Time Tips...

Live in two worlds (that's true in more ways than one), I live between "I don't know how you get it all done" and "what do you do all the time since you only work on Sundays."

The truth is I'm like most preachers you'll meet (Other than that I'm much weirder) I'm neither Superman nor a lazy man. But frankly I don't know too many lazy preachers, I'm sure there are some out there. Typically, someone will think a guy is lazy because he focuses his energies on something other than what the critic thinks a preacher should focus on. For example, the critic thinks the preacher should spend all his time visiting but the preacher in question spends most of his time in prayer and study. Or it could be just as likely the other way around. That gives the perception of laziness.

Most weeks I work 85–100 hours. I've charted it and can't find the last time I didn't put in that much time in a week. I thoroughly enjoy my work, I love it, BUT I do work a lot. Not bragging I just figure most folks are working that much nowadays. Whatever happened to the concept that technology would lead to us working less?

Here is some advice on work that I've found helpful:

1. Equip others: In ministry your

best work is most often not the work you actually do but is done when you equip, energize and empower others to do the work of ministry. This is biblical; check it out in Ephesians 4. But it is also practical for it multiplies your efforts as it frees you to do more.

2. Realize timing is everything! If you have children,

know that your primary responsibility is to those little ones. You will have time before and after they are at those key growing up years. We should have learned from some of our heroes who live in regret today because they, in a sense, sacrificed their families on the altar of church work. But you can double up here some. Let me explain: When my boys were little and playing ball, football, basketball, baseball I always tried to tie my church work into my parenting work. I would coach their little league teams—not only would I have time with them, time we really enjoyed, but I had 10-25 other children who I got to influence. If you want to influence parents, the best way is to show concern for their children. I would get to know a lot of "prospects" (i.e. I'd rather say people) in that setting.

As they got older I volunteered to do radio broadcasts or the PA—that got my name, and by virtue of influence, the churches name in front of people. One more note here: If your elders don't understand how important it is for you to have this time, help them!!

3. When it comes to study— Double your time: Most any time a college student majoring in Bible interviews me they will ask how do I find time for my personal spiritual life and for study for sermons. I'm always a little bewildered by that question. I see little difference. My best spiritual study ALWAYS leads to great sermon study. I listen to the

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Bible being read on podcast, cd's, etc. I spent time in prayer and in study for my own spiritual strength and I will inevitably find myself also seeing something I want to preach.

Another note or two here: Challenge yourself. My dad used to say for me to take on responsibilities that forced me to study and work hard. Do things that forced accountability. I have OFTEN overbooked and put myself under the gun to "get it all done" but I can never remember ultimately regretting it. Be wise and, when possible, use stuff you've used when you travel or when you are traveling and are assigned a text or topic you've not used, use it at home too.

4. Network: You need guys who understand you and the pressures unique to ministry and they need you. Find time for other preachers. Make them your allies. They will understand you and in turn you can help them grow and be better. A side benefit from this should be greater unity among congregations. If someone is spreading something about a brother you know, or spend time with, you'll talk to him with greater confidence if you already know him. In the process, study them. What makes them effective, ineffective? Be a student of preaching, after all, it is what you do!

5. Do more than is expected: Just do!

6. If you have office hours BE EARLY every day! Folks will never know if you stayed up till 2 or 3 working on a project but they will know if you weren't in the office at 8 a.m. I know so many guys who

get in trouble because they come in 15–30 minutes or an hour late two or three days a week. Guys this is such a small thing. Get there early. Be the first there; spend that time in prayer before things get hopping. And, if things aren't hopping, MAKE THEM!

Justified

There are many who insist that the word "justified" in the New Testament is in the passive voice, meaning, it is something that God does, not man. Therefore, a human action, such as baptism, could be no part of the justification process. Some time ago a man sat in my office and stated just those thoughts. He said that if one would do one thing in an effort to be forgiven of his sins that it would make the grace of God totally null and void. The mention of baptism for the remission of sins really set him off. He said that baptism was a work and that would be an attempt to "earn" one's salvation. Of course, he was totally wrong in his allegations.

Those who say that "justification" is a process accomplished wholly by God, and any "obedience" on the part of man is excluded, though sincere, are seriously wrong in their thinking.

While the passive form "justified" emphasizes the fact that ultimately only God can acquit sinful man, the passive voice does not nullify the fact that Jehovah may set conditions in His own plan for the justification of sinful humanity. It has always mystified me that those who are so strongly against man doing anything in the area of salvation will strongly encourage the sinner to have "faith" in Jesus Christ as the Son of God. In John 6:28-29 we read. "Then they said to him, what shall we do, that we may WORK the WORKS of God? Jesus answered and said to them, "this is the WORK of God, that you believe in him who he sent." Faith

is a work that God has given the sinner to do!

Justification may be defined as the divine process by which God acquits the sinner and reckons him as righteous. There are some very erroneous ideas regarding justification in "Christianity" today. There are those who believe that salvation must be "worked out" totally. They believe salvation must be "earned." On the other hand there are those who believe that salvation is by "faith only." Both ideas are wrong. Incidentally, if the passive form, "being justified," eliminates all human response, then faith itself would be excluded from the plan of salvation.

Let us look at the biblical facts involving justification.

1. All accountable people are sinners (Romans 3:10, 23), and deserve to be condemned, and if there is any hope of escaping hell, justification must be extended by the offended God.

2. No one can "earn" or "merit" justification (Matt. 18:21ff; Eph. 2:8-9).

3. Justification can be extended only on the basis of Christ's death as the sinless sacrifice for man (1 Peter 1:19; Romans 3:24-26).

4. Justification will be bestowed only when man responds to God's plan of redemption by faith (Romans3:26; 5:1). In the book of Romans, as elsewhere in the New Testament, faith is not mere "mental assent," or even just a disposition to trust the Lord. It is a willingness to "submit" to the requirements set forth by God himself. "Through him we have received grace and apostleship for obedience to the faith among all nations for his name" (Romans 1:5). Justification is the equivalent of being "free from sin" (Romans 6:18). However, freedom from sin comes only to those who have "obeyed from the heart" the "pattern" of the gospel (Romans 6:17). There is no question but that justification is based upon the obedience of the will of God through Jesus Christ (Hebrews 5:8-9).

5. The result of justification is "peace with God" and then one can rejoice in the hope of the glory of God (Romans 5:1-2).

There is no question but that salvation is totally by the grace of God. Only God can forgive sin. But it is also true that God will not forgive the sins of those who are not willing to obey his commands. When man obeys the commands of God he is not trying to earn or merit anything. Man must obey the commands of God concerning primary salvation and then must continue to obey the commands of God to remain in a saved relationship with God. Once saved, man does not obey God to be saved, but obeys God "because" he is saved. Works of man are worth nothing in the saving of the soul. But obeying the "works of God" is necessary to be saved and to maintain that saved relationship. All these things are clearly revealed to the student of the Bible.

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Voices of Concern

For the past several years, a number of evangelical writers have voiced their concern about the compromising influence of culture among those who claim to believe the Bible is God's inspired and authoritative word. Ronald J. Sider, in The Scandal of the Evangelical Conscience

(2005) points to the disparity between their confession of faith in Christ and lives that are no different from the rest of the world. Many, "by their daily activity... commit treason (i.e. to Christ—WT)... with their actions, they demonstrate loyalty to money, sex and self-fulfillment." He refers to this as a "crisis of disobedience in the evangelical world today." He cites a study by Barna that showed the rate of divorce among evangelicals was slightly higher than in the overall population. He also pointed to problems with materialism, sexual immorality, racism and physical abuse in marriage among evangelicals.

More recently, Michael Horton, in Christless Christianity, said that Satan, "lulls us to sleep as we trim our message to the banality of popular culture and invoke Christ's name for anything and everything but salvation from the coming judgment." He speaks of people becoming "distracted from Christ as the only hope for sinners. Where everything is measured by our happiness rather than by God's holiness" and of becoming better people needing only "a life coach, not a redeemer."


Mark Galli, of Christianity Today, in an article, "In the Beginning, Grace," notes that this move to a more subjective faith has created a tendency for many evangelicals today, when dealing with an issue, to "frame the problem horizontally" - to look for answers on a human level and downplay the need and role of God in finding a solution. As this subjectivity downplays the place of the objective truth of scripture, it reduces evangelicalism to deism. Galli uses a study of the spiritual lives of teenagers by Smith and Denton to define his thesis. (i.e. seeking God through human reason rather than revelation.) Deism rejects the supernatural—miracles—while still claiming to believe in God. According to deism, people can save themselves, lead good moral lives and will eventually end up in heaven. Galli likens many evangelicals today to the teenagers in the study. He cites Smith and Denton's conclusion that "a new religion had emerged in America." Its five chief tenets include: "God wants people to be good, nice and fair to each other... The central goal of life is to be happy and to feel good about oneself... God

does not need to be particularly involved in one's life except when God is needed to resolve a problem... Good people go to heaven when they die." We've all heard messages like these from religious and secular sources. This is the popular religion of today. Galli calls it the "new evangelical creed."

We might legitimately ask two questions. First, why is this shift happening? One answer was suggested by Mark A. Noll back in 1995. In "The Scandal of the Evangelical Mind," he observed that "the scandal of the evangelical mind is that there is not much of an evangelical mind... evangelicals are not exemplary for their thinking." He finds this a "curious situation" because "Modern evangelicals are the spiritual descendants of leaders and movements distinguished by probing, creative, fruitful attention to the mind." Noll is not arguing for a deistic search for God through reason which minimizes revelation and scripture. Neither should the quest for God be mindless. Christians should not "park their brains at the door." William Barclay, in his commentary on the book of Revelation, described the church at Sardis as "untroubled by any heresy" because it was "too lazily lethargic for the effort of thought." When those who claim to believe the Bible do not study it or meditate and think about it, they lose their only defense and become vulnerable to unbiblical ideas-they lose the ability and the will to resist the effects of culture.

The second question is why does this matter to us? At the very least, we face the same pressures to conform to the world as the evangelicals. Even more, on the religious map, we sit closely by the evangelicals. While there are some differences, we share similar views of the inspiration and authority of scripture. We read books and articles written by evangelicals. Sooner

What Is Primary? (Retirement Thoughts)

s a person grows older he/she comes to think of life from a different perspective. The choices made in earlier life will have an impact on the choices made when the years accumulate. I was interested in the following survey report: "As Americans age, 60 percent say they expect to enjoy life more. According to a Belden Russonello & Stewart poll of 1,000 people in May 2001, here are the activities they are looking forward to in their golden years:

• spending more time with family and friends: 81 percent

• having more leisure time: 65 percent

• pursuing hobbies: 61 percent

• traveling: 51 percent.

(Lori Joseph and Sam Ward, USA Today "Snapshots" August 7, 2001).

What do you think of these answers? If you are coming to the age of retirement and were asked this question, what answer would you give? Before you read on, take a moment to consider the survey question and think about your answer.

We have no way of knowing the backgrounds of the 1,000 surveyed. However, it is interesting that in the results there is nothing said about spiritual matters. While not finding fault with the general nature of the answers given, it seems to me that if this question were asked to a group of folks who were strong in their faith we might expect to hear something said about the opportunities for Christian service that comes with time made available through retirement.

While it is true that each generation of the church must turn over the leadership duties to those following behind, that does not mean that the church should lose the important strength and encouragement that can be given by those who have served the Lord faithfully and have rejoiced in His strength. Joshua, for example, still had a lot to give when he became older. "Now Joshua was old and advanced in years, and the Lord said to him, "You are old and advanced in years, and there remains yet very much land to possess" (Joshua 13:1). Joshua still had a lot to give as he took leadership in seeing to the dividing of the land of Canaan among the tribes of Israel. He went on to complete this work.

Of course, his co-faithful-spy is also a wonderful example of one going on to serve and lead in later years. "And now, behold, the Lord has kept me alive, just as he said, these forty-five years since the time that the Lord spoke this word to Moses, while Israel walked in the wilderness. And now, behold, I am this day eighty-five years old. I am still as strong today as I was in the day that Moses sent me; my strength now is as my strength was then, for war and for going and coming. So now give me this hill country of which the Lord spoke on that day, for you heard on that day how the Anakim were there, with great fortified cities. It may be that the Lord will be with me, and I shall drive them out just as the Lord said" (Joshua 14:10 - 12). Caleb went on to take the land "And the land had rest from war." (Joshua 14:15). Both Joshua and Caleb are great examples of using the "golden years" to serve the Lord.

Why did these two men remain so strong in their later years? What is it that would make people, in speaking of getting older, list the using of their golden years in serving God? Solomon gives a clear answer to this question in his book of Ecclesiastes. This book is often referred to as the lab notes of one who has made many experiments and comes to a conclusion based on that evidence. Solomon tries it all. Wealth, power, pleasure, wisdom! While each of these may have something to offer, his final conclusion is, "Remember also your Creator in the days of your youth, before the evil days come and the years draw near of which you will say, "I have no pleasure in them" (Ecclesiastes 12:1).

So again the question, "why did these two men remain so strong in their later years?" Because they understood what was primary. And what is primary in youth will usually also be primary in old age! Those who are truly seeking first the kingdom (Matthew 6:33) in their younger life will do so in later years. If one is blessed with healthy retirement years, think of the force for good they can be as they influence, by example, those who are younger in the church! Thomas Morrell said, "The first great gift we can bestow on others is a good example." May those of us who are getting older realize this truth.

The sad thing is that many, who have been a part of the church for years, come to retirement and fall into the mould of the world and use all the extra time they have to fulfill the will of the fleshly man. Travelling, visiting family, pursuing a hobby, etc., are all fine in themselves. However, to use some of this time to help the church grow and become stronger is better.

Most who read this article will likely agree with that last sentence. After all, you would not be reading this if you did not care about the church and your relationship with the Lord. However, over the years I have known people who have talked about what they plan to do for the Lord at retirement when they don't have to punch the time clock any more. Yet, many of them have been no more involved in "church life" after retirement than before. Why? Hopefully, it is not because one then will say, "I have no pleasure in serving the Lord."

In thinking about what is primary, even in later years, consider this. Do not allow your involvement in spiritual activities to become borderline. Rather, make the commitment to use *continued on page 17*

Missing: A Giving Theology

•• Supper, as a matter of convenience, we take this opportunity to give (give back) to the work of the Lord. If you are visiting, please do not feel obligated to give. Would the servers please come forward."

Over the last couple of months I have visited many different churches around Ontario and I want to tell you what I hear when those words are spoken. This is what I hear: "At this church we usually give money on Sunday. It's something we are supposed to do every Sunday, but we couldn't really figure out where to put it in our order of worship. We decided this is as good a time as any. The money given will be used for 'the Lord'. By the way, if you are visiting there is probably not much point to your giving, unless you really want to."

It seems as though many of our churches are growing increasingly unsure about the reason (theology) of the contribution.

The fundamental question: Is giving a spiritual practice?

What is spiritual? Here is my definition for the purpose of this article: anything that affects, impacts, concerns, or pertains to your relationship with God. Thus, the question could be asked in this way: does what I do with my money (giving, saving, spending, earning) affect, impact, concern, or pertain to my relationship to God? The Bible answers that question with a resounding yes!

2 Cor. 8:7 speaks of the *grace of giving*. We love the word grace. Grace is spiritual. When we give, we both experience and offer grace. Paul encourages us to overflow in our giving.

In Phil 4:18 Paul calls their financial gifts *a fragrant offering, an acceptable sacrifice, pleasing to God.* When we worship we seek to please God. Indeed in our giving we rejoice because we know God is pleased with the fragrant scent of our gifts.

Acts 20:35 Jesus himself said that it is *more blessed to give than receive*. What joy it brings to our hearts to know that our gifts make a difference. Thanks be to God for allowing us to share in the grace of giving.

If we are embarrassed or ashamed about offering an opportunity to give, then we likely have not fully understood all the spiritual blessings associated with giving.

What do we want to avoid communicating about giving during our services?

• This is a **practice for club members only**. We do not want people to think we are just paying our club dues when we put money into the collection plate. Furthermore, we do not want people to think that this money is only used to maintain our facilities like buildings and grounds.

• Avoid giving the impression that if visitors were to give **that giving would be of no benefit** to them. If we insinuate this we ignore the fact that they



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would be blessed by giving. We should all remember gifts are not to a specific congregation, but instead to the kingdom of God.

• That people **are required to give**. Giving is a gift. Don't force or coerce a person to give.

• Don't insinuate that this is simply a physical act with no spiritual impact.

How can we implement a spiritually healthier giving practice?

1. Always commit to speak about giving in positive terms. Use Bible words and phrases 'the grace of giving', 'blessed to give', 'I pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel'. We are giving people the opportunity to be blessed with a spiritual experience. As we give we feel liberated from the tyranny of wealth. When we release money, we ourselves are released from its bondage. Money begs us to need it, but God begs us to release it. What a spiritual blessing.

2. Share a clear understanding of why we give. Consider the following

as some sample words before the collection – "Jesus gives us the opportunity to share in his important work – his work of redeeming the world. His work of reversing everything contrary to the will of God. His work of delivering the world from famine and disease. This morning we seek to bless you by allowing you to share in the spiritual act of giving. Indeed, it is more blessed to give than receive."

3. To pray or not to pray, that is the question. When we habitually pray prior to "spiritual" elements of worship we confuse members and visitors when we do not pray before the contribution. We pray to start worship, before the wine, before the bread, at times before the sermon, and at the end of worship. If giving is spiritual, we should enhance that practice by creating a spiritual atmosphere while we give.


I attended church service in Verdun, QC, where brother Pratley preached to a small congregation. Brother Pratley lived alone, his wife had passed away. After service he invited me out for dinner. We went to a small French Café not far from where we worshipped. He then invited me for a visit in his home. His house was a nice brick building with well maintained gardens. Here we sat and talked. In his house, lining the walls were pictures of the bridges he designed and built.

Brother Pratley, a man of such great accomplishments in his field, was preaching the gospel of Christ to a very small group and was **HUMBLE** enough to invite me, a young sailor in uniform, out for lunch and then invited me home for a visit. Brother Pratley died in August, 1958, at the age of 73.

Just before completing my course I had a visitor. A new work was being started in Montreal by Brother Alvin Jennings. He visited me when I was on duty and watched as the officer put us through some drills. After the drill was over Bro Jennings asked me if they always ordered us around in that manner. We had been so accustomed to taking and acting on orders, at first I did not know what he meant. The work in Montreal was quite a distance from the base. As I was near the completion of my course I did not get to the new work. My next posting was the Naval Air Base in Shearwater Nova Scotia and I attended the congregation in Halifax until leaving the navy.

(Endnote: I think there are very few of our people who know of Bro. Pratley. I have told Geoff Ellis of my meeting him and he mentioned to me that Bro. Pratley had designed the Burlington Bridge built in 1958. Bro. Pratley also died that year. In 1959 I sailed under the bridge when we visited Hamilton during the opening of the St. Lawrence sea way. I was on H.M.C.S. Kootenay and we escorted the Queen on her Royal Yacht Britannia from the entrance of the St. Lawrence River to Thunder Bay. President Eisenhower represented United States. That was a historic event and we had to wear our white uniforms, first and only time for me. TM)

The voices of concern among the evangelicals should also speak to and warn us. A subjective "feel good" message shaped by culture is not the Gospel of Christ. It only can lead to what Horton's title suggests, a Christless Christianity. Our real need is not happiness. Our problem is not a lack of self-esteem. The answers don't come from within us. Our problem is that sin separates us from God. Our only hope for redemption is through the blood of Christ. Paul said that it is by this message we are saved. This is the one and only Gospel.

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
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study of Sarah and Abraham and faith. It was very thought provoking. The 90 sisters present provided much fellowship.

Manila: Manila had their worst flooding in decades on Sept. 25. Food was a priority, but only the government, at first, was able to deliver by boat or air. After five days, Sept. 30, Bonifacio Patricio and a dozen volunteers from churches of Christ around Metro Manila were loaned a dump truck by the government to distribute relief goods to brethren affected by the flooding. After preparing groceries until 3:00 a.m., they found thousands lined up waiting to get food, often in water that was waist deep. Children were playing in dirty water, even diving and doing somersaults. Even in these circumstances, people were laughing and smiling as they waded through chest-high waters. Patricio commented, 'Typical Filipino, who laughs at calamities and misfortunes.' After the water subsided, their primary need was help with repairing their houses or being relocated. With millions affected, some think this was worse than Katrina." I am going to Manila as soon as the initial funds for the Manila Disaster arrives. Right now, we are preparing for typhoons in Cebu in the future. Near and long term: The best way to deal with disasters, of course, is spiritual. The next best thing is to build up enough local resources to help our communities become more typhoonresilient and have enough resources to recover locally. Outside help, both national and international, is slow and small. It is necessary and life-saving, but for the most part, it is a band-aid temporary resource. People are better off saving for rainy days. The Bible says, "Go to the ant, O sluggard, and consider her ways." (Prov. 6:6). I took 18 poor farmers to a 30-acre farm yesterday. It was lush and bountiful. There is enough food and fortune there for 100 local families. The hundreds of hectares of surrounding land was bare and unproductive. This 30 acres is farmed by ONE FILIPINO named Lauro. The size and success by a single farmer is unheard of in this country. He intercrops his farm. He practices organic farming. He has no machinery, except for a weed eater. He is also a college graduate. This man and his method

inspired my companions to do better, and work harder. He confirms my belief that if we have more people like him IN the country, we have a chance not only to survive, but also excel. This country cannot prepare and cope with disasters because the best and the brightest (like Lauro) have left. Young people here try to get education for the sole purpose of its being a ticket out of the country, not to build up their home base. Under this environment, even churches cannot grow and prosper because of the lack of quality leadership. Churches cannot be self-sufficient, because most members are not. - Report from Salvador Cariaga in Cebu

Rapha International received word from Chito Cusi, head of "MARCH for Christ", that he flew to Manila the day after the flooding to establish collection and distribution centres in seven cities around Manila. 
Samoan Islands And Indonesia: On Oct. 1, an earthquake and Tsunami hit the South Pacific southwest of American Samoa, quickly followed by one in Indonesia. Hardest hit was the capital, Padang, and rural villages around the perimeter of West Sumatra, where four villages simply disappeared under mud slides, including a wedding party of 400 people. Each major island in the Samoa chain, Tutuila, Upolu and Savaii had scores of people that were unaccounted for as they were buried in rubble or pulled out into the ocean. Jerry Blankenship, who is working in American Samoa, wrote that there are a number of members of the church in American Samoa, Samoa and Tonga. "Several live in Leone, a village on the west end of the island about 7 to 10 miles from American Samoa's airport. The low areas of Leone were hit, with many dwellings destroyed or damaged. In Samoa, the southern coast of Upolu was hit. Many of the villages on the southern coast were severely damaged, with numerous fatalities and more missing. Christians were asked to pray especially for Olataga Toa, a citizen of Samoa who is financial manager of the hotel in American Samoa. In Ola's

village on Upolu, out of 40 families, only two remain. Six members of his immediate family perished and others are missing. The tragedy of many villages is that they are made up entirely of inter-related families."Currently there are four churches in American Samoa, Tafuna, Leone, Nuuuli, and Iliili. The primary areas of destruction are the village of Leone and the back portion of Pago Pago harbor, which had severe damage. Buildings were collapsed or gone, vehicles thrown about and boats washed into village areas. There was no electricity or water. As a side note. the western portion of the island, which includes a majority of the population and the power plant, did have electricity and running water."Each major island in the Samoa chain (Tutuila, Upolu and Savaii) had scores of people that continued to be unaccounted for, feared to have been buried in rubble or pulled out into the ocean." - Report from Jerry Blankenship

Donetsk, Ukraine: "The TB Sanatorium at Dogichas has always been deeply grateful to the church of Christ, as we seem to be the only ones who help them. Last summer, they asked us for a commercial washing machine, costing \$4,000. They were receiving 85 little children in the fall and the machine that they had been using for years had broken down again and was not fixable. They were desperate for help. We were able to get the one they needed. When we returned from the States, they called to ask us to come out to see the new washer and give a 'tea' to thank us. "In October, four of us went out for the visit. When we got there we had the regular small talk, they showed us where they needed some help with replacing leaky pipes, we saw the new machine, and then went in to have our tea. After a few minutes of 'surface' talk, the director started asking questions about the Bible. After answering her questions, Jay Don encouraged her to go to the church here at Dogichas, as we have a graduate in this town. When she didn't feel comfortable with that, he agreed to her request to come there to teach her and her staff!" - Condensed from a report by Mary Lee Rogers

a master preacher trainer, he had been there and understood preachers. He gave me some of the most freeing advice I ever received. I hope elders, members and preachers will listen to this. It is not an exact quote but it is how I have interpreted it: There are three time slots in every day and no healthy person works all three. Morning, afternoon and night. If you are going to be working that night, take the morning or afternoon off. If you are working in the afternoon take either that morning or night off.

Some days you will have to work all three, but don't make it a habit, it is not healthy, will sap you of spiritual strength, will make you more susceptible to temptation and will not set a good example. You will also lose your family. If your child is in an extra-curricular activity, be there. If your elders kids are, they will be there, they should expect you to as well. Take a vacation, even Jesus took His disciples apart for a time of rest.


MANITOBA

he eagle is one of the most majes-L tic birds that God created. God uses them in the Bible as a symbol of power. God told Ezekiel to warn the Israelites that they would be conquered and carried into captivity because of their wickedness. He used the figure of the eagle to get their attention. "Son of man, set forth an allegory and tell the house of Israel a parable. Say to them, 'This is what the Sovereign LORD says: A great eagle with powerful wings, long feathers and full plumage of varied colors came to Lebanon. Taking hold of the top of a cedar, he broke off its topmost shoot and carried it away to a land of merchants, where he planted it in a city of traders'" (Ezekiel 17:3-4)

"Though you soar like the eagle and make your nest among the stars, from there I will bring you down," declares the LORD" (Obadiah 1:4).

But a more positive scripture that makes reference to an eagle is found in Isaiah 40:31. "But those who hope in the LORD will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint."

There is a powerful word picture here. An eagle is known for endurance. It has the ability to stay in the air for long periods of time. God gave it the skill to catch the air currents and ride them. There is a huge lesson here. The eagle doesn't have any power to change the air flow. It just takes what it is given and rides it out while looking for its prev on the ground to maintain its survival. Wouldn't it be great if we could be more like that? Instead of using so much energy trying to change the impossible, if we could just ride out what we are given and depend on our God for survival.

An eagle is known for its strength. Eagles have been seen lifting large prey in its talons and soaring off to a tree or cliff. Just as God gave the eagle strength beyond what we would imagine, He gives us a spiritual strength well beyond what we can imagine through His Holy Spirit.

Yet with all its awesome characteristics the majestic eagle depends on God for its survival. It is awesome to stop and realize that this magnificent bird, in itself, has little more capability to survive than the tiny sparrow. Without God providing for it, it would surely die at any stage of its life.

The lesson is obvious. Isaiah says there are people like eagles. They are able to renew their strength, soar on mighty wings, run and not grow weary, walk and not faint. Who are these remarkable people? THOSE WHO HOPE IN THE LORD.

Crossfit Faith

A s some of you know, Nancy and I follow a workout schedule that is based on the fitness ideals of crossfit. Crossfit sees fitness as a combination of things including: cardiovascular/ respiratory endurance, stamina, strength, flexibility, power, coordination, agility, balance and accuracy. So a person would not be fit if, for example, they were just really strong, or just had great endurance.

To achieve some ability in all of these areas crossfit uses three principals. These are: Functional Movements – training with exercises that have practical application. High Intensity – whatever the workout for the day it needs to be done at the highest energy level possible. Constant Variation – never allowing your body to become accustomed to the exercise regimen. The purpose is to develop physically in all areas.

In our Christian lives balance and ability across the board is important. For example, it is important that Christians live Christ-like lives. But this can't be done without knowledge of who Jesus is and what His values and expectations are. In addition, the Christian needs some skill at sharing his or her faith with others. Many other principals could be listed but this is enough to demonstrate that Christians need to be developing on a number of fronts to be successful.

We could borrow from crossfit for a summary of what it takes to develop in this way. Our efforts should be: Functional, that is relevant and applicable to real life. Intense, pursued at our highest level of energy and dedication. Constantly varied, encompassing all that is pertinent to growing closer to God and being effective in his service. The writer of Hebrews stressed the importance of developing (growing) as Christians in Hebrews 5:11-14.

Let's make spiritual growth a priority in our lives and work toward ever more crossfit faith.

Alex Clelland, whose tenure as a Canadian soldier in Europe in WWII changed his life forever, died in the Surrey hospital on Aug. 27 at the age of 85. While stationed in England, he met his wife, Marie Ellen Smith, who was born and raised in East London. They married in London on Feb 23, 1946, returning to Canada the same year.

After coming to Vancouver, they eventually built a home in Richmond, where they learned about the church of Christ through studies with David Johnson, the preacher at Blundell Ave. at that time. When Alex became a Christian, he never looked back, but continued to study the Bible and devote his life to being a Christian. He was proficient, whether teaching a Bible class or preaching a sermon. He possessed the gentle and quiet nature of a poet, and put many of his observations and values down in that form.

A private service for a last good-bye was observed in September at the Port Coquitlam cemetery where Alex was buried beside Marie. He leaves his wife, the former Grace Neufeld, and his family of four sons: Anthony, Grant, Philip and John, their wives, nine grandchildren and six greatgrand children.

Alex was born at Lethbridge, AB., on July 7, 1924, one of nine children. He was predeceased by all of his siblings, and, after 49 years of marriage, by Marie in 1995. He worked for Boeing Aircraft before joining the Canadian Armed Services at the age of 19.

Alex was chosen to be a member of the building committee from Blundell when it amalgamated with Vancouver's 12th Avenue church in 1959, eventually serving as an elder at the Oakridge church. He was married to Grace Neufeld on September 7, 1996.

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
