

# **Trying Times: The Need For Organization**

Label{eq:theta} have heard that "these are the times that try men's souls." But since the man who wrote those words died in 1809, I must conclude that "trying times" are not limited to any given era, generation or discipline.

For those of us who are alive today and take our faith-practice seriously, it is disturbing to see the movement or tendency toward forgetting about the Bible as an important document to learn from and live by. Some obvious contributors to this state in which we find ourselves are these:

**1)** Open invitation to all people of every language and faith system to be part of our country and culture with the negative result that we are put on the defensive regarding Christianity.

**2)** Postmodernism. This clearly communicates to us, among other messages, that there are no absolutes, including absolute truth.

**3)** Closely aligned with the previous observation is the fact that we now do not feel free to speak (even to the Body of Christ!) about things named by God in His word as harmful to us.

4) Although this next point is partly result and partly cause, our latest generation, those born after 1980, have risen up with the conclusion that "Christians" in this age are more "Unchristian" than those who do not confess the name of Jesus. Upon what is this observation founded? A recent study undertaken by

the Barna Research Group which resulted in a book written by David Kinnaman, entitled Unchristian, reports that the three most common perceptions that our latest generation have about present-day Christianity is that they are "antihomosexual, judgmental and hypocritical."

The "big three" are fol-

lowed by.... "old fashioned, too involved in politics, out of touch with reality, insensitive to others, boring, not accepting of other faiths, and confusing."

One of the most paradoxical findings is that while there is a measurable heightened interest in spirituality, there is an observable disinterest in organized religion. In other words, today's people are more likely to be inclined to whatever strikes them in some spiritual way, but do not wish to be committed to a local group of religious people.

In these times we still have God's Word as the final say on what should or should not be, and it reminds us that the church Jesus built does have a need for organization.

We will limit our focus to the first letter of Paul to Timothy chapter three, with an invitation to all to read the fourth chapter as well.

Living in Ephesus where Timothy resided must not have been a piece of cake either. The goddess Artemis also "lived" there. It was believed that she actually fell from heaven and was therefore, worthy of worship. But in this letter we find much, much more about which Timothy had to be concerned.

When the Apostle Paul's young protégé received this letter he could read the following words for his encouragement; words that would remind him again that he was on the right track: "I hope to come to you

soon, but I am writing these things to you so that, if I delay, you may know how one ought to behave in the household of God, which is the church of the living God, a pillar and buttress of the truth" (1 Timothy 3:14,15 ESV).

If we were to make even a cursory examination of these words we would clearly see the power and necessity in each one. "Pillar and buttress" remind us of the incredibly important position that Christ's church occupies. Think of pillars in a temple. That seems also to be the picture that is used in another place where Peter and James are seen as "pillars."

While some have speculated that the passage means that the church is the source of truth, we must go beyond this realizing that God is the only source of revelation and that revelation is believed, supported, protected and upheld by the church that is built upon the foundation of Jesus Christ.

This well supported structure was put together by God Himself and is where He lives. The church is "the household of God," His family. Families have rules that regulate what they deem to be acceptable behaviour in their respective households. How does one conduct himself in God's family? This question is not left to everyone's personal will. God revealed the answer to Paul and he in turn passed it on to Timothy from whom we can learn. The God of

heaven has certain expectations for His family on earth.

Is our behaviour within Christianity so confusing, so contradictory that younger people feel justified in labelling us "hypocrites?" Make an effort to remove any picture of the church "gathered." The issue was not then and is not now the

The closing of the Gospel Herald

Bookstore, May 31, and the removal of the remaining inventory from his premises, June 19, were sad days for him and for all associated with this enterprise.

Victim, along with countless bookstores across Canada, both religious and general, of advancing technology and plummeting economies, the Gospel Herald Bookstore's closing is lamented by individuals and congregations across Canada who have depended upon the bookstore's services for decades.

Eugene and Evelyn Perry moved to Beamsville in 1952 from Radville, SK, where Eugene had been teaching, to take up teaching duties at Great Lakes Christian College. (He and Roy Merritt had just accepted from J. C. Bailey the editorial duties for the Gospel Herald periodical.)

Moving into the apartment in the carriage hall (cf. McPhee Hall) on campus, the Perrys processed the Herald and opened a small booksale display in these modest premises. Two years later they moved across the street to an apartment in the Snure House where a small room was set aside for the Herald's activities.

Then in 1956, the growing Perry family moved next door, into the house built by Eugene. The lowerfloor room—intended to be the family room—was pre-empted for the needs of the growing Gospel Herald Bookstore.

"Ring and walk in" was the sign on the door. How many times would the bell, sounding upstairs, interrupt and call for attention, as the years stretched on!

The store's services spread across Canada as congregations ordered their educational supplies and individuals sought specific titles. In recent years, to save on mailing and brokerage costs, many trips to a drop-off address in Lewiston, NY, secured their economies.

The remarkable aspect of the bookstore's operation was that it was profitably maintained while Eugene carried on fulltime duties, first as a teacher, then as principal of GLCC. And in addition, for many years there was the monthly call to produce and distribute the Gospel Herald magazine.

In 1974, Eugene and Evelyn determined to serve as missionaries in Zambia. During this nine year period the Herald's operation was combined with the downtown store managed by Valerie Fleming, Heavenly Arts, Books, and Crafts, and coordinated by Eugene's brother, Ralph Perry.

In 2002, the management of the store and the production of the paper were turned over to Gloria Perry, niece of Eugene and Evelyn. And, of course, "Uncle Eugene" was

always handy to help with training, accounting and the many questions. Eugene's ability to manage and to be thrifty resulted in the Herald's operation generating growing assets of inventory and reserves. These helped to prolong the life of the bookstore in recent years when the operation had ceased to be viable. The 2009 closing of the enterprise that began in 1952, less the nineyear African interval, concludes a near half-century of service, a service that absorbed the energies of Eugene, his wife, and his family in the earlier years. This is a remarkable record of dedication, industry, and perseverance.

Eugene's motivation in maintaining the bookstore was to serve the cause of Christ by distributing Christian literature across Canada. His achievement is remarkable and unparalleled. While we mourn the passing of an era, we can all say, "Well done!" for a service that indeed has advanced "New Testament Christianity in Canada!" Waterloo, ON





# Accountability

or some reason, people don't like the idea of being accountable. The idea that they have to answer to someone else, explain their actions and face possible criticism can be painful. One of the most stressful times in an employee's life is the

periodic performance review where they must face a superior who will compare their outcomes with their job description, evaluate their effectiveness, criticize their weaknesses and ultimately determine their future employment.

Since the Garden of Eden, humankind has demonstrated what seems an almost innate desire to escape the consequences of their actions through denial or by scapegoating someone else. When God challenged Adam for his disobedience, he blamed Eve, and even hinted that God was somehow responsible—"This woman you gave me." Eve blamed the serpent. Since then people have used almost every possible reason or excuse to not be held accountable for their actions. Even addictions have been seen as illness rather than something for which people should be accountable. (Note: Harvard psychologist Gene Heyman, in an interview published in the May issue of Macleans, states that addiction is the result, not of disease, but of choice and free will!)

The concept the Bible uses for accountability is judgment. There are a number of passages that tell us there is a day in which every person must stand before God and give account for his or her life. Some passages speak specifically about giving an account to God, especially for sins. (Matthew 12:36; 1 Peter 4:5) On a similar vein, other passages speak of facing judgment for murder, anger and calling a brother "fool" (Matthew 5:21,21) or careless words (Matthew 12:36). Parables like the Talents or Sheep and Goats speak of judgment. We must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ (2 Corinthians 5:10; cf. Romans 14:10). One of the strong messages of scripture is that we are all accountable to God. We must stand before Him. We are destined to die and then fact judgment. (Hebrews 9:27)

Hebrews 13:17 says that leadership involves an accountability all its own. Leaders are "men who must


give an account." A similar thought is found in 1 Peter 5:1-4 addressed to elders, shepherds, overseers—all synonyms of those who have the responsibility for leading the local congregation. They are accountable to the "Chief Shepherd." Church leaders have a stew-ardship from God. Similarly, teachers will be judged "more strictly." (James 3:1)

Somewhat like the feelings created by performance reviews, people typically react to these passages about accountability and judgment with anxiety and fear. We are all too aware of our shortcomings and failures and assume the worst. Countless believers have lived in fear and dread, uncertain of what really lies ahead. Why is it that we tend to focus on the negative side of accountability?

1 John 4:17,18 speaks of having confidence on the Day of Judgment because, "There is no fear in love. But perfect love drives out fear, because fear has to do with punishment." It is possible to live in confidence and assurance.

In 2 Timothy 2:4, Paul speaks of the soldier who avoids becoming entangled in "civilian affairs." Rather, his goal is to "please his commanding officer." The soldier knows that his commander will hold him accountable. Therefore, he does everything he can to please him. Similarly, several passages speak of pleasing God—2 Corinthians 5:9; Galatians 6:8; Colossians 1:10; 1 Thessalonians 4:1. The point is that as disciples, we are not here to please ourselves, even though our

earning something new is sometimes a great challenge. This may be because one has always done something in a particular way and is comfortable doing so. While I have not had to do so, I believe learning to drive on the left side of the street would be very challenging. Changing one's beliefs about serving God can also provide for challenge when overcoming early learning and tradition.

Consider the problem for the first converts to Christ. We read of their difficulty in Acts 15. "But some men came down from Judea

and were teaching the brothers, "Unless you are circumcised according to the custom of Moses, you cannot be saved." And after Paul and Barnabas had no small dissension and debate with them. Paul and Barnabas and some of the others were appointed to go up to Jerusalem to the apostles and the elders about this question. So, being sent on their way by the church, they passed through both Phoenicia and Samaria, describing in detail the conversion of the Gentiles, and brought great joy to all the brothers. When they came

to Jerusalem, they were welcomed by the church and the apostles and the elders, and they declared all that God had done with them. But some believers, who belonged to the party of the Pharisees rose up and said, "It is necessary to circumcise them and to order them to keep the law of Moses" (Acts 15:1-5 ESV). Some of the Jews who had become believers were still troubled by their past. They appear to have held on to the conviction that some of the issues of the old law (law given through Moses) needed to continue to be followed and also be required in the spiritual life of the Gentile converts. These convictions were long held and had been passed down from generation to generation. Circumcision, in particular, was the sign of the covenant between God and the Jews. They had to learn that the old law was fulfilled and the physical circumcision of the

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
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# A Cheerful Heart

"A cheerful heart is good medicine, but a crushed spirit dries up the bones" (Proverbs 17:22 NIV).

A few years back I was sitting on the front pew, preparing myself for a speaking assignment. Those entering the auditorium were greeting and visiting with others as they made their way to their seats. A friend that I hadn't seen in a while spotted me as he was about to take his seat and instead made his way to the front to say "Hello." We greeted each other warmly and he made a couple of comments that made us both laugh before he took a seat with his family. I sat there thinking of my friend and his ability to cheer others up, when one of the other worship leaders sat down beside me and said, "You'd better wipe that smile off of your face because we are about ready to start."

Does your view of a spiritual person include a smiling face and an easy laugh? Is smiling appropriate in Christian worship? I know that we meet to remember the death and burial of Jesus Christ, but aren't we also to remember his resurrection as well? Remembering the grace that God blesses us with should cheer our hearts and bring a smile to our lips.

Cheerfulness is contagious; one cheerful person can infect an entire group. I have also seen one grumpy person bring down the mood of an entire group. Which would you rather be responsible for?

A cheerful heart is not always the result of the absence of problems or difficulties in one's life. Neither is a cheerful heart the result of one denying their painful reality in order to paste on a happy face. Cheerfulness is a choice and a positive attitude. We choose to see what is right rather than what is wrong. We choose to see the glass half full rather than half empty. It is not denying our feelings or burying our pain, it is acknowledging the pain, problems or difficulties in our life while recognizing that we have more to be thankful for than we do to worry and fuss about.

Some find it difficult to be happy because they have set the threshold of their happiness so high they can never be happy. Without a perfect night of sleep they feel justified in their unhappiness and in spreading their gloom to all that will listen. Regular occurrences like bad weather, heavy traffic and grouchy store clerks set them off. They want good weather, light traffic and polite people to serve them in the stores they frequent. Don't we all! This world however, is not perfect and unless we can learn to be happy in less than ideal circumstances, we will not be able to be happy in any circumstances.

If you want to be happy, be thankful for what you have and give little thought to what you would like to have. We tend to spend more time on our lists of wants than we do on listing what we are thankful for. This leaves us feeling as if we really deserve better than we have. If you want to be happy, count your blessings, not your wants.

If you want to be happy, be generous with what you have. The store here in town sells wonderful ice cream treats. I look into the ice cream freezer knowing that I can afford to buy one, but remember how long I would have to ride my exercise bike to offset the calories, I usually leave the ice cream in the freezer. I have found more joy in treating a young child or two to an ice cream than buying one for myself. Seeing their eyes light up and their huge smiles is far more satisfying than any ice cream treat and contains far less calories.

If you want to be happy, live a peaceful life because it is impossible to find happiness when you are fighting with people. No, I am not suggesting that you give in when truth is at stake, but I have observed that most of what we fight about just isn't that important. Even when it appears that truth is at stake in a dispute over some issue, too often the issue is just camouflage for another personal battle. To live at peace we must learn that we are not always right and that we don't have to always win. If it isn't important, allow the matter to drop before a dispute breaks out. If a dispute has already broken out there are probably some hurt feelings, so learn to say you are sorry and to be forgiving.

If you want to be happy, make the most out of times of fun and fellowship. Summertime has always been a time of great fun and fellowship, especially at our Camps. I can still remember more than forty years later some of the skits on talent night at Omagh that had us laughing so hard our sides ached. Just a few years ago at Family Camp we enjoyed a program so funny that we laughed for more than an hour straight. It is such a blessing for Christians to laugh together, to have fun together and to simply enjoy being together.

These times on their own would be hollow and without purpose if not in the context of a fellowship that loves God and one another. These times at Camp bring us such joy because we are among people we share a common faith with, we love them and love being at Camp with them.

"Our mouths were filled with laughter, our tongues with songs of joy. Then it was said among the nations, 'The LORD has done great things for them.'" (Psalm 126:2 NIV) Let your light shine for Jesus by smiling, choose a happy disposition and focus on what is right and good and spread the joy.

items we do in Sunday worship, at least not directly. It doesn't seem to speak to hand clapping or contemporary worship styles. The younger generation who were polled, as cited earlier, didn't even go to worship, so would not have any objective knowledge as to which "acts of worship" were lacking. Acceptable behaviour in God's family has reference to the way we live, which things are important to us and how different they are from the world's priorities. Does your lifestyle make the statement that you truly believe you are part of a very special family, God's family of faith?

A few verses of Scripture from another section of the Bible has close ties to the third chapter of First Timothy. It reads: "Now from Miletus he sent to Ephesus and called the elders of the church to come to him. And when they came to him, he said to them:... Pay careful attention to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for the church of God, which he obtained with his own blood" (Acts 20:17,28).

These men are called "elders" and are responsible for "overseeing" and "caring for" God's church. We must not overlook two other important aspects of this passage: the unmistakable fact that the church is bloodpurchased, and the confidence that is attached to the elders not picked out by man but by the Holy Spirit.

The crucial point is that God designed the church to be built upon a foundation that included "apostles and prophets," but current, living, breathing men were also to be appointed to take oversight in the local churches. This is part of the "organized religion" that is so distasteful to many in our time.

Step away from this for a moment and listen to a critic: "I generally despise organized religion. Organized religion is characterized by blind faith, irrational beliefs, power-grabs, greedy ministers, a lack of love and no personal respect. Religion is, as Marx said, the opiate of the masses. Tell a man to kill someone, and he'll shrink back in horror — tell him that God says to kill someone, and if he believes. he'll do it gladly. Control the masses through an emotional appeal to an invisible authority who lives in the sky. If they don't use reason, then they are asking to be led to destruction. Sheep led willingly to their slaughter.

"Organized Religion is the institutionalization of something that wasn't meant to be institutionalized. It was supposed to be personalized. It was an issue between man and God, with no mediator."

Perhaps this is the kind of "organized religion" that turns people off. The fact remains that certain *continued on page 9*

I am rarely comfortable unless I'm in the car with the air conditioner blowing directly on me. After growing up in Canada where it didn't seem to be so unbearably hot, it's been hard to adjust to the overwhelmingly high temps down here.

I also dislike the summer because of the way people tend to dress because of the heat. All too early, when the first signs of summer arrive, people get out the short shorts, halter tops, strapless dresses and bikinis. I don't enjoy walking through the mall even and seeing so many scantily clothed people. Sad to say, the immodesty is displayed even by those in the church. Or the directory at the back of this paper lists churches in Canada. There is really no reason for us not to be able to attend worship services when we are away from home.

Unfortunately, missing worship doesn't happen just when we travel, however. Summer sporting events interfere as well. With our children getting involved in organized sports at a very young age, it is easy to let the schedules for practice, games and tournaments keep us away. We need to understand that letting anything become more important than attending worship will have long-range ramifications on our children. We must let them see that God and His church and living for Him are the most important things in our lives so that they will emulate us when they become adults. It is easy to be excited about our kids participating in these athletic events. We want to encourage them to be team players and learn how to get along with others. But none of that is going to mean anything in their future if they aren't faithful to the Lord. It is usually accepted if you speak with the coaches at the beginning of the season and let them know that your child will not be able to be there at worship times. This speaks not only to your child about what is most meaningful

in your life but also to those in the community who see that you have commitments. How is it that we feel bad about missing a game but not about missing worship?

We must, above all, know that there is not vacation from God. If we are truly a child of His, we are

people were given greater specific responsibility than others and would be held accountable for their performance. This sounds like God meant for the organism to be organized. Sure enough, right here in I Timothy chapter three and verse one we begin a section on the qualifications of those people who were identified earlier as "overseers" and "elders." For good reason these men were to be married, with children, not materialistic and able to teach God's word to others. They would have been able to manage their households well as a prerequisite to looking after God's household. These men who aspire to lead God's family are to be humble, of noble character and well thought of by those not connected with the church.

Here we have leaders. Here we have organization. Here we have what is often impugned today.

The Bible is clear: since God put them in this position, we must respect them. Listen, "Do not receive an accusation against an elder except on the basis of two or three witnesses." 1 Tim. 5:19 and "So I exhort the elders among you, as a fellow elder...shepherd the flock of God that is among you, exercising oversight, not under compulsion, but willingly, as God would have you; not for shameful gain, but eagerly; not domineering over those in your charge, but being examples to the flock"(1 Pet. 5:1-4).

The men who submit to God's scrutiny under such circumstances and for the cause of Christ are part of the scheme our Heavenly Father has laid before us to work under Him on earth. going to live every day for Him. The Bible gives much instruction of how we are to live in the world without being part of the world and many examples of people who gave up a lot of stuff in their lives to follow Jesus. God expects no less of us. So, let's just try really hard to show our

children how much we love God and want to be the kind of people that He wants us to be. It's not always going to be easy, but we were never promised that it would be.

Enjoy your summer while staying faithful to your Christian walk. It is possible!

But, as you continue reading, you find another plank in the organization platform. "Deacons likewise must be dignified, not doubletongued, not addicted to much wine, not greedy for dishonest gain..." One who is a deacon is a servant or minister. The Bible is not very specific as to what his job should be, but it is always in the area of serving. That is the meaning of the term and the nature of the task.

A possible precursor to the material we find in Paul's writings is seen in Acts. "Now in these days when the disciples were increasing in number, a complaint by the Hellenists arose against the Hebrews because their widows were being neglected in the daily distribution. And the twelve summoned the full number of the disciples and said, 'It is not right that we should give up preaching the word of God to serve tables. Therefore, brothers, pick out from among you seven men of good repute, full of the Spirit and of wisdom, whom we will appoint to this duty. But we will devote ourselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word" (Acts 6: 1-4).

Try to picture the unmet needs and the encroaching chaos as a small band of disciples was attempting do it all. The godly men who were chosen were to serve tables, while the apostles continued to preach the word of God.

Were these servants really only the apostles' helpers? No more than the apostles were the servants' helpers. All who belong to God by faith are servants. The roles are complementary. Teamwork is in view. When there is organization, role playing is called for, as in marriage. Inequality is not in view but body functioning is.

While we have insufficient information to be able to delineate with accuracy all the tasks to be undertaken by both biblical overseers and ministers, we can say with surety that these good works are the result of God's direction in organized religion.

Note that the letter is addressed to Timothy. He must know how to conduct himself in the church. However, his influence will be felt by all, hence—"Let no one despise you for your youth, but set the believers an example in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith, in purity. Until I come, devote yourself to the public reading of Scripture, to exhortation, to teaching" (1 Tim. 4:12,13). The context indicates that Paul is speaking to Timothy about Timothy!

Preaching and ministering brothers, we too have an awesome responsibility within God's plan. The church is that important: that is it must hold up truth in the face of falsehood, deceit and wickedness. Today we face postmodernism, that spouts off that there is nothing absolute about truth. Today is still the "day of salvation," in spite of the outcry to outlaw lostness! The same Jesus who visited the planet as "Immanuel"-God with us, has promised to return. Let us all do our part in adhering to God's plan and structure while we live out our time between the first and final coming of our Saviour, Jesus.

flesh, a sign between God and the Jews, was replaced by the spiritual circumcision of the heart, a sign between God and all mankind.

Peter presents to those assembled that he, by God's guidance, had delivered the message of salvation to the Gentiles, saying that God had shown acceptance of them by giving the Holy Spirit. There was no distinction between the Jews and Gentiles was Peter's conclusion. Following this, Barnabas and Paul related how they had done signs and wonders among the Gentiles by the blessing and power of God. Finally, James gave a suggestion that "Seemed good to the apostles and the elders, with the whole church to choose men from among them and send them to Antioch with Paul and Barnabas" with the following message, "For it has seemed good to the Holy Spirit and to us to lay on you no greater burden than these requirements: that you abstain from what has been sacrificed to idols, and from blood, and from what has been strangled, and from sexual immorality. If you keep yourselves from these, you will do well. Farewell'" (Acts 15:22, 28, 29 ESV).

No doubt it took a long time for the "Jewish" Christians to begin to be comfortable with this new relationship for themselves and with the "Gentile" Christians. They had to grow in their learning, understanding and accepting the new plan of God. Thankfully, many did...sadly, many did not.

Their experience is not that much different than ours. We must learn to accept, as final, the word of God because His word takes precedence over every religious, cultural or family tradition of man.

# **Newsletter Evangelism-1**

Dale Morgan is the preacher for the Church of Christ in Wauseon, Ohio. Wauseon is a recent church planting and Dale is very excited about a discovery he recently made called Newsletter Evangelism. He is anxious to try it out and wanted to share it with others. Following is part of an article first printed in Church Growth Magazine by Glenn E. Davis and is reproduced with his permission.

Glenn is a deacon in the Buena Park, California, church of Christ and teaches this program in the evangelism class. He travels around the country and shares this approach with other congregations and schools of preaching when possible. Glenn is a graduate of Harding University (1973).

### Yes, You Can Grow... If you really want to!

What would happen if someone made a scientific break-through and developed a cure for cancer? Do you think it would make news? Do you think it would get people excited? What kind of excitement would it cause?

I'm sorry to say that I have NOT come up with a cure for cancer, but I think I have come up with something as exciting in the area of evangelism! It's certainly causing excitement with leaders and teachers in schools of preaching and Christian colleges and universities.

It's called NEWSLETTER EVANGELISM and it's going to revolutionize how we, as a brotherhood, look at and do personal evangelism. With this technique, any and every congregation that uses it can go throughout their neighbourhoods, knock doors, have an extremely pleasant experience at those doors and find out who are the best prospects for sharing the gospel. Don Myers of Faulkner University, who teaches the evangelism class to our future evangelists, said that he had considered door-to-door evangelism as a thing of the past and had dismissed its effectiveness until he saw what this approach accomplishes. He is now working on revamping his entire class and making NEWSLETTER EVANGELISM a central part of the program.

Finding a cure for cancer is a medical scientist's dream. Having this type of experience that I described earlier when I do door-todoor evangelism is the dream I have been living for almost 15 years. I'm so happy to have the opportunity to share it with the brotherhood over recent months.

A cure for cancer would be groundbreaking and I'm going to let you be the judge on how groundbreaking you think this one is! I have discovered that if you pass out a series of 25 religious newsletters (one double-sided 8<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> x 11 page) twice-a-week over a 3 month period (Spring and Fall are the best months to do this) anyone can then go into those neighbourhoods, knock the doors, and find that the newsletters have totally changed the hearts of these wonderful people. You can have a conversation with these fine folks in an environment that is very pleasant for both the door-knocker and the person who comes to the door. These neighbours are happy to talk to you, and you are happy that they are not turning the dogs loose on you.

You are probably thinking, "I don't ever remember getting that kind of reception when I did door-to-door evangelism?" Well, it's because you never properly prepared the field before harvest time. It's all a matter of laying down the proper foundation beforehand!

How does this miraculous transformation take place in these neighbourhoods? What happens is that for a three month period, a couple times a week, these wonderful, highly interesting newsletters keep showing up on the front doors of your friends and neighbours. No one ever knocks on these neighbours' doors during this time period. By allowing people to take them into their living rooms, sit down on a comfortable couch or easy chair, or go back into the kitchen, pour a cup of coffee and sit down at the kitchen table and read these fantastic newsletters, we are allowing people to raise their awareness of our presence in the community in a very calm, low pressure, non-pushy, nonthreatening manner. This makes your congregation a place of prominence in the community. Before, most people weren't much aware of your presence and you didn't matter to most of them whatsoever. Now, for all practical purposes, you have become the most popular church in the community in MOST of their minds.

What do you then do with this new found popularity? You now go out into the neighbourhood to meet these new found friends and neighbours with a six question survey inquiring what they think of the newsletters. Since these newsletters are such a hit with the community, they are happy to answer your questions.

Now within the survey questions you are going to confirm that most people read and like the newsletters. But, how they answer question number 5 will help YOU determine if they are prospects or not.

Here are the six survey questions:

**1.** Does anyone in your home read and like the newsletters, or do you just line the bird cage with them?

2. Who read them the most?

**3.** Do you ever share them with anyone outside your family here?

For a survey, one must have survey questions. The first three questions are not that important, but it makes it sound like a legitimate survey. It is a legitimate survey, but you are less concerned with people's thoughts about the newsletters and more concerned with finding those people in the community who we can bring to Christ on His terms and into the family of God. Of course, the first question is quite cute, if I do say so myself.

# **4.** *Is there anything we can do for you and your family?*

With this question you reinforce the idea that you care about them. Now they already have that impression about you and they will probably tell you that "all is well with their family, but thanks for asking." Or, they might

say, "My mother has cancer, can you pray for her?" You respond appropriately and then move to the next and most important question of the survey.

**5.** How are you and the Lord doing? If you were to die, or the Lord were to come today, do you know for certain that you would go home to be with Him?

This is where the rubber meets the road. You are going to know, based on their answer to this question, if he or she is a good prospect, a fair prospect, or a non-prospect. If their answer indicates that they have STRONG ties to some religious group and are not thinking of moving in any other direction, or they are not interested in any kind of religious commitment, they are not serious prospects.

A large percentage will fall into this category. That's too bad, and that's just life, but let not your heart be troubled! It will have been a nice exchange at the door, and you are looking for the wheat while disposing of the tares.

You are going to find a good number of people that are religious, or want to be, and have no strong ties to any one religious group. They might tell you that they used to "go to church, but not lately, and from reading the newsletters, they know that they need to draw closer to God." Or, they might indicate that they are not satisfied with the church that they are currently attending and they would be interested in visiting your church services. Or maybe God has never played an important role in their lives but the things they have been reading in the newsletters have made them think more about God and life, and they would like to know more.

Whatever they say that would indicate that they are a prospect, make a note of that on the survey form for whoever might be doing the follow-up work. **6.** Would you like more information about our congregation or about the churches of Christ?

Have something to offer people right then that would be appropriate, or make it a point to return soon with the requested material. This gives you another opportunity to visit and build a new friendship, and work toward a possible Bible study.

This concludes phases one (newsletter distribution) and two (the doorto-door/prospect finding survey). We will look at phase three next month.

culture and own desires may tell us to.

When we read the Parable of the Talents, we tend to pay the most attention to the one talent servant and his rejection. He is the main point of the story—in his fear, he had failed to act. He had not pleased his master. What about the five talent and two talent servants? They were told, "Well done, good and faithful servant." They pleased their master and enjoyed the positive result.

There is perhaps no more beautiful end-of-life statement than Paul's. "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day—and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing" (2 Timothy 4:7). Paul was keenly aware of his own shortcomings and failures. He was well aware of the coming judgment and his accountability God, and also the eternal consequences. His purpose was to do everything humanly possible to please God. He could confidently say, "I am not ashamed, because I know whom I have believed, and am convinced that he is able to guard what I have entrusted to him for that day" (2 Timothy 1:12).

As Christians, being accountable to God does not assume failure and rejection. Some people emerge from job performance reviews with raises and promotions. When God's people focus on following and pleasing Him, they can confidently look forward to standing before Him. We can look forward to hearing, "Well done, good and faithful servant. Enter into the joy of your master."

When she was 17, her father wanted Iris to go to college in California, but she had met Charles, a pilot in the Royal Australian Air Force stationed in Canada, and was married instead. Their first two children were born in Australia. Deciding to return to Canada, they boarded a steamer in the '50's, and enjoyed a grand tour of numerous Pacific Islands on the return trip. They settled in Vancouver for several years, but also lived for a time in Kamloops.

As Iris had been raised in the church, they were contacted by John Mallory, and invited to worship with them and the McLean family who had recently arrived from Scotland. When Roger and Margaret Jeal moved from Richmond to Burnaby, the property the Burnaby church is still located on was purchased.

Blessed are those who die in the Lord. May God comfort all who mourn her passing.

### Sinclair, Eva Lauretta


Eva Lauretta Sinclair, at the age of 99, went home to be with her Lord on Thursday, April 16, 2009, in Wichita Falls, Texas.
