



# **Seeing the Picture**

**T**en Words totally changed Pierre's life. He remembered the exact time ten years ago when he heard something that changed his way of thinking and living. Until that day he had been struggling through life. It seemed to him that he was doing everything the hard way. He was discouraged that his life was so difficult. He knew other people who lived life with less effort, less tension, less frustration, less debt. It seemed that he could not successfully complete anything. He thought he could never have what he believed to be a satisfying, abundant, rewarding life.

On that special day he was listening to Maurice, a teacher who was talking about dreams, goals, and success. Pierre had listened to many teachers, but it seemed as if nothing worked for him. Maurice's life-changing statement was simple; he thought he had heard it before. But this time, Pierre really heard it and he wrote down the ten words. He read them over and over again. He couldn't believe it was so basic and simple. Yet the ten words affirm the same basic principle that successful people have been using throughout the ages: "Things will change when you clearly picture the desired result." It is that simple. Change begins when you clearly picture what you desire the change to look like.

#### **Solving the Puzzle**

People who view themselves as failures frequently fail. Successful

people may fail at times - but they do not see themselves as failures. Maurice pointed out that to be successful, people must know exactly what they want to achieve. They move toward the pictures they constantly hold in their minds. Therefore, the clearer the picture the better will be the results. This will enable them to go through the trials and tribulations that may be necessary to arrive at their goal. He used the following example: "Suppose you bought a 1,000-piece jigsaw puzzle with no picture on the box showing what the final result should look like. You could, perhaps assemble the puzzle without the picture. However, it would be a difficult task. On the other hand those who have a clear picture of what the end result looks like will be more likely to complete the puzzle. The clearer the picture, the greater the desire to complete the puzzle".

The people who have a clear and specific picture of the outcome are simply working the way the brain works. The brain moves people toward the pictures they hold in their mind. These people (a) clearly know their goal, (b) begin doing things that lead toward that goal, (c) stop doing things that will not take them to the goal, (d) keep their goal clearly in mind, (e) are attracted to the people and situations that move them closer to the mental picture they keep in mind.

Maurice continued, "If you wish to make a wooden sculpture of a lotus plant, yet you hold clearly in your mind a picture of the purple grapes, what will be the result? To make the sculpture out of wood, will you spend your time, money and energy gathering metal or plastic? Rather, you will focus on finding the best piece of wood. A true artist 'sees' the lotus in the block of wood and then begins to remove everything

else that does not look like a lotus".

Pierre began to understand that success comes from knowing what he wants. For things to change, he must have a picture of what he wants them to change to. If he wished to be successful in school or business, he must begin to picture that success. Then, he will picture himself as a success. Now he focuses on the actions he must take to complete his journey to success.

"But remember" Maurice said, "in many ways the journey will be more important than the goal itself, because in the journey you will become the person you must be in order to arrive finally at your goal. Therefore, when you reach your goal, you will see a new person, the person you have become. Then you can set a new goal so that you can continue to grow and develop."

Ten years later, Maurice's words to Pierre continue to ring true: "Things will change when you clearly picture the desired result".

### **Spiritual Maturity**

Our "desired result" is spiritual maturity. Our Most Gracious God is willing to help us to achieve it, if we surrender our lives to him and let him lead us. Remember that for things to change, we must have a picture of what we want them to change to. As well, the stronger our desires to become spiritually mature, the more likely we will achieve it.

The Bible, through teaching and examples, helps people develop a

picture of spiritual maturity. Yet, people can learn the facts and doctrines contained in the Bible and not grow spiritually. Therefore, it is important to study and meditate on the Scripture, allowing a picture of spiritual maturity to develop within us. It is important to remember that the life-changing story presented in the Bible

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begins with the picture of a loving God who desires a close relationship with people. This is the relationship Adam and Eve had with God until sin separated them (Genesis 1-3). Spiritual maturity is the way for people to develop a closer relationship with God.

Everyone who wants to grow learns to change. But what evidences are there that a person has changed? The book of James urges us to become spiritually mature so that we will not be "like a wave of the sea, blown and tossed by the wind" (James 1:6). He helps us develop a clear and practical picture. For example, peace, patience and stability are evident in the changed lives of the spiritually mature (James 3:17).

Once we have this picture in mind, we need to know how to reach that goal. The simple answer is, depend on God to work in us. According to the Apostle Paul, "it is God who works in you to will and to act according to his good purpose" (Philippians 2:15).

Consider the principle of purity. God purifies us when we surrender our will and lives to Him. God. who is pure, also "purifies us from all sin" as we walk in his fellowship (1 John 1:7; 3:3). Therefore, those who desire to become spiritually mature, practise being pure. This is not easy in our cultures. Suppose we face temptation and have impure thoughts. We can practise being pure and not surrender to the impure action. If we can strongly picture ourselves being pure and act like a pure person, God will change our lives to become a picture of purity.

We must understand that our strength comes from God who enables us to picture what we want to be. Keeping the picture of spiritual maturity firmly in mind during our activities today will move us closer and closer to the spiritual maturity we desire. It will enable us to go through the necessary trials and tribulations so that we can reach our goal.

There will likely be setbacks and occasional self-doubts on the road to our maturity. We will need patience and persistence. But it's important to keep moving toward our personal goal by practising the principles given in the Holy Scriptures. If we keep growing, refusing to give up, and staying as positive as we can, we will reach our goal.

Begin your morning with this simple prayer: "Holy God, let my eyes be open to your presence and your will throughout this day. Work in and through me." Picture yourself honouring God in all you do: Exercising thankfulness, turning frustrations into learning patience, serving others as service to God, celebrating their successes, being a friend to those discouraged or in distress. Commit yourself to practise spiritual maturity.

End your day thanking God for the times when your actions moved you closer to the picture of spiritual maturity.

# The King is Dead!

n June 25th, Michael Jackson died. One of the most successful entertainers ever, he was awarded 13 Grammies and sold over 750 million records becoming a cultural icon and gaining acclaim as the "King of Pop." His public memorial service, with his \$25,000 gold

casket was attended by a host of celebrities, 20,000 ticket-holders and was viewed by an estimated 1 billion people worldwide.

Much of Jackson's life and death paralleled Elvis Presley, his first wife's father. Elvis was known as "The King" and the "King of Rock 'n Roll." Both performers were "larger than life" personalities whose talent, distinctive music styles and clothing had far ranging effects on the entertainment world. Despite their success, both had difficult personal lives that ended abruptly and prematurely. Each of their deaths was followed by massive outpourings of public grief. In the years since Presley's death, Graceland, his mansion, has become a quasi-religious shrine for his devotees. Jackson's estate, Neverland, will surely attain a similar "sacred" status for his fans.

Many fans go beyond appreciation and admiration for stars to almost fanatical adoration and devotion which could well be called worship. It is not surprising that in our culture the word for a false object of worship, "idol," is used of celebrities from sports, movies, television or music. Stars may be incredibly talented, capable of touching masses of people, but at best, they are fallible and mortal—even super-stars like Presley and Jackson. The reality is that no matter how successful, popular, or wealthy they were, or how devoted their fans, the King of Rock 'n Roll and the King of Pop are dead. They are powerless to do anything for those who believe in them. Though countless thousands will flock each year to their memorials, there are only memories—but no hope. They were entertainers, mere men, nothing more.

There is nothing more empty than worshipping an idol. The Old Testament prophets often spoke of the tragedy of worshipping what was only wood, stone or precious metal (or flesh). Isaiah tells of the man who makes an idol from the same piece of wood he burns to make a fire to warm himself. He bows down and prays, "Save me." Jeremiah speaks of "worthless idols" that cannot save. Paul speaks of the pagans who worship mute idols. Like the Baal and Asherah called on by the false prophets at Mount Carmel, idols cannot hear, answer or help.

We worship another King. Like Elvis and Michael Jackson, from a human standpoint, this King's death was premature. However, His life and death stand in stark contrast to theirs. Despite sometimes drawing crowds, He lived in relative obscurity and poverty. At His death, the only crowd was an angry mob. His only procession led Him to the place of His execution. After He died, His body was quietly taken from there, wrapped in linen cloth and placed in a borrowed tomb. There were no tributes, performances, motorcade, or media—not even a private family service. Other than a relatively small group of followers, few people grieved. His devotees were discouraged and disillusioned. Their King was dead. One killed himself, others left the city. But, their hope did not end at his grave. We know Him as the "King of Kings." His death was neither permanent nor pointless.

Jesus warned of the dangers of worshipping things that are impermanent and untrustworthy. It isn't the Baals of the ancient world. They and their followers are long buried. We are challenged by more subtle idols, those which don't present themselves as gods or religions but just as certainly want first place in our loyalty and service. They want to be king. Jesus spoke of the God of mammon (materialism), Paul called it covetousness. It could take the form of power, wealth, possession, fame—all the things that today's entertainment idols represent. The death of Michal Jackson reminds us that of all the popular idols of today, none are worthy of our lives.

Perhaps William Cowper said it best when he wrote: The dearest idol I have known, Whate'er that idol be Help me to tear it from Thy throne, And worship only Thee.

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# **How Would You Answer?**

The person, who has a relationship with God through Jesus Christ, has the most valuable possession one could possibility have. If you understand the value of that blessing you will want everyone you know to share in it. It would be more acceptable to many if everyone could have that blessing, obtained in whatever manner that appeals to them. The divided "Christian" religious world offers just that! Big groups have and are being formed on the basis that as long as a person believes in Jesus as the Christ, one is welcomed into membership by whatever means he or she chooses. The sinner's prayer? OK. Confession of belief in Jesus as the Christ? OK. Baptism of some sort (sprinkle, pour, immerse)? OK. Of course, we do not have to worry about that happening in the Lord's Church. Right? Sadly, this affirmation, right, seems to be being challenged by some today.

How would you answer a person who came to ask you about their relationship with God. If they said something like this: "I have been doing some serious study of the Bible and have become concerned about my relationship with God. My parents were fine people and made sure we went to Sunday school and worship each Sunday. They had me 'baptized' when I was very young, so they have told me as I do not remember it. However, as I have been studying I have begun to wonder, even though I 'feel' like I have been saved, have I in fact been saved?

Based on my recent study I have the following questions: 'Is Baptism necessary for salvation? If so, does it have to be immersion after the age of accountability/understanding? I was baptized as an infant in my church at a public baptism but the Bible gives no examples of infant baptism. So, do I need to be re-baptised?"

How would you answer? You could say, "I am not the judge of your salvation so I can not really answer the question." Or, "The real issue is whether you really love God truly in your heart or not, and since I can not read your heart, I will have to leave that between you and God." Or, as is being said by some in the churches of Christ today, "You seem very sincere in your belief in God and you are living a good life in accordance with what you have been taught so you are fine. You obeyed the Lord as you understood His command so you don't need to be baptized again. After all, relationship with God is about the sincerity of one's belief in Jesus as the Christ and not the keeping of these picky little rules!"

Is it possible that the warnings of Paul are being reflected in the answers given in the previous paragraph? Remember he said to the Ephesian elders, "Pay careful attention to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for the church of God, which he obtained with his own blood. I know that after my departure fierce wolves will come in among you, not sparing the flock; and from among your own selves will arise men speaking twisted things, to draw away the disciples after them" (Acts 20:28-30 ESV). Remember Paul also warned Timothy, "I charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and by his appearing and his kingdom: preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching. For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate

for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths" (2 Timothy 4:1–4). Has the fox/wolf gotten into the henhouse?

The questions in the third paragraph above are not hypothetical, but are quoted directly from a letter I received from a student who is studying the World Bible School course through Key To The Kingdom. He asked me those questions plus two others, seeking Biblical answers. The answers I gave in the second paragraph above are what seems to be the answers that are being given to such questions by some in our brotherhood, based on the books and articles they are writing and the sermons they are preaching. In the next few paragraphs I want to share the answers I gave to the questioner.

I appreciate your question and your obvious desire to know and obey God's will for your life. Baptism in the New Testament is clearly for the purpose of bringing salvation. When Jesus gave the great commission to His disciples, directing them to take His message to the world, baptism was to be a beginning result of the first teaching they did. "Then Jesus came to them and said, "All author-

# Be Strong! Have Courage!

**7**e live in a world today that demands that we have courage. It demands that we have persistence, knowledge, skills and courage. We need courage to step outside our doors in the morning, courage to watch the 6 o'clock news, courage to speak up and out about issues that we care about. Courage to watch our friends and family learn, courage to love, not only our boyfriends or husbands, but our friends, our family members and even deeper than all that, courage to love those who are very difficult to love. In Joshua 1:5-9, God is preparing Joshua to lead; preparing him to have the courage that he needs to be in total obedience to God. Now, we might not be preparing to lead an army into battle as Joshua was, but God needs us to be in full obedience to Him, right here, right now, and have the courage to serve him to our greatest ability. We are being led into battle; actually, we are in the battle. Simply by being born, we are thrown into a battle for our souls. And only God can help us win that battle. We need to be in strict obedience to him at all times.

The fundamental ideas that will be discussed in this article are courage, strength, meditation and obedience. The dictionary defines courage as "the quality of mind or spirit that enables a person to face difficulty, danger, pain, etc., without fear; bravery". Courage is stepping out of one's comfort zone, doing something that might not come easily to you. Looking back at Joshua 1:5-9, we can identify several areas of action where God talks about courage. God needs us to be leading, not necessarily in front of a group or in an official position, but we are all

leaders of sinners to Christ. We are all being called to spread the gospel, and that is where leading comes in (vs. 6). We need to be ready to tell people about God and His love for them. We need to be obedient (vs.7). No amount of courage will be useful if we are not following God and His plan for us. This leads us right into meditating (vs.8). How can we be obedient if we don't know the word; if the word is not written on, and in, our hearts. God told Joshua not to turn to the right or the left of the law of the Lord, but to do this, he needed to know it, and know it well. The final two actions are the promises that God gave Joshua and that He gives us today if we follow Him. He promises us prosperity and success (vs. 8)! And He promises to be with us through it all (vs.9).

What is it that can make us emotionally strong in the Lord? What does it mean to meditate? Here's a quote I found on the internet regarding meditation: "In order to not let the Bible depart from your mouth vou have to commit it to memory and to think about it often. To think deeply about something is to meditate". Who among us finds it easy to study and meditate on the Bible? I sure don't. I can always find other things to do. I get into a nice little pattern once in a while of reading scriptures before work, but I don't think that qualifies for meditation. I remember a few years back when I was reading scripture every night before bed, but that isn't meditation either. I wasn't thinking deeply about the verses or trying to really apply them to my life or trying to commit the words to my heart and mind.

This is the underlying topic of study in this article. What is it about

us-about our lives-that stops us from really meditating on the word? This goes back to what we were talking about earlier, that the first step to having courage is to have the will to do God's work. If we are serious about wanting to work for God, then we will be able to come to the understanding that God's will for our lives and His instructions to us are all in the Bible. It's with this knowledge that we will be able to read the Bible unobstructed by time, with full willingness and genuine interest in the words God has written. Once we know what God wants and needs of us, then we can be obedient to His calling. Like I mentioned at the beginning, courage is demanded of us as Christians. But the courage that we need to do God's will is supplied by the Word of God.

Now let's look at some obstacles and think about how we can try to change our thinking around each of them.

**Time.** God is not asking us to spend hours and hours at a time. In fact, He didn't require a timeline at all. He did say to meditate on it day and night. What does this mean? It means to keep it in your heart. Consciously focus on scripture throughout the day and apply to your life the concepts and lessons you are reading about. For example, if you happen to be reading the beatitudes in Matthew one morning, and you read that blessed are the merciful, and blessed are the meek, and blessed are the peacemakers; and you end up going to work and are faced with a situation. . . an example from my own work as a nurse would be dealing with a rude patient. If I go by my own instinct, I become easily annoyed with the patient and might talk about him or her to other nurses and just have a rotten attitude towards that patient. That, believe it or not, is the easiest way to deal with that type of patient and how many other nurses deal with them. But if I consciously remember to meditate on what I read. then I will apply those words to my actions. Blessed are the meek... so, be gentle towards the patient, trying

to understand where he is coming from. Blessed are the merciful... to have mercy on this patient and care for him in body, mind and soul is to treat him with respect and dignity; not talking about them. Blessed are the peacemakers... by talking about my patients to other nurses in a negative way I am encouraging others to do the same, creating a negative attitude throughout. So, in applying the concepts from one tiny piece of scripture throughout my day, I am meditating on the word, keeping it in my mind and heart, and consequently, it shows through my actions.

Priority/Indifference. In dealing with this issue, we need to come to the realization that obedience requires work. To mediate on the word we need to have the desire to come to know God more and to be more like him. Matthew 6:21 says "for where you treasure is, there your heart will be also". And in verse 33, "but strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteous-

ness". If we are Christians and feel indifferent about studying and meditating on God's word, then we need to examine our hearts and find out what is standing between us and God. Once we turn our hearts toward God and truly strive to be like him and work for his kingdom, then the indifference will fade away, and studying and meditating on God's word will become a higher priority in our lives.

Enough knowledge. For those of you who have been Christians a long time, who have had a lot of biblical teaching or who have grown up in the church of Christ, it is easy to read passages and think that you know it already and just skim over it. This is a dangerous attitude because then we're not really reading the scripture in hopes of gaining anything from it. We need to be careful to stay away

from this attitude and praying that our attitudes might change and that we can continue to learn and grow in Christ.

Let's look at prayer for a minute. Prayer is a huge part of our walk with God. It's our means of communication with Him, and Jesus is a great example in that even though He was the son of God, He still prayed frequently to His Father. He sought guidance and strength and communicated with God on issues He was facing. Prayer can help us meditate on God's word. If we pray at the beginning of the day for His word to be ingrained on our hearts, God will help us to remember the scriptures and will give us the strength and courage we need to apply the scriptures to our lives. Romans 12:12 says to "persevere in prayer"; James 5:13 says "Is any one among you suffering? Let him pray. Is any cheerful? Let him sing praise". We are to pray under all conditions. Prayer needs to be our starting point in the day, not just when things get crazy. If we keep our open lines of communication, God will be faithful and will supply all our needs.

Although we have already touched on obedience, let's look at it a little closer. John 15:10-11 says, "If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete". In short, we can write that obedience equals joy. So, like we covered earlier in the meditation section, if we have the word in our hearts and minds, we will be more likely to apply them in our lives, and in so doing, we will be obeying the word of God. But in Joshua, the wording is very particular. It says to be careful to obey. Why do you think that it would be listed as a caution? Obedience requires a purposeful decision to do what the Bible tells us to do. However, it all stems from the idea that we are children of God. Read John 15:1-5. In abiding with

> Him, we will have no other desire than to be obedient to His teachings.

> In concluding this article, I want to encourage us all to think about how these topics can apply to our lives. Think of how you can makes changes in your life to be a more effective servant of Christ.—Sudbury, ON

ity in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age" (Matthew 28:18-20 ESV). In this text Jesus instructs His apostles to baptize those who desired to become disciples. Of course, this was only the beginning of living the Christian life so He instructed them to teach those converted to "obev everything I have commanded you."

We see the beginning of this message being taken to the world on the day of Pentecost, following the resurrection and return of Jesus to heaven, in Acts 2. The people heard the message and were convicted by it. Because of that the following took place: "Therefore let all Israel be assured of this: God has made this Jesus, whom you crucified, both Lord and Christ." When the people heard this, they were cut to the heart and

said to Peter and the other apostles, "Brothers, what shall we do?" Peter replied, "Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:36 - 38 ESV). When these people became aware of their sin, they knew they needed to do something to get back in favour with God. The response of Peter is, that based on their faith, they were to repent and be baptized "...for the forgiveness of your sins." Clearly here baptism was to be a necessary part of the plan the disciples had been given to teach people who desired to come to the Lord to receive forgiveness.

In the conversion of Saul (later to be known as Paul) the Lord appears to him on his way to Damascus. He was told to go into the city and he would be told what he was to do. In Acts 22, when Ananias came to Paul at the direction of God, he told him to "...Get up, be baptized and wash your sins away, calling on his name" (Acts 22:16 ESV).

There are other examples of con-

version in the book of Acts and they all involved baptism. We should also take note of what Peter had to say about baptism when talking about the saving of people in the days of Noah (sadly, just the family of Noah) and water. He says the people in the ark were saved by water and then goes on to speak about the salvation of people today. Understand that Noah was saved by water, because he obeyed God. Peter speaks to us saying, "... and this water symbolizes baptism that now saves you also--not the removal of dirt from the body but the pledge of a good conscience toward God. It saves you by the resurrection of Jesus Christ" (1 Peter 3:21 ESV).

Based on the examples and statements from scripture quoted here, I would understand baptism to be necessary for salvation.

From a biblical standpoint you have already answered the second part of your question. Those who were baptized in the New Testament were all believers at the time of their baptism. Each of these people responded as an act of faith to what they were taught.

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And, as you pointed out, there are no examples of infant baptism in the Bible. In fact, infant baptism is not even recorded in history until late in the second century. In the New Testament, baptism is administered to believers for the remission of sins.

Finally, it would be my understanding that to fulfill obedience to God one must be baptized by immersion for forgiveness of sins. The New Testament word for baptism means to "dip, plunge, immerse." English dictionaries will add such things as "sprinkle or pour." However, the Greek word used in the New Testament does not have this second meaning as part of its definition. Paul underlines this "method" of baptism when he writes to the church at Colossae, in Colossians 2:12, "... having been buried with him in baptism and raised with him through your faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead." Some today seem to want to argue that Paul is speaking in a symbolic way here and that the idea of being buried and raised is spiritual and not physical. It is clear from historical references to Christian baptism that the physical act of burial and raising took place in baptism. Certainly there was the spiritual burial and resurrection connected with it which depended on the heart of the person being baptized. The act of baptism can simply make one wet! However, if it is an act of faith. submission and obedience, it results in cleansing from sin and receiving the gift of the Holy Spirit in new birth into the family of God. Paul says it like this, "Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:3, 4 ESV).

I would answer, If one wants to obey God, he or she will be baptized by immersion for the forgiveness of sins and thereby experience "...the pledge of a good conscience toward God."

I ask again in closing, "How Would You Answer?"

# Newsletter Evangelism – 2

(See the July issue for the first part of this article.)

In phase three you are free to use whatever study method you are most comfortable with in order to lead people to Christ. My emphasis in this article is to show you how anyone can break down barriers and resistance that the community might have to any congregation and elevate it to the status of the most popular church in the community (in the judgment of MOST of the community members). From this vantage point you are then able to walk through that community with ease and confidence because you have first made the community "user-friendly" with this easy-going, non-pushy NEWSLETTER EVANGELISM approach.


A great way to visualize this approach is to think of some guy that wants to be married and his game plan is to walk up to every woman with whom he finds himself attracted and tell her he wants to marry her. He thinks that statistically, eventually one will say "yes" to his proposal.

Now another guy who also wants to get married goes about it in a much more common manner. He finds someone to whom he is attracted, and he "courts her" over a period of time with the hopes that he may eventually win her over during the courtship process.

Guy number one may go through hundreds of women with his approach, and he may eventually find some prospective bride in the process. But guy number two doesn't have to court dozens or hundreds of women because his approach is much more likely to win-over a prospective bride. The better the courtship, the better the chances of marriage. If there is no courtship, the chances of marriage are slim-to-none.

Isn't this similar to what happens when people do door-to-door evangelism the old-fashion way? You go doorto-door looking for people with whom


#### **BRITISH COLUMBIA**

Myanmar (Burma): Nothing in other parts of the world prepared the McDonoughs for the experience of life in Myanmar. They wrote that, in addition to "spiders as big as your fist in the kitchen and poisonous snakes on the back porch, government monitors watched and reported our every move. Twenty to 30 trucks full of riot policemen roam the city, putting down demonstrations and showing force to intimidate the opposition party. All telephone calls and e-mail messages are censored." For these reasons. Brother McDonough noted that their e-mail reports would be much less frequent and sent only when they were outside of the country as in June and July. They have been aboard the "Ship of Life" to train a group of preaching students from the Sunset Bible School in Phnom Penh how to evangelize in the villages of Cambodia. He pointed out that 63% of the world's population is found in Asia. Nine have obeyed the gospel and a new

beginning is being made in the land of Buddha where the name of God and His Son had never been heard before. When he returns to Myanmar, he is planning to bring newly-converted men together for a week of intensive Bible study as an aid to helping them plant new churches in the region devastated by Cyclone Nargis, where life-saving work still goes on. On a recent trip, a village chief asked those delivering rice to share the story of Jesus with the entire village. providing his battery-powered T.V. for viewing a film about the life of Christ. Afterwards, the team of workers spent the day teaching, as the group of people listened to answers to their many questions.

Cambodia: A new addition to the "Back to School" program in Cambodia is causing great excitement among the children. It is a mobile library of boxes of books rotating among seven villages. One box stays in a village for six weeks, and then goes to a different location, allowing children to read about 50 different titles by the time all of the boxes reach them. They call it a "Book Club", and chose monitors to be responsible for having them available qnd seeing to the return of the books in good condition. Children may earn "points" toward a toy, a bag of rice for their family or another book if they can answer a few questions about those they have read. Eventually, some may earn enough for a bike, which is a tremendous help to those who live a long way from the schools. Three Bible story books are included in the \$50 cost of each box.

Zimbabwe: A man who had just finished the three-year Bible program in Mutari came to work in Bulawayo in 1972 with Leonard Rogers, who was from England and had married the daughter of Canadian missionary parents. Velaphi Mlangeni was highly recommended by Loy Mitchell, head of the Bible school at that time. Brother Rogers, who spent 42 years in Africa. and Velaphi worked together very well in the rural areas around the city of Bulawayo. However, eventually a terrorist war made it unwise and unsafe to go out into the villages. With three sons that Leonard and Mabel Rogers knew would be forced to go into the army, they came to Canada. Velaphi returned to Mutare Bible School where he taught a few years. He then worked for Zimbabwe Broadcasting station for a longer period of

time, but his heart was always to go back to the village work in the Bulawayo area. He and his wife were both born in the Matebele land and understood the people. In 2002 they were given the opportunity to begin a work with World Bible School in an office in a large shopping centre in Bulawayo. As it is on a main thoroughfare on the edge of the city, it is very accessible to the public. They have established a staff of dedicated people. Bible lessons are marked at the office and returned sometimes in person for follow up and further teaching. Since 2002 the team has started 28 congregations and over 1600 people have been baptized. The work has spread over into Botswana, and some 13,400 students have been taught through the Bible lessons. They also have a radio broadcast that they produce themselves and is well received since people in the rural areas don't have access to T.V. The station is situated in Bulawayo and is heard over a wide part of Africa, even beyond Zimbabwe. Although small, the church in Manson, MB, has been involved with raising a work fund and providing food during the drought in that part of Africa. Recently the Maryvale church in Calgary has helped, as well as a church in the U.S. which has some members from Bulawayo. The Mlangeni's son and his wife work with

a congregation near Bulawayo. Also, the Manson, congregation is attempting to purchase a vehicle for Hailey Velaphi Miangeni to use. Anyone wishing to support this ministry should contact the Manson church.

Cochabamba, Bolivia: The youth group from this church was headed for a youth retreat the first week in July when their chartered bus overturned, killing 3 of the teen girls (2 were first cousins) and injuring several others. Josh Marcum missionary there and a friend of Craig Fords', was with them. Japan: Ben and Erica Berry: Our Wednesday night Bible study continues with an in-depth focus on the gospel of Luke. Some great news to share – Mizuki Komoro, a young lady Erica got together with a lot last summer, was just recently baptized! She is spending the summer in Japan and told us that her father is also considering becoming a follower of Jesus as well! Also, the mother of another

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

Japanese friend, Yukari (Sekine) Garcia, was baptized just a few weeks ago. Sasha Ingle, intern in Sendai, requests prayers for her friend, Mr. Fukuda, a retired man about 60 years old, who has been studying the Bible with her. She also rejoices that she has enough support to be able to raise her salary a little and is now receiving 93% of the budget approved by her sponsoring congregation. Joel Osborne: "I have now been back in Sendai and Japan for 6 months since I left for furlough and a time of learning in Southeast Asia (and) am discovering many things that are different this time around. The biggest difference is the church itself. Our numbers are small, but the ownership, the heart, the vision and understanding of the church is stronger, healthier and more godly. Each church member played a role in this year's LST orientation meeting, and has been helping in tasks through the week as well as in preparation for FriendsCamp. A few weeks ago, Toshiko (church member) and our neighbour Akiko (who also does LST) sat around the dining room table with Gaku, Sasha and me. Toshiko shared about how different her life has become since

she became a Christian. This year's Young Adult camp, held in Hitachi for the third year in a row, had the theme of "Mission," and hopes to equip the youth of Japan to be outward looking with their faith, and to help them catch a vision for God's mission and His heart for the lost and the hurting. Next year the Tokyo area churches have agreed to spearhead YA camp for the first time. Other: 1) LST- 61 people are regularly coming to read Luke, Acts or John in English with the team. 2) FriendsCamp was scheduled for July 24-26. 3) "Mission Exposure" - in August, Joel plans to take seven people from Japan for a "mission exposure" in Cambodia.. Michiko Straker: "We arrived in Abilene a year and a half ago. I have been trying to get close to the Japanese ACU students since then. I enjoyed auditing a class called 'Theology of Mission' last semester. While Jonathan and I were at class four Japanese girls babysat our kids. In addition, the girls and I got together once a week and talked about their struggles, questions about Christianity and Christian life, God, Jesus, wisdom to live in this life and so on. At school now there are around 18 Japanese students. Three Christian boys come to the Bible study (and) around 15 girls are friends with us. They are seeking. I found my opportunity to work in them and want to keep working for God... Right now we take turns with the Betts having the Bible studies in our homes on Wednesday nights. Please keep praying for this ministry with the Japanese students. Jonathan enjoys school and study. He especially enjoys Greek (and) says learning Japanese helped him to study Greek. Minori turned one year old in April. Hijiri is now three years old. Jonathan is preaching at the Highway church of Christ, 12 miles southeast of Abilene.



to form a life-long religious relationship. To the people in your neighbourhood with whom you have never met, and don't know anything about you, you are not someone they are likely to quickly form any type of relationship with at all. To them, you are more of an annoyance, a "how quickly can I get you to go away" kind of person.

Pursuing a mate and pursuing a prospect in the community, when done slowly, and in a non-pushy, non-threatening, loving way will produce much the same results. The prospective mate and the prospective community member is much more likely to be receptive to your proposal once they get to know you and you have formed a relationship with him or her. This is what these newsletters accomplish.

This is what friendship evangelism is all about. When you think about it, what you are doing is forming this terrific friendship with your community before you pop that all so important question, "How are you and the Lord doing?"

In a recent example of one neighbourhood of 160 homes, I had about 50 people from 19 of those homes who have since visited our services and/or had Bible studies with us. That's about 2 ½ people for one out of every nine homes. Can you believe that this experience and those numbers are possible anywhere in the country? I can, because I've seen it and lived it. And Californians are less religious than most people in the country.

This is not rocket science. People don't care how much you know until they know how much you care. You softly break down barriers with this approach. And this is so very conducive to helping people to be open to you sharing the Gospel.

What's so great about this approach is that now preacher training schools can give their students something that will really work when they get out into

### **Kneeshaw, Frank**

(April 14, 1908-May 7, 2009)

Frank Kneeshaw was born in Goderich, Ontario, on April 14, 1908. He was one of five children, four boys and one girl, who were born to Ernie and Lucy Kneeshaw. Frank grew up and was educated in the southern Georgian Bay area; and lived in Owen Sound, Meaford and Collingwood. Frank apprenticed as an electrician in Colingwood and spent his entire work career plying his trade-the majority of it working for himself.

On June 17, 1930, Frank married Edith Mason of Meaford. Together they would share seventy-six happy years until Edith's passing on March 29, 2007, a little more than two months short of their seventy-seventh anniversary. She was ninety-seven at the time. Frank and Edith were blessed with two daughters, Ruth and Sylvia; and from them the family grew.

Frank and Edith spent all their married life in Collingwood, about 5 years in one house and then about 72 years in a second residence. Not long after Edith's passing, Frank moved into the

lodge section of the Bay Haven Long Term Care Facility and remained there until his death on May 7, 2009, at the age of one hundred and one.

Frank was as a loving husband, devoted father and doting grandfather, great-grandfather and great greatgrandfather. He loved his family and was proud of their accomplishments. He was always glad to share them with you. Frank will also be fondly remembered as a good neighbour and friend. To many in the community he will always be Frank, the electrician. He was honest, hard working, dependable and particular about his work. When the town clock was first installed above the Collingwood arena, Frank was called on to do the wiring. A great many other sites around Collingwood also remain as monuments to Frank's work.

To those who knew him best, Frank will be remembered as a man of faith who loved his Lord and who did his best to serve Him. He had strong beliefs and was firm in his convictions. He believed deeply in prayer; and did so regularly, especially for both his physical and spiritual families. Frank and Edith were a gracious, hospitable couple and, over the years, many a person enjoyed a meal or spent a night in their home. In addition,

as long as they were able, the Kneeshaws regularly provided rides for those who needed transportation to church services and activities and elsewhere. For years Frank led singing, taught Bible classes, served as treasurer, and preached when needed. He also devoted many hours in preparation and physical labour when the congregation was building its present meetinghouse. Afterwards, he spent many hours doing electrical repairs and maintenance around the building. If there was a need that Frank could meet, he was there.

Frank is survived by his two daughters Ruth (Archie) Blanchard and Sylvia Davison, two brothers, Milton and Alex Kneeshaw, five grandchildren, eleven great-children, and one great greatgrandchild. He was preceded in death by his loving wife, Edith, his son-inlaw, Basil Davison, one brother, Carl Kneeshaw and one sister, Birdie, who died in infancy. Besides those already mentioned, Frank will be fondly remembered by his many nieces, nephews and other family members, as well as his friends and neighbours and his church family whom he loved dearly, the members of the Church of Christ in Collingwood and elsewhere.

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# Winnipeg Moves into New Building

n June 14, the Central congregation in Winnipeg gathered for worship for the first time in their new building. It was just a little over a year ago that they met for the last time in the building on Osborne Street. Since then, they have been meeting in rented facilities.

The new building is located at 170 St. Mary's Road, which is just a short distance from Winnipeg's downtown. The congregation purchased the building, which had formerly been used by the Norwood United Church, originally built in 1947. Due to declining membership, Norwood United moved out of the building a few years ago. A subsequent church group began extensive interior renovations by demolishing much of the interior. After gutting it, they found themselves unable to continue the project and put it back on the market. The Central congregation purchased it in early 2008.

After an extensive planning and design process, architectural and engineering plans were created. The congregation obtained a building permit in late October and started work. Because many interior walls had been removed, this offered an opportunity for a complete redesign of the interior. Also, many upgrades were made to improve the overall efficiency of the building: steam boiler replaced with high efficiency

furnaces, lighting, window and insulation upgrades, new bathrooms, carpeting and flooring, millwork, etc.

Throughout the process, many members of the congregation have heard from people living in the area around the building who are pleased to see that the building was being renovated and a church meeting there. (Different proposals for the empty building had including turning it into condominiums and a strip mall).

The congregation shares a parking lot with the high school next door, which offers space for about 45 cars. plus there is almost unlimited onstreet parking. The auditorium can seat over 400 with overflow space in the enclosed balcony (to be used as a classroom). A cry room/training room has been put in under the balcony. Additionally, the multi-purpose room can seat about 180 with dividers that can make this into three separate rooms. On the second floor, where the United Church formerly had their offices, there are 8 more classroom spaces. The rest of the main floor has the youth classroom, kitchen, bathrooms, a small office and a large coatroom. At the south end of the building, where the United Church previously had a bookstore and offices, there is space for a library/ meeting room/classroom, plus offices and work area for the staff. In this area, a wheel-chair lift accesses the classroom, office and main-floor levels of the building. Handicap features include washrooms, a ramp and assisted hearing system in the auditorium.

On Saturday, August 22, the congregation is planning a special Community Open House and barbecue. The festivities will continue the next day, the 23rd, with a fellowship and barbecue after worship. There will be a VBS from the 24th to the 28th. Other events planned include the Clothing Giveaway on September 19 and Youth Rally on September 25-27.

The congregation has already had several visitors over the first few weeks. It is hoped that the move to a new facility in a new neighbourhood will offer many opportunities to reach out and serve the community and that the building will be a useful tool for God's service in Winnipeg.
