

Your Faith and the Faith

veryone has faith. That's a bold statement! Everyone has faith in someone or something. Having faith is part of being human. If you disagree and know someone who doesn't have faith in anyone or anything, I humbly stand corrected.

However, listening to people speak of their dreams, challenges and views of life reveals that we generally believe in someone or something beyond ourselves and, to some extent, in ourselves and our abilities to improve and overcome. Many people believe in God. Many who don't believe in Him believe in other people or things to improve their lives and answer questions about the meaning of life. Even atheists have a strong faith that there is no God and humans control their destiny. Scientists and inventors believe they can discover and create things not known or done before. People believed they could travel to the moon though it had not been done before.

Today, people are placing their faith in various places: technology, science, medicine, governments, money, famous people, education, entertainment, sports, pleasure and so on. Everyone has faith. The difference between us is where we put it. For Christians, "your faith and hope are in God" (1 Peter 1:9).

Now if we each have faith, we could say the faith we have individually is

"our own." In talking with people, Jesus often says something to this effect. He describes their faith as "your faith." About eight times Jesus tells people "your faith has made you well." He also speaks of "your faith" relative to salvation and steadfastness. Many sick and guilty people placed their faith in Jesus and His power to heal and to forgive and He made them well and spiritually whole.

While Jesus was dining with Simon the Pharisee, a woman known around

town as a sinner came to see Jesus and brought an alabaster jar of perfume. Luke 7:38 describes her act of faith: "Standing behind Him at His feet, weeping, she began to wet His feet with her tears, and kept wiping them with the hair of her head, and kissing His feet and anointing them with the perfume." When Simon reasoned that a prophet would know the woman is a sinner, Jesus explained the relationship between forgiveness and loving God. To Mary, the sinful woman (John 12:3), Jesus spoke comforting words that washed away her guilt and shame, "Your faith has saved you, go in peace" (Luke 7:50). She put her faith in Jesus. Our faith belongs in Jesus the One able to forgive and save us. Salvation is the ultimate result: "obtaining as the outcome of your faith the salvation of your souls" (1 Peter 1:9).

Each of us has our own experiences of God. I came to know Him through different experiences than yours, but He is the same God, the same Father, Son and Spirit. He has so many dimensions and so much love for all of us. One beautiful thing about Christian fellowship is that as we hear each other's experiences of God's grace and providence our appreciation of Him grows. This is part of what Paul means when he prays we "may

be able to comprehend with all the saints what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ which surpasses knowledge" (Ephesians 3:19). Our faith can encourage others (Romans 1:8). We add to our faith and it grows (2 Peter 1:5-8).

While we have our own experiences of God, we also share much about Him in common. We are born into God's family individually yet we become part of something much larger than ourselves. We become part of the family of THE faith. To use Paul's terms, we are part of "the household of the faith" (Galatians 6:10). We each have faith of our own yet we also have a common faith, a common love of God. He has given us "one faith" (Ephesians 4:5, 13) to unite us and bind us together. God wants His people to pass on this faith from one generation to the next and to keep it in our own day (2 Timothy 4:7).

We share in "the faith," which is something God has given His people together: it is a body of teachings, beliefs and truth, "the words of the faith" (1 Timothy 4:6). It includes historical events and, importantly, fellowship with people past and present who love God. The central historical events of the faith are the life, death, burial, resurrection and ascension of Jesus. In one sense the faith is outside of ourselves, not dependent upon us, and eternally valid. In another sense, we are part of the history of the faith and it is in us as our own faith is part of us. They are interrelated and have much in common. Faith comes from a source open to all: "So faith comes from hearing, and hearing by the word of Christ" (Romans 10:17).

The various crises in the Corinthian church showed the importance of both faiths. In Corinth individual faith was strong yet often out of control and misplaced. To the Corinthians, Paul laid out in the plainest terms the foundation of the faith, the gospel, the good news of Jesus' death for

Naming The Animals... In One Day?

ne of the reasons skeptics reject the validity of the biblical account of Creation is because they find it impossible to believe that one man could name every single species of animal on the Earth in a single day. Considering there are only 86,400 seconds in a 24-hour period, we are told it is ridiculous to believe that an individual (who had never seen animals before the day he named them) could name several million species of animals in one day. Perhaps over a period of a few weeks he could accomplish such a gargantuan task, but certainly not in a single day—right?

The problem with such objections to Genesis 2:18-20 is that they are based on assumptions. The question that skeptics sometimes ask, "Could Adam have gathered and named all of the animals on the Earth in one day?," is misleading because the Bible places certain limitations on the animals that Adam named. Consider the following:

Adam's task did not include searching for and gathering all of God's creatures. Rather, God "brought them" to him (Genesis 2:19). Likely this was in some sort of orderly fashion (similar to how the animals in Noah's day went into the ark systematically—Genesis 7:9,15) in order to reduce the amount of time and human energy necessary to complete the process.

Genesis 2:20 does not say that Adam named "all" of the animals on the Earth. The text actually says, "Adam gave names to all cattle, to the birds of the air, and to every beast of the field." The fish and other sea life created on day five (Genesis 1:21), as well as the creeping things created on day six (1:25) are excluded from this naming process. [NOTE: The term "every," which modifies "living creature" in Genesis 2:19 in the KJV. ASV. and RSV is not in the original, and should not leave one with the impression (as it has some, cf. McKinsey, p. 84) that Adam named "every" animal alive on the Earth. The phrase is translated more precisely in

the NASB as "a living creature."]

Skeptic Dennis McKinsey asked in his book Biblical Errancy, "Could Adam have named millions of different animals...in the time available [one day—EL]" (p. 84)? The truth is, Adam did not have to name millions of species of animals on day six. Genesis 1 states that the animals were created "according to their kind(s)" (vs. 21), not species. The Bible was written long before man invented the modern Linnaean classification system. The "kinds" (Hebrew min) of animals Adam named on the sixth day of Creation were probably very broad—more like groups of birds and land animals rather than specific genera and species. Adam would have given animals general names like "turtle," "dog," or "elephant," not special names like "pig-nosed soft-shell turtle" or "Alaskan Husky." As Dr. Henry Morris pointed out, ...the created kinds undoubtedly represented broader categories than our modern species or genera, quite possibly approximating in most cases the taxonomic family. Just how many kinds were actually there to be named is unknown, of course, but it could hardly have been as many as a thousand (p. 129).

The events of day six could have been accomplished easily within a 24-hour period. Adam did not have to spend a great deal of time pondering what he would call each animal; he was created with the ability to speak and reason. If a three-year-old child could look at picture books and call the names of 60 different kinds of animals in 60 seconds, I have no problem believing that Adam, having been created directly by the hand of God and made in His image, had the ability to name hundreds of birds and land animals in just one hour.

*NOTE: Some Bible believers may answer the question regarding the length of day six by simply saying, "We don't know how long the days of creation were. They could have been long periods of time, thus giving Adam all the time he needed to name the animals." However, the available evidence (of which the skeptic is very aware) reveals several reasons why we can know that the days mentioned in Genesis 1 are the same kind of days we experience in the present age, and were not eons of time. The Bible states that the heavens, the Earth, the sea and all that is in them were created in six days (Exodus 20:8-11; 31:17; Genesis 1). Genesis 1:5 states that each of these days was a period of "evening and morning." Additionally, we are told in Genesis 1:14 that the lights in the heavens were "for signs, for seasons, and for days, and years." If the days that are described by "evening and morning" were long epochs of time, then what were the "years"? Indeed, God could have created the Universe in any amount of time He chose. The point is, however, He said He did it in six days, not six long periods of indefinite time.

EDIORIAL

An Unexplored Country?

ave you ever wondered, after the Israelites crossed the Red Sea and spent the next several decades wandering in the wilderness, whether or not they prayed? This may seem like a strange question, but at this very important stage of their development as a nation, how often did the people of God

approach Him in prayer? The question is not whether Moses or the priests prayed. The question is whether or not the Israelites prayed.

The story of Israel's exodus from Egypt basically begins when they "groaned in their slavery and cried out." According to the writer of Exodus, "their cry for help went up to God." Later, after Pharaoh agreed to let them go, he reneged. When they appeared to be trapped by his army against the waters of the Red Sea, "they were terrified and cried out to the Lord." However, after they had celebrated crossing the sea, while there are references to Moses talking to God, there is no mention of the Israelites praying or crying out to God. They cried out (complained) to Moses, who cried out to God. But, there is no mention of the people praying to God.

We cannot assume that they did not pray just because it is not mentioned. But this apparent silence stands in sharp contrast to the early days of the church where prayer is demonstrated repeatedly, from the beginning of Acts, as one of the distinctive, ever-present characteristics of the believers. They were constantly in prayer (1:14). In 1:24, they prayed about the replacement for Judas. They devoted themselves to prayer (2:42). They prayed after their arrest and appearance before the Sanhedrin (4:24). They praved before appointing the seven in 6:6. Stephen prayed as he died (7:59). The apostles prayed for the Samaritan converts (8:15). Simon the sorcerer asked for their prayers (8:24). Saul prayed after his vision on the road (9:12). This was only the beginning. The numerous mentions of prayer at the early stages of the church seem to emphasize what appears to be a lack of prayer in early Israel. Could we consider the different outcomes between Israel and the early church as a result? Without assuming the worst about early Israel, we know that prayer was key to the faith and lives of Christians.

The apostles were awakened to the true potential of prayer by Jesus, who taught by word and example. He often withdrew to spend time with God, sometimes even praying all night (Luke 6:12). Prayer was also an on-the-spot response to daily events, as just before he raised Lazarus. He prayed before making important decisions or before significant events, like appointing the apostles or before His arrest. What impact would hearing His prayer recorded in John 17 have had on them? Prayer was vital to His relationship with God.

From Jesus, they learned that prayer is more than ritual—mindlessly repeating a rote formula. It is our heartfelt

communication with our Heavenly Father. Communication is the lifeline of human and spiritual relationships.

In prayer, as we open our hearts and lives to God and His will, we learn to trust Him and His love and gain direction and understanding. Isn't this what happened when Jesus prayed in the garden? "Not my will. Your will be done."

When the early believers gathered after Jesus' ascension, they were in a completely new territory. They no longer had Jesus (as they had Him during His ministry) and were outside the familiar routines of synagogue and temple. They were blazing a totally new trail, supported by prayer. As a result of their deepening relationship with God, they were emboldened and empowered to step out into the world as Jesus' disciples.

When we speak today about restoring New Testament worship, how often does this become "routine" prayer—in our worship assemblies, at mealtimes and a few special occasions? How important is prayer to us, really? Do we pray without ceasing? Is there the urgency, intensity, submission, trust of the early disciples? Do we pray because we are scheduled to, or because we are thrilled to enter the presence of our God to speak with Him—to share our hearts and lives as well as our struggles? What would happen if we really discovered the heart and power of New Testament prayer?

We all struggle with the competing and pressing demands of life. Often, while prayer is important to us, it is difficult to find the time to focus as we would like. As a result, the resources offered through prayer may be relatively unexplored and untapped.

As we begin this New Year, let's make prayer more than an unexplored country. Let's make 2007 a year of prayer. Let's give it not only more time, but more focus and attention—more meaning—more of ourselves. Let's go beyond our usual prayer habits and expressions to open our hearts and lives to our heavenly Father. Let's restore New Testament prayer.

Unlimited Growth

oes the slow growth (in the context of this article I am talking about numerical growth) of the church today trouble you? Do you ever think about it at all? Have you thought about why the church is not growing "by leaps and bounds" in Canada these days? If you are fortunate enough to be a part of a congregation that is increasing in size, is the growth by "leaps and bounds" or only by "short jumps"? Do you remember how the church grew in the beginning?

"So those who received his word were baptized, and there were added that day about three thousand souls... And day by day, attending the temple together and breaking bread in their

homes, they received their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having favour with all the people. And the Lord added to their number day by day those who were being saved" (Acts 2:41, 46-47 ESV). "But many of those who had heard the word believed, and the number of the men came to about five thousand" (Acts 4:4 ESV). "And the word of God continued to increase, and the number of the disciples multiplied greatly in Jerusalem, and a great many of the priests became obedient to the faith" (Acts 6:7 ESV).

What exciting times those would have been to be a part of the Lord's Church! These references from Acts are only a few of the several throughout the book that tell of the amazing growth of the church following it's beginning in the city of Jerusalem on the first Pentecost following the

resurrection and ascension of Jesus. Could it be possible for the church to grow in that way today? How do we limit the growth? I may not know all the answers to that question, but consider these. The bottom line answer is often attitude. Our title suggests what to many may seem impossible; "unlimited growth." If we think about growth at all it is most often limited by attitudes.

We limit growth by forgetting whose work it is we are called to do. "And Jesus came and said to them, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit,

teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age" Matthew 28:18-20 ESV). It is the commission of Jesus that His people should take the gospel to the world, planting the seed so the church can grow. Today, in cities like Toronto, we can fulfill this directive of Jesus without leaving the city limits!

This forgetting whose work it is often brings on what might be called the "grasshopper complex". The best example of this complex is seen in the account of the twelve spies who had been sent in to investigate the land God had promised to GIVE Israel. Caleb tells the assembled people that they could go and take the land, just as God had promised. However, ten of the spies say, "The land, through which we have gone to spy it out, is a land that devours its inhabitants, and all the people that we saw in it are of great height. And there we saw the Nephilim (the sons of Anak, who come from the Nephilim), and we seemed to ourselves like grasshoppers, and so we seemed to them" (Numbers

13:31-33 ESV). Forgetting whose work it was and whose promise had been given, they "hopped away" to forty years wandering in the wildness, never to enjoy God's promise of a "land flowing with milk and honey."

What are the giants that oppose unlimited growth of the church in our land? Often denominationalism is viewed as being so strong that it can't be overcome. (Or worse we have come to believe their lie of many ways to God.) In the book of Acts their amazing growth took place in a climate of strong Judaism and paganism. The gospel, God's power to save (Romans 1:16), worked then and is just as strong today as then. This sword of the spirit has been given to the church to fight against the false doctrines. Sometimes the members of the church



#6 Makeover Mania: Patience

7e live in a culture of immediate gratification. We want what we want and we want it yesterday. Overnight delivery was at one time seen as a marvel but now is seen by many as too slow. We continually creep forward at red lights because waiting the two minutes for the light to change is just too long. We find ourselves getting overly frustrated at a checkout when behind a senior who is carefully digging in her purse to provide the correct change that she just knows is in there somewhere. Weight loss programs that include exercise and dieting are seen too slow, so many choose surgery and the more immediate solution that it promises.

We justify our impatience by saying that we are busy people and have a lot to do. Money is time and we just can't afford to wait on others. Impatience isn't pretty and sometimes it is deadly. We have seen those waiting in line behind the senior as she digs in her purse for the correct change that she knows is in there roll their eyes and huff and sigh. When that goes unnoticed the rude remarks begin to come and they get louder and louder. Those who choose not to wait at a red light have found that their impatience produced deadly results. Impatience is both ugly and deadly.

Do we value patience as God does? In Galatians 5:22 patience is described as a fruit of the spirit. In Colossians 3:12 we are told to clothe ourselves with patience. Patience comes from wisdom. "A man's wisdom gives him patience; it is to his glory to overlook an offense" (Proverbs 19:11). Patience with gentle persuasion will win over even the powerful. "Through patience a ruler

can be persuaded, and a gentle tongue can break a bone" (Proverbs 25:15). It is clear that God values patience and if we want to please God we must value patience as well.

Patience isn't a "you either have it or you don't" character trait! Patience can be learned and practiced as a discipline.

We assume that we don't have time to be patient, we are busy people and others are counting on us and we just don't have time to wait. We assume that patience and productivity are enemies when they are not. When we first moved to Saskatchewan I found the slower pace of life frustrating and found myself growing increasingly impatient. In Saskatchewan one couldn't just go fill the car with gas, one also visited with the gas station attendant. In Saskatchewan visiting someone often required a 30 minute or more drive and when you arrived in the middle of the afternoon you found you just had to stay for supper. I found myself wondering how I was going to get anything done. I soon grew accustomed to the slower and friendlier pace of life and looked forward to those visits at the gas station and visiting in people's homes. I found my years in the west some of my most productive years

in ministry. Patience and productivity are not enemies!

How can we learn patience; how can we make over ourselves so that we have more patience?

First, learn to delay gratification. You don't have to have something the moment that you want it. We have been forced to learn that in the north where we live. We have two stores in this community and although they stock a lot of things there are many things that we just can't buy here. If we order it we know it will take at least a couple of weeks to get here. Are we still going to want it or need it then? Don't buy things the second you realize that you want them. Waiting a few days or a week may help you to overcome impulse buying. Too often when we impulse buy we purchase a lot of things that we don't really need or even want once we get them home. We can develop

patience and get control of our impulse spending at the same time.

Second, learn that you don't always have to have it your way. We allow too much of our self worth to be tied into getting our own way. When someone simply suggests that something be done another way we see it as an attack on ourselves. We should see it as an alternate idea and if we would give it a chance we might see it as a better idea than our own. Learn to give in, not because others are right and you are wrong, but to learn patience. Let others have their way, not because they are better than you but because you want to learn patience. Maturity is found in not having to have things your way all the time. Maturity is learning to allow others to have their way.

Third, practice living with grace, which involves bearing with one another (Colossians 3:13). Learn to put up with the things that you see in others that drive you crazy. Smile at the kindly senior as she counts out her exact change and keep smiling when

she doesn't find the exact change that she was so sure she had. You'll be in her shoes soon enough.

Forgiving whatever grievance you have against one another. Where did we ever get the idea that forgiveness was our choice? That we could choose to forgive or choose not to forgive and our eternal destiny would not be affected? If we forgive, we will be forgiven by God. If we choose not to forgive we will not be forgiven (Matthew 6:14-15). When we choose not to forgive we doom ourselves to carrying a lot of baggage, we doom ourselves to carrying each one of those offences. When we forgive we can lay them down and travel lighter and more patiently.

Forgiving as the Lord forgave you. There is a lot of debate as to how we are to forgive one another when God has spelled it out quite clearly to us. We must forgive others in the way that God has forgiven us.

Learn patience and you will develop an inner beauty that will shine to everyone you meet. Honestly, who looks better? The cranky person who huffs and sighs and makes rude comments when forced to wait while a clerk serves another before them, or the person who smiles, graciously visits with others in line while they wait patiently for their turn with the clerk. Patience is beautiful; learn it and you will be beautiful.

have not learned to properly handle "the sword" in defending truth or have been lulled asleep by the smooth talking of denominationalism.

Maybe the greatest attitude adjustment needed is that Christians would simply begin to care about the lost. All of us are likely familiar with the parable of Jesus in answer to the lawyer's question recorded in Luke 10:25, "And behold, a lawyer stood up to put him to the test, saying, "Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" (ESV) Jesus answered by asking, "What is written in the Law? How do you read it?"

The lawyer answered correctly that one must love God completely and his neighbour as himself. When Jesus agrees, the next question is, "who is my neighbour?" Jesus responds with the parable of the Good Samaritan. (Luke 10:30-27). Sadly, the attitude of many toward those in trouble—and what can be more troubling than one lost in sin—is seen in these words, "Now by chance a priest was going down that road, and when he saw him

he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side" (10:31, 32 ESV). It is so easy to live our lives, happy that we have learned the truth, obeyed and gospel and are enjoying the blessing of being the children of God, while "passing by on the other side" of those who have not obeyed? But then, can we really say we have obeyed the Lord if we are not reaching out to others with the gospel?

Going back to the book of Acts, remember what happened when things really got bad for the young church in Jerusalem? "And Saul approved of his execution. And there arose on that day a great persecution against the church in Jerusalem, and they were all scattered throughout the regions of Judea and Samaria, except the apostles... Now those who were scattered went about preaching the word" (Acts 8:1, 4). Or remember what happened to the woman at the well who sat at the feet of Jesus and learned of her need to change her life. When she was convicted of her



sin, what was the first thing she did? "So the woman left her water jar and went away into town and said to the people, "Come, see a man who told me all that I ever did. Can this be the Christ" (John 4:28-29 ESV).

India: Sponsors are needed for the new home in Chirala which is for 30 children who lost one or both parents in the Tsunami two years ago. As land or a building has not been purchased, monthly expenses are greater than for the other children's homes. This means that each child needs two sponsors: one for food, medical and clothing needs, and the other for school expenses and salaries for the people who look after them. Those able to sponsor one or both of these needs are asked to get in touch with Karen Clayton at karenusa@sonnet.net. A congregation wrote recently to find out in which specific areas most of the Clayton's work is done in order to complete a special display of various mission activities. The bulk of the work spearheaded by Ron and Karen is in Andhra Pradesh, Karmataka and Maharashira. But the call to help in others of India's 28 states has taken them to Karala, Goa and Tamil Nadu to the south. Converts to the north have been made in the states of Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, Chattisgarh, Ultar and Rajasthan. There is work in Orissa, West Bengal, and at least four of the far north-eastern states as well. The church has a large presence in the three major metropolitan areas: Hyderabad, Bangalore and Bombay, with a growing work in Madras. Some Canadian missionaries have also worked in these areas. Following the lead of J. C. Bailey, the scope of the work started by the Claytons some 28 years ago involves providing tools for Indian preachers to evangelize their nation. It is divided into four different areas: evangelism, preachertraining, benevolence and follow-up. Several

preacher-training schools are designed to assist new churches and new Christians to mature in the faith. Furnished with teaching, Bibles and bicycles, Indian preachers do most of the converting and establishment of churches.

Cambodia: During the last three years, more than 50 retirees have spent from one to nine months at the Partners in Progress Center teaching English Bible studies to young university students. Now more than 30 of these are attending the recently established University church, and many have obeyed the gospel. They will provide leadership in the years ahead. Some are already teaching and inviting friends to worship and studies with them. In Eastern countries, age is respected by their culture, and older teachers are often eagerly desired above younger. Emily Pownell, who spent 20 years serving in Italy with her late husband, Mel, and in Albania for six years, expressed her enthusiasm for the situation here by giving the pluses: "We live in a lovely house together, have delicious meals prepared by a Cambodian cook, with fresh tropical fruit at every meal, a lady to clean house, excellent affordable dental and medical care at 1/3rd the price of that in the U.S., and younger co-workers... I don't know why all Christian retirees don't come." If you are interested in becoming a part of this exciting opportunity, please write to EBS Project Director Claude Lewis for information about how you can continue to serve God as a senior. Uganda: In November, the World Bible Translation Center in Fort Worth, TX, started printing the "First Phase"—163,000 Bibles-—to go to that many public school teachers to use in their classroom for reading to their children. Along with each Bible went a bookmark especially for the teacher with a poem titled "Thankful for You!" and signed by all who made a contribution toward the cost of the printing. These were Christmas gifts with an eternal impact on the lives of thousands of Ugandan children, as well, perhaps, as on their teachers. A gift of \$100 provided 25 Bibles reaching into the lives of 2,250 people. It is estimated that within three years of use, each Bible will have been read and heard by 90 students, teaching them about honesty, love, purity, faith, marriage, truth and scriptures covering other subjects related to living life as God would have it. The remainder of the almost 300,000 needed will be published as soon as funds are made available to print them. Contributions may be sent to the Translation Center at 4028 Daley Ave., Ft. Worth, TX 76180.

THAILAND

Bangkok: Subin and Kim Panboon reported that 3,844 new Bible correspondence students were reported in the October 2006 monthly literature program report. God was thanked for a successful gospel meeting and seminar from October 25-29. Brother Matel Pace gave very good Bible lessons both day and night. His wife, Doris, accompanied him. Five people were baptized and one restored. Average attendance was 130 people, with 145 on Sunday morning and 101 on Sunday night. Thirty-two Bible course students came for the seminar and 19 Bible course students received certificates on Sunday. Alltogether, 45 people from seven churches in northeast Thailand and the church in Nakhonsawan church attended. John Henry and Richard Taylor from the Salem church of Christ in Florence, Alabama, plan to go to Thailand in January to visit the brethren, encourage them and boost the enrolment by visiting schools as they did in 2000.

JAPAN

Sendai: *Ben and Joel traveled to a youth ministry conference in the mountains of Nagano prefecture from November 1-4. One item of note: A recent survey showed that 7% of Japanese youth responded that they have a strong interest in learning about Christianity and openness to becoming a Christian! *A Youth Weekend was planned at Ibaraki on November 11 and 12, followed by the Japanese preacher's meeting in Ochanomizu/Tokyo on November 13. *FriendsCamp 2007 is scheduled to be conducted by the East Hill church of Christ in York, Nebraska, (the team's US sponsoring congregation), and Bramalea church of Christ, in Brampton, Ontario (the team's Canadian sponsoring congregation) at the end of July - first of August, 2007. QUESTIONS PEOPLE ASK "How can I love my neighbour if he is my enemy?"

Bill Craddock

This is a very important question in our present day. There are **People** in the world who hate us even though they do not know us. They hate us because of where we live and what we believe. Yet we find our Lord telling us that if we are to be his faithful disciples, we must love everyone, even our enemies. He said the second great commandment was to love your neighbour as yourself (Matthew 22:39). Consider the words of Jesus from the Sermon on the Mount: "You have heard that it has been said, you shall love your neighbour and hate your enemies. But I say to you, Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them that despitefully use you and persecute you; that you may be the children of your Father which is in

heaven: for he makes his sun to rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust. For if you love them that love you, what reward have you? Do not even the publicans the same? And if you salute your brethren only, what do you more than others? Do not even the publicans so? Be you therefore perfect, even as your Father that is in heaven is perfect" (Matthew 5:43-48).

The first thing we must notice in this text is that our standard for loving must be based upon the Word of God, not what we have heard from others. Men tell us to love our neighbour and hate our enemy. The world advises us to keep our enemies at a distance, do what you must do to take them down before they take

you down. This is not God's way.

Jesus teaches us to love our enemies. The word *love* in this text is from the Greek word agape. This word is not the Greek word that conveys the concept of having a warm affection or feeling for my brother or friend. Agape love is loving someone, not because I feel like it, but because it is the right thing to do. It is the highest expression of love. Agape is personally sacrificial and selfless. Thus, if someone curses me I may feel like cursing them right back. However, agape love compels me to act better than I feel. Because of this, I will bless them who curse me. I will do good to those who hate me, rather than seeking to repay evil for evil (Romans 12:14, 17). As Jesus did on the cross, I will pray for those who hate and want to hurt me (Luke 23:34).

Paul wrote to the Romans that before we were saved by the blood of Christ that we were all enemies of God (Romans 5:8 KJV). Though we were his enemies, God loved us and gave us his Son to die for our sins. If God had given us evil for evil, we would never have received a saviour.

When I love my enemies I am showing myself to be a true child of the Heavenly Father (Matthew 5:45). Christian love stands head and shoulders over the "love" the world is accustomed to showing. The love of the world is a conditional love. "I will love you if you will love me, but if you hate me I will return that hate." God condemns that attitude. As Jesus said, it is not difficult to love those who love you. It is not difficult to be good to those in our immediate peer group, but when you get

outside to those who don't like us it is a different matter (Matthew 5:46-47).

The kind of love Christians must show for their fellow man is summed up by Paul in 1 Corinthians 13:4-7, "Love suffers long and is kind; love envies not, love vaunts not itself, is not puffed up, does not behave itself unseemly, seeks not its own, is not provoked, takes no account of evil; rejoices not in unrighteousness, but rejoices with the truth; bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things."

The challenge for those who desire to please God is that we have many enemies in this world today and the Lord says we must love them all. We cannot do this alone, but with the help of God it can be done.

Gideon had second thoughts about God's plan to use him as the deliverer. What did Gideon have to offer? Me? From Manasseh? Isn't there someone from the tribe of Judah or Ephraim that would be a better fit? If it has to be someone from my tribe, my clan and my father's house, couldn't it be one of my brothers who are much stronger than myself? So he asks the question, how can I save Israel?

Ready for the answer? 'But I will be with you, and you shall strike the Midianites as one man.' (Judges 6:16) What did Gideon need? Less focus on his own ability and more on God's! Gideon needed to do the one thing he had the power to do: obey the One who can change night to day and make the strong weak and the weak strong!

All through the scriptures God did this: made strength out of weakness. Churches that looked so strong and healthy were actually sick and dying (See Revelation 3:1-6, 14-22) while others that looked poor and weak were mighty and rich (Revelation 2:8-11, 3:8-13). Ministers and servants that were judged as incapable and unimpressive were people of great power and amazing resources (See 1 Corinthians 2:1-3:9). Over and over again, God's message was clear: let the weak say 'I am strong.'

What do you place your trust in? The strength, ability & work of men or of God? The next time you feel weak and overwhelmed remember to look up and see that it might just be the time that God will show His strength.

"If I must boast, I will boast of the things that show my weakness... for when I am weak, then I am strong." (2 Corinthians 11:30, 12:10)

Utilizing Our Differences

Did you ever consider how different the twelve apostles were? In terms of background there were four fishermen, a tax collector and I don't know much about the background of the others. In terms of personality Peter was outgoing and spontaneous. Andrew appears to be a quiet problem solver. They argued at one point about who was going to be the greatest when Jesus came in his kingdom. If Matthew was a typical tax collector he would have had to overcome the stigma that was associated with tax collecting. Thomas appears to a skeptic or at least needed concrete proof to accept things. Judas was financially oriented.

The bottom line is that Jesus chose very different people to carry on His mission after He went back to Heaven. When you consider the importance of that mission, and the small number that Jesus trained, one would have to conclude that Jesus saw an advantage to utilizing people with major differences.

First Corinthians 12:15-31 is dedicated to explaining that we need to make use of our differences in the church. The Holy Spirit compares the body of Christ, the church, to a physical body. "If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be?" Just as our body functions well because of the different abilities of

our body parts the church functions well because members of the Lord's church are different and have different abilities.

But one of the most significant statements in that passage in 1 Corinthians is the one that follows. "But in fact God has arranged the parts in the body, every one of them, just as He wanted them to be." You are what you are in the church because that is what God made you and wanted you to be.

Two conclusions can be drawn from this thought. First, if God gave me something special that I can use to serve Him in the church, and I do not use that skill/ability/personality, something important is not going to get done. Second, if the rest of the body stifles the unique differences of the members of the church, they

How Much Experience Do You Have?

Experience is a hard teacher because she gives the test first, the lesson afterwards. – Vernon Law

Try and get a job without any experience. It's pretty hard, isn't it? Well, we learn from one experience to the next that God hears our prayers, that He is near to us and cares dearly for us, that He expects certain things of us, that He lovingly watches us throughout the experience and that His answers to our prayers may not always be the answer we want but it's the best answer because God always knows what's best. The apostle Paul prayed three times to have his thorn in the flesh removed. It didn't happen. However. Paul learned that there was

good in his affliction as it kept him in a frame of mind where God could use him affectively. Read 2 Cor.12:7-10. Because Paul understood this he was well content with weaknesses, with insults, with any distresses, with persecutions, with difficulties, for Christ's sake; for when he was weak then he was strong (for God).

Each of us, as we go through life's experiences, find some of its tests hard to complete. May we find the attitude of Joseph helpful. He had many terrible things happen to him in his lifetime. He was rejected and sold by his own brothers to foreigners, accused of making sexual advances towards Potiphar's wife, spent two years in prison, was separated from his family for many years, etc. Yet Joseph learned from all those experiences that even though they were evil times God used them for good, in order to preserve many people from dving from the famine (Gen.50:20). In Phil.1:12-14. Paul's imprisonment turned out for the greater progress of the gospel. Go figure!

our sins, and His burial, resurrection and appearances, which they received and by which they were saved and stood firm (1 Corinthians 15:1-11). To the Corinthians Paul wrote, "Be on the alert, stand firm in the faith" and "test yourselves to see if you are in the faith" (1 Corinthians 16:13 and 2 Corinthians 13:5). It is this glorious gift of the faith "once for all delivered to the saints" for which Jude 3 urges us to "contend" (or "to exert an intense effort on

behalf of" in Bauer's lexicon). We strive "together for the faith of the gospel" (Philippians 1:27) and "continue in the faith firmly established and steadfast" (Colossians 1:23).

Truth Be Told, Exposing the Myth of Evolution, 179 large pages, \$19.50 (Cdn.) by Kyle Butt & Eric Lyons.

This outstanding book is beautifully printed with numerous photographs and charts in full colour. It clearly and powerfully demonstrates the law of cause and effect. Every material effect must have an adequate cause. God is undoubtedly an adequate cause since He is all-powerful (Psalm 90:2). The laws of thermodynamics also demonstrate this great truth. The relationship between the planets gives further evidence. Also the earth's atmosphere is perfectly designed. If the atmosphere were much thinner, meteorites could strike our planet with greater force and frequency, causing worldwide devastation. As Paul told the people of his day that it was God who made the heaven, the earth and the sea and "all things that are in them (Acts 14:17)

The theory of evolution is thoroughly discussed and refuted. It is assuring to know that many great scientists have written about their faith in the Creator and His inspired book, the Bible. This fantastic book should be in every home, especially where there are children.

Behold! The Lamb of God, Exploring the Historic Deity and Personality of Christ, by Kyle Butt and Eric Jones, Apologetics Press, Montgomery, AL. \$10.99 Cdn

As Christians we believe that Jesus Christ is the Divine Son of God and our Saviour. However, are we able to share that faith with others?

This excellent book gives us the answer to this vital question. It gives evidence that Jesus was an historical figure, fulfilled prophecies made hundreds of years before He lived, worked miracles and was resurrected from the grave after his death. The reader must answer the question that was posed to His listeners 2,000 years ago: "What do

you think about the Christ: Whose Son is He?"

There is abundant evidence that Jesus was a real historical figure. Even those who deny His divinity cannot but accept His historical reality. Many non-Christian writers recognize the reality of the existence of Jesus and His impact upon history. How can anyone do otherwise when our dating system is based on His coming into the world?

The Old Testament has a great abundance of prophecies (many in great detail) that were fulfilled in the birth, life and death of our Lord. In addition, there are excellent charts that illustrate the many miracles that our Lord performed.

The glorious resurrection of Jesus is also presented as one of the greatest proofs of His divinity. Attacks on this great truth are answered in a most convincing way.

The reader is encouraged to respond to the Lord's commands in faith and obedience.

Ron Taffel and Melinda Blau, The Second Family: Dealing with Peer Power, Pop Culture, the Wall of Silence—and Other Challenges of Raising Today's Teens, Reprint Edition, St. Martin's Griffin, New York, 2002. (pbk) \$15.75 Cdn

Ron Taffel is a child and family therapist who does much work with teens and their parents. By "second family", he means the combination of pop culture and peers. In many cases, he argues, the second family has displaced the first family (Dad, Mom, siblings). He notes the strengths of this second family as well as the dangers found in it. The last section of the book gives advice to parents and schools in dealing with this second family.

The book is an easy read, being filled with descriptions of teens and preteens with whom Taffel has dealt. He quotes teens as often stating, "My parents don't know me," and "They don't have a clue." His experience often confirms these statements. "Parents of teens and even many preteens rarely know much about their kids' involvements and less about their misdeeds," being dismissive when told about some things happening among teens. "'My child would never lie to me,' they insist, or 'My child tells me everything.'...'What could go on?' they challenge. What indeed! I have firsthand knowledge that proves how wrong my friends are" (12,13). He states that the face teens show their parents is often quite different from the face they show their friends. "The kids who scare me the most are the ones whose misdeeds take adults completely by surprise" (104).

"Listening to these children, it is relatively easy to understand why the second family has become so much more powerful than the first... Many of my young interviewees told me that their parents simply weren't around or they were preoccupied." Teens tell him that they miss the "mudane rituals that make up family life—dinner together, pancakes on Sunday, regular trips to the playground... wishing that such special times could happen more often"(18).

He thinks that the formation of the second family begins in the day care and nursery, as children are programmed to relate to peers rather than to their parents and other caregivers. As they move into the teen years the second family offers them what they are not getting from adults: support, understanding, and a set of values.

What is the answer for parents? Taffel suggests opening heart, mind, and home to the teen and his friends, showing an interest in their world. He says that expectations are to be balanced with love and understanding, trust needs to be earned, and teens need to work toward privileges. The children themselves tell Taffel there are not enough rules at home and that their parents do not lay out consequences beforehand and follow through on discipline.

This book should be of interest to anyone desiring to have a better understanding of today's teens, but especially of interest to parents and educators.
