

A sincere student of the Bible should be able to easily recognize these claims as superstition and opposed to

> Scripture in several ways. First of all, Joseph, the carpenter from Nazareth, does not intercede in prayers. Jesus and the Holy Spirit are our only mediators. "For there is one God and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus" - 1 Timothy 2:5. "In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groans that words cannot express" -Romans 8:26.

> While we should and do offer prayers for others (Ephesians 6:18), we go to the throne of God ourselves, not through dead people. "Let us then approach the throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us

in our time of need" – Hebrews 4:16. "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God" – Philippians 4:6. "This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything according to his will, he hears us. And if we know that he hears us – whatever we ask-we know that we have what we asked of him" – 1 John 5:14, 15.

Some would limit the term saint to only a few dead people whom they deem to have met certain criteria. That is not the way the term is used in the Scriptures. Writers of the New Testament referred to those to whom they were writing as saints. All Christians are saints and their prayers are all equally important to God. If we are faithful to the Lord, our prayers will be heard and answered. "The prayer of a righteous man is powerful and effective. Elijah was a man just like us. He prayed earnestly that it would not rain, and it did

not rain on the land for three and a half years" – James 5:16b, 17. "Dear friends, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have confidence before God and receive from him anything we ask, because we obey his commands and do what pleases him" – 1 John 3:21, 22. "If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be given you" – John 15:7.

Even though this statue is less than three and a half inches (8.6 cm) tall, it is an idol. We may have numerous figurines in our home or yard which are nothing more than decorations and there is nothing wrong with that. But when we attribute special powers to such an item, it becomes an idol. "You shall not make for yourself an idol in the form of anything in heaven above or on the earth beneath or in the waters below" - Exodus 20:4. "Therefore, my dear friends, flee from idolatry" - 1 Corinthians 10:14. "Dear children, keep yourselves from idols" - 1 John 5:21. If we place our trust in anything or anyone other than

God, that is idolatry. "Trust in the LORD with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make your paths straight" – Proverbs 3:5. 6.

As you talk with someone about events in your life, there may be no harm in rapping on something wooden as long as you fully realize that your help and protection comes from the Lord and not from oak trees. While there may be no harm in it, wouldn't it be better to give God praise instead? If you are planning on selling your house, don't waste your money on resin figurines rather, "Commit to the LORD whatever you do, and your plans will succeed" – Proverbs 16:3. Dispelling superstitions is one way in which the Truth will set us free.

Casual Commitments

he observant reader will have immedi-

ately recognized that the two words of our title do not really fit together in any meaningful way. The word "casual" is defined as "careless, not planned, unconcern, temporary" whereas the word "commitment" is defined as "pledge or promise to do something, dedication to a long term course of action".

Many aspects of life require at least some degree of commitment. Accepting employment, undertaking study programs and making business transactions are among them. Even in these less serious commitments, faithfulness and fulfilment are expected and failure results in embarrassment and penalties.

The Apostle Paul, in writing to the young Timothy instructed him to "endure hardship with us like a good soldier of Jesus Christ" (II Tim.2:3) and reminded him of the commitment required of those contending in the "games". The dedication of those contending in the current Olympics comes to mind. We have observed much serious (far from casual) commitment in recent weeks. When hardship or temptation confronts the committed person just endures/ keeps on faithfully fulfilling whatever the obligation. Difficulties call for faith continuance/endurance not a copout. What happens to the soldier who deserts? How seriously do we take our commitments?

Our concern in this study is the tendency in our current culture to be very careless/casual, not just in small every day matters but even more so in the most serious aspects

of life. Two of these are the commitment to be a disciple of Jesus and that involved in marriage. In both cases the commitment usually appears to be serious, public and intended. In marriage the participants commit to be faithful "until death do us part". In becoming a part of the church, the bride of Christ, His body the situation is similar. It is a long term undertaking. Jesus has assured us "Be faithful, even to the point of death and I will give you the crown of life." (Rev.2:10). He said, "No one who puts his hand to the plow and looks back is fit for service in the kingdom of God." (Lk.9:62).

The common practice of singing the hymn, "I have decided to follow Jesus" whose chorus is "No turning back, no turning back," at baptisms is to remind of the seriousness/permanence/faithfulness involved in this commitment. We need to reread it, sing it more often and with serious thoughtfulness. It involves a pledge to go it alone if necessary, to leave worldliness behind and to surrender "my all". Nothing casual about either of these commitments and yet they often seem to be so treated.

We are reminded of LaGuard Smith's excellent book, "Baptism, the Believer's Wedding Ceremony" in which he compares and emphasizes the seriousness of these commitments. Just as the wedding ceremony is a pledge to maintain a relationship, so ones' baptism also initiates an enduring relationship. Neither relationship is to be broken except by circumstances beyond ones' control, such as death in the case of marriage.

The seriousness is further empha-

sized in the fact that both commitments are made "before God" and, traditionally, made in public, before many witnesses. Nothing casual involved!

Despite this, in today's culture, both of these serious commitments are, all too frequently, being treated casually. Unfaithfulness is not at all uncommon. "Here today, gone tomorrow!" Marriage vows are being broken on every side and pews, once filled, are empty; lives, once dedicated to Christ, are lukewarm, toying with or fully involved with worldly activities and/or unscriptural practices.

These are NOT casual commitments and yet they are being treated as such much to the detriment of our society and the displeasure of our God.

"Jay Don had 10 potential students to interview the morning after our arrival, but could accept only seven of them due to lack of space and money. Officially we now have seven new students at UBI which makes our total at 30~~16 men and 14 women. We never dreamed we would have to turn down potential students that wanted to come to UBI, but such are the times and circumstances. "Dave Phillips from Memphis, Tenn., arrived on Saturday, Aug.6th, to teach a seminar on "God's People". He has been coming to teach since 2005 and it's always a treat to have him here. He is the minister at the Germantown church which supports Sasha and Natasha Maluga. The Germantown church has been very active in helping the school as well as the Maluga's and we are very thankful for them. "On Sunday before school started on Monday we had a great day at the Poznicky church. The morning started off with a baptism and was followed with two lessons and a great fellowship. We got to see so many of our students and friends that we had missed all summer. Most of them had worked in as many as three different children's camps and/or Bible schools. (Working for the Lord is just their life.) Dirk Smith from EEM, along with two of their Ukrainian workers,

joined us for worship. Afterwards we took them to lunch and visited and visited, not getting home until after 5:00 p.m. We were also informed at church that Igor Kosalovsky is still in prison but that there are continual negotiations for his trade and release. All we can do is pray for this to happen soon." (Excerpts from a report and pictures sent in August from the Rogers back in Kiev)

CAMBODIA: Lack of normal amounts of rain, coupled with the long drought and dams being built by countries north of Cambodia on the Mekong River, had combined to cause the Tonie Sap Lake to have the lowest water levels in over 50 years. Our "Ship of Life" recently ran aground and was very difficult to free. It took three tugs nine hours to get her floating again. With an average life expectancy of only 54 years, many people are telling us that it is the lowest they have ever seen the water. The part that concerns us most is that the poorest people live in areas where it is the lowest, causing us to have to change our route which leaves them without a way to get any kind of health care. The Ship is being managed for three months by Tim and Cheryl Carlin for a second time. They have been providing clothing for needy children and eye glasses for everyone from widows in need to the local police, they reported. (September Newsletter from Partners in Progress)

ETHIOPIA: "A LIFE THAT MADE A DIFFERENCE" was the headline on the Ethiopia Gospel Outreach: Letter on Aug. 25. This was followed by a quotation from Rev. 14:13: "and I heard a voice from heaven, saving, "Write, 'Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord from now on'." To which the Spirit responds, "so that they may rest from their labors, for their deeds follow with them." It was such an appropriate reading for Belamo Bada, whose death at the age of 85 ended a journey as a leader known by all in the Sidama region of Ethiopia. Some 6,000 people from all walks of life, including non-

Christians and Muslims, church leaders and preachers, attended his Memorial service. Although the community had erected four huge tent covers to provide shade for the people, there was room for fewer than 10% of the crowd to sit under them. The family had invited one of the best-known preachers in Ethiopia to preach the service. Brother Moges, who has an open invitation to teach the Bible to interested students at the Addis Ababa University, used an hour and a half to tell the crowd "The Plan of Salvation" at the service, before pointing out how Brother Belamo's life and example of unwavering faith will continue to provide a Godly influence for many years to come.

Halls, Amy (1929 – 2016)

When she was born in 1929, Amy Elizabeth Perry was much more welcome than the great depression of the same year. She was number seven in a family of eight siblings (four boys and four girls), children of Ernest and Grace Perry. I was second to the oldest and Amy was second to the youngest with Charles, Mabel, Donald and Ralph between us.

Amy's early years were on the ancestral farm on Spring Creek Road near the location of the meeting place of the Tintern Church of Christ which the family faithfully attended and in which they sometimes provided leadership.

She was educated in the one room school one mile east in the hamlet of Tintern and then at the Beamsville High School where she attended for three years. Having become convinced of the truth of the Gospel Message of Salvation in Christ, she confessed her faith and was baptized into Christ for the remission of her sins. She was very sincere in her faith and lived a fully committed life as His disciple from that day until her death.

Those who have known her can testify of her dedication, commitment and faithfulness. Her commitment was without reservation, not casual as sometimes seems to be the case. In fact, in our observation, she fulfilled the biblical admonition "to be faithful unto death" and receive the crown of life (Rev.2:10).

Once committed, it appears that her interest in secular education was over-ridded by a desire for more Bible knowledge. She left home in 1948 to attend Radville Christian College in Saskatchewan. Once there she was soon spotted by fellow student, Donald Halls, who soon won her heart. This resulted in a second serious lifelong commitment to which she also proved faithful. In matters of relationships with God and with one's spouse it is especially important to be faithfully committed for the long term as she demonstrated.

Their rather large family of five girls and five boys survive them along with thirty-one grandchildren and twenty-one great grandchildren. The children who are all with us here today are Jewell, Donnette (Jim), Sharon, Holly (Joe), Tim (Sharon), Paul (Debbie), Patrick (Lori), Sam (Karen), Dan (Christine), and Jacqui. It is worthy of note that three sons, Paul, Sam and Dan have served as full time firefighters and one grandson, Chaz, is an officer in the RCMP.

Of her siblings, Mary (2009) and Charles (2015) have preceded her in death. Eugene, Donald, Ralph and Myrna are local and Mabel Taylor is in Alabama and not able to be present. We will miss Amy.

As is quite evident from the above, Amy became fully occupied as a full time mother and wife and caregiver. When the "empty nest" situation developed years later they moved from Hamilton to Vineland where Don passed away. As Amy's health called for it, Sharon lived with her for a time until a place was found for her at Albright Manor in Beamsville where she has been regularly visited by family members from near and far up to the present.

We are thankful that although physically weak and somewhat incapacitated, Amy did not suffer intense pain except for the few days before her passing.

Jacobs, Allen Lewis

Allen Lewis Jacobs was born to Lewis and Allie Jacobs on Jan. 13, 1923. He passed away to the Lord on Aug 26, 2016 in the Fairhaven Care Centre in Burnaby, BC. He was predeceased by all his siblings, 7 brothers and 4 sisters. Also predeceased by great granddaughter, Avery May Johnson. Now together with the Lord. He is survived by his wife Betty, four children, Marilyn, Patty, myself, David and Teresa. Also eight grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

He lived a few years in the roaring 20's, but most of his growing up days were in what was known as the dirty 30's which was the great depression. All those who know of

this time on the Canadian prairies will say that it was a difficult time. Growing a crop to harvest in the severe drought conditions was hard and the price for selling it was very low. I am sure the plight of his family was more difficult due to the lack of a mother in the home, since his mother passed away the day after he turned six.

After several years of tough farming in the dirty 30's, Dad seemed to remember that it was 1937 when it looked like they had a decent crop growing. His father had given them strict orders to stay out of the field to protect every grain of this crop. Late in the year Dad saw his father returning home galloping on horseback through the crop. Dad wondered what could going on. On his dad's arrival he announced there will be no harvest, there is a bad hailstorm coming. A couple of hour later, the crop was all on the ground. Apparently his dad had seen a few hailstorms before.


It was an active household. Dad often described their living room as a gymnasium. But with the total lack of gymnasium equipment, his older brothers would often use the younger ones such as Dad as the equipment. He often said that it was amazing that they all grew up. But he and his younger brother, Floyd, found their own activities like in the winter, climbing onto the house and jumping off into the snow bank.

There were Bible Schools and camps in those time. It was at the Radville Bible School that he was baptized, we think it was in 1936.

Farming didn't look so good those days. In the later war years, Dad took a winter work excursion to Kimberley BC where he worked in the hard rock mine. Returning to Saskatchewan after the winter, he later took a job in the ice house in Moose Jaw. In doing this job, he said that no matter how warmly you dressed, it seemed that your back was always cold. Remember

Saskatchewan people have experience in dressing for the cold. From the ice house, he could see the trains going through the Moose Jaw station. He thought that looked a lot better. So he went down and applied and became a railroad man.

He worked on the trains through going through much of Saskatchewan for 18 years. Thinking of winter cold, he would talk of his record. Once the train went into Prince Albert, SK, and the temperature was -48 degrees.

Early in his railroad days, he married Elisabeth May Bell on Sept 15, 1949. That began a marriage of 20 days short of 67 years.

Also in his railway days, he took a couple of breaks from work to

pursue schooling at Freed Hardeman College in 1957 and 1960.

The family moved to Swift Current, SK, in Sept 1960. A couple of years later, Dad left the railroad to go into fulltime ministry for the Lord working with the church in Swift Current.

In the late 1960's, it seemed time for a move. Dad was getting persuasion largely from J.C. Bailey that he should come to India, a field very open to the gospel. Dad was interested but said that he was not going to drive every road in the southern US searching for the required financial support as was usually required of ones of our brethren to embark on such a mission. Shortly after, a connection put Dad in contact with the congregation in Hart. Texas that was interested in sending someone to India. Things fell into place and the family left for Bangalore, India, in June 1969 with the intention of being there for three years.

The family was in Bangalore for a little over one year. Modern communication is wonderful and we keep contact with several from India, including two who were then a young married couple who were the first ones that Dad baptized in India.

With the government of India having reservations about such work, we were required to leave India and with the direction of the supporting congregation, we moved to Karachi, Pakistan. We were there 1 year before moving on to Islamabad, at that time the new capital of Pakistan. The most direct drive between the two cities is about one thousand miles. So five of us in a VW Beetle made the move. Marilyn, having

previously returned to Canada. Dad, never one to take the shortest route, set the route from Karachi, up through Quetta, across to Kandahar, Afghanistan, up to Kabul, on through Jalalabad. Finally, back across to Peshawar, Pakistan and finally on to Islamabad. Little did we know that these places, unknown in most of the western world, would become famous some years later.

After a few months in Islamabad, war broke out between Pakistan and India. The family took the Canadian Armed Forces evacuation plane out on Dec. 12, 1971. With the unscheduled return, the supporting congregation in Texas asked us to come there for 6 months. At the

conclusion of that time, the family moved to Burnaby BC in June 1972 where Dad worked with the congregation for 7 years.

In Sept 1979, with three children largely on their own and one in Western Christian College, Dad and Mom started a series of lengthy trips back to India. Between trips, Burnaby remained a home base. The last trip to India was in 2005.

In his latest years, Dad took great enjoyment in the company of family and also the company of the brethren. My latest visits with Dad were after two or three months in either hospital or care home. If he was told that it was Sunday or Monday, he asked about the past Sunday worship. He would comment that it must be two or three weeks since he had been out to worship. Sometimes asking how many exactly. I thought it best not to start counting the exact number. He would go on to say that he really hoped that he could get out next Sunday.

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
