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Why the Church Loses People—2

(The first of these two articles can be found in the February, 2010 issue of the Gospel Herald or on the website, www.gospelherald. org, under Magazine, recent articles.)

e asked the question—why is it so difficult to rejoice consistently about ourselves being members of the family of God?

That question gives me a lot of troublem When I stop and consider all that Jesus did so that I (very unworthy of any good thing) could be part of the eternal fellowship of the Father, Son & Spirit, it is an obvious thing that I should be rejoicing and I should be eternally grateful. So, why does it escape people at times?

This is really hard to understand but one of the reasons churches lose people is due to the fact that the love of sin has grown too great. In other words, we love the message of Jesus but we are loving the 'thrill' of our sin more and more, so that eventually what happens is we must choose between two loves and the one we love the more wins out.

You probably know the story of Sodom & Gomorrah to some degree. Abraham's nephew, Lot, is warned by the angels to leave Sodom and never look back but Lot ends up having all sorts of family trouble (Read Genesis 19) where his sons-in-law mock him, his wife looks back and actually longs for Sodom and his daughters end up doing something really disgusting. I liked what one man once said about this entire situation: "...the problem wasn't that Lot's house was in Sodom; the problem was that Sodom was in Lot's house."

While the church loses some because they feel God is no longer interested in them because of their weakness, others will be lost because they lose interest in God and His way.

Sin is serious business and, if played around with, seriously weakens our feelings for and relationship with God Drew Chapados

and His church. (See Isaiah 59:1,2; 1 John 2:15-17; James 4:4).

The more one doesn't care in one area of life of doing it God's way, the less they will care in all areas of life including church. What should the church do in such situations to help avoid this?

1) Understand the difference between encouragement and approval! I understand the temptation to always be seen as the nice person and never wanting to step on toes, but might we send the message of approval when encouragement to do right is what is needed? (Romans 1:32—esp. the last line). Biblical encouragement is to direct others, with a good spirit, to move in God's ways.

2) Understand how horribly a 'little' sin might grow. What is sin? It is anything that is contrary to God's ways and it is something that takes our spiritual life away. We can often hope in silence that people (and some do) will work through it on their own, but we must maintain the balance of preaching strongly about the grace of Jesus and the destruction of any and all rebellion against God. No one today would probably think that the biting of a fruit would be that 'big' of a sin, but ask Adam & Eve and they might think differently. The alcoholic who lost his family probably thinks the first 'little drink', the gambler who lost everything, the first 'little wager', the sexually promiscuous with the first 'little encounter' etc., etc. No one is beyond redemption and no one is equally beyond sin's deception!

Why is the church thought of, at times, as only a cold institution or even in terms of a church building?

As Jesus walked the earth and called people to follow him, and then as His apostles and others began to preach and write, there was more than just formal greetings involved, there were pure authentic familial relations. It was not uncommon for the words "brothers, family and children" to be used to describe the thing we call "church" (See 1 John 2:1, James 1:2, Luke 8:21, John 21:5).

So, back to the original question. Why does the church become a thing thought of as an institution rather than the warm idea of home or family? This is one of the most serious questions churches have to look at as to why some people end up being lost from the church. The reason it is difficult is because the church has to do some self-examining at times in order to see if the functions, events and services the church provides are lending to the idea of a family setting or more like an institution. Are we more like a home or a school? More like a business meeting or a neighbourhood gathering? Are relationships being developed or are we just associates who attend the same function?

To treat one another as family members is one of the main calls of the church, "Behold, how they love one another" was an early Roman assessment of this little group of "Jesus-followers"! (See for example 1 Peter 1:22; 3:8; 2 Peter 1:7).

The relationship of a family is to

be underlying all our dealings with each other: when we think about what liberties we can take in life, we are to see how it might cause our family to stumble (1 Corinthians 8:11-13). When dealing with an issue like correcting another, they are to be considered as family and not someone "on the other side" (2 Thessalonians 3:15). When *continued on page 14*

Restoration of Literal Biblical Creation

I is my belief that God raises up men at a proper time to accomplish His will. Is it possible God raised up the Restoration movement to also counter Darwin's theory? F.W. Mattox dates the Restoration beginnings at 1811, though there were roots in various religions long before that. Charles Darwin had formed his opinion of Evolution by 1836 when touring the world in the H.M.S. Beagle.

Darwin had just finished reading a book by Charles Lyell on *Uniformitarianism*. This is the belief that the present is key to the past. That is, present geologic happenings multiplying into what you see in our geology today over eons and eons of time.

So Darwin was impressed, and everything he saw he saw through Lyell's glasses. At the Galapagos Islands, Darwin was studying the varieties of finches present, mistaking

it for macro evolution; but what he was really seeing, was micro evolution, simple adaptation. Macro Evolution is microbes to man, this is the crossing of phylogenetic lines. The finches had adapted, but they were still finches.

Evolutionists are divided about the working of macro Evolution, but usually they think micro Evolution over millions of years became macro Evolution: another of the miracles required to believe in Evolution.

The great problem here is, where are they getting their time? Since God created time, Genesis 1:1 is where time began, and there are numerous New Testament passages pertaining to, or inferring to the end (Hebrews 9:27; 2 Thessalonians 1:7,8; Jude 14,15;1 Thessalonians 5:2; 2 Peter 3:10 etc). From

Genesis 1 to the end of the NT, is a simple chronology of God's plan to redeem man from the great sin in the Garden of Eden that brought about death to everything God created. Death is amenable to a natural law, called Entropy or Second law of thermodynamics. Everything God made is in a state of degeneration or net loss of usable energy.

Actually time was a gift from a benevolent creator to dying man, to number his days, and to learn of God who made him - how he should behave, think, reason and research God's Revelation and physical evidences. "God is not willing that any should perish, but that all might come to repentance" (2 Peter 3:9).

Time was also God's gift for man so he could return his love for God in acceptable worship (Psalm 95:6; Luke 4:8; John 4:23,24 etc.). Jesus lived outside of time with God (Psalm 90:2b; John 1:2,3) so He could not

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die for our sins in the eternal state, He came into this world of sin and death, a babe, to be the atonement for sin.

However, back to the subject of micro Evolution. Micro evolution requires a lot of information in the DNA for adaptation and the Bible shows the creation of "kinds". It is reasonable to believe that genetic information was present in the geness of the created things to develop the various species of each kind. (by the way did God use "kinds" or" species" to save in the ark? Most Creationists think" kinds")

And, though Evolutionary theory lost in the Scopes trial in Dayton, TN, July 20, 1925, the theory still won its place in the educational circles. Had Christians been alert to this matter, they could probably have hindered the acceptance of Evolution that is now revered as scientific fact.

Most Restoration preachers took

it for granted that everyone believed the six day creation of Genesis. But Satan was busy bringing Evolution into the school classrooms and text books. Not satisfied to remain just a theory, text books and Evolution scientists have promoted it to absolute fact. And the word absolute hasn't usually been a popular word with them.

So I think it fair to say that the lack of preaching the Gospel of literal Creation as is clearly laid down by John in the first chapter of his gospel and in Paul's sermon to the Athenian Philosophers in Acts 17:24, and the writer of Hebrews in Chapter 11:1ff, have to be included in what Jesus calls the rock our lives are to be built upon in contradistinction to the sands of the opinionated minds of men. Eating Spiritual Vegetables

There are few words that glaze over people's eyes faster than "doctrine." To many people, doctrine represents some of the driest, most tedious subjects imaginable. Asking some adult Christians to study doctrine is comparable to asking many children to eat vegetables. Though both know that doctrine or

vegetables are healthy, few really desire to consume them. (The word translated doctrine simply means teaching, that which is taught.) Yet, in today's culture of diversity and toleration, for many people, Biblical doctrine is becoming increasingly unimportant and irrelevant.

Collin Hansen, *Christianity Today* editor at large, in *"We're All Theologians,"* notes that a recent Pew Forum study showed that while about 80 percent of the young adult, American, Millennial (ages 18-29) evangelicals surveyed trust the Bible as the inspired or literal Word of God, attitudes toward key doctrines evidenced beliefs more consistent with cultural norms of pluralism and tolerance. For example, "52 percent of evangelicals from the so-called millennial generation" believed that "many religions can lead to eternal life." Only 43 percent believed Christianity was exclusively the way to eternal life.

Hansen goes on to note a similar analysis by Smith and Snell who observed that cultural diversity "tends to devalue distinctive beliefs" and makes Westerners "wary of exclusive claims." For today's young adults, religious beliefs are "abstract" having little relevance or effect on their daily lives. "Religion is about doing good and living a good life, not believing the right things" which is a "false dichotomy between belief and behavior." The new open-mindedness of our culture is becoming a close-mindedness to doctrine. In the words of Linus, Charles Schultz's cartoon character, "It doesn't matter what you believe, as long as you're sincere."

Keep in mind that the term "evangelical," as the Pew Forum is using it, refers to those who claim to accept the Bible as God's inspired Word. Would it not be reasonable to expect that such a view would lead to daily interaction with scripture? Yet, the study also showed that "barely more than half of these young evangelicals read the Bible weekly." (The obvious pun is that these young adults read the Bible weakly.) We can only guess how few are actually studying and learning from it.

Can you imagine trying to live effectively as a Christian without doctrine? Hansen notes that doctrine is necessary for discipleship and spiritual formation. The apostle Paul told Timothy to "watch your life and doctrine closely. Persevere in them." For Paul, there was no choice between life and doctrine. Both were necessary to "save yourself and your hearers." Similarly, James speaks of being blessed by both hearing and doing. Paul encouraged both Timothy and Titus to recognize and teach sound (healthy) doctrine.

Unhealthy doctrines are speculative and destructive. They undermine the identity and work of Christ, misrepresent salvation, devalue the church, promote empty legalism. They give people a stone instead of the living Word of God. If, as Christians, we want to become like Christ, how can we know what that really means without learning doctrine? In the words of Joshua Harris, without teaching, "...we're basing our lives on our own imagination and misconceptions."

From its beginning on Pentecost, the Church was devoted to the apostles' teaching. We need only look at the New Testament to see the importance of doctrine in the early Church. In the context of pointing out unhealthy teachings, Paul spoke of Timothy being a "good servant of Jesus Christ... nourished on the words of the faith and of the sound doctrine you have been following" (1 Timothy 4:6–NASB). Healthy doctrine feeds and nourishes.

For many of us, at first, eating vegetables was an acquired taste. When we were young, we preferred junk food. (We still may!) We found the taste of things that were salty, fried or sweet very appealing. However, as we matured, we discovered that these foods gave us little or no nutrition, and caused us to gain unwanted weight, high blood pressure and clogged arteries. We learned to choose and enjoy foods that are healthy.

Like vegetables for our bodies, doctrine is essential for spiritual growth and health. It is how we know and understand our faith—the foundation for how we live. Doctrine is not just knowing facts about the Bible or the life of Jesus, or the definition of words like incarnation, justification, sanctification, salvation or atonement. It is knowing and teaching why we believe. It is gaining a vision and understanding of God, what He has done in Christ, and the life, both present and future, to which he calls us and how that personally affects us.

The Faith of Jochebed

(Editor's Note: I apologize first for not being diligent in getting an article for this page for every issue. I hope to do better this year. I invite articles from ladies who read this page. Just send your submission to me at the email address listed above. I welcome any and all submissions. Ich)

First of all, I wonder how many reading this article recognize this name—Jochebed? Do you know who Jochebed was? I'm sure I have learned somewhere in my youth in Sunday School or Bible classes in high school and college that Jochebed was the mother of Moses. But up until a few weeks ago, if you had asked me who she was, I would likely have not been able to say, except that it was a Bible name.

I have been helping my daughter teach the two- and three-year-olds on Wednesday night at church. We are studying the life of Moses. Repeating the story week after week has finally helped me commit to memory this name. And it's amazing to hear the little ones repeat her name each week as we review the facts of this story.

We have all studied the events in the life of Moses for years and can probably recount many of these events, from his floating down the river to being called by God at the burning bush, to lead His people out of Egypt, to his involvement in the plagues, to the parting of the waters, to the wanderings in the wilderness, to striking the rock, to the receiving of the 10 Commandments, to the end of his life-and all of the events in between. We see through Moses' life many examples of faith and trust in God as he sometimes reluctantly followed God's instructions. He did not see himself as a leader of men, but God led him to be one of the greatest leaders in history, guiding an enormous mass of people on a most significant and lengthly journey.

In this story, we most often focus on the man, Moses, and sometimes neglect some of the other lessons that can be learned. Let's go back to the beginning. Moses was born to Jochebed and Amnon. He was not their first child but their third, brother to Aaron and Miriam (who both played significant roles in his life). He was born at a very dangerous time, a time when the "mean" Pharoah, as we describe him to the children in class, decided that there were too many Hebrew people living in his land. Because he didn't want them to someday outnumber the Egyptians, he put out a call for all Hebrew baby boys to be put to death at birth. Imagine the fear and terror, the questions on the hearts of the Israelite women who were with child on that day!

Any of us who have borne a child can only imagine the fear these women experienced at this time. To know that you were going to be blessed with a new baby only to have him snatched away by the decree of a wicked ruler must have been horrific. Tears were probably shed, and the joy of an anticipated birth would be stolen away by the knowledge of imminent danger to the baby, should it be a son. We are truly blessed that we don't have to worry about such decrees in this country!

Pharoah soon discovered that some of the Hebrew midwives whom he had ordered to do away with the baby boys were not obeying his demands. The baby boys were alive. So, he changed his plan. He ordered that all living baby boys who were three and under were to be thrown into the river. This surely would eliminate the threat of being overrun by Hebrews!

We don't know how old Moses was when Jochebed heard this news. but she couldn't bear to have her son thrown into the river. So, in faith, she fashioned a waterproof basket in which she placed Moses and floated him down the river. We can only imagine what she was thinking. How did she know that he wouldn't be found by the Pharoah's men and killed immediately? How did she know that he wouldn't just disappear and she would never know his fate? She must have had a great faith to do what she did, knowing that God would take care of her son.

And that He did. Miriam followed Moses down the river, keeping out of sight but keeping her eye on the basket. When he ended up in the area where Pharoah's daughter was bathing, she must have held her breath, wondering what would happen next. How relieved she must have been when the princess greeted Moses with a warmth that ensured Miriam that he would be safe. And what an opportunity she found to offer to find a Hebrew woman to care for the baby.

Jochebed must have been relieved and grateful when Miriam came to tell her of the news. How blessed she and the family were that what could have been a tragic ending to this baby's life was instead the beginning of a life of influence and historical leadership. Because she had a strong faith in God, she was able to help raise her own son, who could have so easily been destroyed by the hatred of an Egyptian king.

How does our faith compare to that of Jochebed?

eople with disabilities play tennis and basketball, and they bicycle too. They sky dive and compete in the Paralympics. They go to the opera, the beach, the mall and the office. And many of them want to go to church. Some of them want to go to your church.

Additionally, 1 in 8 Canadians are over 65, a number that is expected to double within the next 35 years. There is an increasing number who will continue to be active beyond their 85th birthday. Couple this with the number of individuals who use a wheelchair and we have a significant proportion of the Canadian population who face barriers accessing buildings.

Perhaps this would be a good time to ask the question "Is our ministry available to all?" If your church building was designed prior to the 1960's then you are likely well aware of the

barriers it presents to the elderly and people with disabilities who have mobility impairments.

These older church buildings generally have many stairs along with narrow hallways and doors. Washrooms that are satisfactory for most people are challenging for the elderly and for those in wheelchairs. Are there things your congregation could do to make your building more accessible to members of your congregation and those wanting to come for the first time?

What does the Code Require?

Although building codes will vary from province to province ground floor accessibility is generally required in all new construction. This could also become a requirement in a major renovation. At this point, access to the basement or to upper floors has not

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been mandated unless the building use is for people with physical disabilities.

Building Priority

But this is not simply about the building code, or what the law for buildings dictates what must be done. Ministry asks not what must I do, but rather what can I do?

• Our cause is nothing short of the cause of Christ.

• Our ministry is guided by the Great Commission to go and make disciples of all people.

• People with physical challenges need to be given the same access to ministry as able bodied people.

Consider the single largest age group of people are passing through middle age and will be hitting the turnstiles of senior citizenship in record numbers over the next two decades. How will your church building accommodate their needs as they look to the church to answer some of life's most pressing questions?

Our buildings are the servants of our ministry. Does your building serve your ministry or hinder your ministry? Does access to your building prevent your ministry from reaching elderly people and people with disabilities? Ask yourself the following questions.

A Beginning Checklist

• Do you expect to have people with physical disabilities involved in your congregation?

• Do you have designated handicapped parking spaces (minimum 8ft. wide) close to the main entrance?

• Is the pathway smooth from leaving their car to the front entry?

• Do you have ground level entrance, a ramp, or lift to the main floor entry?

• If another entry is required is it attractive and welcoming to the disabled attendee?

• If you have a basement or a second level is there a lift for those who cannot handle the stairs? Remember that ministry also occurs in classrooms, kitchens, and fellowship areas.

• Can the lift be used without assis-

tance? If not, is a call button provided?

• Are there places for wheelchairs to fit comfortably in the auditorium and in a choice of locations?

• Is the pathway from the main entry to the other areas easily accessible?

• Is there a washroom on each level to accommodate people in wheelchairs?

The Fennell Avenue Church's Bible Day Camp Experience

e all know that events are not the be all and end all of evangelism, but I believe there is still a role for events both as outreach and in strengthening the congregation.

Last year in Hamilton, as we began to plan for an event that might help us reach out to the community, we knew that some help would be beneficial. I was fortunate enough to have come into contact with Earl Lavender of Lipscomb University and learned there was a possibility of a group coming to us from there to help with our outreach.

Plans then started to come together (early fall '07) that did lead to a group coming in March of '08. If indeed we were going to get a group from Lipscomb, the next challenge we faced was to determine how we might best use them. Our thoughts went to Halam Park Housing Cooperative as a target audience as it is just a stone's throw from our building. It is comprised of about 96 families living next to our building.

On behalf of the congregation, I approached the director to ask how we as a church could best serve the cooperative during the March Break if we had the services of a dozen university students to help them in any way they wanted. The director took our question to the board and to a members meeting. They came back with a request that we work with them in providing a programme for their children. This was always our first choice.

There were some definite benefits to our approaching them and learning what they wanted. They knew we were interested in them and their opinions. When we provided a Bible Day Camp, we did not have to seek their buy-in, since we were doing

what they had asked us to do. Another benefit was that the cooperative promoted our programme weekly to their members for about 6 weeks.

The programme went well. We had over 30 children from the community out to the programme in addition to our own children. Toward the end of the week we had nearly a hundred visitors in our building for the wrap up activity.

One of the strong benefits came when the cooperative staff promoted the activity. People are never sure these days whether they can trust their children to strangers or not. In this case the programme was promoted as a joint effort, and the promotion came from someone whom they already trusted. We believe this helped in getting as good a response.

1 Chronicles 12 tells of those who came to join David at Hebron to turn Saul's kingdom over to him. Verse 32 says the men of Issachar understood the times and knew what Israel should do. Today in the kingdom we certainly need all of the help we can get in understanding the time and knowing what to do. If we seek to expose Jesus as the one who can fulfill needs, at times it may be helpful to learn what those around us want, and if it fits in our mission we can work along with them and thereby be the leaven they really need.

(Ed. note: It seems that as our world struggles to help victims of one disaster, another comes along to get our attention. Sometimes it makes us wonder, "How can we cope?" In "The Olden Days", plaques with important truths hung in many homes. One that some will remember read: "Only one life, 'twill soon be past— Only what is done for Christ will last." Is God stretching us as Christians to arise to all of these opportunities to help others and, at the same time, bring His message to thousands of people who might otherwise have never had the opportunity to know about Christ and His church?)

Chile: Originally estimated to have caused 200 deaths, the number of dead from the 8.8 earthquake and tidal waves which followed quickly rose to four times that number, with more yet to be found among the ruins. With the loss of 36 hospitals and many pharmacies looted, the emphasis shifted to preventing the spread of infections and the lack of medications

for diabetics and psychological illnesses. An appeal was made last month for field hospitals, chemical toilets, water and electrical systems. Fish rotting in the streets and other debris were a major problem as they became nests of infection.

Haiti: A report from BandS (Body and Soul Ministries) gives details of what has been accomplished toward aid for this disaster through mid-February. Outstanding is the fact that 11 orphans were brought to the States and placed where adoptive homes were ready to receive them. Care has also been provided in the Caris Foundation office in Port au Prince for a number of other children without a family. As none of the Caris owned vehicles was damaged by the quake, they have been in constant use carrying food, clothing, medicines and patients. Of special importance has been moving patients in need of having amputations to helicopter pads to be transported to the USNS Comfort, the hospital ship where it is safest to take care

of the needs of those critically wounded. However, after surgery, finding somewhere to place them for recuperation quickly became an urgent problem. BandS set up a M.A.S.H. style tent with 50+ beds and arranged for doctors and nurses to go to Haiti to care for those in need of rehabilitation. The cost of many supplies in Haiti shot up dramatically immediately after the quake, so everything that can be brought from other countries is of prime importance. The major airlines have helped with this problem by transporting many necessities for free if accompanied by a passenger. Also, several corporations and some owners of private planes have supplied their planes and pilots by allowing us to pay for the fuel cost. According to Dr. John Bailey, BandS is trying to do what they can to take care of the immediate needs of those who have been overlooked by bigger organizations. He notes that not all of the volunteer medical professionals can afford to take off time from their jobs and also cover travel expenses. If this need can be taken care of by those who cannot go, those able to make a difference in Haiti are still urgently needed. Ukraine (Kiev): The Ridgewood church



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in Beaumont, TX, sponsor of the Pinczuk family since their personal involvement 15 years ago in their work in Ukraine, brought a young Ukrainian Christian to the U.S. to talk about assuming the work Rick was doing at the time of his sudden death over a year ago. The son of one of Rick's first converts, 27-yearold Yuriy Aniper and his wife, Oksana, spent a month visiting with individuals and congregations who might be willing to contribute to their number one priority, raising money for a permanent building to house the Slavic Evangelism Ministry and to house the growing Shevchenko church in Kiev. Contributing to this urgency is the fact that Ukraine now has a pro-Russian president who may impose restrictions on religious organizations. On their return to Kiev, Yuriy used Power Point to show his congregation results of his trip, and bring home the fact that Ukrainian Christians are not alone in their mission to spread Christianity in their country. The work done by the Pinczuks-from translating songs into the native language to radio broadcasts and the establishment of new congregations outside of Kiev, has been invaluable in laying a foundation to carry on the work. Yuriy had already taken on much of the responsibility since Rick's

death, and was recommended by Carol Pinczuk, who has known him since his childhood because his mother, Lidiya Aniper, served many years as the secretary/ office manager of the Slavic Evangelism Ministry. Yuriy is using an uncoloured drawing of the proposed building to call attention to funds as they come in as a means of keeping the congregation informed and praying about their needs. In the meantime, the church keeps busy with numerous Bible studies in homes being attended by friends and neighbours, making bedding sets for a local kindergarten where one of the members works, and, as money for materials permits, another 1500 for a prison.

Thailand: From the ministry team in Chiang Mai comes the news that 86 young Christians from Thailand, Malaysia, Singapore and Japan met together at Siem Reap, Cambodia, from March 14-20 for what is called the "Angkor of Faith 4 Friends 4-ever". Their time was devoted to sharing the story of Jesus and serving the street children. In Chiang Mai, a third course dealing with "Romance" was started in March. Designed to help couples, either married or single, as a spiritual discipline to understand each other better, the importance of good communication, loyalty, power, gender roles, sex, money and marriage have been discussed in depth.

Papua New Guinea: Craig Ford, who was raised and is serving on the mission field in Papua New Guinea, has, together with his wife, Jeri, produced a Missions Resource book. Called the "Short Term Missions Handbook", it became available on March 1, and may be found at the following site: http://www.moneyhelp- forchristians.com/short-term-missionshandbook>. As the title suggests, it is a practical handbook that would help people who are participating in short term missions. Feeling that it is a resource for churches, a free copy to all church leaders and those who work with missions organizations is being offered. The Fords were encouraged in February when a new church started in Popover, where Craig is preaching every other week, had five baptisms. He has also begun a bi-monthly men's training class in ministry and leadership on Saturdays. A new three-year work permit for all PNG missionaries has been issued by the government.

Papua New Guinea – Urgent Appeal: The Fenwick church of Christ has accepted the Canadian sponsorship of Ruth Zimmerman and her Christian mission in Papua New Guinea. The support Ruth needs include salary, work funds, health insurance and travel expenses. Time is short, so the congregation encourages congregations to invite Ruth to meet with them (elders, mission committees, ladies' groups or other interested persons) to discuss the needs and opportunities of this work. Ruth reports that to date she has been able to raise three quarters of what she needs to resume working in Lae, and is currently seeking the remaining \$500 per month needed. She has booked return tickets to Papua New Guinea and plans to leave Canada on April 29. 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looking at the needs of another member, the family is supposed to determine what should be done (1 John 3:17) and the list could go on but the main thing is this: if someone is in Christ he/she is to be regarded as part of the family and the main responsibility is to love (1 John 4:21).

There are two things the church needs to focus on regarding why we lose people: 1) The church is not just about attending a service, while it is important to do so (Hebrews 10:25). The problem of being seen as an institution and not a family can cause a congregation to fall into the trap of focusing solely (or mostly) on attending the church meetings, seeing themselves as fulfilling their duty if they attend. It is often hard to answer the following questions. "What do your fellow church member struggle with? What is their hope? What do they need your help with? etc."

2) People need to be sought after not just for attendance but relationship. This will require practicing longsuffering, reaching out, showing interest in, forgiving, confessing to and so many other difficult things. The main thing needed is to develop a relationship of love and concern! May we all love the true church (the people) and not just replace the true nature of the church with an institution. To do so will make us feel less like leaving and more like belonging!

seek. It is one of the character traits to be added to the Christian's life (2 Peter 1:7).

This quality of life does not just happen but will come as a result of determined effort. "For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation for all people, training us to renounce ungodliness and worldly passions and to live self-controlled, upright, and godly lives in the present age..." (Titus 2:11, 12 ESV). The only way to live godly in this life is to do exactly what Paul says and "renounce ungodliness and worldly passion." There is more than simply a mental exercise but it must be supported by the daily walk (working) of our life.

Living godly in this present world may bring persecution. It may be very subtle persecution, since Satan knows all the tricks. We must always look to Jesus as our example, understanding that He knows our needs, our strengths and our weaknesses. He did not deliver us out of the darkness of sin only to see us entangled in it again. Remember the promise from 2 Peter 2:9, "... then the Lord knows how to rescue the godly from trials, and to keep the unrighteous under punishment until the day of judgment."

Jesus gave, and is, the gospel for the world. He is "God's power for salvation" (John 3:16). The gospel must not be altered to meet the shallow wishes of the world. "But even if we or an angel from heaven should preach to you a gospel contrary to the one we preached to you, let him



be accursed" (Galatians 1:8 ESV). We cannot learn too early in our Christian walk that the true gospel is the only message that can save and it must be preached in purity.

For sure, we live in an age of challenge. However, with the help of God and with the support that comes from study, prayer and fellowship, we can meet the challenge and succeed.
